

Lost Legos and Jesus

My boys and I love Legos. Still we get distracted by other fun activities and the Legos might sit for weeks at a time without being used. When we come back to them, they have not built themselves into a new creation. They are still the same as when we left them. Further if we put them into a pail and shake the pail, they do not build themselves. Instead the things that we built actually fall apart.

The Lego example illustrates the Second Law of Thermodynamics (a law of energy decay) that shows that things go from a more ordered state to a less ordered state. The rust on our cars is a great example of this law and so is the rotting garbage in a dumpster.

Another example is the human body. Although I still feel fairly young and healthy, I cannot see as well as I used to and I am not as strong as I used to be. Further my hair is turning gray. My body is going from a more ordered state to a less ordered state.

The Lego illustration showed us that there has to be a creator. The example of my aging body shows that one day I will meet that creator. Hebrews 9:27 warns, "And as it is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment."

As a child, I became a Lego creator. Many of my creations were lost or destroyed. Today I do not even know what happened to the Legos that I had as a child. Thankfully my creator is much more loving of his creation than I was of my Legos.

John chapter 1 makes it very clear that Jesus is our creator. By the third chapter of John we are shown how much he loves us. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." (John 3:16) Jesus did not just create us and

then forget about us. He knows the details about us. Jesus said in Luke 12:7, "Indeed, the very hairs of your head are all numbered. Do not fear; you are of more value than many sparrows."

As the hairs of my head turn gray and fall out, Jesus knows how many I have left. He also knows about my sin and that because of my sin, I have come short of his glory. "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God," (Romans 3:23) This reality presents a problem for all of us because "the wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23a). In other words our sin is an even bigger problem than the fact that our bodies are going from a more ordered state to a less ordered state.

If I were simply buried in the ground and forgotten once I die like childhood Legos- then there would not be a lot to worry about. But we are not forgotten by our creator. We are both loved and held accountable for our actions. If we return that love and believe in the Lord Jesus Christ as we give our lives to him, then we will live with him forever in a wonderful place he has prepared for us. If however we reject him, he will not just throw us away, he will throw us into the lake of fire where we will be punished forever (see Matthew 25:46).

Some may think it is cruel of God to hold his creation to such a high standard, but he is not expecting much from us. He made us and loves us so much that he died for us. To expect us to simply submit to a creator who made us, loved us, and died for us is not expecting too much. In fact, it is making heaven a better place because it is keeping out those who do not care enough about God and others.

Back in 2015 I took on the task of putting together a historic calendar that would be used as a fund raiser for Canton's sesquicentennial in 2016. It would have old photographs pertaining to Canton and my original plan was to try to have something concerning our town's history for everyday of the year. Having never done anything like this before I didn't realize how difficult that would be until I began searching for 365 things I could use. I finally had to give up on this idea but I did find 37 historic photos to use for this calendar along with a multitude of interesting historical facts

concerning our 150 year old town. I've listed some of these from the month of October which is almost upon us.

Speaking of October, don't forget to attend the FREE Concert and showing of a film concerning Bill Peterson and his mentor Dwight Lamb on the 7th at the PAC. These two have toured Denmark six times and will be joined by an Orchestra. Two of the musicians, Kristian Bugge and Sonnich Lydom, are from Denmark. A tune session with Dwight kicks things off at 2:00 p.m. with the film being shown at 4:30 and 6:30. The concert will start at 7:00 pm. Happy Reading

October 1

1901- Farmers State Bank of Canton Opened for Business on the northwest corner of 5th and Main.

2014 - The Crawford Counseling Center opened for business at 1010 W. 5th St.

October 5

1975 - The bell tower dedication was held at the Untied Methodist Church.

1933 - John Collier, the new Commissioner of Indian Affairs, reported: "The institution (The Hiawatha Insane Asylum) was so outrageously cruel and injurious that we would deserve to be blown out of the water if we continued it."

October 9

1963 - The Canton Development Corporation was incorporated. It was organized to foster local economic growth by increasing the number of employment opportunities.

October 10

1957 - A & R Food Mart became a partnership of Howard, Owen and Dorothy Amundson and Harry H. Rathje and moved into a new supermarket constructed at the northeast corner of 5th and Lincoln.

October 13

1868 - The first wedding to occur in Lincoln County took place with John Hanson and Siren Louise Bille being the bride and groom. Siren had just arrived from Norway.

October 15

2004- The Canton C-Hawks football team cruised to a 32-0 victory over the Beresford Watchdogs and captured their third consecutive Big Sioux Conference title.

October 16

1870 - The Congregational Society was organized by Rev. J. Ward of Yankton. Meetings were first held in a sod hut on the Courthouse Square and later in school houses until the erection of a church building in 1872.

1874 - Thirteen Masons met at attorney Mark Bailey's office at 513 S. Main to organize a Masonic Lodge in Canton.

October 24

1941- Jerry Chaon was born in Washington state to "Hap" and Charlotte Chaon. They returned to Canton in 1946. Jerry was affiliated with the Boy Scouts for 25 years and was named 'Man of the Year' in 1967.

1913- The Canton Carnegie Public Library, on the southwest corner of 4th and Lincoln, opened with a book shower.

October 28

2007- The Johnson Feed 5th and 6th grade football team played in the Dakota Dome for the S.D. Junior Football Championship. The team finished a perfect season under coach Rich Beitzel.

1868- Rev. Emil Christensen met in the log home of Tron Lunder with 14 immigrants who founded and became the charter members of the Canton Norwegian Evangelical Lutheran Congregation.

October 31

1906: Harold Bogue, father of Richard (Dick) Bogue, was born in Delaware Township, Lincoln County. In 1957 he was appointed Justice of the South Dakota Supreme Court and elected to the office in 1958.

To the owner of, occupant of, person in charge, or other persons responsible for the property. Any tree, sapling, or growth of Genus Fraxinus, commonly known as Ash, located within the city limits of Canton is declared to be a dangerous tree and a nuisance upon private property unless treated with Emamectin Benzoate on or before September 15, 2023. Declaration of this nuisance as it relates to untreated Genus Fraxinus on private property is necessary for public safety or to prevent the spread of disease or insects to public trees and places.

Removal of existing untreated Genus Fraxinus trees on private property by the occupants, person in charge, or property owners is ordered to occur on or before March 1, 2024.

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Removal of untreated Genus Fraxinus is necessary to preserve public health and safety and to prevent the spread of disease or insects to public trees and places.

The River We Remember by William Kent Krueger (LP). A wealthy landowner is gunned down and suspicions and rumors abound that he was killed by Noah Bluestone. The sheriff, with demons of his own from his service in the military, struggles to calm the fears of the community. It seems many members of the community have secrets that will be exposed because of the landowner's death.

The Club by Ellery Lloyd. At a luxurious home-away-from-home for a collection of celebrity members, things become very dark and sinister, and as the body count piles up, some of the members wish they'd never RSVP'd at all.

Hello Beautiful by Ann Napolitano. When a college basketball scholarship allows William Waters the opportunity to escape his tragedy-laden hometown, he is thrilled. There he meets Julia and her loving family. However, when the darkness from William's past surfaces, it threatens his relationship with Julia, and her relationship with her family. Can their love draw them back together when they need it most?

"Rattlesnake Bill"

The following is a summary of a story I had never heard, submitted to The History of Lincoln County book by Ethel Johnson and Capitola Weisberger.

Long ago, before Newton Hills grew into the state park it is today, some interesting characters lived there. Some came to escape their wives, the law, or the modern world.

Bill Mitchell was a scout for the US Cavalry during a trip to the Black Hills in the 1860's. During this trip, he was wounded by a Native American's arrow, lost consciousness and was left for dead. Mitchell was then taken captive by the Natives for six months before he escaped. He worked as a cowboy in west river. After a bronco round-up, he was relaxing and drinking with other cowboys, when a rattlesnake came up to the men. Bill was dared into picking it up, because he had just been bragging about how he could charm a rattle with just his eyes. He was used to snakes, and so he picked up the snake leading the men to believe he had charmed it. After that he was given the name "Rattlesnake Bill."

No one knows for certain why he came to live in Newton Hills. Bill had said that his wife was a daughter of a Chief and was killed by a Frenchman in Newton Hills.


So, he stayed there to be closer to her grave. He also told some he was appointed by the Governor to track down horse thieves who often hid from the law in the hills. He hardly ever left the hills, except for his annual "fixin' up" at a barber shop in Canton. He would dress in smelly old clothes and wear rabbit skins with burlap wrapped on his feet. He was not the most popular customer. Other people had a hard time finding Bill when they needed him because his dugout was well hidden. He had a few friends but would hide from others in the hills that were his home. He knew when strangers were present and would follow or observe their activities from an unseen hiding place. He would engage with them sometimes if he was curious about what they were doing, or if he wanted to tell them stories. Just as quietly as he would sneak upon them, he would disappear back into the hills he knew so well. In 1938, Rattlesnake Bill was found dead at age 89 with a broken neck, in his home for more than forty years.

The next time you walk the trails in Newton Hills, you can partake in the beauty around you that Bill loved so much. Perhaps you will have an unseen visitor watching curiously from the trees.

Dear Dave,



On top of this, her dad is worried he might have to pay her mom's funeral expenses if she died, and he's not in good enough shape financially to do that. Do you have any advice?

If the only life insurance her dad has is furnished through his employer, then he probably won't have it anymore once he stops working. I suppose it's fine if she wants to buy them each a small policy, but it's liable to be pretty expensive at their age.

Now, she can do this, but I don't think it would be a good long-term plan. I'd tell your girlfriend she needs to start saving money and building up her own wealth. If she had just \$20,000 in savings, that'd be more than enough to bury two people. Please understand, I don't mean to sound insensitive. We're talking solely about the economics involved in this kind of situation.

The other thing your girlfriend should do is have a discussion with her mom to find out if the stepfather has the money to handle that kind of thing. When it comes right down to it, any final expenses for her mom would be his responsibility now—not her dad's. She should have a discussion with her dad about preparing for things, too. But if her dad's got insurance through work, and the stepdad is ready to pay for her mom's burial, then they're covered for the immediate future.

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

C-Hawks Fall to West Central at Homecoming

The Canton C-Hawk football team hosted the West Central Trojans for Homecoming and the close game ended up with WC winning 32-28 as the game went to the very end as the Hawks fell to 3-2 and the Trojans improved to 5-0. Canton will next travel to Madison to face the 0-5 Bulldogs who lost to Dells, WC, SFC, Milbank and Dakota Valley and it will be a 7pm kickoff time.

Canton started out the game on offense and drove across midfield penalties stopped their drive after a pass from Braxton Mulder to Brayden Qualseth for 7 yards came up short on a 3rd down play forcing a Matt Anderson punt. The Hawks defense forced a punt after good tackles from Canaan McCracken but on the Trojans punt a C-hawk player touched the ball and WC fell on it to get the ball back at the Canton 35 yard line. Madison found a receiver on their 2nd play as he caught the ball over the Canton defensive back for a 33 yard TD pass and after the extra point was no good they took a 6-0 lead at 5:27. Canton was forced to punt back to the Trojans as the 1st quarter ended with the Hawks trailing 6-0.

West Central started the 2nd quarter on the Hawks 45 but a pass deflected by Pierce Mastalir that Cain Wallner intercepted giving Canton the ball at the 42. Canton started to move the ball with runs by McCracken and a 22 yard pass from Mulder to Wallner with the help of a good block from Anderson then 2 plays later Mulder hit Anderson for 17 yards putting the ball at the Hawks 11 yard line then on the next play Wallner took the handoff and ran it in for the touchdown behind John Halverson and Chance Riley. The extra point run was short and at 8:44 the score was tied at 6-6. The Trojans moved into Canton territory on a long pass but a fumble on their next play was recovered by Traun Cook giving Canton the ball at the 29. McCracken moved forward with 2 carries and then Cook took the handoff and ran it up the gut and was hit but kept his feet moving and broke tackles and found daylight and ran for a 41 yard gain putting the Hawks on the Trojans 21 yard line. Mulder passed to Anderson and WC was called for pass interference putting the ball on the 10 yard line then on the next play Wallner took the handoff and ran outside the right

tackle and broke 2 tackles and got in the end zone for the touchdown and the lead. Mulder hit Wallner on the extra point and Canton took a 14-6 lead as the game headed into halftime.

West Central got the ball to start the 3rd quarter and they took to the air and passed their way into C-Hawk territory then a run around the end put them on our 30 yard line but a good Arthur Benoit tackle moved them back 5 yards setting up a 3rd-15 play that the Hawks intercepted but a pass interference penalty moved them down to the 20 instead. They moved to the 10 on their first play and in for the touchdown untouched and after the extra point run they tied up the game at 14-14 with 7:00 left in the 3rd. Canton was forced to punt after Mulder was sacked on a 3rd down play for a 9 yard loss giving the Trojans the ball at the Canton 46 then on their first play they ran outside and found open field and ran for 38 yards to the 8 yard line then the QB faked the handoff and headed outside and scored the touchdown and the extra point run was stopped making the score 22-14 at 3:39. Canton started their drive on the 28 and runs by McCracken with a pass from Mulder to Wallner for 8 yards moved the ball downfield then from the 39 Mulder hit Anderson for a 27 yard gain moving into WC territory at the 37 then a pass interference against the Trojans put the ball at the 22. Canton was called for a holding call on a pass play but on the next play from the 31 Mulder hit Anderson for a 21 yard gain after a diving catch from Anderson as the 3rd quarter ended with the Hawks trailing 22-14.

Canton started the final quarter on the 10 yard line and a Mulder to Wallner pass for 9 yards led to McCracken powering in a one yard touchdown run over the right side behind Hunter Richmond, Halverson and Riley. The extra point pass was no good making the score 22-20 with 11:17 left in the game. Canton forced a Trojan punt after they made a nice stop on 3rd down with tackles from Teague Granum and Wallner. The Hawks were forced to punt the ball back after 3 plays with 2 sacks giving the Trojans the ball at their own 46 yard line with 7:16 remaining. An offside penalty gave WC a first down on a 3rd-3 then 3 plays later from the 33 yard line the

Trojans ran up the gut and found open field and scored untouched and with the extra point run they took a 30-20 lead with 4:21 left. Canton got the ball but lost 4 yards on their first play then 2 plays later Mulder let the pass fly and down the sideline and Anderson jump for the ball over the defender and grabbed the ball and shook off the defender and raced for 76 yards for a Canton touchdown then Wallner ran in the extra point making the score 30-28 with 3:23 left in the game. West Central started midfield and the Hawks defense tightened up and the Trojans were looking at a 4th-2 from the 42 but false start moved them back 5 yards forcing them to punt. WC hit a great punt downing the ball at the Hawks 1 yard line with 1:50 left and there first play was incomplete but on the 2nd attempt the got thru our line and sacked Mulder in the end zone for a safety for 2 points and the Hawks would have to kickoff with 1:41 trailing 32-28. The Trojans recovered the on side kick and ran out the clock winning 32-28 to improve to 5-0 and the Hawks dropped to 3-2.

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

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Harrisburg Launches its Own Registered Youth Apprenticeship

A brand new program and the “groundwork” it took to make it happen
forty-nine students part of the inaugural year

The launch of Harrisburg High School's (HHS) Registered Youth Apprenticeship Program (RYAP) was celebrated with lots of fanfare September 15. A ribbon cutting for the new green house and a day filled with lunchtime food trucks and live music along with special educational activities marked the kickoff of two new apprenticeship programs—Landscape Management and Horticulture Technician.

Prioritizing workforce development

Currently, South Dakota's unemployment rate is 1.9%; historically, is the lowest unemployment rate that any state has ever had. It is not surprising that career and technical education has taken center stage.

This spring Governor Kristi Noem announced a \$7.9M investment in apprenticeships as part of work shortage solutions. Noem's belief - funding apprenticeships and seeking out high school graduates could help fill needed jobs.

High school students have also begun to see the value in career and technical training and a career and technical training pathway. Southeast Technical College's enrollment this year hit a decade high with 2500 students offering 65 pathways for a two year-degree.



older,” Lynch reported.

These two awards also opened opportunities for cross curricular programming with business, culinary arts and marketing she added.

A lot of partners were involved says Lynch. “It wasn’t until February of 2023 that there was an official meeting between all parties: The SD Department of Labor and Regulation, Apprenticeship Coordinators, Weller Brothers Landscaping, Southeast Tech and the Harrisburg School District CTE to discuss the components of the RYAP.”

Lots of boxes had to be checked. Tours had to be made of local greenhouses. Numerous meetings

opportunities for their students, and Weller Brother is honored to support them.”

The start of something big

Attending the Sept 15 ribbon-cutting and educational day were Sarah Hitchcock GOED workforce and education policy advisor and John Bolger, Director of Apprenticeship for the State of South Dakota along with Amy Miller, Asst. Director of the SD DOE Division of College, Career and Student Success.

“What we saw happening September 15 was an amazing showcase of partners, workforce development and CTE programs,” said Lynch.

The stars aligned

Though high schools across SD are well aware of skilled labor shortages, and are looking to add new educational programs, launching a RYAP is a huge undertaking for any school. It takes some doing says Breanne Lynch, CTE Coordinator. Before it could happen at HHS, a lot of pieces needed to come together.

“The whole process started in the fall of 2022 with an application for grant funding that was available through START TODAY SD and then a pitch to Superintendent Tim Graf about how the grant would be used. The idea – a modern horticulture facility which would allow a partnership with an area business and the ag and culinary programs at the high school. Soon after, Weller Brothers Landscaping, a local landscaping company, agreed to not only partner with the greenhouse design but also the RYAP on the job training.”

But new programs take money. In December of 2022, it was announced that the Harrisburg School District (HSD) was one of 17 schools in the state to receive a career and technical grant. The high school's share - \$250,000.

“The school was awarded the \$250,000 CTE Innovative Equipment Grant to fund a modern horticulture facility. It would be a professional greenhouse aligned to urban farming and landscape operations. The greenhouse would include a FarmBot and aquaponics operations and would be built on the west side of the school. Also included was a \$35,000 Start Today RYAP Grant to launch a RYAP in South Dakota for learners 16 and

with SD Department of Labor to develop the RYAP were held. And then there was teacher training. CTE Ag educators had to attend professional development for curriculum development.

Partnerships are key

Besides partnering with South Dakota Department of Labor and Southeast Technical College, HHS also teamed up with Weller Brothers Landscaping, a local landscaping company.

Jaden Miller, Marketing Director of Instruction at Weller Brothers Landscaping, says Weller Brothers is pleased to be in partnership with the HSD.

Apprenticeships can start at age 16; however, not all apprenticeship programs accept learners that young. Depending on the apprenticeship program, most require that applicants be 18+ with a high school diploma or GED.

“It was a no-brainer to partner with HSD in pursuing both the CTE Innovative Equipment Grant and the Start Today SD RYAP Grant,” he said. “These are valuable opportunities that accomplish two goals – supporting workforce development for the landscape industry and allowing students to get a jump-start on viable career paths. The team at Harrisburg works hard to create incredible

Dr. Mike Amolins, Director of Instruction and Federal Grants, played a significant role behind the scenes as he wrote the two grant proposals and coordinated the Ag curriculum. Without the \$285,000 in grant money, the RYAP could not have moved forward.

“For all the challenges we face in the education world, from school funding to politics, this project is a shining example of what can happen when we work collaboratively between community partners, state government and schools to do what is best for kids,” said Amolins. “I couldn’t be more happy or excited to see what will happen with this project and program moving forward.”

Growing” the program

With RYAP now underway, all that is left is the completion of the 30’ X 72’ greenhouse that will be done by the end of the month. Forty-nine students are currently enrolled in two sections of Greenhouse Horticulture this fall with another section of Landscape and Horticulture to be offered this spring. The Ag teachers for RTAP are Tara Fastert and Josh Christiansen.

“Mr. Christiansen and I are very excited to integrate the Landscape Management and Horticulture Technician Apprenticeship Program into our classroom as well as the Supervised Agriculture Experience (SAE) project and the Harrisburg FFA Chapter,” said Fastert. “Over half of our students are already engaged in the Plant Systems Pathway. This includes taking one of the plant-related classes we offer such as Plant Science, Greenhouse Horticulture or Landscape Horticulture or are participating in an FFA Career Development Event (CDE) related to plants such as Floriculture, Agronomy or Natural Resources or Nursery Landscape.”

Fastert believes students’ SAE projects related to plants is a good fit for both apprenticeships. Examples include gardens – traditional, aquaponic and hydroponic; mowing lawns; and landscaping as well as a variety of other plant-related projects.

She also couldn’t be more pleased with the new greenhouse and sees it as a real bonus to the RYAP.

“The modern horticulture and landscaping facility will allow us to give students hands-on experiences. Mr. Christiansen and I look forward to working with the task force for the RYAP. We have already identified some FFA members who will benefit from the RYAP.”




E.O. Lawrence (Academics)




