Tyler is originally from Avon and Courtney from Brandon. Tyler works as a fire inspector for Sioux Falls Fire Rescue while Courtney is a part time data analyst for Animalytix. Rugged Cross Stables in Sioux Falls is also owned and operated by the couple.

The Tjeerdsma's were married at the Canton barn, where they simply fell in love with the venue. Since both grew up rurally, they understand all that an old barn represents. They reached out to Tim and Kalli Blackstone when they announced they were closing. They asked if they would be interested in selling it to them, which has led them to owning the barn.

the venue and the Tjeerdsma's are excited to add this option for bridal parties.

Sioux Valley Unearthed




Late October, many of the Civil War Reenactors who were in Canton last year, met again for an event at Harrisonville Missouri. It was an interesting event as it commemorated a series of encounters on the outskirts of Kansas City. Confederate guerilla groups, commonly called bushwhackers, and militia were supplied by southern sympathizers in Cass County. The Union General, Thomas Ewing, found it hard to secure the territory for his soldiers and union civilians, therefore he ordered that all civilians loyal to the union should evacuate to areas where they would be safe. Anyone who would not take the oath of allegiance and move was ordered to leave their homes. Their home and crops were to be destroyed. Problem was if you took the oath the Confederates would burn you out if you didn't, the Union forces would burn you out. The area became known as the burnt district or burnt chimneys.

At this event there were four different battlefields and the idea was that CSA troops would be found at a certain place. Union forces would be dispatched to take care of the situation. Then another group would pop up somewhere else. These were always small skirmishes never large-scale battles but it kept everyone busy. Even late in the afternoon when there was supposed to be a time of rest, out of nowhere the Rebel troops advanced to within twenty yards of the Union camp unseen and opened fire sending soldiers to their muskets and into line.

While I was there, I handed out almost 90 handbills to both CS and US troops as invitations to next years Canton Civil War Days. Groups that were not represented last year had heard that it was a good event and that the community and committee supported the reenactors efforts to portray history in an educational manner. Both sides of the 'conflict' indicated they planned on attending Canton Civil War Days in August of 24.

As we reenactors close this year and plan ahead to holding the Canton Civil War Days on August 17-18 of 2024, I would ask the community to engage in volunteering to make this next event bigger and better. Your time, your talent and your treasure would be greatly appreciated. Begin to watch for more articles and information in the early spring.

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A LOOK BACK AT THE STORIES AND HISTORY OF LINCOLN COUNTY

Reading the December 14 edition of the Sioux Valley News one story stood out that put a big smile on my face. It was on page five and involved Eric Hohman's decision to throw his hat into the ring and run for the District 16 State Senate seat currently held by Jim Bolin. Before we go any further let me state that this is not an endorsement for Mr. Hohman. I'm quite sure that most of you wouldn't pay much attention to me if I did say he's the most qualified person for this job or avoid voting for him at all cost because he's backed by Big Money Scandinavians who want to have lutefisk named the State Food of South Dakota. After all this is a history column and I've always tried to keep my political views out of what I write.

Getting back to the story, one of the first things I did after reading it was to check out a great photo of a much younger Eric Hohman taken back in 1966. It was from an ad for his father's business in Canton-Freeman and Hohman Veterinarians. Eric is standing between his father, Dr. Paul Hohman, and another gentleman. On the far left is a very bearded Dr. Robert F. Freeman. This photograph was taken in front of their office at 207 E. 5th St. and was included in the Canton Centennial Souvenir booklet. Hoping to verify that was actually Eric in this photo I gave him a call and he told me that was indeed him at the ripe old age of 9. From the look on his face it appears he wasn't too happy about posing for this photograph. He probably wished he was at the swimming pool with his friends.

In the 1985 History of Lincoln County it states that Paul Hohman was raised near Larchwood, Iowa. It goes on to say that he graduated from Iowa State and joined Dr. Freeman in 1958.

Arthur and Palma Roe Family

The parents of Arthur G. and Palma M. Roe were all born in Norway. Palma Roe's family moved here from Claremont, Iowa, in the same caravan as the Schiger family in 1868. Mrs. Roe's father (Martin Monrad) came to his sister's (Mrs. Wright) in Menominee, Wis. He worked in a lumber mill in the office. He was later encouraged by Jim Wahl to come to South Dakota to take a homestead in Lincoln County. He married Karen Shulson and remained on the farm. They had six children: Marie, Alfred, Phine, David, Christine, and Palma. All are deceased except Palma Roe.

These pioneers battled with grasshoppers, the drought, blizzards, the Indians, and even Jesse James and his outlaw brothers who came through this part of the country, stealing the best horses and leaving their old nags behind. These pioneers were brave men and women who never faltered or gave up. They carried on and built up what became the finest farming country in Dakota Territory. Most of them now are sleeping in their little country cemetery overlooking the scenes of their earlier struggles.

Palma Roe celebrated her 95th birthday on April 21, 1984 and is living on her farm with her daughter Maevis. Mrs. Roe attended Augustana Academy and graduated in 1908. She attended St. Olaf College one year and sang harmony under F. Melius Christiansen. She sang in the ladies chorus and played piano under Miss Cheneviet. She taught school two years and was organist in the Canton Lutheran Church for seven years.

Mr. Roe was a member of the Rotary and the Lincoln Debating Society. Arthur and Palma were charter members of the South Dakota Farm Bureau since its beginning in 1920. Arthur was also honored at Brookings, as an eminent farmer in Lincoln County. He received a certificate from the Pioneer Livestock Shipper Club. Arthur and Palma received certificates of recognition from the South Dakota Farm Bureau. Mrs. Palma Roe was crowned the queen in Lennox at the Lincoln County Senior Citizens celebration in 1983.




Another was disgust. I realized what I was doing was stupid. I was

on your list, it's a win. Every time you do this, it's another win and another step away from your old habits and in the right direction.





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Commission Sets Fine for Temporary Branch Drop Off Site

The Canton City Commission met in regular session on Monday, December 18 at 7 p.m. All Commissioners were present at the time of roll call.

With no visitors to be heard, the first item under Old Business was the Pay Request #11 - Airport Snow Removal Equipment Building. KLJ Projector Engineer Aaron Storm has submitted the Pay Request in the amount of \$70,079.06 for work completed at the Airport Snow Removal Building. This item was tabled at the December 4 City Commission meeting due to issues with the project. Storm took to the podium to answer questions about the project. Commissioner Kris York showed him photos of his concerns that he had with the project regarding the quality. Commissioner Paul Garbers echoed York's concerns and said that City Engineer Myron Adam said the quality was acceptable. Garbers also asked if some of the concerns have been fixed and Mayor Sandra Lundstrom said yes. Motion to approve by Commissioner Jerry Chaon. Seconded by Commissioner Tyler Larson. Chaon aye. Larson aye. Garbers nay. York nay. Mayor Lundstrom aye. Motion carries 3-2.

The final item under Old Business was the Canton Capital Improvement Plan. ISG has submitted the Capital Improvement Draft Plan for the City and was present to answer questions. A more finalized plan will be presented in January. Motion to approve project list by Garbers. Seconded by Chaon. Unanimous approval.

The first item under New Business was the Illegal Dumping at Chautauqua Park. The alternative drop site at Chautauqua Park is having items dumped that are not Limbs or Branches. Signs are posted stating that this drop site is only for Limbs and Branches. A fine

of \$250 for illegal dumping is being recommended during this time that Chautauqua Park is the temporary drop site. It was noted that cameras are installed on the property. Garbers suggested that they make the fine \$500 to further deter illegal dumping at the temporary drop site. Motion to approve the \$500 fine for illegal dumping at the temporary drop off site at Chautauqua Park by Garbers. Seconded by York. Unanimous approval.

Next under New Business was the First Reading-Commercial Garbage Ordinance. Due to the failed adoption of the Ordinance No. 1110 Garbage Ordinance - Commercial 54A, the City is required to formally repeal this Commercial Ordinance. Motion to hold the First Reading by Garbers. No Second and vote is required for a First Reading.

Award Bid - Beaver Creek Trunk Sewer Improvement Project was next on the agenda. The bids for the Beaver Creek Trunk Sewer Improvement Project were opened on December 6 and five bids were received.

City Engineer Adam is recommending to award the bid in the amount of \$5,272,178 to First Rate Excavate Inc., located in Sioux Falls, So. Dak. Adam originally estimated the project would cost \$5,400,000.

An additional project bid was included in this bid for one block of water main replacement on 10th Street in the amount of \$278,178. Adam had estimated that this side project would cost \$200,000. The total base project cost from JSA would be \$4,994,000. Motion to award the base bid for the project in the amount of \$4,944,000 with First Rate Excavate Inc., by Garbers. Seconded by Larson. Unanimous approval.

Next on the agenda was the 2024 Fee Schedule. Each year, the City adopts a fee schedule and is given



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Brain Development Science Bolsters Calls for Quality Preschool in South Dakota

Raising a child looks different for every generation. Amy Elliott, chief clinical research officer at Avera Research Institute, understands how quickly new science and research can change ideas that used to be taken for granted. Her research focuses on child health and development.

"For example, drinking during pregnancy," she said. "That's something you don't have to go back too many generations — and that actually may have been something that had been encouraged. Now we know the

children. For now, brain research is catching up with what early childhood educators have known for decades: the earliest years of a child's life can set the tone for lifelong learning outcomes.

State law requires kids are in school by age 6, though families have the option to start kindergarten if their child is 5 by Sept. 1 of the school year. Families might harness the potential of those earlier years through preschool, but South Dakota does not have a state-run or funded preschool program. Aside from federally funded programs like Head Start, privately run early childhood learning programs can

profession because it truly is a profession. I mean, we're working with young children when the most brain development happens. So why shouldn't it be required that you need to understand how to work with young children at that time?"

Preschoolers 'need more than just love'

Nicole Weiss believes preschool providers owe families the highest-possible quality care for their children. She's the early learning director for the YMCA of Rapid City. While the state doesn't mandate credentials to teach preschool, her program does.

"Preschool's an interesting time



effects that can have on fetal development, which is why there's the recommendation of no drinking during pregnancy."

In the same way, researchers are uncovering new information about brain development. Even the past five years have uncovered new information, Elliott said.

"We're able to look at the brain, for example, and look at brain development to a much greater degree than we were ever, ever before with those technologies," she explained.

That means researchers have a clearer picture of what parts of the brain develop, when they develop, and how rapidly. Elliott said when a child is born, its brain is about the fourth the size it will be when the child is an adult. By the child's first birthday, the brain will grow to half its eventual size.

"Some have even said in those first three months, the brain is increasing every day at almost a 1% capacity — every day," said Elliott. "Millions of connections being formed in a very short amount of time, much more rapid development than is seen at any other time period in life. So the first year of life and then the first five years are really what we would refer to as very critical time periods for brain development."

For instance, research has determined that the foundations for language development are set in a child's brain by age 3.

"Now you can definitely learn language after that, but it's a lot more difficult," Elliott said. "We know there's a critical time period where different sounds — because different languages have different sounds — are getting integrated within and becoming part of how that brain is wired."

Lifelong learning ability established in early childhood

Elliott expects the next decade of research to demonstrate similar findings for reading, math and social development in

vary dramatically in quality.

Preschool standards 'really random in South Dakota'

Janessa Bixel is executive director of the South Dakota Association for the Education of Young Children. It's a statewide chapter of a national professional organization that provides resources for early childhood educators, families and communities. She has more than 20 years of experience in early childhood education, including in Head Start programs in various states.

"When you're in Alaska or Kansas or New Hampshire or South Dakota — which are some of the places I've lived — those Head Start standards are the same, basically, in all of those states," she said. "When you get outside of Head Start, it's really random in South Dakota. You can open a preschool and you don't even have to be regulated in any way in the state."

In fact, South Dakota is one of a handful of states in the country without a state-funded program or official standards to measure the quality of private programs. There have been some efforts from groups like the School Administrators of South Dakota to create early learning guides, but they don't hold the weight of regulatory standards.

There are no state-required credentials for preschool teachers either.

Part of Bixel's work includes expanding opportunities for early learning educators in a state where public policy hasn't caught up with the importance research puts on the field.

"I would love to see an apprenticeship program started in South Dakota for early childhood educators," she said. "There are some states doing that right now and it seems like it could be an untapped area to support this field and really help to elevate it as a

in a kiddo's life because they need more than just love and freedom to roam and learn," she said. "They also don't need to be sitting down with worksheets and having their whole day scheduled out. It takes some education to understand that."

All teachers in Weiss' department must join with at least a Child Development Associate (CDA) credential, a one-year degree.

"They have to have a minimum of that to be a lead teacher in our program," said Weiss.

However, even that minimum education requirement adds a hurdle to ongoing staffing issues.

"There's a lot of people who think because they have worked in child care that, 'I'm a preschool teacher now, I can go do this or that,' and they don't understand the lesson planning and the assessments and the conferences."

The state Department of Social Services contracts with a handful of organizations around the state that offer the CDA credential. One of those is a Rapid City nonprofit called Early Childhood Connections.

"The state of South Dakota supports CDA," said Autumn Gregory, executive director. "Right now they pay for the coursework, they pay for the scholarship, for the assessment and credentialing, and so they are really trying to promote

professional development."

But without a state requirement, it's up to private entities to decide what level of training their staff needs.

Gregory's organization also administers a program called Starting Strong, a scholarship program funded by the John T. Vucurevich Foundation to allow disadvantaged families the opportunity to afford preschool. The benefits ripple beyond children in the Starting Strong program, she said.

"That kindergarten teacher is going to teach to the child with the most needs because that's where all that attention needs to go," Gregory said. "If those children can come in ready to learn, then it benefits all the children in that kindergarten class."

Elliott, Avera's chief clinical research officer, believes the data show the same benefits to preschool that educators have

experienced firsthand.

"Pre-K teaches kids so many things, and sometimes I think the things that are taught — the most important — are on the behavioral side," she said. "There shouldn't be pressure that kids have to be able to read or do those things before school. But it's good for them to be exposed to letters and to colors and to sounds and to like looking at books."

Because research on child development is evolving so rapidly, Elliott understands it can take time for the public — and policy — to catch up. She returns to the example of drinking during pregnancy.

"People will say, 'Well, I think things turned out just fine.' The one thing I would like to say is, that's what science is supposed to do for us. It's supposed to help us raise the next generation better than the previous one."



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



TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Installation and maintenance of said facilities on highway right-of-way shall be subject to applicable State and Federal Laws and the following terms and conditions:
 1. The Applicant agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Township, its officers, its employees and its agents, from any cost, claim, suit, liability and/or award which might come, be brought, or be assessed, because of the issuance or exercise of this permit, or because of any adverse effect upon any person or property which is attributed to the partially or entirely completed works of the Applicant.

Accomplishment of the permitted work, or any part thereof, by or on behalf of the Applicant shall bind such Applicant to abide by this permit and all its conditions and provisions.
 2. The permitted facilities shall, if necessary, be altered at the expense of the Applicant to permit alteration, improvement, or maintenance of the highway and right-of-way as may hereafter be ordered. The entire costs of constructing and maintaining the permitted facilities shall be the obligation of the Applicant unless a contract for such costs has been executed.

3. No open cutting for utility crossings will be allowed without specific authorization by the Permitting Authority. At least one-way traffic must be maintained at all times throughout the utility installation unless specific approval that states otherwise has been received from the Permitting Authority.

4. When one-way traffic or a detour is used, the Applicant shall provide all necessary signs, flagmen and lights required according to the "Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices."

5. All disturbed areas shall be returned to their present condition or better, subject to the satisfaction of the Permitting Authority. Access to all private drives and public street intersections shall be maintained, and all disturbed areas completely restored.

6. Any trenching, tunneling or excavating shall be performed in accordance with the requirements of OSHA and other South Dakota governmental departments having jurisdictional authority over such actions.

7. In cases of emergencies, the Applicant shall call 911 immediately. As soon as safely possible thereafter, the Applicant shall notify the Township by calling (605) 212-7821.

8. A copy of this completed permit, along with any plans and special provisions, shall be available on the job site.

9. The Applicant and all its agents and assigns shall wear an ANSI/ISEA 107-2004 Class II height visibility garment while working within the highway right-of-way as per the requirements of 23 CFR 634.

10. Applicant shall promptly remove said facilities from highway right-of-

way, or shall relocate or adjust said facilities, at its sole cost and expense when requested to do so by Township.

11. This permit maybe suspended, revoked or modified at the conscientious discretion of the Township and upon Notice to the Applicant.

ORDINANCE NO. 2023-02
AN ORDINANCE OF CANTON TOWNSHIP, LINCOLN COUNTY, SD TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION OF CARBON DIOXIDE PIPELINES.**BE IT ORDAINED BY CANTON TOWNSHIP, LINCOLN COUNTY, SD:**

Section 1. An Ordinance is established with the following terms and definitions:

CARBON DIOXIDE A fluid consisting of carbon dioxide molecules compressed to a supercritical state and classified as a hazardous material by the federal government.

PIPE LINE PIPE OR PIPELINE A tube, usually cylindrical, through which carbon dioxide flows from one point to another.

Section 2. In the event that Lincoln County or a municipality in Canton Township (to the extent of its territorial jurisdiction in Canton Township) has not assumed the regulation of carbon dioxide pipes and line pipes, and to the extent not contrary to said Lincoln County or municipal ordinance if it has assumed said regulation, be it ordained that in Canton Township in order to protect the lives and property of townships inhabitants and property owners such carbon dioxide pipes, line pipes and pipelines:

(a) Shall be setback a minimum of 1,855 feet from a dwelling, church, school, daycare, nursing home, hospital, business or other inhabited structure or a, public park or a permitted concentrated animal feeding operation. Said setback is based upon a six-inch (6") diameter pipe. If said pipeline is other than six inches (6") in diameter said pipeline owner shall provide the Township Board an application concerning said pipeline so that it can be determined what setback other than the minimum set forth herein may be required at the Canton Township Board's discretion. The setback shall be measured from the pipeline to the closest point of the building or in the case of a public park or concentrated feeding operation the closest point of the property line. Any authorized governmental entity, business or person that has a use described above within the minimum setback may waive the setback through a written instrument to be filed with Lincoln County's Register of Deeds. This waiver would run with the land.

(b) Shall be setback a minimum of 5,280 feet from an incorporated city. Said setback is based upon a six inch (6") diameter pipe. If said pipeline is other than six inches (6") in diameter said pipeline owner shall provide the Township Board an application concerning said pipeline so that it can be determined what setback other than the minimum set forth herein may be required at the Canton Township Board's discretion. The setback shall be measured from the pipeline to the closest point of the municipal boundary as recorded with the Lincoln County Register of Deeds.

Any incorporated city that is within the minimum setback may waive the setback through a written instrument to be filed with Lincoln County's Register of Deeds. This waiver would run with the land.

(c) Shall be at a depth of seven feet (7') to accommodate agricultural practices within the Township, including but not limited to cultivation practices such as drainage tiling, plowing and decompaction, and the potential long-term impacts of soil erosion. The default depth on agricultural lands within the Township is set at 7 feet (7') below grade. Landowners may assert that the level of cultivation extends deeper than 7 feet (7') upon presentation of supporting documents to the Township. Conversely, a landowner may choose to waive the default depth to a depth shallower than seven feet (7'), but no less than four feet (4'), through a written instrument to be filed with the Lincoln

County Register of Deeds. This waiver would run with the land.

(d) Any such waivers as set forth in Sections 2(a), (b) and (c) are void if the pipeline fails to obtain the necessary permit(s) and authorization from the South Dakota Public Utilities Commission or other applicable federal agency for the construction of such Transmission Pipeline within five (5) years after the effective date of the waiver. This language shall be set forth in all waivers filed pursuant to Section 2 (a) (b) or (c).

(e) Shall not be constructed until all other Canton Township permits, including right-of-way hazardous utility occupancy are approved regardless of whether Lincoln County or a municipality in Canton Township has assumed the regulation of carbon dioxide pipes and line pipes.

(f) Shall be in compliance with all other Federal, State and Local rules, regulations and permitting requirements and shall provide Canton Township with:

1. A complete copy of the application for a permit filed
