


**New Student Registration at Lawrence Elementary School**

**Lincoln County OKs Courthouse Concept with 5 Courtrooms, Stone Exterior**  
**Minor tweaks came to the plans that were first presented in May, with the public getting their first look at the exterior design of the building.**

Initial schematics for the interior, exterior and grounds of Lincoln County's courthouse expansion have been approved, giving architects the go-ahead to continue moving forward with the structure.

The Lincoln County Commission voted 4-1 on Tuesday, July 11, to approve preliminary schematics for the county's courthouse expansion — commonly referred to as the criminal justice center — and authorize architects to proceed forward to a design phase.

Tuesday's approval of the schematics comes more than two months after the public got their first look at the concept for the courthouse expansion, which is planned to house the county's court services, state's attorney's office, sheriff's office and a jail.

The design boasts a three-story structure with security features intended to keep separate members of the public, employees and criminal detainees.

Only minor changes were made from the interior's initial schematics, which were first presented to the commission on May 2.

**County settles on five courtrooms ... for now**

Though the May proposal featured room for up to seven courtrooms spread across the three-story complex, Lynn Remmers, of JLJ Architects said stakeholders agreed that five courtrooms will suffice the county's court needs for now.

An arraignment courtroom and a jury assembly room will be on the first floor with two large courtroom and two smaller hearing rooms on the second floor. The third floor, home to the state's attorney's office, will be constructed without courtrooms, but built with the possibility to transform them into additional courtrooms should the county need them in the future.

Remmers said leaving the extra space on the third-floor as convertible saves the county money by not investing in courtroom technology



today that could be outdated by the time the county needs to use it.

"On the future build out, we would have two courtrooms on the third floor. ... They'll [initially] be built as multipurpose rooms, because judges are worried electronics and technology would be outdated by the time they're ready to use those courtrooms," Remmers said. "It was a waste of money to outfit those courtrooms at this point. It's maybe \$60,000 to \$70,000 that we were saving per courtroom."

Remmers said the rooms will be outfitted with electric and technology plug-ins, so the county can avoid demolition when the conversion is deemed necessary.

Judges chambers for the day-one courtrooms will be located on the second floor, with private access to courtrooms.

**Stone exterior, native grasses planned**

While the presentation in May focused mostly on the look and feel of the criminal justice center's interior, Tuesday's meeting featured a first look at the building's exterior.

"Even though it's a large site and you're being mindful of how we're using money, there needs to be a sense of place and arrival," said Todd Orr of DLR Group. "We've been very diligent looking at opportunities for growth and how this site will serve the community for many, many years."

The front of the three-story building will be composed of a rough gray stone across most of the exterior.

From the main parking lots, visitors will be greeted with raised planter walls with a small set of wide stairs up to what Orr calls a cement "front porch." While on the front porch, visitors will be covered by a full-height canopy with a wood bottom, supported by four three-story pillars.

To the right of the main doors is a green space where trees will be planted.

Orr said native grasses will be planted across areas of the 40-acre lot to help the land feel like southeastern South Dakota, as opposed to a generic lawn.

The structure is planned to lie in the center of the land, which is already owned by the county. However, Orr said that all exterior building features and landscaping is being planned with the possibility of additions in mind.

"We have a very large site, and we are planning for the future," he said. "The infrastructure and roadways are in place for the main court building, but we do have stub outs for a future loop road for the future jail and other developments. We're putting in that infrastructure so we aren't going backwards to go forwards."

**Land dispute persists for Highway 18 access**

The schematics approved by the commission included an access road to U.S. Highway 18, a major artery that runs through Canton.

But Scott Montgomery, a Fairview resident, made sure to point out to the commission that they haven't acquired that land yet.

## A LOOK BACK AT THE STORIES AND HISTORY OF LINCOLN COUNTY

If you can't attend the Sioux River Folk Festival at Newton Hills State Park this weekend you can still catch one of the acts at the Canton Open Air Market on Thursday, August 3rd.

Singer/songwriter Janice Gilbert has roots in rural South Dakota and her music has been described as a blend of down home roots and contemporary country. She grew up on a farm and uses these experiences in songs like *Corn in the Silo, Bloom and She Can Haul*. Her songs have placed in national song writing contest in Nashville she won a title and a guitar for her song *No One Has to Go*. Janice will be performing from 5:00-7:00 p.m. at Jack Fox Park for our Folk Festival Kickoff Concert and Shari's Kitchen will have their

food truck there.

It's hard to believe that this is the second to the last Open Air Market of the summer. If you haven't attended time is running out for you to do so. For the final Open Air Market next week the Notable Accordion Ladies will be performing.

I've used the following story from the 1985 History of Lincoln County South Dakota before in this column. It describes how the folk festival began in 1980 and other events that myself and a few friends put on in Canton. Bill Peterson and I are still at it some 43 years later. What this all means I'm not quite sure but it's definitely been a very interesting ride. Happy Reading and I hope to see you at the Sioux River Folk Festival.

### Sioux River Folk Festival

Several projects had been tried in Canton to bring entertainment to its people, and the popular lament "there's nothing to do-nothing ever happens in Canton" was often heard. Being hometown fellows, Bill Peterson, Gaynor Johnson, Steve Frisbie, Craig Brown, and Gary Johnson felt the need for some kind of entertainment to bring back what Canton used to be. The answer-Chautauqua Park-a weedy but shady unused park since its demise in 1940. This inspired them to bring back the "old music in the park" days. Thus, Traditional Concerts was formed, and the first Sioux River Folk Festival was held Aug. 17, 1980 in the newly manicured park with nearly a thousand in attendance. Several nationally known recording artists starred in the six hours of music including gospel, bluegrass and folk music. The South Dakota Fine Arts Council and Friends of the Old Time Music were cosponsors for the family-oriented festival. The festival atmosphere was evident in the colorful stage cover, lawn chairs and umbrellas, blankets to sit on and dozens of hay bales for back rests and tables for picnic baskets. The festival was declared a success, and it was decided by the promoters to make it an annual event.

For the 1981 Festival, the group built a permanent stage at the park and other improvements were made. The concert drew nearly as large an audience as the year before with addition of blues, jazz and string band performers.

The third Festival featured the famous Rocky Mountain Oysters. Other music on the six hour program included the Lincoln County Band and groups playing Irish, Scottish and cowboy folk music. Pictures of the Chautauqua Park and city of Canton were on display, and there were several booths showing how to make musical instruments. This concert was aired on the South Dakota Public Radio Network.

The 1983 Festival was a "smashing success" with over twelve hundred people attending. Cloggers and square-dancers plus twenty-two Arts and Crafts booths were added to the usual musical groups.

The need was also felt for some kind of entertainment in mid-winter, so the group originated the Canton Area Cabin Fever Talent Shows which were held in the High School Auditorium. Three prior events in 1981 included the famous McLain Family, The Dakota String Quartet, and a group from the British Isles. The first annual Talent Show was held February 6, 1982, and in March a piano recital was presented by two music majors from the University of Vermillion. The second Talent Show was presented in 1983 and area talent was at its best.

September 3, 1983 was a happy day when Traditional Concerts brought the Roller Bros. Circus to town for two performances at Chautauqua Park. The two-ring Circus brought big-circus acts, acrobats, clowns and animal acts. Popcorn, peanuts, balloons, snake displays and all the pomp and beauty of a big show were there to entertain the audience.

As a parent and a grandparent, myself, I know how important it is for all of our parents to spend time with their newborn babies.

That's why I have prioritized family bonding by expanding Paid Family Leave (PFL) benefits for state employees. We worked hard to pass PFL for state employees in 2020, and we expanded it earlier this year.

We're not focusing solely on children and new parents. We have also given a new sense hope to hundreds of others across South Dakota.

When I launched the "Meth, We're on It" campaign in 2019 alongside the Department of Social Services, we were attacked by the mainstream media. The campaign was provocative, and it worked.

We have had incredible success combatting the meth crisis in our state. In 2020, South Dakota had the largest drop in drug overdoses in the country. Only two states had a decrease.

New Hampshire dropped by less than 1%—South Dakota dropped by 16%. Then, in 2022, we had the largest drop in the nation once again. This time, our overdoses dropped by 17.6%.

The media attacked us for the campaign, but it worked. It saved lives. And it made a difference in the lives of so many families.

This success is not just a happy coincidence. It is proof that our policies work. Our focus on the


individual needs of our people is really making a difference. I could never produce these results on my own – neither could any of our state agencies. Many of our agencies have worked together to tackle this challenge.

One of the biggest contributions has been the Department of Tribal Relations' annual Meth Summit. Secretary Flute and his team has been dedicated to helping our tribes fight the meth epidemic, and hundreds of lives have been saved because of their tireless efforts.

In South Dakota we don't complain about things, we fix them. That's something that my dad always told me. We are not a people who look at problems and think that it's someone else's job to solve them. We pick ourselves up and figure out how to fix things.

We dedicate ourselves to the betterment of our communities, our state, and our great nation.

That perspective is hard to come by these days, but that's what makes South Dakota even more special. Our state is a beacon of Freedom for the nation. We are a state that truly has a story to tell – and I couldn't be prouder that our story is a story of hope.

# Hailee Christensen: “Women’s World Cup is Just as Inspirational as it is Entertaining!”

## Rising HHS Soccer Star Enthusiastically Watching Women’s World Cup

As the U.S. Women’s National Team seeks its third consecutive World Cup win, Hailee Christensen is watching intently. And why not? She is a die-hard soccer fan. Hailee was part of the Dakota Alliance U17 Girls Soccer Team that recently won the USYS National Championships in Orlando, July 17 – 23. Her team was the first in South Dakota to win a national title at the biggest soccer tournament in the country.

For the soon-to-be Harrisburg senior, soccer has become more than just a school activity.

As a junior, Hailee played forward and scored an unprecedented 35 goals and made 20 assists leading the Harrisburg Tigers to a 16-1-1 season and winning the SDHSAA State AA Girls’ Soccer Championship title.

Honors continued to come her way this summer.

In June she was named the Gatorade South Dakota Player of the Year coupled with the South Dakota Player of the Year and also named a United Soccer All-American – the first girl in South Dakota to ever win the award. Her summer program wrapped up July

29 with the 4th Annual Gatorade & Granola Game, and Hailee now prepares for her last season of high school soccer.

While in Orlando, at the USYS National Championships, Hailee, along with teammates Abby Flanagan, Jaylee Hofer, Stella Litzen, Taylor Halstenson Tierney Mullady, and Rylan Peska made time to watch the first match of Women’s World Cup and saw the US team take on Vietnam winning 3-0.

Hailee says she watches professional sports when it comes to championships – especially soccer championships.

“Watching any professional sports is entertaining. I am not much of a football fan, but as soon as it is Super Bowl time, I am watching. For me, watching the Women’s World Cup is just as inspirational as it is entertaining.”

Now with month-long coverage of Women’s World Cup underway in Australia and New Zealand, Hailee is caught up in the tournament. Watching professionals play the sport she loves makes it even better.

“Yes, it is fun just to watch, but watching professionals play the sport you’re trying to succeed in is



so inspiring,” said Hailee. “Soccer is a sport that doesn’t have a lot of ‘attention’ from fans, so as a young soccer player, watching women play at a high level with the support of their Country, is incredible. The

National team is incredible.”

Knowing that players close to Hailee’s age are playing on the Women’s National Team makes watching even more fun. Young players make up the roster. Three players are 22 and under. Alyssa Thompson, 18, is the youngest player and the only teenager on the U.S. Women’s World Cup roster. She, in fact, was the first overall pick of the 2023 NWSL Draft in January. There is also Trinity Rodman, 21 and Sophia Smith, 22.

“It is pretty cool knowing that players close to my age are playing on the National Team,” she said.

Hailee’s favorite player is Sophia Smith.

“I think she has a similar style of play as me which is fun to see as a younger player. She doesn’t just score; she also assists and creates plays based on her runs. She might not always get the goal or the assist, but her movements to create space for her teammates is exceptional,” said Hailee. “Doing our best to help the entire team find success is what I enjoy.”

**Staying free of injuries – a key for a team**

For many members of the Women’s World Cup team, knee injuries plague the team. In fact, knee injuries along with ankle and calf injuries are the most common in women’s soccer.

Hailee and her Harrisburg teammates has been fortunate in the injury category as they get ready to defend their state title.

“Other than Hailee tearing her ACL with her club team, we have really not seen any serious injuries to girls’ knees on our Harrisburg team,” said Coach Eric Christensen. Christensen is not only Hailee’s coach, he is also her dad.

Eric knows there are many factors that lead to a higher level of knee injuries in women.

“I know there are many stories out there on the subject,” he said. “I honestly attribute that (being injury-free) to the level and length of our warm-ups prior to our practices and games. I am very happy the efforts we have taken have kept our players free from most all injuries during the high school soccer season.”

### August means soccer

As Hailee enters her senior year, she has already committed to SDSU for college soccer. She will play the first game of her final high school season at home Friday, August 11 vs the Mitchell Kernels.

As for the next few weeks, Eric knows that Women’s World Cup holds his daughter’s interest.

“The relatability of the games when there are girls at or near my daughter’s age group playing at this level is very impactful.”

### Remarkably Bright Creatures by Shelby Van Pelt


This story takes place along the Pacific Northwest coastline, in the fictional town of Sowell Bay, Washington.


take some time and effort from both of you to reach it.





## A Trial or A Blessing?

We raise chickens and one of the best benefits of having chickens is having eggs. We had a problem though. In one of our best laying pens, the eggs were being eaten by a chicken. Instead of getting 5 or 6 eggs, we would only find one egg each day and that egg was protected as the hen sat on it until we arrived. We could see evidence of other eggs and determined that one of the chickens must be eating them. We had made sure there was plenty of protein in their ration, but the problem continued.

We were experiencing what often happens in life. We were being blessed and facing a trial all at the same time. We were blessed with hens that laid eggs, but were facing the trial of having a chicken that was eating the eggs.

Suddenly another trial struck. In the pen where the eggs were being eaten, one of the two roosters died. Although we also raise chickens to eat, the unexpected death of one of our birds is not easy to face. But just as blessings often come with trials, this trial came with an unexpected blessing. After that rooster died, we no longer had eggs being eaten. Evidently our egg thief had perished.

Now we have the blessing of a full crop of eggs again, but we have the trial of one less rooster. So often life is like that. It reminds me of the

words of a song I heard as a child, "I beg your pardon, I never promised you a rose garden. Along with the sunshine, there has to be a little rain sometime." In order to have beautiful flowers, we have to have both rain and sunshine. There are times that rain is a blessing and times when it is a trial. The same can be said about sunshine.

On the 4th of July, we were disappointed when the parade was canceled due to rain, but we were also glad that it rained because it was good for the crops, gardens, and trees we had planted.

Some people teach that if we just get things right, that we should expect a life filled with health, wealth, and prosperity and free of trials. When we read the Bible, we do not find any people who have lives free of trials. In fact, some of the most faithful people faced extreme trials like prison, beatings, famine, health challenges, and poverty. Yet over and over again, we find people in less than ideal situations trusting God in spite of their trials and then finding blessings.


The Apostle Paul wrote in Philippians 4:12, "I know how to get along with humble means, and I also know how to live in prosperity; in any and every circumstance I have learned the secret of being filled and going hungry, both of having

abundance and suffering need." In his letters to the Corinthians, he says, "To this present hour we are both hungry and thirsty, and are poorly clothed, and are roughly treated, and are homeless; and we toil, working with our own hands; when we are reviled, we bless; when we are persecuted, we endure;" (I Corinthians 4:11-12), and "as sorrowful yet always rejoicing, as poor yet making many rich, as having nothing yet possessing all things." ## Lincoln County Courthouse Continued

While the majority of the criminal justice center's plans focus on the already-owned 40-acre lot, negotiations are currently under way for the county to acquire another 10-acre plot to the south of the main campus.

That land is owned by Doug and Sherry McKenney, and their attorney said discussions for the county to acquire that land is not welcome.

"Let's just say we do not welcome the county's interest in the land," said attorney AJ Swanson. "The McKenneys don't think their lives are going to be bettered [by selling the land]."

Though he didn't provide Sioux Falls Live with any details of possible negotiations, Swanson indicated that the county may have to resort to the use of eminent domain to acquire the land.

The Lincoln County Commission has discussed the use of eminent domain, a topic which saw public outrage after the same commission asked incoming carbon pipelines to avoid using the tactic. The commission, however, tabled further discussion, saying they're attempting to continue negotiations with the McKenneys.

It's unclear whether the commission will use eminent domain or not.

### More details to come, planners say

Tuesday's vote gave architects and planners the green light to begin transforming the two-dimensional schematics to three-dimensional designs, which will give the public and the Lincoln County Commission their closest look at the courthouse expansion.

Remmers said the 3D design process is expected to be finished sometime in September, and that the commission should expect to receive another update sometime in mid-September and again in November.

After those presentations, construction documents will begin to be prepared, Remmers said, with bidding opening in January 2024 and a bid winner ideally selected in February. Construction could begin as soon as that spring.
