

C-Hawks Trade in Their Blue and Gold for PINK



October is Breast Cancer Awareness month, and on the 6th the Canton C-Hawk football team will take the field in their "Crucial Catch" jersey's. Instead of their traditional blue and gold, these one-of-a-kind jerseys are highlighted in PINK. The night is about building awareness around cancer and early detection, it's also a chance to honor those who've battled the disease and to raise money to help local families currently battling cancer.

The NFL and American Cancer Society started the Crucial Catch program in 2009, and according to Coach Rich Lundstrom that's when the C-Hawks partnered with them to raise money for breast cancer awareness. But Lundstrom says for the past several years he was looking for a way to help people locally, "Scott Larson from Sanford Hospital told me about a small fund for cancer patients and their families at the Canton-Inwood Area Health Foundation, so I decided that we would raise money for that fund instead of sending it to the National ACS office." Lundstrom says the fund is for patients and families battling any kind of cancer not just breast cancer, and the money is used for things like transportation, meals, rooms, or whatever is needed.

C-Hawk Moms for Football are raising the money for this every other year event. Donations from Canton area businesses help purchase the football jerseys which the players will wear Friday night against Vermillion. During the game, each jersey is for sale and will go to the highest bidder as part of a silent auction that will run through half time. The Road to Nowhere

South Veterans Parkway has its first intersection complete as construction continues between the major roadways of Cliff, Minnesota and Western Avenues

Call it a baby step.

The first intersection of the 8.7 miles of the South Veterans Parkway road construction project is complete, and two lanes of northbound and southbound traffic on Cliff Avenue are now open between 77th and 85th Streets. It is also where the six-lanes of Veterans Parkway will be crossing roadways north of Harrisburg. Not only that, but it will also include a bridge over 85th Street near Minnesota Avenue.

Motorists traveling Cliff Avenue, Minnesota Avenue and Western Avenue have been contending with construction woes the last four months. These three vital roads are the first of four construction segments as the four-year, \$210M South Veterans Parkway project moves forward.

Lots of roadwork; no roads

For now, only an intersection is complete. Nothing else.

And even with all the construction, South Veterans Parkway still has no roads.

Confused? A drive down Minnesota Avenue may explain

more. The six lanes are being built mostly in open fields in between rapidly developing areas of Harrisburg and Sioux Falls.

Two weeks ago, crews closed the outside northbound and southbound lanes on Minnesota Ave one-fourth mile south of 85th Street where South Veteran's Parkway will eventually intersect with Minnesota Avenue. Because of the work zones, there is only one lane of traffic.

Though there is work on intersections, road paving and road work between Cliff Avenue and Western Avenue won't be scheduled until the spring, summer and fall months of 2024. There is also work west of Minnesota Avenue towards Western Avenue where a pedestrian box culvert has been installed as a pedestrian underpass.

A 1995 vision to wrap up in 2027

The new 8.7 miles of South Veterans Parkway will eventually add to the existing 8.5 miles of North Veterans Parkway, which stretches from Interstate 90 in northeastern Sioux Falls to 57th Street in southern Sioux Falls. Veterans Parkway has been part of

Sioux Falls' long-range planning since it was outlined in 1995 by a Sioux Falls Regional Transportation Study. The road would serve a different purpose than a street like 41st Street which has access every 100 feet. Instead, it would curve around the city. It would be 16 miles long, be six lanes wide and connect I-90 and I-29. And it would take time. Southern Veterans Parkway would be completed in four phases stretching over four years and finishing in 2027.



Marie "Teenie" Heeren

December 25, 1931 -

September 29, 2023

Marie "Teenie" Heeren, age 91, died Friday, September 29, 2023 surrounded by her family at Avera McKennan Hospital in Sioux Falls. Funeral services will begin at 11:00 a.m. Thursday, October 5, 2023 at Canton Lutheran Church. Family will greet visitors one hour prior to the service.

Marie "Teenie" Elyne (Volden) Heeren was born on December 25, 1931, to Thoralf Olson Volden and Florence Evangeline (Juel) Volden near Klondike. She grew up with her older brother Elmer and later welcomed brothers David and Paul. The family moved around farms in the Canton area before settling near Klondike, which became Teenie's lifelong home. She was baptized and confirmed at Canton Lutheran Church, studied at Hokenstad Country School, and graduated from Canton High School in 1950.

Teenie had a deep affection for the outdoors and animals, bonding especially with her pet racoon and workhorses "Pete & Johnny." "Bitty coon" loved nothing more than to ride on her Indian motorcycle or the Oliver tractor. There was no animal that she could not tame or make a pet out of. Once in her care, they never lacked for food or attention. Her greatest love was for horses. She was especially fond of horseback riding with her friends Gloria & Lana through the Klondike hills or trail riding with the Saddle Club.

On January 1, 1957, she married her best friend and the love of her life, Stanley Eugene Heeren at Canton Lutheran Church. They initially moved to Iowa Falls for Stan's job as a power lineman, but returned to the family farm due to her father Thoralf's health issues. The couple had a daughter, Linda, who inherited her mother's love for animals, especially horses.

In 1977, Teenie started working at Hinky Dinky in Sioux Falls, staying through its various name changes until the store closed its doors in about 2005. She was the only original employee of Hinky Dinky, Prairie Market, Sunshine & Econofoods before it closed. Because of her outgoing personality, she decided to take a job as a cashier at Hy-Vee, where she became a favorite amongst customers. In 1991, Teenie faced the sudden loss of her beloved husband, Stan. Despite the tragedy, she continued to work at Hy-Vee, care for her many farm animals and look after her brother, Paul.

Her grandchildren, Aliya Marie & Kellyn Daniel, were her greatest joy. Chasing Grandma's car up the driveway to the screams "Grandma's home, Grandma's home," relentlessly knocking on her door, because she couldn't get out of her car to unlock the front door fast enough, so they could get inside to spend time with Grandma. Soon, the smell of fresh popcorn filled the air, along with butterscotch pudding & cookies while watching Sponge Bob! As the kids aged, she loved watching videos from Aliya's cheerleading competitions and Kellyn's wrestling tournaments. Special memories were Grandma traveling to Council Bluffs to Aliya's cheer competition & going to Kellyn's wrestling tournaments. The kids had their own private cheering section.

In 2012, a stroke changed her life forever, taking away the independence of being outside, riding her motorcycle & 4-wheeler, being out in the barn & the job she loved at Hy-Vee. After her rehab stay at Avera McKennan Hospital, she moved in with Dan, Linda & her grandchildren, where she would live until her death. Our home will never be the same without her, but her stubbornness, faith, work ethic, honesty, and love will be the legacy we all cherish and carry forward to honor a well-lived life.

Preceding her in death was her husband, Stanley, parents Thoralf & Florence Volden, brothers Elmer, David & Paul, sister-in-law Martha Volden, brothers-in-law Harold Heeren & Warren Heeren, sister-in-law Betty Hulst, nephew Mark Volden, nieces Peggy Volden & Lori Volden and Bruce's son Travis Volden.

2013

The Canton C-Hawk football team hosted the Tri Valley Mustangs on Friday night and rolled to a 38-0 victory to improve their season record to 3-1.

The Cross Country Team participated in the Sioux Falls Christian Invitational. Thomas Woods placed 49 with time of 19:39, followed by Jacob Huber 51 in time of 19:52; Elliott Anderson 61 in time 20:28 and Austin Rhode 71 in time 21:19. Natalie Van Wyhe finished 16th in a time of 16:50; Sally Peterson 23 in time 17:07; Jaden Wersal 49 in time 18:32; Jada Lundstrom 60 in time 19:10; Ariann VanBockern 61 in time 19:11; McKenzie Krogmann 63 in time 19:22.

What can you do with land that is situated between a railroad track that is circular? Build storage facilities for 5 million cubic feet of grain. Kyle Hoffman came away with a second place finishing a time of 15:38 in the junior varsity division. Deb Grebner finished 19th. The girls varsity team ran in a field of 39 runners with Jennie Day placing 22th, Amber Hoffman placed 18th and Desiree Sehr 27th.

The Klondike Mill Property on the border with Iowa and South Dakota was sold recently with EROS Rural development corporation of Sioux Falls, being the purchaser. The new owners of the property said they plan to reserve the Mill for an historical attraction.

Twenty-five grain cars were in Canton last Wednesday to be loaded with corn from Hunting Elevator Co. Hunting Manager Orv Bruk said as far as he knew this was a

first time for this area and he has contracted for the train to be here five times. The local elevator has twenty-four hour period to load the twenty-five grain cars and have them ready for shipment. The units carries 85,000 bushels of corn, with each car carrying 3,500 bushels.

Each car takes the local Hunting force of seven men form 12 to 15 minutes to fill.

A special bond election is being held Tuesday, October 9 to decide whether the Board of Education shall be authorized to issue bonds in an amount not to exceed \$400,000.00 for the purpose of raising money to provide funds for the construction of additional junior high school classrooms, band room, lunch room, locker room, heating plant and other facilities.

I am sure I romanticize my childhood and memories of Canton but nothing in the past decades has done anything to diminish the love affair, and so, on it goes."

Memories of a Kid from Canton

Dr Nutter: When I was probably 9 or 10 years old, the Methodists were building a new church. They had just started construction and there were several huge dirt piles. Nothing attracts a bunch of mischievous boys like dirt piles. Me and some friends were having dirt clod fights back and forth. One of my friends landed a perfect shot. Unfortunately, it included a pretty good size rock that was inside the dirt clod. It hit me square on the top of my head. I did not think much about it but then I could feel something on my head. It was blood. I was bleeding pretty good, so I figured I better head home. I got on my bike and started riding towards home. I got to the base of Millie's Hill where Dr. Nutter lived. I figured I'd save my parents a trip to the doctor, so I pulled my bike up to Dr. Nutter's front door and knocked on the door. Amazingly, Dr. Nutter was home.

Reading this made me think of a time many, many moons ago that I drove a friend of mine who used to live here back to his new home in Tucson, Arizona. He'd flown into Sioux Falls and since I wasn't working at the time I thought a trip to much warmer climates in the middle of January was just what I needed. We took our time getting there heading west to the Black Hills and then down into Colorado where we visited Judy Deinema who was living high up in the Rocky Mountains at the time.

We eventually arrived in Tucson where the temperature was in

the high 60's. After a little side trip down into Mexico I said goodbye to my friend and began my journey home. Tucson to Canton is a long drive especially when you are making it solo. I'll never forget coming down Lier's hill west of town and seeing Canton off in the distance for the first time in awhile. I had that same feeling and smile on my face that Tom mentions. I'd enjoyed my trip to Arizona but I was very happy to be back in this place I truly loved. I'd come home to my little town on the prairie—Canton, South Dakota. Happy Reading.

EO Lawrence- I have many fond memories of my elementary school, E.O. Lawrence. It was named after a nuclear scientist who lived and grew up in Canton and eventually won a Nobel prize for physics. Unfortunately, that did not motivate any of us to follow in his footsteps. I genuinely looked forward to getting up and going to school every day. I loved the environment in the school. It was only 3 or 4 blocks from my house, and I of course walked to and from school each day. Like most kids in elementary school, I looked forward to getting up and spending time with my friends before, during,

and after school. Learning was just a bonus. I had many wonderful teachers and many fond memories of them. One of my favorite teachers was my 3rd grade teacher, Mrs. Lewis. She reminded me of Mrs. Landers on the old show Leave it to Beaver. She had this great smile and was very warm and caring. She was also very patient with kids like me. In those days I was constantly stuffing my pockets full of all kinds of things such as rocks, marbles, yo-yo's, super balls, and pocketknives. Mrs. Lewis was constantly telling me not to bring those things to school and eventually she started taking them from me. On the last day of school in 3rd grade, she called me to her desk. I figured I was in trouble for something and started checking my pockets, but they were empty. She smiled and handed me this huge box of all the miscellaneous things she had taken from me over the year. It was like Christmas. I had so much fun going through that stuff.

Rendon Offers Stark Realism


Murder on the Red River, a mystery by Marcie R. Rendon, a citizen of the White Earth Nation of Minnesota, offers stark realism and a sense of place that rivals the work of the late Larry Brown and David Rhodes.

The story set in the Red River Valley of North Dakota and Minnesota during the era of the Vietnam War is told through the eyes of Cash, a young woman of 19 who has already lived through a lifetime of hardship and grief as she was bounced through the foster system. In her epilogue, Rendon comments further on the inequitable treatment of native children not just in Indian schools in the 19th and 20th centuries but even until today.

Far from breaking her, though, Cash's background has only made her stronger. Cash has a mutual admiration society of sorts with her unlikely mentor, Sheriff Wheaton, a tough but fair lawman who respects Cash's native instinct and her ability to sift through clues and through her clairvoyance understand the experiences of others through space and time. In short, Cash has brought the best of her native culture to assist her uncanny ability to uncover clues to crimes.

Our first glimpse of Cash is of a female farmworker who can take care of herself. A seasoned pool shark, she can clean up the table. Similarly, when it comes to dealing with men, like Jim, her occasional married lover, she can take control and have the emotional upper hand. Readers need not be offended by Rendon's love scenes, however. She skirts over them like rocks skipping across a pond, leaving us impressions of what happened without the gory details.

Cash and Sheriff Wheaton join forces in the novel when a native man



is murdered. Cash envisions the man's last moments, and with clairvoyant clarity determines where the man once lived. When she goes to visit his widow to break the news of his death, his widow responds angrily to Cash, and that night tragically dies, leaving a household of children to fend for themselves. Cash steps in to try to help the fledglings, who themselves show amazing resilience.

When Cash investigates a second murder, she finds herself involved so deeply we wonder if she can ever escape.

Murder on the Red River is an amazing accomplishment by an author whose gifts promise even greater things to come. The book is first of the Cash Blackbear Mystery trilogy, so it's a great place to start experiencing Rendon and her remarkable gifts as a writer.

The Buffalo Roundup: The Heart of the Wild West

Teddy Roosevelt is one of my favorite presidents. He embodied the spirit of Freedom. He cared about stewarding the land. And he appreciated the beauty of this nation. Back in 2016, when I was serving as South Dakota's lone member of the U.S. House of Representatives, I led the efforts to name the bison as America's National Mammal. This was a huge accomplishment, especially after the bison came so close to extinction. It is estimated that the bison population in the United States reached an all-time low in 1884, when fewer than 1,000 were left in the country. Now, after more than a century of conservation efforts, there are more than 500,000 bison in the United States!

The Custer State Park bison herd has contributed greatly to those efforts. When South Dakota legend Scotty Philip started the herd, it was one of the few herds left in America. Because of that long history of strong management, our herd has some of the best genetics in the country. Each year, we sell some of these bison to intersperse their genetics with those of other herds to improve the health of

the species' population across the nation.

The state of South Dakota is a special place – and the Buffalo Roundup is truly a testament to the spirit of conservation in our state. We are a state still believes in the beauty of the American Dream. We believe that you can pull yourself up by the bootstraps, put in a little hard work, and make anything possible for yourself. We still prioritize American values. Our small-town way of life makes people feel comfortable – like they're back somewhere safe and familiar.

We value tradition, and we value the great outdoors. All of this is why we continue to host the Buffalo Roundup year after year. The Roundup is a tradition unlike any other. It's a once-in-a-lifetime experience that you can only get here in South Dakota.

Teddy Roosevelt talked about the "lonely freedom" of the wilderness. Well, South Dakota is the Freeest state in America – so I can't think of a better place to enjoy the Freedom of the Wild West than right here.


Now, if you want to gift him the house, that's your decision. If you want to approach him with a rental agreement or sale proposal to which all parties are amicable, that's okay, too. If neither of these ideas are in the cards, I'd make sure to sit down with

this young man and have a gentle—but firm—talk. I'd let him know I had been happy to help him over the last several months, but that he needs to start moving forward with his life. I'd set a very reasonable and patient timeline for a move-out date, and let him know once that time is up, I'll be selling the house.

That's fair to everyone concerned.







There is a large truck parked on the river bottom and it shows just how massive these dams are. Gavin's Point Dam is considered to be one of the smaller dams.



Here is another spectacular view in S.D. Black Hills at Harney Peak, Now called Black Elk Mountain. This is the highest mountain in South Dakota at 7,240 feet. A ranger fire lookout tower is seen on the top east edge of the mountain. No one can really see this sheer drop-off cliff without being in a plane or helicopter. "Through the example of the DSS's 'Notes to Self' awareness campaign, we are hoping to show South Dakotans that small acts can make a big difference in someone's journey" Althoff said.

5. General agility

Changing technology on a dime is not the only ways small businesses excel. They can experiment in other ways, such as a home contractor

offering a special price deal for a certain period of time, or a clothing store experimenting with new in-store decor. Big chains cannot pivot that quickly, and any changes must be approved by corporate and implemented across all centers.

The contest consists of two grade divisions: K-8 and 9-12. There is one National winner in each grade division, with awards for first, second and third place in each grade division.



"Is this essay really yours?"

AI, ChatGPT and the College Essay; Authentic writing in the age of Chatbots

As a high school senior, how would you answer this essay prompt for a college or scholarship application?

Our university is a learning environment that affirms identities and experiences and prepares graduates to work towards a more just and peaceful world. Write about how your experiences, perspectives and hopes for your college education connect to our mission.

This university's topic requires students to get personal and apply their lives to the answer writing a 650-word essay.

For high school seniors, September marks the official beginning of college application season. Scholarship applications have the same narrow window. Both share a common thread – cohesive essay writing is crucial.

But as many students will admit, it's not easy to create an articulate response. For some, it is more like "spinning their wheels" when it comes to content and organization. Applicants may be able to verbally provide a good answer but writing it down with style is another matter.

Though difficult to compose, those college essays have purpose. College Admissions officers want to learn who this person is, will this person contribute something of value to their campus and, finally, can this person write?

Of late, a new technology has posed a new wrinkle for the admissions process. It's called ChatGPT, an artificial intelligence (AI) chatbot function that generates writing including college essays. But it's not just college. What about those high school English writing assignments? As AI is sweeping the world and becoming a reality, Harrisburg High School is meeting this new essay writing dilemma straight on.

What is Chat GPT?

Last November the software company OpenAI released the chatbot program ChatGPT which transcends the traditional chatbot function of imitating a human conversationalist. The free tool lets people enter prompts and receive human-like text in return.



In addition to creating software and answering questions, ChatGPT can generate poetry, letters, news stories, compose music and play games. It also generates essays.

Because it can produce sentences and paragraphs of "humanlike" writing, it has garnered lots of attention in the education community. This fall those required college essays, which are supposed to be authentic and reflective of the writer, have become one of the first real tests of how much ChatGPT will be used or abused.

Proceeding with caution

"Artificial intelligence, like other ground-breaking technologies, is certainly something we cannot ignore," said Dr. Michael Amolins, Director of instruction. "It will play an intimate role in our future, and, as such, we need to embrace the future while also proceeding with caution."

Amolins believes AI can't be ignored especially since students have discovered ChatGPT. Educators need to get educated he says.

"I look forward to learning alongside my colleagues and our students to develop a meaningful, ethical and effective strategy for integrating AI in our schools and our communities."

Scrambling to navigate the new technology

Principal Ryan Rollinger is passionate about AI at the high school and has met with teachers on the subject. He believes ChatGPT

is a powerful tool and form of technology that is already changing learning environments. He has taken a positive approach for its uses.

"I am so glad the collective we have embraced is that we see this as a tool rather than banning its use and labeling it as a cheating resource only," said Rollinger. "There will be challenges along the way, but I think our path is a good one."

Rollinger has encouraged his ELA teachers to responsibly integrate ChatGPT into their classrooms and augment their lesson plans. His recommendations: set classroom norms on the use of ChatGPT; establish a baseline of students' writing skills; and help students evaluate the credibility of arguments and language choices.

"I am recommending that teachers model its use with their students," he said.

All about self-expression

Senior English teacher Cheryl Geraets currently wrapped up teaching the college scholarship essay. She was well aware of ChatGPT and its accessibility.


"Writing in today's world is difficult enough, with the advancement of technology and the ease of accidentally or intentionally plagiarizing always a possibility," she said. "Yet, the ease of AI is proving to be a means to quickly write an essay without any 'self-thought' process."

Though Geraets believes AI is great for businesses such as advertising and making peoples' lives easier, as an English teacher she has a more pragmatic view. More importantly, she wants her students' writing to be authentic.

"I still want to see self-expression come through my students' writings – to see their minds working to absorb materials and thinking for themselves. AI can assist, yet self-expression and thought processes are necessary for students to be able to communicate to others their own ideas and opinions."

"It's easy to write. Just sit down in front of your typewriter and sweat blood."





Veterans Parkway Construction Continued

Touch ups North Veterans Parkway

North Veterans Parkway is mostly complete from I-90 all the way to 57th Street. The stretch from Arrowhead Parkway north to Madison Street is not the full six lanes width like the rest of Veterans Parkway but that will change in 2025. Also in 2025 and part of the Veterans Parkway Project is the plan for a new intersection for Arrowhead Parkway.

Growth and growing pains

Construction of Southern Veterans Parkway will cost \$210M with state and federal dollars paying roughly \$176M and the city of Sioux Falls paying \$33M. Though the road runs between both Sioux Falls and Harrisburg, Sioux Falls will be responsible for the snow removal and maintenance.

Sioux Falls city officials projected that by 2040 Sioux Falls will have grown to the south as far as it is able before bumping up against the Harrisburg boundary. And just like 57th Street is the boundary of Lincoln County and Minnehaha County, the division between Harrisburg and Sioux Falls will simply be two sides of the Veterans Parkway artery.

Something new – A program management team

Because of the size and scope of the project, the SD Department of Transportation (SDDOT) in 2021 selected HDR engineering to provide the program management of South Veterans Parkway. The Sioux Falls-based firm makes sure the project is moving along providing environmental services, real estate acquisition, data collection, strategic communications and preliminary and final services.

The \$210M road project is the first in the state to use a program management approach to get to the finish line. Not only does HDR help to accelerate the timeline, the firm assists SDDOT in oversight avoiding the need to hire multiple consultants to deliver different services.

"After Veterans Parkway was connected to I-90 in 2020, the SDDOT and the City of Sioux Falls agreed to cooperatively finish the remaining eight miles of South Veterans Parkway by 2027," explained Shannon Ausen, Civil Engineer at the City of Sioux Falls. "We learned many lessons from the first eight miles from 57th to I-90, and we agreed we needed to find a more efficient and faster delivery method to bring the last eight miles to construction."

"Program Management allows all the project elements (final design, right of way services, environmental approvals, communications, construction inspection, and actual project coordination) to be managed by one consultant team and allow work to be done simultaneously improving communications."

The City of Sioux Falls, SDDOT and the Federal Highway Administration still ultimately approve the final product Ausen added.

Ausen feels Project Management was a good decision.

"South Veterans Parkway is a unique project and the SDDOT and the City needed to deliver a more efficient and timelier product to maintain the community excitement of the overall project corridor," she said. "Overall, Program Management has proven to shorten the typical design/bid/build process for an eight-mile corridor by at least three years, allowing the community and region to benefit from this new roadway earlier."



Down Memory Lane Canton C-Hawks

From the September 12, 1963 edition of the Sioux Valley News

Hawks Topple Beresford in 19-0 Rout

Canton High stunned Beresford 19-0, in the season's opener here Friday night.

The C-Hawks scored twice in the second period. Greg Eiesland had runs of 40 and 58 yards for the TD's. Doug Dittberner ran the extra point on the first touchdown. The second score was set up by Bill Bogue's interception of a Beresford pass.

John Eidsness scored from eight yards out in the last quarter for the final TD. Eiesland had 185 yards rushing in 17 carries, and the team total was 278 yards. Beresford totaled 105 yards rushing and 12 passing.

The Hawks passed once, unsuccessfully. Beresford completed one of eight, with one interception.

Ron Johnson led the Canton defense with 13 tackles, followed by Craig Van Bockern, Danny Nelson and Dennis Vander Sluis with 10 each. Jim Lounsbury was in on every

kickoff tackle. Nelson was outstanding on pass defense, and credit for recovering a fumble went to Dave Martin.

Beresford threatened twice during the game, but was halted by penalties both times. The visitors had 45 yards in penalties, while Canton was penalized only 20.

The Hawks held Beresford to 7 first downs, while making 13. The number of plays was virtually even, with Canton running 47 to 48 for Beresford.

Coach Burdell Coplan expressed satisfaction with most phases of the game, but said "we need a lot of work on pass protection and our down-field blocking left much to be desired."

The C-Hawks journey to Brandon next Friday. The coach indicated Brandon has a big, rangy team, "and they like to throw. Other than that we don't know too much about them."

C-Hawks Down Brandon

Canton ran over Brandon Friday night, 28-0.

Scoring started in the first quarter, with the Hawks taking the kickoff and moving down the field on a series of line backs. Greg Eiesland scored from the eight, Robbin Bong made the point, and the Canton squad was ahead to stay.

Hines and Danny Nelson led the C-Hawks




Coach Burdell Coplan commended the entire defensive unit, and Hines in particular, for putting pressure on the passers and breaking up the Brandon offense.

The Hawks play at Lennox Friday night at 7:30. Coplan said, "we don't know much about Lennox, but they always give us a battle over there."



C-Hawks Prepare for Milbank

Canton High readied for undefeated Milbank this week after walloping Lennox 34-6 Friday night.

The homecoming tilt, which begins here at 7:30 Friday, will pair the Hawks with a team which has won 44 straight and knocked off Canton last year 21-7.

Canton scored in all four quarters at Lennox. Greg Eiesland led off the TD parade with a two yard run in the first and made his own extra point.

Doug Dittberner went into the end zone from three yards out in the second period. A Ron Hines to Danny Nelson pass was good for the point.

Lennox fought back with a series of passes late in the first half, and made their only score on a 35-yarder from Alan Rops to Doug Skie. The point try failed.

Eiesland scored from the 37 early in the third, and a run by John Eidsness was good for the point. The fourth TD came on an eight-yard run by Dittberner in the same period. He ran again for the point.

Gary King, back in action for the first time this year, showed his speed on a 52-yard dash, leaving several Lennox defenders in the

dust. The point try failed.

The Hawks chalked up 259 yards rushing and 17 yards on two of three pass tries.

Lennox made 63 yards on the ground and 58 in the air, completing 4 of 10. Bill Bogue knocked down five of the Lennox passes.

Canton had 30 yards in penalties to 5 for Lennox. Coach Burdell Coplan indicated dissatisfaction with the penalties and some C-Hawk fumbles. "We'll have to cut these down if we intend to stay in there against Milbank," he said.

Denny Vander Sluis and Jack Suter led the Canton defense with 15 and 13 tackles respectively. The coach commended Don Hammer for his defensive work. "He played only a quarter and got five tackles," Coplan said.

Vander Sluis set a new mark for the season. The previous high was 13 tackles, set by Ron Johnson in the Beresford game.

Also winning praise were Leon Yelinek, who blocked a Lennox punt, and Nelson and Dave Martin, who each recovered a fumble.

"Milbank is coming to town with 44 straight, and we hope to be ready for them," the coach said.

Canton put the skids under Hawarden's 11 game win record Friday, as the Hawks polished off the West Sioux team 26-13.

But the C-Hawks were scheduled to put everything on the line Wednesday night. Gregory defeated only by Chamberlain and rated ahead of Canton in both area polls, was due here for a mid-week confrontation.

Results of the Wednesday tilt will probably spell oblivion, as far as the rating are concerned, for the losing team.

Greg Eiesland set a new school record at Hawarden with 225 yards rushing. The old record, 223 yards, was set by Don Bong against Gregory in 1959.

Gary King, with 105 yards for the night, made the opening score in the first quarter on a 24-yard run. Eiesland added the point. Hawarden tilted the game up in the second period, but fell behind for good when Doug Dittberner scored from the one and added the point. Dittberner was third in rushing with 34 yards.

Eiesland made the third CHS score from 42 yards out, after the half. Hawarden worked down-field for a final TD, but missed the point. Canton's last score came in the final quarter, when King dived in from the 3.

Hawks Beat Milbank, Face Hawarden

Canton cut Milbank's string Friday night.

The holders of the state's longest win record, 44 games, went down 13-6, in a game that kept the overflow crowd bobbing up and down all night.

The C-Hawks touchdowns came in the first and third quarters, as Gary King and Doug Dittberner went over from the 2 and 37 yard lines, respectively. Milbank's TD was scored in the final period by quarterback Randy Settje.

Canton received the opening kickoff, but punted four downs later. The Hawks then held Milbank, and took a punt at midfield to start their initial touchdown drive.

A fourth-down gamble paid off for a first and ten, and the team worked its way to the two, where King took the ball for the score. He made his own extra point.

A second-quarter Bulldog threat ended as Greg Eiesland stole a pass on the five.

Milbank passed down to the 16 worked inside the 10 at the start of the third quarter, but guard Leon Yelinek grabbed a fumble to end the drive.

Canton kicked out, and the second TD was set up when end Jim Lounsbury recovered the Milbank fumble on the punt. Doug Dittberner broke loose on the 37 four plays later to score. The point attempt was no good.

The Bulldogs scored early in the final quarter as Settje went over from the seven. The point try failed, and the rest of the quarter saw Canton frustrating Milbank's attempts to

get with in touchdown range.

Coach Burdell Coplan said he was "very proud" of his team. "They made very few mistakes," he said. The coach commended King and Dittberner for their hard running, and also had good words for Danny Nelson, who was down under the punts all night.

He also singled out the defensive play of Ron Hines and Bill Bogue and "The way Ron Johnson and Jack Suter took care of the middle of the line."

"We gambled that they could cover all the territory between the tackles and they did just that," he said.

Coplan, who was carried off the field at the end of the game, credited John Eidsness for keeping Milbank in trouble with his punting. The sophomore back got off punts of 40, 35, 38, 35, and 34 yards. Coplan also commended Hines for leading the team from the quarterback spot.

Dittberner was the leading ground-gainer with 78 yards in 17 carries. Jack Suter set a new mark in tackles for the year with 18. Hines, Johnson and King each had 9.

Milbank led in first down, 12-5 and in passing, completing 5 of 12 for 95. The Hawks took rushing honors with 157 yards against 128 for the Bulldogs.

Canton journeys to Hawarden Friday for another tough one. Coplan said the team had to work on its timing "and play even better if we hope to spoil the Hawarden Homecoming.

They said it couldn't be done, but Canton did something nobody else could do for 44 games against Milbank, and that is win.

It was a school and team effort all the way. One year was wrapped up into this game, as Canton was defeated at the hands of Milbank last year. This last week before the game was at a high point. The school spirit was the highest it has ever been.

Then the game came, after exchanging punts in the first quarter, the C-Hawks began to roll. At the Milbank's 41 yard line, the Hawks gambled on a fourth down and 5. King picked up seven yards for the first down and there was no stopping the Hawks.

Gary King capped the 50 yard drive by plowing in from the one. King also added the extra point.

Milbank threatened to score in the second period, but Greg Eiesland picked off a Milbank pass to end the drive. The half-time score was 7-0 in favor of Canton.

Rollie Greeno's Bulldogs got another drive going into the third period only to have the C-Hawks line mean hold them back on the downs at the 8 yards line, Leon Yelinek picked up the fumble.

The hawks were forced to punt from there, and then got the major break of the game. Safetyman, Arlen Conrad of Milbank fumbled John Eidsness's high kick and Jim Lounsbury pounced on the ball at the Milbank 45.

Milbank's only TD came next, starting at their own 5 yard line. Several plays later the Bulldogs moved up to the Canton 33 yard line on superb passing.

The Hawks then intercepted another Milbank pass but it rolled out of Dittberner's hands to a Milbank man.

Then the Milbank quarterback kept the ball going around left end to score from 7 yards out. The extra point failed.

Milbanks held the hawks after the kick-off but the clock ran out before they could run any more plays.

The final score read Canton 13, Milbanks 6, ending the best football game in years for Canton. Congratulations to the team for their outstanding play on the field.

Coach Burdell Coplan said "we were well satisfied with the outcome of the game." But

The Canton squad took the opening kickoff, and punted four plays later. Windom marched to the C-Hawk 33, and then scored on a long pass play. The point try failed.

Canton took the kickoff on the 34, and in twelve plays worked down to the Windom 2. Gary King blasted over for the touchdown. They try for the point failed.

10 Years Since Winter Storm Atlas By Sen. John Thune

Ten years ago, Winter Storm Atlas swept through western South Dakota. When it started, no one had any idea that it would be one of the most devastating snowstorms in the area's history. Atlas dropped as much as 5 feet of snow in some areas. Wind gusts reached 71 miles per hour, and the storm devastated West River ranches.

Growing up in Murdo, we saw a lot of nasty weather, but Winter Storm Atlas was a storm unlike any other. Shortly after the storm cleared, I toured the area with then-Gov. Dennis Daugaard. It was heart-wrenching to see the impact on our state's livestock industry. Tens of thousands of cattle, sheep, horses, and bison were killed. Much of the livestock that survived the storm were scattered miles from their pasture.

The Atlas storm brought the ferocity of Mother Nature to bear, but it also revealed the resilience and kindness of South Dakotans. Farmers and ranchers are independent, hard-working people. They are the best friends and neighbors you could ask for – the first to lend a helping hand and the last to ask for help. In the days and weeks after the blizzard, support came in from across the country. South Dakotans donated to the Rancher Relief Fund that provided millions of dollars in assistance to livestock producers, and producers from around the country donated their own livestock to help South Dakota ranchers rebuild their way of life.

When the storm hit, Congress was working on finalizing a farm bill, and I got right to work to make sure the bill would be done quickly and that the programs producers needed would be there for them. Winter Storm Atlas was a reminder that disaster can strike when you least expect it. In the 2008 farm bill, I coauthored the first standing livestock disaster programs of their kind. I worked to ensure these programs – the Livestock Forage, Livestock Indemnity, and Emergency Livestock Assistance programs – were continued and strengthened in the 2014 and 2018 farm bills.

Thankfully a storm as devastating as Atlas hasn't struck again, but South Dakota's farmers and ranchers have certainly seen their fair share of extreme weather in the last decade. Weather is just one aspect of the uncertainty and challenges that farmers and ranchers face. The livestock programs I helped design are an integral part of the farm safety net that farmers and ranchers depend on when challenges arise. As Congress considers another farm bill this year, I'm working to strengthen these programs to ensure farmers and ranchers can weather any storm that comes their way.

Agriculture is South Dakota's number-one industry. South Dakota farmers and ranchers work hard every day, and they face uncertainty and a myriad of challenges to deliver a reliable and affordable food supply to the nation and the world. South Dakota's producers are on my mind every day in the U.S. Senate, and I'll continue working to ensure farm policy supports them and the important work they do.

BIG Update

C-Hawks Defeat Bulldogs 30-14 to Improve to 4-2

The Canton C-Hawk football team traveled to Madison on Friday night and after halftime made some adjustments and rolled to a 30-14 victory to improve to 4-2 as they next host Vermillion on Friday with a 7pm kickoff. Vermillion brings in a 2-4 record with wins over Custer and Milbank and lost to Chamberlain, West Central, Dakota Valley and Lennox.

Canton started out the game on offense and drove down to the 9 yard line after a strong ground game then Braxton Mulder threw a pass that was intercepted in the end zone giving Madison the ball on the 16 yard line. The Bulldogs drove out to the 33 yard line then they dropped back to pass and found a receiver cutting down the center of the field and he caught the pass and raced 67 yards for the games first touchdown and after the extra point kick Madison held a 7-0 lead at 7:43. Canton started at their own 8 yard line and Canaan McCracken and Teague Granum with Cain Wallner moving the ball down to the 44 but the ball was turned over after another interception and with the return Madison had the ball at the Canton 15 yard line. Madison ran to the 4 yard line but penalties moved them back to the 9 then on a

4th down and 2 the Canton defense stopped the runner short turning the ball over as the 1st quarter ended with Canton trailing 7-0.

Canton started the 2nd quarter on the 4 yard line but on the first play Cain Wallner took the handoff and got around the end and gained 51 yards putting the Hawks on the Madison 45. Granum and McCracken each had 6 yard runs followed by a 23 yard run by McCracken as he broke 3 tackles on the run down to the 10 yard line. Wallner ran outside after getting the pitch from Mulder and just came up short on the 1 yard line and Wallner finished it off following McCracken into the end zone for Canton's first touchdown and after an extra point pass from Mulder to Matt Anderson made the score 8-7 at 7:44. Madison started on their 33 but good tackles from Arthur Benoit and Traun Cook forced a punt but on the play Anderson blocked the punt and Canton would get the ball at the Bulldogs 33. After 2 play the Hawks were down to the 12 then Wallner for 6 and a penalty on Madison for offsides put the ball at the 3 then McCracken took it in for the touchdown. The extra point run by Cook was short and at 2:28 Canton led 14-7. Cantons defense



let down and after a good tackle by Anderson their quarterback scrambled and with bad tackling he was able to score a 67 yard touchdown run and with the extra point kick the game was at 14-14 as the game went into halftime.

Good defense and penalties made the 3rd quarter a defensive battle with neither team making much yardage as the game stayed tied at

14-14 heading into the final quarter. Canton stayed on the ground to start the 4th and with Wallner, McCracken and Granum running the ball they moved downfield by chunks down to the 26 yard line then McCracken took the handoff and was hit after 3 yards but kept his feet moving and the found an opening and ran it in for a touchdown. Mulder kept the ball and ran around the end for the extra point making the Hawks lead 22-14 with 8:02 left in the game. Anderson ended the Bulldogs next drive with an interception giving the Hawks the ball back at the 4. McCracken

went into beast mode as he had runs of 9,9,8, and 4 with an 11 yard counter run by Wallner down to the 4 and McCracken followed that up with a run behind Cook, Pierce Mastalir and Casey Sheridan. The extra point was good after Mulder hit Benoit on the pass making the score 30-14 at 3:59. Madison had trouble moving the ball with the Hawks defense along with Madison penalties forcing a pass that Kieshon Smith intercepted at the 4 yard line as our defensive line was applying the pressure so with 2:30 left in the game the Hawks ran out the clock with runs from McCracken 10 yards behind Cook and Mastalir then on the next play Wallner went outside and powered

his way for 28 yards to end the game with Canton winning 30-14 to improve their record to 4-2 with Vermillion coming to town Friday.



Your local newspaper is far more than just print. In the ever-changing media landscape, local newspapers have evolved to true multi-channel content providers. From websites



produced for you. And behind the articles, columns, and images your newspaper produces is a team of local residents who are committed to making your community stronger! National Newspaper Week; Support Your Local Newspaper

There's been a lot of hand-wringing in recent years about the death of local newspapers, those bastions of democracy and chroniclers of community.

While the loss of any newspaper hurts the people they serve, residents of rural areas and small towns are hit especially hard when a newspaper shuts down. When a local newspaper closes, citizens lose impartial news and information about town and county government, school boards, local athletic teams, academic awards, county fairs and the mundane and special occurrences of a community's life.

Despite the very real consequences of the shrinking traditional sources of community news, Americans remain hungry for reliable, accurate local news and information, a 2023 study conducted for America's Newspapers shows.

The study by Coda Ventures

found that 8 out of 10 Americans still get news and information from local print or digital sources every month. The survey included a nationally representative sample of 5,000 respondents.

Nearly three-quarters of respondents said a local newspaper is important, and 43% said local newspapers or their websites are the most accurate source of news and information.

"Local news is critical to the well-being of a community," the study's authors wrote.

As a 50-year veteran of small and medium-sized newspapers and now editor of a statewide digital news site covering government and public policy, I know how true that statement is. Local newspapers give readers more than just the news; they help define and keep a community's culture strong.

My 93-year-old mother has been

a subscriber to our hometown newspaper since I was a child, and she's continued subscribing through changes in ownership and the switch from steady delivery by carrier to the sometimes spotty delivery by the mailman. From obituaries to wedding announcements to front-page news, she relies on that newspaper to keep her connected to her community.

I learned about local politics and government by reading that newspaper. It's a major source of my own passion for journalism and news.

The survey notes that when people say they "read the local newspaper," they're referring to any number of print and digital platforms where they can easily obtain news and information about their communities.

Not surprisingly, those ages 18-39 cite social media as their

preferred means of accessing local newspaper content while those 40-74 prefer getting local news via a news website. Those 75 and older are almost evenly divided between preferring to read a home-delivered paper and reading a news website.

The study findings support the importance of local newspapers to citizens' sense of community and engagement in public life, not just through news reporting but from public notices from local government and advertising from

local businesses.

Local newspapers and their websites are relied upon more than any other source of information about public notices and government, the study says: 55% vs 24% for government websites.

As National Newspaper Week gets underway, we should take hope that our fellow Americans remain supportive of local newspapers even as their means of accessing news and information has changed. Local news is not dead.
