Canton Senior Center History

The Canton Senior Center is used daily by several different groups. Community members gather to play cards, whist, bridge, mahjong, or pool. In addition to the daily events, the building is used by several community groups for monthly meetings or family gatherings.

The building was built by Thorson in 1921, which was given to the city for the youth. There was gym space and bleachers around the upstairs to watch games being played. Later known as "The Link" it was a local hangout for teens with a concession stand, juke box and pinball machines. A group of members from the community met at the time to discuss ways to help our elderly population. For many, it was difficult to have a home cooked nutritious meal. This led a member of the group to approach the Nursing Home about starting a meal program. Soon, the program outgrew the nursing home and went searching for another solution. Members of the group approached Active Generations about providing a meal program in Canton and the Senior Center Board was formed.

The Board approached the city and made an agreement that the city would provide a safe place to hold the meal program. The city is responsible for the outside of the building, and the Board responsible for the inside. Active Generations agreed to provide staff, equipment, and the raw food cost. In return, Active Generations received all meal donations and unspecified donation gifts. The nutritional meal program is subsidized by the state and federal government, which is received by the parent company to offset the costs. In 2018, the Senior Board chose to leave the parent company of Active Generations and they joined Rural Outreach Community Services (ROCS) based in Wagner. ROCS is also the parent company of the bus transit service in Canton.

The local kitchen chooses their menu from a file of state approved menus and recipes based on nutritional value. 800 meals every month are prepared in the kitchen. There are 20 households who also receive delivered meals. In-house dining brings approximately 20-40 people every day. Anyone regardless of age can eat. If over the age of sixty, the suggested donation is \$5 and under the age of sixty, \$8. To help the staff prepare, they request anyone who is planning on coming to sign up ahead of time. There is a daily kitchen staff of 2 employees and 1 cook/manager.



Volunteers are a huge part of operations for the Senior Center, Meals on Wheels and during noon meals. The meals leave the Senior Center at 11 am to be delivered. These volunteers are important because they may provide the only contact with the outside world for most of these clients and can also be used as a well-being check. If the client doesn't answer the door or is feeling ill, the appropriate steps can then be taken by the site manager. Lunch at the Senior Center is at 11:30 Monday-Friday. Volunteers are also needed at the center during this time to help the elders by providing fellowship, setting tables, pouring coffee, and carrying meals for clients. Socialization is an important part of the elderly's lives, as most live alone.

Caught by Your Own Trap

My oldest son has figured out how to make a fun pranking device. He took a mouse trap, covered the spring arm with duct tape so that it can hold some airsoft bb's, and then he extended some fishing line to make a trip wire to trigger it.

Since he likes playing airsoft, he decided that this has potential to be more than just a pranking device. So he began to calculate how he could implement it into game play. One of his concerns however was that he not place it where he or his teammates would end up being the target rather than their opponents.

His concerns remind me of Proverbs 26:27, "He who digs a pit will fall into it, And he who rolls a stone, it will come back on him."

The Proverbs however, are not talking about a game of airsoft. They are talking about the dangers of acting foolishly and not doing what God expects from us. Just before vs 27, the Proverb warn about stirring up strife. Often when people do that, they end up hurting themselves as much or more than they hurt their opponents.

Rolling a stone or digging a pit for an opponent tends to be more of an offensive rather than defensive action. Of course the mouse trap could be used to defend a strategic point. Still, there is a difference between protecting oneself and going on the attack. This is the difference between justice and vengeance.

When someone has done wrong we must seek justice. Information about the injustice must be shared with the proper authorities with the hope that justice will be served. In an imperfect world justice does not always prevail, but that does not mean that we should resort to vengeance.

It is not uncommon for strife to be stirred up and for people who do not have all the facts to stir things up even further. All we have to do is look at the political landscape in our country to see examples on both

the left and the right of this very thing happening. Both of our major parties have experienced some major embarrassment after "rocks that were rolled" rolled back on them. We have even witnessed violent action from those on the extreme edges of both parties as the quest for vengeance over injustices got out of hand. Too often things got out of hand because people were stirred up by false or incomplete information. The flames were fed to make people more angry than they should have been.

For example, the important message of rejecting racism was lost through false claims of racism in the Jessie Smollett case. Then legitimate concerns about making sure our elections are fair got lost by extreme ideas from the "Kracken Lady."

Soon people on both ends of the political spectrum had reason to be embarrassed and the real concerns for injustice got overshadowed. Further people got hurt because strife had been instigated to extremes that should have never been reached.

What we witness on the political landscape makes news headlines, so it is easy to be familiar with it, but the Proverbs are important for helping each of us individually in our day to day lives. Too often when we get upset we end up making things worse for ourselves and our teammates. This is especially true when instead of showing grace, we start to dig pits and roll rocks. Jesus had the power to put people into pits or to crush them with rocks, yet instead he came filled with grace and truth.

When injustice has been done, we should be willing to speak the truth. But we must be careful that we not speak or act in a vengeful way that could do more harm than good. We should be reminded to live like Christ as we show love to our neighbors. We should take a firm stand against injustice while still being gentle toward the world around us. www.southtownchurch.com

A LOOK BACK AT THE STORIES AND HISTORY OF LINCOLN COUNTY

When you look at the history of Canton, South Dakota the name "Lawrence" looms quite large over our prairie landscape. Ernest Orlando (E.O.) Lawrence was recently inducted into the first C-Hawk Community Hall of Fame for his achievements in the world of physics, winning the Nobel Prize and inventing the cyclotron. His brother John did some amazing things too becoming "the father of nuclear medicine." In 1983 he received the Enrico Fermi Award, the Department of Energy's highest scientific honor.

You have to look no further than

Carl G. and Gunda Lawrence Family

Carl Gustavus Lawrence was born in Madison, Wis., on Jan. 12, 1871, to Ole Hundale Lawrence and Betha Marie Hull Lawrence. Ole Lawrence was an educated Norwegian immigrant who took up his profession of teaching among the frontier settlers in Wisconsin in 1840. Carl graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1894 and rode into South Dakota on a bicycle. He came to Canton to teach Latin and history at what was then Augustana College. His salary was 55 dollars per month for nine months. At that time the college was having financial troubles due to the depression. There were seven faculty members and 100 students, 75 of whom were high school students.

Four years later Carl became Superintendent of Public Schools in Canton. He met and married Gunda Regina Jacobsen, who was in the high school mathematics teacher. She had graduated from the State Teachers College in Madison before becoming part of the Canton High School faculty. Upon accepting Carl's proposal of marriage, Gunda conscientiously quit her teaching career and took a job as a "hired girl" in order to learn more about homemaking to make her a better wife. They were married Aug. 22, 1900. Carl was then one of the nation's youngest superintendents of schools.

Carl remained as Canton Superintendent until 1906 when he became Lincoln County Superintendent for two terms. As County Superintendent, he believed there should be a connection between school and home life. He started "industrial education" clubs, which were forerunners to 4-H clubs. The clubs spread all over the state and got him into politics. He became the State Superintendent of Public Instruction in 1911 and held that position until 1914. He then returned to Canton to again be Superintendent of Public Schools until 1919, when he became President of Southern State Normal at Springfield from 1919 to 1933. (The library of the Springfield campus is named in his honor.) In 1933, he went to Aberdeen as President of Northern Normal and Industrial School in the years 1933-1939.

Carl and Gunda were blessed with two sons, Ernest Orlando and John Hundale, both born in Canton. Ernest became a physicist, best known for inventing the cyclotron and his work on the atomic bomb. John used his brother's nuclear ideas and applied them to medicine, becoming the "Father of Nuclear Medicine."

Gunda became ill in 1938 at the age of 65, and received the diagnosis of cancer of the pelvis at the Mayo Clinic. Ernest and John took her to California with them and applied their research in nuclear medicine to her. She was treated with a million x-rays using a tube invented by Sloan (a student) and Ernest Lawrence. She lived to be 83.

In 1939, Carl retired and joined his famous sons in Berkeley. Carl and Gunda celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary at Berkeley in 1950.

While he was in Canton, Carl was the first President of South Dakota Luther League in 1898. He taught a Bible class at the Lutheran church. The Athenian Debating Society in Canton was organized by him and other like-minded fellows. He also helped organize the golf club in Canton, as well as in Springfield.

The Lawrences lived at 822 East Third when they were in Canton. They taught their sons the traditional values of pioneer America: honesty, morality, and fear of God. Those virtues and the values of hard work, initiative, and self-reliance have been evident in their careers.

E.O. and John's father Carl to see where these two Canton born men got their drive to succeed and make the world a better place. In 1894, four years after arriving in South Dakota on his bicycle, Carl became the Supt. of Schools in Canton, a job he would hold not once but twice.

The following family history taken from the 1985 History of Lincoln County South Dakota will tell you all about Carl and his wife Gunda. Happy reading and be sure to check out Charlie Parr at the Canton Barn Sunday evening at 7:00 p.m.



The Big Three

BIG Update

Ten years ago, Winter Storm Atlas came bearing down across western South Dakota. It brought record amounts of snow for the month of October, dumping 55 inches over Lead, South Dakota. Tens of thousands of livestock tragically perished in the storm, and many areas had power outages that lasted a week or longer.

Many of us have never experienced a storm like that in our lifetime, and hopefully never will again. The unprecedented nature of this storm brought people together to clear debris and restore damage over the following months. South Dakotans are tough and resilient. Neighbors helping neighbors, strangers helping strangers is the norm in South Dakota, even when times are tough.

The devastation endured by many is disheartening, but the strength of South Dakota remains.

BIG Idea

This week, I met with the South Dakota Association of Healthcare Organizations (SDAHO) to discuss the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services' (CMS) proposed rule to require nursing homes to have an onsite RN 24 hours, 7 days a week and mandate minimum hours for RNs and CNAs. This rule would force nursing homes across South Dakota to close because they can't fulfill the requirement. In fact, the rule would cause nursing homes across America to close because Alaska is the only state that currently meets CMS's baseline. If the outcome of this rule is thousands of nursing homes closing, that certainly isn't the best for America. Like SDAHO, I oppose this decision, and I've been working in Congress to ensure CMS's rule does not get finalized.

BIG News

Unfortunately, the House made history this week. On

Tuesday, eight Republican members of Congress (only 4% of Republicans) voted with every single Democrat to remove the Speaker of the House from his post. It is a historic move with detrimental consequences to our country and to the slim House Republican majority. We were making progress on lowering spending and securing the border – these eight members brought that progress to a halt.

Without a Speaker of the House, no legislative business can be conducted on the House Floor. This situation is a giant waste of America's time. We are 40 days away from a government shutdown and haven't passed the necessary funding bills to pay our military, the aviation bill, or the Farm Bill. America deserves better. I came to Congress to solve problems, it's unfortunate that eight of my colleagues don't feel the same.

Dave Says: When You Nickel and Dime Things, Nothing Gets Done Well

Dear Dave,

I'm currently on Baby Step 2, and I have about \$7,000 in debt to pay off before I can move to bulking up my emergency fund in Baby Step 3. When you're paying off debt, what do you recommend for 401(k) contributions?


I recommend putting a temporary stop to investing while you're getting out of debt. Lots of people are shocked by this advice, and some disagree with it, because they're afraid of missing out on their employer's match or the wonders of compound interest. But before we go any further, let me emphasize one thing. The key word here is temporary.

Baby Step 1 is to save \$1,000 as a starter emergency fund. Baby Step 2 is paying off all of your debt, except for your home, from smallest to largest using the debt snowball plan. During this time you're attacking your debt with incredible intensity, and putting every penny you can scrape together toward paying it off.

Working my plan, the average person can pay off all their debt, except for their home, in 18 to 24 months. Some folks can do it faster, and for some it takes a little longer. But during this time I want your financial focus to be on nothing but getting out of debt. Once that's done, you'll find you have a lot more control over your biggest wealth-building tool—your income.

Trying to accomplish too many things at once diminishes the ability to focus. And when you spend all your time nickel-and-diming everything, the result is that nothing at all gets done very well. You need to really move the needle and see results, because personal finance is 80 percent behavior and only 20 percent head knowledge. It's not so much a math issue, because if you'd been doing the math all along you wouldn't have a bunch of debt.

That's why, for a short period of time, I want you to concentrate with laser intensity on knocking out debt. Once that's out of the way, you can pour even more money into investing, saving and giving!

**Home Fires:**

KNOW THE DRILL

PREPARE

Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, as well as inside and outside every sleeping area.

Test smoke alarms monthly, and replace the batteries if needed.

Purchase and learn how to safely use a fire extinguisher.

Create a fire escape plan with your family, reviewing and practicing it twice a year.

Your fire escape plan should include two exit points from every room, as well as a designated outdoor meeting spot.

Make sure everyone in your family knows when and how to call 911 or the fire department.

PREVENT

Turn off portable heaters whenever you leave a room or go to sleep.

Never leave a candle burning unattended, and consider replacing traditional candles with battery-operated flameless versions.

Keep matches and lighters out of reach from children, and make sure they know never to play with these items.

Replace or repair loose plugs, exposed wiring or frayed extension cords, and avoid overloading outlets and extension cords.

Keep any items that can catch fire at least three feet away from cooking and heating devices.

Remain in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food. Always turn off the stove if you leave the kitchen even for a brief period of time.

STAY ALIVE

In the event of a fire, yell "Fire" repeatedly and evacuate immediately. Once outside, call 911 or the fire department, and never reenter a burning building for any reason.

If a door or door handle feels warm to the touch, do not open it. Use an alternate escape route.

If you must walk through smoke, get as close to the ground as possible to escape under the smoke, closing doors behind you.

If your clothing catches fire, always remember to stop, drop and roll, covering your face with your hands.

If you can't escape a room, close the door and cover vents and door cracks with a towel or cloth to keep out smoke. Call 911 or the fire department, and signal for help at the window with a piece of cloth or a flashlight.

If you are unable to reach pets or someone in the home needing assistance, evacuate, call 911 and tell the emergency operator and firefighters where the person or pet is located.



Now that we have essentially a green light from the PUC and PHMSA, it would make sense to see our officials now take the initiative to move ahead with an ordinance.





Understanding the 504

Important Civil Rights law providing educational benefits for kids with hidden disabilities and/or ADHD

Diabetes. Dyslexia. Autism spectrum disorder. Anxiety. Traumatic brain injury. ADHD. Asthma. Hearing loss. Low vision. A heart condition. For a student, who otherwise on the outside may appear like everyone else, dealing with any of these "hidden" disabilities can make school difficult at times.

But a 504 Plan could help make school more accommodating.

A 504 Plan ensures a student is receiving the most effective accommodations for his or her specific circumstances that will ensure academic success, educational opportunities and fair access to the learning environment.

For a parent, it is important to understand what a 504 Plan is, what accommodations a student can receive, what is covered under a 504 Plan, how students access or make sure accommodations are followed through, who oversees a 504 Plan, if there is a designated area to go for the accommodations or services and how parents can advocate for those accommodations.

But what exactly is a 504?

Actually, 504 is part of a civil rights law. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, commonly called "Section 504," is a federal law that protects students from discrimination based on a disability. It is an anti-discrimination, civil rights statute that requires the needs of students with disabilities to be met as adequately as the needs of the non-disabled students.

Section 504 states that: "No otherwise qualified individual with a disability in the United States, as defined in section 706(8) of this title, shall, solely by reason of her or his disability, be excluded from the participation in, or be denied the benefits of, or be subject to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance..."



There's a lot to know about Section 504. Here are some commonly asked questions:

Who is protected under Section 504?

To be protected under Section 504, a student must be determined to: (i) have a mental or physical impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities; (ii) have a record of such an impairment; or (iii) being regarded as having such an impairment."

What is an "impairment" as used under the Section 504 definition?

An impairment as used in Section 504 may include any disability, long-term illness, or various disorder that "substantially" reduces or lessens a student's ability to access learning in the educational setting because of a learning-, behavior- or health-related condition.

Many students have conditions or disorders that are not readily apparent to others. They may include conditions such as specific learning disabilities, diabetes, epilepsy and allergies. Hidden disabilities such as low vision, poor hearing, heart disease or chronic illness may not be obvious, but if they substantially limit that child's ability to receive appropriate education as defined by Section 504, they may be considered to have an "impairment" under Section 504 standards. As a result, these students, regardless of their intelligence, will be unable to fully demonstrate their ability or attain educational benefits equal to those provided to students without disabilities.

HOW TO GET YOUR CHILD A 504 PLAN

- 1 Gather Documentation
- 2 Reach out to the school's 504 coordinator
- 3 Write a formal request
- 4 Follow up if needed (ideally, you won't need to!)
- 5 Prepare for the evaluation process
- 6 Arrange a meeting with the school
- 7 Collaborate and create a plan

What are "major life activities"?

Major life activities include, but are not limited to self-care, manual tasks, walking, seeing, speaking, sitting, thinking, learning, breathing, concentrating, interacting with others and working. As of January 1, 2009, with reauthorization of Americans with Disabilities Amendment Act (ADAA) this list has been expanded to also include the life activities of reading, concentrating, standing, lifting, bending, etc. This may include individuals with AD/HD, dyslexia, cancer, diabetes, severe allergies chronic asthma, Tourette's syndrome, digestive disorders and temporary disabilities (broken writing arm, broken leg, etc.).

What does "substantially limits" mean?

Substantially limits is not defined in federal regulations. However, in a letter from the Office of Civil Rights, it states, "this is a determination to be made by each local school district and depends on the nature and severity of the person's disabling condition." New guidance from the Americans with Disabilities Amendment Act states that Section 504 standards must conform with the ADAA and is "intended to afford a broad scope of protection to eligible persons." In considering substantial limitations, students must be measured against the same age, nondisabled peers in the general population.

Who can refer a child for consideration for evaluation under Section 504?

Anyone can refer a child for evaluation under section 504. However, while anyone can make a referral, such as a parent or a doctor, the school district must also have reason to believe that the child is in need of services under Section 504 due to a "disability." If a parent requests a referral for evaluation, and the school district refuses, the school district must provide the parent with notice of their procedural rights under Section 504.

Who decides whether a student is qualified and eligible for services under Section 504?

According to federal regulations: "...a placement decision is to be made by a group of persons who are knowledgeable about the child, the meaning of the evaluation data, placement options, least restrictive environment requirements, and comparable facilities." This group of persons is often called a 504 team.

Unlike Special Education, Section 504 does not require or even mention that parents are to be part of the 504 team. The decision to include parents in the 504 team is a determination that is made by each school district and should be spelled out in the district's procedures for implementing Section 504. Parents should at least be asked and encouraged to contribute any information that they may have that would be helpful to the 504 team in

making their determination of what the child may need. Schools are expected to make sound educational decisions as to what the child needs in order to receive an appropriate education.

What information is used in doing an evaluation under Section 504?

Under Section 504, no formalized testing is required. The 504 team should look at grades over the past several years, teacher reports, information from parents or agencies, state assessment scores or other school-administered tests, observations, discipline reports, attendance records, health records and adaptive behavior information. Schools must consider a variety of sources. A single source of information such as a doctor's report cannot be the only information considered. Schools also must assure that all information submitted is documented and considered.

Can a child be placed under Section 504 without a parent's knowledge?

No. Parents must always be given notice before their child is evaluated and/or placed under Section 504. Parents must also be given a copy of their child's Section 504 accommodation plan if the 504 team determines that the child is eligible. They should read the plan and know what the accommodations are.

What is the difference between an individual Educational Plan (IEP) and a 504 Plan?

There are subtle but important differences between an IEP and a 504 plan.

Not all students who have disabilities require special instruction. IEP's create specialized instruction and related services. Students with 504 Plans do not require specialized instruction, but accommodations and/or related aids and services. And like the IEP, a 504 Plan should be updated annually to ensure that the student is receiving effective accommodations for his or her circumstances.

Assistant Principal Kay Bass, who leads the 504 team at Harrisburg High School, says individuals who have a disability that limits a major life activity can qualify for a 504.

"Students who do not qualify for an IEP and special education services may qualify for a 504 and receive protection from discrimination. To be eligible for a 504, individuals must have documentation of their physical and mental disability typically from a medical provider indicating a qualifying disability."

Bass encourages parents to be proactive and advocate for their child.

"If your child has a disability that does not impact their ability to learn, but does impact their life activities, you can work with your child's principal/504 coordinator to develop a 504 plan, which indicates specific accommodations needed."



The Canton C-Hawk football team hosted Vermillion and rolled to a 42-13 victory as they prepare to head out west to face the 2-5 Custer Wildcats to earn wins over Hill City and Lead Deadwood and losses to West Central, Tri Valley, RC Christian, Lennox and Vermillion. Kickoff will be at 6:00pm on the 13th.

Canton started out the game with the ball and 2 minutes into the game Cain Wallner took the handoff and headed left and found daylight and ran for a 52 yard touchdown as the Hawks took a 6-0 lead at 10:00. Vermillion got the ball in Canton territory at the 42 but on a 4th down at the 35 Canaan McCracken got a good tackle on the scramble to turn the ball over on downs but Canton couldn't make any ground and was forced to punt. The Tanagers were forced to punt on their next series and they pinned the C-Hawks back on the 1 with a great punt but then the hawks went to their ground attack with Cain Wallner having runs of 20 and 7 then McCracken followed Dallas King for another 5 to the 33 yard line.
