
**Canton Lutheran Church Welcomes Pastor Jon Splichal Larson**

I love to worship in a space that prominently displays the Biblical story of the "Woman at the Well," painted on the ceiling of the sanctuary; a story that demonstrates how we can connect with Jesus, even bringing our hardest questions to God. Larson contributes his decision to become a pastor based on four parts: wonderful mentors who came into his life that encouraged him in ministry, family members who served in the ministry, traveling the globe to places that opened his eyes to the gifts and diversity God has created, and God's grace in his life. The Canton C-Hawk football team traveled to Winner on Saturday night for the 11B semi finals against the Winner Warriors and earned a trip to the Championship game Friday at 2:30 p.m. in the Dakota Dome in Vermillion. Canton will face the Parkston Trojans in the title game for the second time this season. Parkston was the only team to defeat the C-Hawks as they won 21-14 in the second game of the season.

The Canton Boy Scouts presented the colors to start off the annual Canton Veterans Day Program at the Canton High School Monday. The event, which honors all veterans, focused on the services of those who were in the Iraq and Afghanistan wars this year, with the Lincoln County Cruisers presenting veterans of that era with a special gift. The CHS Choir sang A Patriotic Salute by George M. Cohen. Guest Speaker Congresswoman Kristi Noem talked about the importance of veterans, saying in a statement: "Veterans have been asked to put the interests of our nation first – above their careers, their families, even their own lives. Veterans Day is a time for all of us to remember the sacrifices these women and men have made. It is a time to think of their families who have loved and supported them through deployments and when they returned home. It is a time to show our gratitude for their leadership and bravery. From the bottom of my heart, thank you to our veterans."

Betty Ann Everhart Park would have looked pretty bleak this summer had it not been for the hard work of the Canton Garden Club. The park was meant to be a place for people to just sit and relax but picnic table and benches had to be removed because they were being targeted by vandals.

The Harrisburg Tigers' starting five scored 67 points to get an opening round victory over Canton C-Hawks 70-52.

Two Canton residents have been instrumental in the creation of a computer program to file traffic accidents report with the state. 1923

The moon wasn't shining on the "moonshine" Monday when the sheriff, his deputy and State and Federal agents arrived, but the moonshine was sure in the process of manufacture in the distillery of two area men. A cave had been dug in the side of a hill on their farm near Shindler, two stills installed, barrels lined the walls and a row of them ran through the center of the room, each one filled with mash in the process of fermentation - in all 500 gallons.

Imagine yourself at the top of the scaffold at the ski hill where you could stand and see Lennox, Worthing, Inwood, Harrisburg and the penitentiary hill at Sioux Falls and then turn your attention to the trip down hill at an express train rate of speed over a skiway that is smooth as a floor. That's the kind of a hill the ski club just completed.

The ski hill has now been made without question, the best in the northwest. It has been plowed and leveled from top to bottom, fifty foot scaffold built for a starting place and the take-off altered so that 200-foot jumps will be a possibility. Within the next few days, the entire skiway will be gone over with hand rakes and prepared for the winter sport.

**The Arts Have A \$363 Million Impact In South Dakota**

The arts change lives, from elementary schools to senior citizen centers and for people in every walk of life—the arts truly benefit us all. And the arts also transform economies, according to a new study of South Dakota's nonprofit arts and culture industry. Arts & Economic Prosperity 6 (AEP6), an economic and social impact study conducted by Americans for the Arts, documents \$363 million in economic activity generated in 2022 across South Dakota.

This economic activity—\$63.7 million in spending by nonprofit arts and culture organizations and \$299.3 million in event-related spending by their audiences—generated nearly \$52 million in local, state and federal government revenue and supported 6,054 full-time jobs. Spending by arts and culture audiences also includes local merchants, restaurants and lodging facilities, a value-add that few other industries can compete with.

Our state has always understood the value of cultural attractions and creative enterprises to drive our economy. South Dakota's creative community contributes in

so many ways, reaching beyond our monumental sculptures into the heart of each community. This comprehensive study quantifies the impact of our arts industry in a way that dramatically illustrates its importance to us all.

The audience survey portion of the South Dakota analysis illustrates the overwhelming appreciation of arts and cultural opportunities in our state. 91% of respondents mentioned a sense of community or neighborhood pride in arts offerings, while 88% would feel a sense of loss if cultural opportunities were not available. 87% said arts attendance was a way of ensuring that creative activities and venues are preserved for future generations.

While an understanding of that economic impact of the sector is critical to its future, the true power of the arts is the social impact within our communities. Our arts venues and opportunities are shining examples of accessibility and inclusivity. We have so much to be proud of in South Dakota's creative community!

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## A LOOK BACK AT THE STORIES AND HISTORY OF LINCOLN COUNTY

My mother Ethel, would occasionally utter the words "UFF DA." As a youngster I had no idea what "UFF DA" translated to in English but I knew what it meant when she used it and most of the time it wasn't good. "Uff da Gaynor! Look at this messy room. How many times have I told you to clean it? Now get busy!" Or So you want more money so you can put gas in your car and drive back and forth through town with your friends. I just gave you some two days ago and now your telling me you already spent it. Uff da!"

Ethel was born on November 16, 1913 (110 years ago this Thursday) northeast of Canton on the homestead of her grandfather, Nels Benjamin Nelson. She didn't speak English fluently until she began attending public school. "Uff da" was something she kept from her Norwegian heritage and used it for the rest of her life. I still say it occasionally in a jocular way usually around people my age who are also around people my age who are also from Scandinavian descent. Saying it will often bring a chuckle or two and memories of days long past.

The following comes from a postcard I was given by a relative of mine. It's postmarked September 14, 1988 and was sent to my cousins, Pete and Merle Nelson who once lived at 704 E. 2nd St. in Canton. The card was sold by Bergquist's Scandinavian Imports in Cloquet, Minn. which is located west of

Duluth/Superior. I'm using it without their permission so, Uff da, please don't tell anyone.

This post card was sent by Bill, Kathy and Andrew who lived in South Jersey, New Jersey. They call Pete "grandpa." The card states "Uff da cannot be found in the dictionary, but for Norwegians it is an all-purpose expression covering a variety of situations."

Before we get to the many meanings of "Uff da" I would like to take a little space here to thank Dan Heinemann for turning us on to Katie Deal and her wonderful band. As a member of the Canton Performing Arts Council I wasn't familiar with Katie when Dan suggested we should consider booking her. I had seen the Patsy Cline show with Kaja Bonde and Jill Pillar, along with the Poker Alice Band, that toured around this area years ago. That was a great show and Katie's "Crazy For Patsy Cline" was too.

Everyone on our board got behind this show and put in the work to make it a success. It was really great to see the large crowd at the PAC on November 3 and I'm quite sure that Katie will be making a return trip to Canton at some future date. So, thanks again Dan and everyone who came out to support CPAC and got a little crazy for Katie.

## "I Want Life"

Last Saturday evening, I had the pleasure of sitting down and enjoying a cup of tea with Achut Deng, author of "Don't Look Back." Based on her warm hug and happy smile laughing with joy, you would never have believed the horrors the little girl living inside of her had gone through.

Thirty-two years ago, Deng was forced to flee the village in the middle of the night while Nuer rebels attacked the only home she had ever known. Among many other refugees, Deng made her way hundreds of miles on foot to Kakuma refugee camp in Kenya, where she lived for about 10 years. In late 2000 at age sixteen, Deng was chosen as one of the refugees that were brought to the United States with the "Lost Boys of Sudan."

In March 2020, Deng was interviewed by the New York Times about COVID-19's impact at Smithfield in Sioux Falls, where she works in the HR department. She also shared some of her story with the reporter, which led to Macmillan Publishers taking an interest in her unique story. They proposed the idea of writing her story into a book. She asked author Keely Hutton to collaborate with her on the book to help her tell her story. Deng would write a chapter a week to send to Hutton, which she would edit. Then Hutton would ask Deng to tell her about another part of her story for the following week. She had never shared her story with her children before. Each week after another chapter was done, they would talk about it, and she would answer their questions. Her boys had never understood why they volunteered at the homeless shelter or The Banquet serving food, but soon after hearing their mother's story everything started to make sense. After learning about their


mother, they were proud to volunteer their time to help others.

When she started working on the book, Deng found it emotional to revisit her past experiences and to "live through them" again in a way she hadn't before. Up until that point, she had been living in the present and not glancing back at her past. She kept herself so busy that she didn't have time to think about it. Looking back, Deng took her grandmother's advice "keep moving forward and don't look back" to heart more than she knew. However, that mindset helped Deng survive the heart-breaking tribulations she went through, by taking one day at a time and pushing through with a resilience few people have.

Ever since I read "Don't Look Back" a few months ago, I find myself thankful for little things. When I was born in 1991, Achut was literally running for her life in Sudan. Really puts things into perspective and helps to remind me to be kind to everyone, regardless of knowing what they have gone through or not. During this season of Thanksgiving, I hope others will reflect on what they have to be thankful for, here in our hometown.

I asked Deng if she would have advice for others willing to tell their story & she replied, "I would tell them to take their time, and do it when they are ready. Don't force it, do it when you're comfortable. You can't do it for other reasons, only yourself. Everyone has their own story to share."

Deng and her three boys live happily in Sioux Falls, SD. She also has talked at events as a motivational speaker, which she enjoys. Interested readers can buy her book on Amazon or at Barnes & Noble.



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

"Don't Look Back" By: Achut Deng and Keely Hutton

How hard would you fight to save your own life? The lives of your friends and family members? In this harrowing and heart-wrenching survival story, readers will follow Achut Deng on her emotional journey throughout the Sudanese war to American soil.


Achut Deng grew up in South Sudan a Dinka village with her family. This village was a thirty-minute walk from the city of Wernyol. A hut with round mud walls and a straw roof housed her family and 2 dogs. Growing up, girls were educated by women in their families on gardening, cooking, and raising children. Boys were taught by men of the village how to hunt, fish, and care for the herds of cattle which were their livelihood. To go to school was an expense most could not afford. Many boys would go on 3-month cattle drives away from home, starting at the age of 10. Achut's father was in the Sudan People's Liberation Army (SPLA) and was gone from the homeplace most of her childhood. Her grandmother Koko helped her mother around their home.

One day, a soldier from the SPLA came to their village with a list of names that were killed or injured in the war. Achut's father had been injured, so her mother left her in the care of her grandmother. At this time Achut was 6 years old and had been shielded from talk about the war encroaching on her homeland. Many boys were taken at an early age by the SPLA to be forced to train for the military.

A few months after her mother left, the Nuer rebel militia attacked her village at night. About one thousand people in her village were forced to flee. Achut and her grandmother ran from the sound of gunfire firing through the darkness. Fleeing from their home down a narrow dirt path not only worrying about wandering gunfire, but also wandering predators. Eventually walking a harrowing journey through southern Sudan to Kakuma refugee camp in Kenya, where she would live for about 10 years. She was chosen as a candidate for a relocation program and sent to Houston, Texas. Unfortunately, problems followed Achut to America and she would have to learn to survive once again.




## OFF The Road With Jerry



The dark overcast day is showing on the Missouri river on Oahe Reservoir. This area is where Game, Fish and Parks begin their big programs of Net catching hundreds of female walleye fish. They need these to "milk" the eggs of the fish and then they have great stocking material. They will finish raising in their growing ponds. This has to be done at spring spawning time.



Here the fisherman are emptying fish from their large commercial nets. This is a wet heavy job. These fish need to be moved quickly from this boat to a much larger one.



This scene is an inside lab on the pontoon, shown here is how fish specialist literally "milk" and stripped of a dozen eggs, and that collection goes into another special holding tank. Then the adult fish are quickly returned to the lake.



Here the fish are sorted and other species are all thrown back into the water, then the female walleyes are separated from the male fish. This big boat is a pontoon boat anchored in a quiet protected bay. The walleyes are now in large tanks with oxygen pumped to the tank while the egg capture process starts.



After the hundreds of fish are taken from the female walleye, she and all the others are immediately returned to the cold water of Lake Oahe, close to where the Cheyenne River, Moreau and Grand River the walleyes migrate up these rivers to spawn. Canton has had good size 4 to 6 lb female walleye caught down at the dam when the river was better.

### BIG Update

Nearly 55,000 veterans call South Dakota home. These veterans are our friends, family, and neighbors. They served to protect us and our country to help ensure freedom continues to ring. ### BIG Idea

Butte County Sheriff Fred Lamphere understands how the border crisis affects South Dakota. Although our state isn't near the southern border, illegal immigration has cost South Dakota taxpayers \$56.9 million in 2023.

I've been an advocate for securing the southern border for years. The Biden Administration's

open border has created crises for governors, mayors, and law enforcement across America. Sheriff Lamphere and I talked about solutions, like HR 2 that passed the House with my support. It includes the strongest border policies ever seen in Congress. Now it's time for the Senate to take action.

### BIG News

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) has started using public airports to house illegal immigrants. This is unsafe and is an improper use of our transportation and commerce hubs.

Individuals on the terrorist watch list have come across our southern border, along with illicit drugs and an increase of violent crime. Our airports are supposed to be safe and secure – but housing undocumented migrants does the opposite.

This week, I urged Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg to block the continuation of this unsettling use of our public airports.

This is just another attempted band-aid on the Biden Administration's failed border policies. Allowing unfettered entry into the U.S. through the southern border is a choice, and the Biden Administration continues to make the wrong one. We must address the root issue and put strong border security measures in place.

Will the DOC issue a statement saying, "We're sorry we riled up everyone and we're looking at other sites that are more suitable for a prison?" I doubt it. So, where does that leave us? I guess time will tell. For now (the day after the N.O.P.E. public forum at the Canton Barn) Kristi Noem is in Paris giving a speech and who knows where Kellie Wasko is. ## HHS Trap Shooting a Fast-Growing Club Teaching Responsibility, Safety and Marksman

Sports has always been a vital part of high schools throughout the country. While sports like football, wrestling, volleyball, basketball and soccer have been part of HHS for decades, a list of new, diverse sports are giving students more choices. In the last five years, E-sports, girls' wrestling and powerlifting are getting a whole new level of participation. And there is one other sport that can't be left off this list - trap shooting.

### Trap Shooting?

Trap shooting dates to the 18th Century where competitors would shoot at live pigeons released from cages called traps. Today, oscillating target throwing machines release the target at an angle for the shooter to take down.

Clay target shooting is also a longtime Olympic sport and will be part of the Olympic Games in Paris in 2024. It includes four disciplines of which trap is the most popular.

Though trap shooting has been around for quite some time, it only got its start at HHS in 2017.

"There were only 13 students on the 2017 team," recalls head coach Adam Dancsisin. "In 2023 there were 125 students - 30% are female. We are now gearing up for our sixth year."

### Targeting youth

Across the state, trapshooting has taken off not only here but the nation as well. It is part of a national effort to grow the sport, especially in small towns. Ethan, SD, for example, got approval from the Davison County Commission to allow the school's shooting team of 22 members to build a range in Ethan instead of having to travel 12 miles to Parkston.

Though South Dakota has a strong hunting and recreational shooting culture, the proliferation of youth trap came out of Minnesota 20 years ago. In fact, Minnesota became the first state to have its high school league endorse clay-target shooting, which lent the sport credibility among wary school administrators. There are now roughly 12,000 participants in 350 of its 500 schools.

Schools had to be convinced that clay-target shooting brought inclusivity. Teams only need five students and are not gender segregated; the sport accommodates a wide range of body types and

physical abilities, there are no cuts or benchwarmers. Team members don't have to be the fastest, strongest or tallest.

Recreational shooting reaches kids who don't participate in other teams. Students say they develop skills and friendships through the sport.

Trap doesn't require school facilities and team members' average participation fees are about \$300 a season (mostly for shotgun shells and clay targets). And - crucially - the league has an impeccable safety record. So far, it has reported no injuries, unheard of in youth sports.

To practice, the team goes to the Izaak Walton League in Sioux Falls.

"The competition is virtual," says Dancsisin. "We shoot at our home field and the scores are uploaded. Our conference is made up of three teams - HHS, Pierre and Brandon Valley. HHS took first place in our conference this year for the first time."

### Safety first

Safety is the number one priority Dancsisin says.

Each athlete must first successfully complete the SD Game, Fish and Parks Hunt Safe Certification or The Safe Certification from the High School Clay Target League prior to the start of the season.

"We have range night where we go over the safety rules and the policies of the Clay Target League. We have a safety brief at the start of each night prior to taking the field. We have a certified range safety officers that monitor during competition. We also have two coaches on each field who monitor for safety as well as coach the students. The athletes do not load until it is their turn and keep their firearm stored on a safety rack in between rows."

### So much good

Dancsisin has been the coach since 2019. He has seen nothing but good results.

"The sport is both an individual and a team sport so there are more ways to be successful. Athletes can participate at any level. For example, there was a student who had knee surgery and was still able to participate by sitting on a stool to shoot."

But unlike sports like soccer or swimming or tennis, trapshooting is mental than physical - 90% mental; 10% physical.

There is also a level playing field for all participants he says.

"It is an opportunity for those who may not make traditional varsity teams the ability to be on a team and participate in a state tournament. Last summer 58 teams and 900 students participated in a state-wide competition in Aberdeen June 9-11.

It's also a sport the entire family can get involved in and do together in the off season.

"The Harrisburg trap team is not just coaching our kids to be successful in this life-long sport, but to be successful in life."

The Harrisburg Tigers' spring season gets underway in April of 2024.

In all, the library has 37 different flags which serve as symbolic representations of the students who make up the high school population.



And as the high school continues to grow, so does the diversity among its students.


"The district's diversity is a perfect illustration of the demographic shift that has occurred in the past few years," says Dr. Michael Amolins, Director of Instruction. "At HHS for the 2023-24 school year, 14.6% of the school's student population is a racial or ethnic minority. That is up over 1% from last year's number of 13.4%."



"To help recognize and celebrate this diversity, we started hanging flags in the library in 2020," said librarian Eve Langerock.

Langerock and her staff were able to launch their own special library flag project after taking a survey.

"Students filled out a Google survey in which they answered if they, or someone in their household, was born in a different country and moved to the US and/or if another language was spoken in their home. From the results of this survey, we purchased flags of each of the countries that were mentioned. These 28 flags are hanging in the library. The number has now grown to 37."

The flags displayed in the library are proudly hung to represent the countries of origin of our Harrisburg High School students. If a student or an immediate family member was born in another country, or if another language is spoken in the home, that country's flag is on display. 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The Great American Smoke Out is observed on the third Thursday of November each year. In 2023, it will take place on November 16th. What makes this an important day for students and parents? Over 2.5 million teens use e-cigarettes with nearly half (46%) of high schoolers who vape doing so on a frequent basis putting a new generation at risk for a lifetime of nicotine addiction. (Truth initiative)

This nationally recognized day provides an opportunity for parents and students to talk about vaping and nicotine addiction. The day provides a platform for individuals, families, communities, and organizations to come together in the fight against tobacco addiction.

Nicotine addiction can play a role in intensifying feelings of stress, but many young people are unaware of this connection. In fact, according to a Truth Initiative survey, 4 in 5 young people who had vaped said they started as a way to lessen their feelings of stress, anxiety, or depression.

In the short-term, vaping nicotine may produce feelings of satisfaction by stimulating the production of a chemical in the brain called dopamine, which can create feelings of pleasure and relaxation. However, because of the way nicotine works in the body, those feel-good chemicals don't last long. Within just a few hours, the effect of nicotine in the body wears off and is replaced by an urge to vape again.

This cycle is called nicotine withdrawal, and it can produce cravings or urges to vape, irritated or upset feelings, jumpy and restless feelings, difficulty concentrating, changes in sleep and eating habits, and feelings of anxiety or depression. Over time, it can take more nicotine to curb the symptoms of withdrawal and create that satisfied feeling. That's called nicotine dependence. Eventually, what started out as a pleasurable experience turns into a vicious cycle.

Whether it is on the 16th or later this month take a couple minutes to talk with your student about the dangers of nicotine and the long-term health impact of vaping. At school I will be providing a nicotine facts activity for students in 6th-12th grade who want to participate. Creating awareness by sharing information about the harmful effects and benefits of quitting is one way all of us can help break this cycle of nicotine addiction.
