# “Crazy For Patsy Cline”

Georgia singer and actress Katie Deal was singing before forming words. Music has always been a big part of her life, her family always supporting her creative endeavors. They recognized her talent at a young age and encouraged her to keep singing. Her mother was a low-alto singer who influenced her with her love of the oldies station. They would listen to Aretha Franklin, Etta James, Dinah Shore, and Patsy Cline to name a few. Deal practiced so hard for her first solo at church as a child, she got laryngitis and had to postpone the solo. She learned not only from her mother over the years, but a wide array of brilliant choir directors and an acapella trio she was involved in.

In high school, Deal tried to be trendy and learn more contemporary music. She taught herself guitar at age sixteen and played with a band in coffeehouses on the weekends. They would sing Indie/Alternative music throughout high school, but it wasn't until later in life she realized that wasn't who she was. She found she connects more with the older country music which resonates with her soul. Once while playing with her band, she sang “Your Cheating Heart” by Hank Williams, the Patsy Cline style of the song. A friend told her the similarity in their voices was

uncanny and insisted she needed to learn more songs by Cline to add to her repertoire.

Deal's mom insisted that she went to college, and found herself joining her sister at Piedmont College in Demorest, GA. Her sister is an actress, which led to her becoming involved in theater as well. The theater is where Deal met her “people.” She found friends that were like-minded, which got her more involved in theater, even graduating with a theater degree. After college, Deal auditioned for many internships across the country. One audition came up for the “A Closer Walk with Patsy Cline” show. She eagerly auditioned since she knew the music. She learned they had already cast the part but were so impressed they gave her an understudy role that didn't exist before her. The woman who had the lead part was generous enough to give her one show a week, where Deal could be the lead. From this opportunity, other theaters took an interest in her and she began doing the show all over the country. Deal found herself in country music after all, through theater. She never would have gotten the part if she hadn't been encouraged to learn more Patsy Cline.

Deal does multiple shows as a singer, but “Crazy For Patsy Cline” is the first concert she has put together. Her friend who



is a music director in Colorado contacted her, to inform her that New York agents had booked her to write a Patsy Cline show. So, they worked on it together and started touring. Deal remarks that people hear the term tribute shows and often think she is just trying to impersonate that individual. She insists instead it is a tribute show, in a real sense of the word tribute. She has grown up loving Patsy Cline and her life story. She jokes, “I am the #1 Fangirl.”

For the upcoming Canton show, Deal has a great lineup of phenomenal musicians joining her. Her keyboard player is Cleveland Georgia, who previously played steel guitar with Bon Jovi for 10 years. Her friend Jimmy is also joining, and he was recently in the remake video of “Does He Love You” by Dolly

Parton and Reba McEntire. Her favorite song to perform changes with each show depending on who she is playing with because, “each person adds their own different little flare to how they play the songs.” Her all-time favorite song to sing is “Faded Love” which was recorded just before Patsy Cline passed away in 1963. Deal also loves the crowd pleasers such as: “Crazy” “Walking After Midnight” and “I Fall to Pieces.” Deal has a personal connection with some of the songs, such as “Got A Lot of Rhythm in My Soul.”

This show will be on Friday, November 3rd at 7pm, with doors opening at 6pm. Attendees can purchase tickets at the door or online at [www.CantonPAC.com](http://www.CantonPAC.com) for \$30.

granola bars, protein drinks, a t-shirt, and other trinkets donated from our local downtown businesses. After the run the runners got to tour the

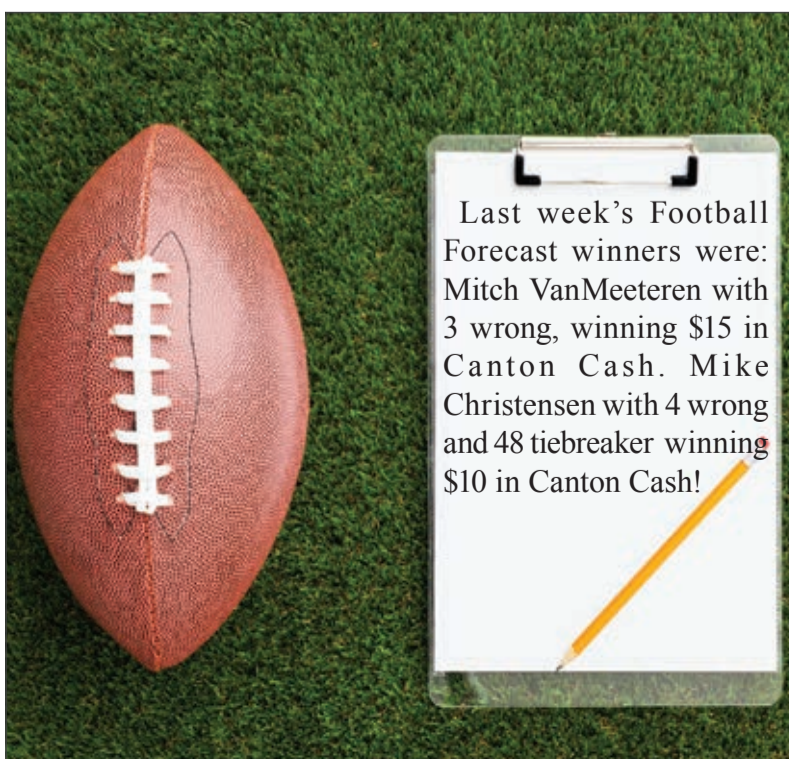
Anytime Fitness facility while enjoying an after run snack.

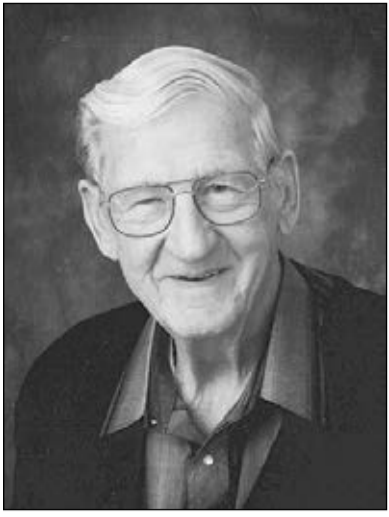

He attended Rock Valley Christian School through the 8th grade, spent two years at Rock Valley High School and later obtained his high school diploma through a GED.

Clarence was united in marriage with Marlene Dykstra on September 8, 1954, at the First Reformed Church of Hull, Iowa. In 1954, Clarence also joined the United States Army where he proudly served his country until 1956. While in the Army, he lived in El Paso, Texas for 3 months and in Detroit, Michigan for 21 months. After his honorable discharge from the US Army, Clarence and Marlene lived in Sioux Center, Iowa for 3 years, Inwood, Iowa for 26 years, Colorado Springs, Colorado for 25 years, and Canton, South Dakota for 13 years, until recently moving to Fellowship Village in Inwood.

## Buckle Down and Budget: Looking Forward to Legislative Session

As we close in on the start of legislative session, I have been meeting with my team to discuss how we can deliver the best possible results for the people of South Dakota during those weeks.

I am also working on my budget. While South Dakota has seen unprecedented growth, we have not been immune from the burdensome regulations and inflation inflicted by the federal government, and America's national economy continues to tank because of the extremist policies of the Biden Administration. Thanks to South Dakota's conservative fiscal policies, our state economy is still strong. However, it is important to realize that this year's budget will look more "normal" than it has the last several years.

South Dakota has had a balanced budget for 134 years. Now, our revenue rates are going back to normal, and we will have to rely on our tradition of smart money management to achieve our 135th year with a balanced budget.

We are a state that values fiscally conservative policies. We have no state income tax. We have a AAA credit rating. We have one of the only fully-funded pensions in the country. We make it a priority to cut government red tape wherever we can. And we let the taxpayers keep as many of their hard-earned dollars in their pockets as possible.

South Dakota has reaped the benefits of those conservative policies. We have had record surpluses and sales tax revenue over the last several years – and we have been able to use those dollars to give back to the people of our state.

Our budget for Fiscal Year 2024 funded important needs like K-12 education, healthcare providers, and state employees. It also included funding for the operation of regional behavioral

health centers, 100% tuition assistance for our National Guard soldiers, and targeted increases for our state employee workforce and community service providers.

The legislature also chose to give the people of South Dakota a sales tax holiday to ease the burden of inflation. While it's no secret that this was not the tax cut I wanted to deliver for the people last session, I'm hopeful the legislature will make this tax cut permanent. Instead, there is already talk among legislators about repealing the sales tax holiday to free up money for more spending.

I point all of this out because there are many members of our state legislature that have not experienced a "normal budget year." 51 of the 105 members of our legislature have only been serving since 2020. That means that 49% of South Dakota's legislative body has not experienced a fiscal year without record-breaking economic growth. These legislators are used to having huge revenues and surpluses to spend on whatever they want. They have not had to do what more and more families across America are having to do – stick to a tight budget.

Don't get me wrong, we've accomplished some great things with our revenues and surpluses, but now it's time for us to get back to conservative spending.

We cannot raise taxes on South Dakota families. They deserve to keep their hard-earned dollars. They deserve a permanent tax cut. What we can do is limit government spending and focus on the needs of our people.

"Under God, the People Rule." We need to remember those five words that make up our state motto all 38 days of legislative session. We work for the people of South Dakota, and we owe it to them to deliver the sound fiscal policies that have made our economy the strongest in the nation.

**2013**

The Canton C-Hawk football team traveled to Flandreau Thursday night for their last regular season game against the Fliers and they improved their record to 7-1 with the 48-0 victory putting the Fliers 3-5. For quite some time, the flagpole that used to be proudly displayed in front of the Lincoln County Courthouse was not visible. Thanks to the hard work of the VFW, the flagpole was repainted, restrung and installed recently at the Canton VFW.

One hundred years ago the Canton Library was opened, then known as the Carnegie Library. The library of yesterday is much different than the library today, which was noted during the Canton Library Centennial Program held this past Friday. The milestone reached this year marks a continuation of the Library's mission to serve its citizens, at no charge to the public. The library is one of the few institutions where anyone and everyone is welcome to stop in, peruse the materials, check them out and utilize the myriad of services available, according to Dr. Heinemann, who was the master of ceremony.

The C-Hawks faced Beresford in the first round of the Dakota 12 Conference Tournament. They fought a close battle but came up short with scores of 24-26

and 14-25. The next match was against Tea and the Hawks won in three matches. The C-Hawks took Madison in three matches with scores of 25-22, 18-25 and 25-8. The final match up was against Elk-Point Jefferson. They came up short with scores of 23-25 and 16-25. The Hawks travelled to Vermillion and took it to five matches for the comeback win. The Hawks came back from behind to win over Marion.

This weekend on Sunday, November 1 the Canton Lutheran congregation will celebrate 130 years of witnessing Christ in this community and beyond. The theme chosen for the observance, "That We May Be Witnesses," comes from the mission statement of the congregation.

The Canton Football Team ended their 1998 season with an 18-0 defeat to the Vermillion Tanagers in the first round of the Class 11 A Playoffs.

There are considerable more soybean acreages this year than in

The average yield for beans for the area is estimated in the thirty-five bushel area. Corn yields on what has already been harvested is running from fifty bushel per acre to 125 bushel.

Repair work was started this week on the east cell of Canton. The east cell of the lagoon was drained about a year ago and left to dry up, so workmen could enter the cell and rework the bottom of the man made lake.

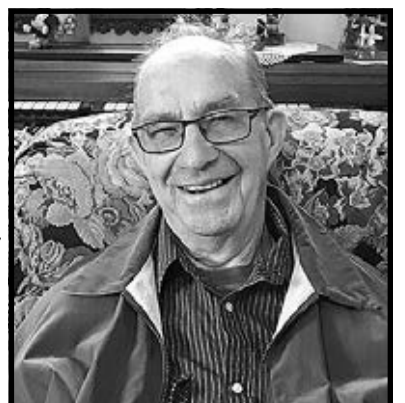
## Canton United Methodist to Host Fall Community Blood Drive

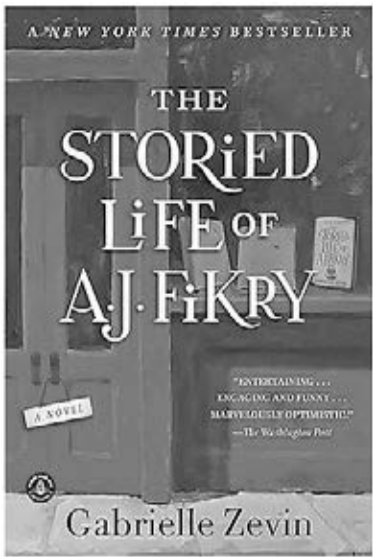

## Collection Describes Land Challenges And Solutions

### Tending Iowa’s Land: Pathways to a Sustainable Future

Several books have come down the pike recently about the impact of agriculture on the Midwest, and Iowa and particular. However, *Tending Iowa’s Land: Pathways to a Sustainable Future* shows not just challenges but solutions to the impact of agriculture on Iowa’s landscape.

Editor Cornelia Mutel has assembled a variety authors – both academics and farmers – who have provided an objective assessment of the past impact of farming in Iowa. The meticulously documented selections by experts in their fields drill down to the heart of the problem. While Iowa is the most productive state in the nation for many ag commodities, there has also been a price in topsoil depletion, nitrogen and phosphorous runoff from drain tile and an overall impact on the state’s flora and fauna.

The selections by farmers and conservations, however, tell many success stories of what has worked in reversing the impact of nearly 200 years of agriculture in Iowa.

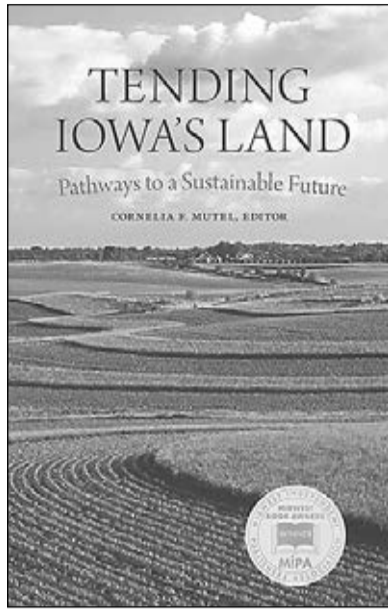
Mutel puts it quite plainly in her preface:

“In truth, although our environmental problems are worsening, we largely know how to solve them. It’s not solutions that we are lacking, it’s the collective will to enact them.”

Kathleen Wolda, who holds a Ph.D. in geology from the University of Iowa, says in her article, “The Root of Our Problems – Iowa’s Degraded Soils,” the state on average has lost half its former topsoil depth built over the millennia.

Keith E. Schilling, state geologist of Iowa, and Christopher S. Jones, research engineer at the University of Iowa, in another article tell us:

“The transition from the dominance of point sources to nonpoint sources has been a huge change for Iowa,



and with this change our most common pollutants are now traced to agriculture, nitrate, phosphorous, sediment, bacteria, and other mixed contaminants.”

Mutel’s collection also includes inspiring essays by farmers and others who have found solutions and possibly a way to reverse these trends.

In the essay “Curtailing Climate Change on the Farm” Francis Thicke, an organic dairy farmer near Fairfield, Iowa, tells us, “Regenerative agriculture, instead, is based on the principles of mimicking nature and harnessing the energy and the organizing power of nature’s ecology, rather than trying to overpower nature with fossil fuels.”

This is a great book for anyone interested in helping the environment as well as farmers who want to ensure continued productivity of their land. Beyond that, it would be a great core textbook for an environmental studies class.

# Dave Says: Control Your Own Destiny

Dear Dave,  
I read where you recommend saving 15% of your income for retirement. Should I count my employer’s contribution to my retirement plan as part of that 15%?

Carlotta

Dear Carlotta,  
That’s a great question. Employer contributions do not count toward the 15 percent I recommend setting aside for retirement. It’s great if you work for a company that offers perks like that, but I want you putting 15 percent of your money into retirement. Whatever your company matches, whatever its pension may be, or even having a military retirement package, none of that enters the equation. I want your money in your name.

If you’ve got a 401(k), a Roth 401(k) or a 403(b) and your employer offers a match, you should do that up to the match before anything else.

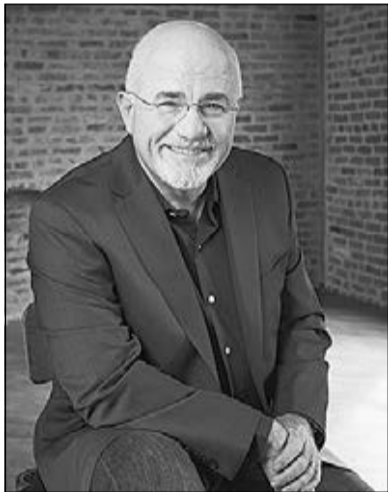
Let’s say your employer will match three percent. Since the goal is 15

percent, that still leaves you with some work to do. You’ve got three percent of your own money already going into retirement, so then you could look at a Roth IRA. If the Roth, plus what you invested previously to get the match doesn’t equal 15 percent, then you could look at a 403(b), or go back to your 401(k) to hit the 15 percent mark.

And remember, if you’re going to reach your retirement goals, you can’t do it alone. King Solomon, one of the wisest men who ever lived, wrote: “Where there is no counsel, the people fall; But in the multitude of counselors there is safety” (Proverbs 11:14 NKJV). YOU HAVE THE POWER TO STOP THIS. As a resident of Lincoln County near the 'proposed prison site' I am trying to state FACTS and not let emotion write this, but it is a very emotional topic.

Deals done in SECRET, behind closed doors is not the legacy you should want on your record. Why was this just thrown out there? WHERE are all the other options and opportunity for public opinion weighing in on sites options? WHY were committees changed and powerful people who did not want prisons near THEIR land allowed to be part of this decision? WHY does Tenhaken (SF mayor) and towns north of Sioux Falls get to publicly state they do NOT want the prison in their county have that option, but not Lincoln County?

To say our community - town leaders - elected officials - were shocked at the bomb the DOC and YOU dropped upon rural ag land is an understatement of epic proportion. There is NOT one positive thing about this site that makes sense. Touting 'we need a new prison' and 'the state owns the land' as the driving forces for this selection does nothing to justify the absolute devastation it will bring to Lincoln County. To be truthful - it almost feels like punishment - "Stopping the CO2 pipeline? Creating 40 acre rules? Fighting wind turbines? HA Ha - well take THIS - you can't stop THIS."

Dropping a 1500 unit prison in the midst of agriculture farmland is ludicrous. To simply bring in the infrastructure to support such a venture will destroy more than the '300 acres' the state owns. It will change lives. It will eliminate pristine lands that have been preserved and protected. It will be a blight on beautiful land - concreting a county. Beyond the buildings themselves - the lighting that will be required on such a structure for safety and security will pollute the county night skies for miles. The run off from the buildings and parking lots will overwhelm watersheds. The support businesses required to sustain this new small city population will decimate the farmland. Without a doubt it is a slap in the face of the constituents of Lincoln Co.

I also struggle with the fact that for at least 4 months of the year - South Dakota can have brutal weather. What are the contingency plans for the workers to be transported THIS far out of town during blizzards, ice storms, etc? Where will people stay? How will you control the prison population when you can NOT get food and workers for 2-3 days? There is also the consideration that the fire departments are volunteer. Police and Medical support are MILES vs. minutes away....and these are SMALL rural forces - NOT the large, well supported systems of the city.

I recognize as Governor, you are termed out. I believe you are trying to make your mark on your term as the one who brought in a new State Prison. Do we need one - yes, a 343 thousand dollar study paid for with TAXPAYER dollars show we do - and ALSO show there are more lucrative sites with more readily available infrastructure.

You have built your political persona on PROTECTING the values of South Dakota. Freedom. Farming. Pheasant Hunting. Guns. Tourism. Fireworks. FAMILY. I am stunned that you would bring in an out of state person and allow them to have input on something as big as this. Kellie Wasko has no ties to our community. She was NOT raised with the values of family farms/ranches/communities. She toots her horn of growing up near prisons and it being NO BIG DEAL. Like Sioux Falls - it is NOT a big deal if you choose to live within the FOOT PRINT of an existing prison system. IT IS LIFE CHANGING to want to BUILD a prison system in the midst of the most VALUABLE farm and family land in the state of South Dakota.

Honestly, the criminal system NEEDS to change. Punishment should be MORE POWERFUL to hinder crimes, not to lock people away and let the hardworking, tax paying people of the community support them. PRISON SHOULD BE punishment - it should be HARD WORK. It should NOT be pleasant. It should be life-changing for the prisoner - NOT the residents of your state.

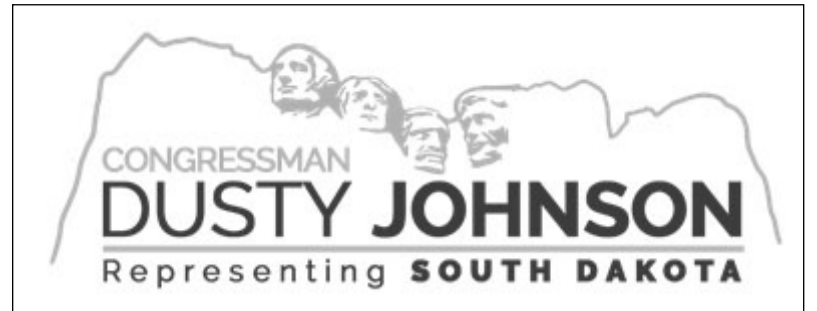

## Fighting for South Dakotans

### BIG Update

Mexico's ban on imports of genetically modified corn from the U.S. and Brazil's unfair tariffs on our ethanol are hurting producers who rely on exporting their products.

This week, I joined a group of Midwest Republican congressmen in a meeting with Doug McKalip, the Chief Agricultural Negotiator in the office of the U.S. Trade Representative. We talked about the need to reestablish markets with Brazil and Mexico and to encourage U.S. Trade Representative Katherine Tai to pressure Brazil and Mexico to end these policies. South Dakota exports around 40% of its corn—having these markets back online would benefit South Dakota producers.

We must work together to negotiate trade agreements that benefit U.S. agriculture.

### BIG Idea

Most of us in South Dakota know how unrealistic the Biden Administration's desire to make an immediate switch to electric vehicles (EVs) is for rural America. Our cold weather, long distances between destinations, and lack of charging stations make it almost impossible to switch to EVs. I met with South Dakota members of the Community Transportation Association of America to discuss rural transit services, propane buses, and how to best serve our communities.

### BIG News

The House elected Speaker Johnson this week. No, not me, but Rep. Mike Johnson of Louisiana. I was proud to vote for him so we could restore order to the House of Representatives. I look forward to working with him as we pass legislation to secure the southern border, tackle the national debt, and avoid a government shutdown.

The House was in an unfortunate stalemate for three weeks. Our first action after installing Speaker Mike Johnson was passing a bill to support Israel and condemn Hamas for their acts of terror on our ally, Israel. Yesterday, we passed another appropriations bill, getting us one step closer to fully funding the government. I'm glad we've hit the ground running.

## Israel Should Not Tolerate Terrorists on Its Border

I recently returned from a bipartisan congressional delegation trip to the Middle East, including Israel. Our trip was in direct response to Hamas' savage attack on innocent men, women, and children. We went to show our support for Israel and to deliver a clear message with one voice: The United States stands with Israel.

For nearly 20 years, Israel has had to live with a terrorist organization on its border whose sole mission is killing Jews and wiping Israel off the map. And during that time Hamas has loomed as a persistent threat to Israel, attacking, kidnapping, and killing Israelis. But the barbarism and brutality Hamas displayed in its October 7 attacks revealed an evil that had reached new heights.

During my recent visit, Israeli defense officials updated us on the war. They showed us video evidence of the unnerving atrocities committed against innocent people - horrific images that I will not soon forget. In Tel Aviv, we met with the families of hostages being held in Gaza, including Americans, who shared their painful stories. These experiences made crystal clear the imperative of Israel defeating Hamas once and for all.

Prime Minister Netanyahu made a

point about the war that is especially chilling as an American. He pointed out that on 9/11, America's enemies were thousands of miles away, but today, Israel's enemy is only one kilometer away. Hamas represents an evil not seen in generations, and, for Israel, this threat is existential. Israel knows it has to eliminate Hamas. Their cause is just, their resolve is firm, and every peace-loving nation on earth should be on its side.

If Hamas and its reign of terror are allowed to continue, no nation in the region or beyond will be able to live in peace and security. It's really that simple. We need to get hostages freed and Americans out of harm's way and give Israel the space to get this job done.

The United States and the world also need to be clear-eyed about how Iran is involved in, and benefits from, this brutal bloodshed. Their goal is to bring chaos, violence, and death to anyone who does not share their extreme and militant religious ideology, which includes wiping Israel off the face of the earth. Ninety percent of Hamas' military budget comes from Iran, and numerous other proxy terrorist groups in the Middle East are also financed, armed, and trained by Iran. Through its proxies, Iran is

literally getting away with murder, and it must be made clear to Iran that if they do not stand down or if they escalate this war, the United States and our allies will have no choice but to respond forcefully.

Hamas' atrocities against Israelis, including against children, their use of Palestinians as human shields, and their lies to undermine the civilian evacuation of Gaza, are truly depraved. Their actions cannot be rationalized yet we have seen some in our own country attempt to do just that in recent weeks. As Americans, we must be uncompromising in our rejection of antisemitism and hate in all its forms. And we must stand united in asserting that hate is not welcome in our communities, in South Dakota, or in any corner of America.

The world hasn't seen this kind of evil in generations, and it has to be confronted. If it's not, we will see death and destruction on a scale akin to the horrors of the last century. I will continue working with my colleagues in Congress to ensure the United States' support of Israel is unwavering. Kimberley and I continue to pray for the victims of Hamas' terrorism, for the success of Israel's efforts, and for a lasting peace in Israel and the Middle East.

# South Dakota Beef Industry Sees Potential in Small, Local Meat Plants

WALL, S.D. – The small, somewhat worn meat processing plant in rural Wall seems an unlikely place for the birth of a new trend in South Dakota agriculture. But it could fundamentally change the economic landscape for the state's \$1 billion annual beef cattle industry.

The 2,400 square-foot Wall Meat Processing plant is the current home base of an aggressive, innovative new ownership team that has plans to revolutionize how South Dakota ranchers get their animals processed and expand opportunities for local consumers to buy meat raised almost in their own backyards.

On a recent day, a half-dozen or so workers were on task in the cramped but clean meat plant that sits less than a mile from Wall Drug. It's the last structure standing before the city of 700 fades into a nearly endless prairie to the north.

Built nearly 60 years ago, the boxy white plant takes in local cattle as well as a few hogs, sheep and buffalo and processes them from live animals to carcasses to final cuts of meat packaged in plastic, ready for consumer purchase. With a capacity of only 15 head of cattle per week, the plant hardly makes a dent in processing the roughly 1.5 million beef cows raised in South Dakota in 2022, the overwhelming majority of which are trucked out of state for processing.



Ken Charfauros. The plant will process beef, pork, lamb and bison produced by local ranchers. It would sell those products at the plant store as well as a retail location in Rapid City and at other groceries across the West River region.

"South Dakota is fourth or fifth in cattle production in the nation, but we sell our cattle out of state and then buy it back, so it's kind of backwards," said Charfauros.

Most South Dakota livestock are trucked out of state for finishing and packaging at one of the four major meat packing companies in the U.S.

Troy Hadrick is part of a five-generation family legacy of farming and ranching in South Dakota. He and his family want to expand their business and provide another regional meat processing option for ranchers in northeastern South Dakota.

The family's plan is to build a \$13.5 million meat plant, called North Prairie Butchery, that could process 25 head of cattle per day near their hometown of Faulkton.

Hadrick has qualified for a \$2.2 million grant from the USDA to get the project started, though the money only comes in the form of a reimbursement.

Two years ago, the Hadricks made a deal to provide beef to the Vanguard Hospitality group of restaurants in Sioux Falls, which includes Morrie's Steakhouse, Minerva's, Grill 26 and Paramount Cocktails and Food. The family sells them 60 to 70 carcasses a year, Hadrick said.

When the first shipment of beef was made to Vanguard, Hadrick took his two daughters out of school and brought them on the trip to Sioux Falls.

"It was exciting," he said. "It was like a light bulb came on for our girls, that this is why we do all the work we do at home."

# Worthing Volunteer Fire Department Held Smoke House Education

On October 13, the Worthing Volunteer Fire Department (WVFD) turned into educators as they visited Worthing Elementary School, spreading crucial knowledge about fire safety to 124 of the youngest members of the Worthing community. Classes of kindergarten through fourth graders took turns going outside to the school's parking lot to participate in an interactive presentation during National Fire Safety Week. The event aimed to equip young minds with life-saving skills, particularly

focusing on how to safely exit a house fire. WVFD borrowed "The Smoke House" from the Yankton Fire Department to allow learners a simulated smoke to crawl through. The Smoke House trailer is set up like a miniature house featuring a replica living room, and kitchen on the first level and a staircase leading to the replica bedroom on the second level. Firefighters also stopped by the Worthing Preschool class to show learners their bunker gear and explain what firefighters do as community helpers.



But the two co-owners of the plant, who bought it in 2017 after the former owners shuttered the business for several months, are using what they have learned in Wall to develop a business expansion plan that agricultural leaders said could form the model for future development of a new generation of in-state regional meat processing plants.

The local packing plants, they said, will allow more livestock grown in South Dakota to be processed, sold and consumed entirely within the boundaries of the Rushmore State. Local processing will create jobs and tax revenues, save ranchers money on trucking and packaging and create a fully South Dakota farm-to-table process that is increasingly popular among consumers.

The Wall owners and a third partner recently launched a new entity, I-90 Meats, which plans to build a \$21 million, 30,000 square-foot meat processing plant in New Underwood, a town of 600 people located south of Interstate 90 midway between Wall and Rapid City.

The high-tech plant would have capacity to process 15 cattle a day, or about 4,000 a year, and would include a retail market, agri-tourism learning center and culinary demonstration area.

The plant, with a proposed groundbreaking in early 2024 and projected opening in 2025, could employ as many as 50 people with wages up to \$36 an hour, according to I-90 Meats co-owner

Producers pay more to have their animals transported and processed, and the state loses out on the resulting jobs and tax revenues. Consumers then pay more for products for which they have no idea whether the meat they are eating was raised in South Dakota, California or even Mexico or Brazil.

U.S. Sen. Mike Rounds, R-South Dakota, said further expansion of processing would be a win for both producers and consumers.

As livestock processing evolves, Rounds said he sees the growth of smaller processing plants around the state as a likely path forward.

"If our premises are correct, that people want to buy American beef because of its quality, then I think these smaller processors are going to continue to grow and I think they're going to become the wave of the future," Rounds said.

The ongoing evolution of the meat packing industry in South Dakota is part of a larger statewide trend in which more agricultural products that are grown or raised in the state are being processed here.

Scott VanderWal, president of the South Dakota Farm Bureau Federation, said shipping products out of state for processing drives up costs for producers and eventually consumers.

"More local processing has been something we've needed for a long long time because for whatever reason, we've been happy in South Dakota just to produce things — corn, soybean, cattle and hogs — and ship them out of state for processing," VanderWal said.

# C-Hawks End Season with Loss and Finish with a 7-3 Record

The Canton C-Hawk football team hosted the Lennox Orioles for the 1st round of the 11A playoffs and the Orioles scored a late touchdown to win 28-22 ending the Hawks season and sending the Orioles to West Central Friday night for the semifinals. Dell Rapids host SF Christian for the other semifinal game.

Lennox started the game with the ball and they drove downfield on runs and quick pass plays down to the hawks 17 then they passed over the top of the Canton defender into the end zone for the games first touchdown at 8:35 and after the extra point was no good the Orioles took a 6-0 lead. Canton started at the 37 and on 9 running plays with Canaan McCracken and Cain Wallner they moved down to the Canton 35 and on a 4th and 5 play a Braxton Mulder to Wallner pass play fell incomplete turning the ball over to Lennox. McCracken led the defense with a 12 yard sack forcing a 4th and 12 punt turning the ball back over to the Hawks at the 41 yard line. The Hawks moved the

return and with a McCracken run on the extra point Canton tied up the game at 14-14 with 6:06 left till halftime. Lennox started their next drive at the 43 but after a 4 yard loss after a sack by McCracken they were faced with a 4th down and a bunch. They tried a pass on the 4th down and it was knocked down by Carter Kreger turning the ball over to Canton on their own 47. The Hawks moved the ball downfield on the ground on runs by McCracken and Wallner with a 16 yard gain to the 17 then Mulder hit Anderson for a 14 yard gain then 2 plays later Wallner took the handoff around the left end and hit a tackler at the goal line and powered his way into the end zone for the touchdown at :34 left till halftime. Mulder hit Athur Benoit for the extra point pass in the back of the end zone for the 2 points giving Canton a 22-14 lead as the 1st half came to a close.

Canton received the ball to start the 3rd quarter and they drove the ball downfield on the ground with McCracken on the bench with an injury Wallner and Teague

Granum did the carries with a pair of 12 yard gain but after Mulder hit Anderson for a 10 yard gain down to the 10 yard line a fumble ended that drive giving Lennox the ball at the 4 yard line. The Orioles moved the ball down the field thru the air until Anderson intercepted a pass giving the Hawks the ball on the 28. Wallner and Granum moved the ball down to midfield after a fake punt by Anderson for a 11 yard gain ended the 3rd quarter with the Hawks leading 22-14.

Canton started the 4th quarter at their 46 but a fumble set the Hawks back 19 yards and would force a punt moving the Orioles back to the 20 after the punt rolled into the end zone for a touchback. Lennox moved the ball down field thru the air and with 6:45 left in the game they crossed midfield and pass down to the 14 yard line followed by a 14 yard touchdown pass over a C-Hawk defender then the extra point play was no good making the score 22-20 with 5:31 left in the game. Canton was forced to punt after 3 plays giving Lennox the ball at their 30 yard line with 3:09 remaining. They crossed midfield with just under 2 minutes left then a pass play moved the ball down to the 21 yard line when run put them down to the 11 yard line with a 1st down. Canton was called for pass interference on the next play moving the ball to the 6 yard line and on their next play they sent a receiver out to the right and the Hawks defensive back slipped and fell as the orioles hit their wide open receiver for the touchdown with :29 left in the game. The Orioles ran in the extra point on an option play giving Lennox the lead 28-22. Canton got the ball at the 32 yard line and Mulder hit Anderson for 11 yards then after an incomplete pass Mulder hit Anderson for 28 yards



ball across midfield then a reverse run by Wallner for 26 yards put the Hawks on their 15 yard line as the first quarter ended with Lennox leading 6-0.

Canton started the 2nd quarter at the 15 yard line and McCracken moved it down to the 6 after a 9 yard run then two plays later Wallner followed Traun Cook and Pierce Mastalir into the end zone at 10:59. The extra point kick was blocked making the score 6-6. Lennox would start on the 20 yard line but their quarterback scrambled down to Cantons 49 yard line then they ran down to the 36 and then from the 21 yard line the Orioles got a run up the middle of the field but following 2 missed tackles they got to the end zone for their 2nd td of the game. The extra point pass was good and at 6:24 they increased their lead to 14-6. Lennox kicked off to Matt Anderson and he started up the gut and then out ran a couple tacklers and got out side and out ran the defense down the right side of the field for a 75 yard touchdown



putting the ball at the 29 yard line with :08 remaining then after an incomplete pass Canton was at the 29 with :04 left but an incomplete pass ran out the clock ending the Hawks season with a 28-22 defeat.
