Reilly Sisters Volleyball Camp Comes to Canton

Raegen and Bergen Reilly are bringing their volleyball camp to the girls at Canton schools on May 22nd at Canton High School. They are the daughters of Canton graduate Tiffany Skiles Reilly, nieces of Chad, Shane, Jen, Devin and Miranda Skiles, and granddaughters of Carol and Joe Skiles. Raegen holds the Jackrabbit record for single season assists (1,307) and the record for sets played in a season (131.) Raegen will be continuing her volleyball career at Illinois next season, while pursuing her master's degree. Bergen Reilly was recognized as the "Big 10 Setter of the Year" during her freshman season with Nebraska. She and her teammates were runners up in the NCAA

National Championship game in December of 2023. Before beginning her sophomore season, Bergen will be competing for a spot on the 2023 USA Women's U21 National Team, which will participate in the NORCECA Continental Championship in Toronto, Canada in June.

The Canton community has shown them both support throughout their volleyball careers, and since their mother is a Canton native, they decided to bring this camp to Canton. They want to give back to the community by providing their knowledge, skills, and experience to help the game of volleyball grow in Canton. This will be an all skills camp, where girls in grades 2-12 will work on serving, passing, setting, hitting, and also involve



some fun games.

The Reilly girls believe camps are important for younger ages because each camp and coach can have something unique to offer. This allows the younger girls to gain valuable experience and be able to use their skills in a competitive environment. For the younger ages, it is beneficial to dip their toes in the water to see if it is something in which they are interested.

"We both love the team aspect of volleyball. It is so fun competing

each night with girls who become your best friends. We also love the experiences and opportunities volleyball has to offer. Bergen has got to experience volleyball at the highest level through Team USA and Raegen has been to a number of cool places while playing and coaching. of the past. "For those who do not remember the past are doomed to repeat its mistakes";



God's Will Be Done

A few years ago, my mom passed away. Leading up to her death I was a bit conflicted. She had quit eating a few days before and my brother and I coaxed her into eating because we wanted her to get her strength back. She had however been resisting our coaxing.

We found out later that she had told one of her friends weeks earlier that she was ready to go. That comment was actually made before she even got sick. I have wondered if she had some sort of inclination about her demise. She had trusted Jesus Christ as her savior so she knew that when she left this world, he would be waiting for her. She was looking forward to that.

Thus as my brother and I were trying to get her to eat, she was just content to let the infection overtake her body so that she could go home to heaven. After receiving the medical report, we found out that the extra food would not have made any difference anyway. Mom was ready to die, she knew it, and she was okay with it. Mom was totally at peace as she left this world.

As others prayed for Mom, they prayed for her recovery. Mom's prayer was to be with Jesus. So whose prayer is God supposed to answer?

When Jesus taught us to pray, he told us to say, "thy will be done." Whenever we pray, we must realize that God's will is what will ultimately be done, not our desires. We cannot expect to get our desires simply by drumming up more faith or by living more godly lives. On the other hand, we must recognize that by living more godly lives, we can know that God will listen to our prayers instead of ignoring them. 1 Peter 3:12 says "FOR THE EYES OF THE LORD ARE UPON THE RIGHTEOUS, AND HIS EARS ATTEND TO THEIR PRAYER, BUT THE FACE OF THE LORD IS AGAINST THOSE WHO DO EVIL."

Do what is right so that God listens to your prayers. Jesus gave the illustration of a widow and

a judge and explained that the judge finally granted the request because the widow kept asking. He was explaining prayer. Thus we should live righteously and pray consistently. But the judge/widow passage in Luke 18 was an illustration about praying for God to bring about justice. God is righteously just in all he does, so we should always want his will to be done, even if we do not understand his justice. In hind site, it was more just for God to allow my elderly and sick mother to be with him. Often we do not totally understand God's justice and we must then trust him by faith.

In the book of James we are given the example of Elijah's prayer being answered. "Elijah was a man with a nature like ours, and he prayed earnestly that it might not rain; and it did not rain on the earth for three years and six months. And he prayed again, and the sky poured rain, and the earth produced its fruit." (James 5:17-18)

So how was Elijah able to get such amazing results in prayer? It was because he already knew the will of God in that situation because God had told him. "Then it came about at the time of the offering of the evening sacrifice, that Elijah the prophet came near and said, "O LORD, the God of Abraham, Isaac and Israel, today let it be known that Thou art God in Israel, and that I am Thy servant, and that I have done all these things at Thy word." (1 Kings 18:36)

The reason those amazing things happened as Elijah prayed was because he was doing what he did according to God's word. In other words, God had told Elijah what his will was so Elijah knew how to pray. If we knew God wanted a mountain moved we could pray and see it moved, but we must not think our prayers are more powerful than his word. Steele book a great guidebook for life

Times They Are A-Changin' As Told By a Couple Happily Married (Most Days) for 50+ Years

Times They Are A-Changin' As Told By a Couple Happily Married (Most Days) for 50+ Years by Mary and Steven Steele of Spencer, Iowa, is more than an autobiography of their 52 years of marriage. It could serve as a guidebook for all couples by helping them meet life's challenges head-on.

Steven was raised on a farm near Sutherland, Iowa, while Mary grew up in Readstown, Wis., tucked in the Driftless Region of southwest Wisconsin.

The Steeles' story is unique for several reasons. Despite having everything against them, they managed to stay together for over a half century.


Married at 19, having children just a few years later, they faced poverty and the waning days of the Vietnam War to raise a family of healthy, bright children. Rock-solid Midwestern values and faith instilled by their parents made all the difference.

While Mary's mother and father divorced because of his alcoholism, her mother, Betty McSwain, a strong-willed nurse, grabbed the family reins to raise her children. Her mother's story is detailed in Mary's inspiring biography Betty: A Memoir.

Through alternating chapters, the Steeles play off each other's strengths to create a vivid and inspiring portrait of a couple creating a successful marriage.

"The plan is to alternate writing chapters – one from Steve's point of view, followed by my perspective," says Mary, an accomplished journalist, of their original intent for the book. However, they chose their own topics for each chapter.

Mary is not alone, though, in creating a vivid picture of their lives. Steve, a retired teacher, coach and pastor, offers vivid imagery



such as, "I associated the tart odor of geraniums with loneliness" as he waited for his older brothers and sisters to return home from school.

A few years later in one state away, Mary's world view expanded while an exchange student in Brazil.

"The whole family did everything possible to make me feel welcome, including taking me to a 'futbol' game starring the legendary soccer player Pele."

Both left home after high school graduation to meet at a Christian college and they married a year later. However, life wasn't easy.

"We lived below the poverty line in the early years of our marriage but thought we were rich," Mary writes. "We were young and healthy, we had a beautiful baby, and we had each other. What else could we possibly need?"

The Steeles finish their autobiography with lessons to teach children, including having compassion for others.

Times They Are A-Changin' As Told By a Couple Happily Married (Most Days) for 50+ Years is a wonderful testament to a wonderful couple, and a great example of what it takes to make marriage work.

I have an old tattered South Dakota Official Highway Map that was published in 1998 when William J. Janklow was our governor. He stated on the back cover "We South Dakotans come from strong stock. Our ancestors include Lakota people who followed the buffalo across the plains.... German, Norwegian and Czechoslovakian immigrants who made this land their home....And farmers and ranchers who tirelessly worked the land. Everywhere you look~ from small-town festivals to world famous mountains~ you will find evidence of the stat's rich history and heritage. I invite you to visit our historic sites, museums,

cultural events and landmarks- for each presents a unique part of the South Dakota Story."

Inside this "official map" is a lot of great information, some you might know and some you might not. Either way I will be sharing these facts with you and please keep in mind that this publication is 26 years old and some of the things mentioned may have hanged over time.

Since its Memorial Day this coming Monday, the unofficial start of summer, I hope you all take time to remember those loved ones that have us and reflect on that. Life is fleeting but oh what a wonderful ride it is. Happy reading.

State Sins and Symbols

State Nickname • South Dakota is called the Mount Rushmore State. The nickname comes from the famous mountain carving of four U.S. Presidents in the Black Hills.

State Flower • The pasque, a small lavender flower, is a member of the buttercup family. It grows wild throughout the state, and its blooming is one of the first signs of spring in South Dakota.

State Bird • The Chinese ringneck pheasant was introduced to South Dakota in 1898. The male has a long, pointed tail, colorful plumage and white band around the neck.

State Tree • The Black Hills Spruce is a member of the evergreen family characterized by foliage of short blue-green needles and slender cones.

State Animal • The adaptable coyotes are found in greater numbers along the Missouri River, it's tributaries and in the Black Hills. The coyotes characteristic howl is commonly heard on star-filled nights.

State Fish • The walleye is the most sought-after game fish in South Dakota. Walleye populate all four Missouri River reservoirs and many South Dakota glacial lakes.

State Insect • South Dakota is a leader in honey production. The honey bee (*Apis mellifera* L.) was adopted as the state insect in 1978.

State Soil • Houdek is a deep, well drained and loamy soil. Farmers use it for growing crops and for range land.

State Gemstone • The Fairburn agate is a semi-precious stone, first discovered near Fairburn, S.D. The brightly banded gem is used in jewelry and is a favorite of rock collectors.

State Mineral • Rose quartz, mined in the southern Black Hills, was first discovered near Custer in the late 1880's. The pink colored quartz is used primarily for ornaments and jewelry.

State Song • "Hail, South Dakota" is the official state song adopted in 1943. It's a marching song composed by Deecort Hammitt.

State Slogan • Introduced in 1990, South Dakota's slogan is Great Faces, Great Places.

State Seal • The state seal serves as a symbol of life in South Dakota. It depicts the state's diversity of commerce and resources, farming, ranching, industry, logging, manufacturing and mining. The seal was adopted in 1885, four years before the state was admitted to the Union.

Monarch Village Subdivision Will Bring Much-Needed Housing To Canton Community

The Canton Economic Development Corporation (CEDC) in partnership with EXP Development introduces Monarch Village Subdivision. This is a masterplan subdivision consisting of approximately 64.2 acres of land with approximately 50 acres of the total being developable for housing in the City of Canton. The remaining portion of land will serve to meet the engineering aspects of the project, while also providing future tenants and homeowners with adequate green space as well as a parks system that will be uniquely designed by Charles Yi, a real-estate investor with a portfolio that spans the globe to include experience developing within the State of South Dakota. One of his partners, Mel McGowan, is an eclectic, with a background in film and creative design during a decade long stint at the Walt Disney Company. The hope is this unique background will serve the project well in providing a subdivision with more character and unique value than typically seen in a subdivision within an historically rural community in the Midwest.

The subdivision is being permitted to develop approximately 83 single-family residential lots and up to 200 multi-family and mixed-use residential units. It is currently being planned for a four-phase buildout dependent on market demand. The goal is to provide affordable, workforce housing that is uniquely designed in a suburb setting. This will cause neighboring cities to take notice

and it is likely other communities will want to replicate its' unique qualities causing an influx of buyers from other jurisdictions. It will also serve existing residents needs in desiring to upsize or downsize their current homes. There will be unparalleled amenities currently not found in the City of Canton and other surrounding suburbs.

Monarch Village will eventually feature walking trails that traverse the village, water features and a dog park, along with mixed-use commercial/residential as well as retail settings. This will create energy toward outdoor activities and gatherings that seamlessly converge at the "Grandis Pond," an outdoor venue being considered as a place for families to gather.


The multi-residential and mixed-use condominiums and townhomes, where "Grandis Pond" is idyllically situated, represent the affordable products of this vibrant village community for Millennials and Gen Z's to rent or purchase. The single-level, Villa-Style homes, ideally situated adjacent to nearby Canwood Drive. On the east side of Canwood Drive is Hiawatha Golf Course. If unable to afford a single-family home or unwilling to take on the responsibilities associated with it, Monarch Village will expand opportunities for ownership with the availability of condominiums in this development truly designed with all

ages in mind.

An individual or family's options will only be limited by their imagination as the development is committed to having the following options: single-family residences, villa-style homes, twin homes and/or town homes and apartments will be available for rental units. The Developer will also be working with Sanford Hospital on addressing other needs in the community for Canton's elderly population.

Dirt work on this project will begin in the fall of 2024 with vertical construction to begin in 2025. It should be noted this development will be developed without the use of Tax Increment Financing, that has become popular and often necessary in smaller rural communities. This is due to the CEDC applying for and receiving a 3.72-million-dollar grant through the Housing Infrastructure Financing Program through the State of South Dakota.



Majority of South Dakota Landowners Don't Support the SB 201 Repeal Effort

As the Chairman of the South Dakota House Agriculture Committee, I helped negotiate significant benefits for landowners and counties in Senate Bill 201 -- also known as the "Landowner Bill of Rights." Legislators dedicated countless hours to discuss and debate a number of bills to determine the state's role should be. Three bills were passed that provide a positive pathway forward for South Dakota's future. These bills provide safety requirements for residents, revenue for South Dakota counties, and protection for affected South Dakota landowners.

As a farmer and rancher myself, I fought to place new and strict regulations on the proposed carbon pipelines to hold them accountable. Additionally, the Landowner Bill of Rights requires the carbon pipeline companies to pay new and significant compensation to counties and landowners. From the perspective of a landowner and a lawmaker, the compromise legislation that we passed and Governor Noem signed into law finally leveled the playing field for South Dakotans in this carbon pipeline debate.

Now a vocal minority is seeking to repeal benefits for South Dakota landowners. Unfortunately, they will actually hurt landowners and agriculture in our state if they are successful. Repealing the Landowner Bill of Rights won't stop the pipeline from being built. A repeal will only strip the landowner and county benefits we fought so hard for.

The most significant policy change in the Landowner Bill of Rights is an additional surcharge that counties can levy on carbon pipelines, which will result in millions in new revenues for county governments and landowners in the form of property tax relief each year. This isn't a new tax on South Dakotans, the pipeline companies will be required to pay this fee.

The proponents of a repeal also suggest that these new measures somehow give pipeline companies a "layup" in siting these projects. In truth, the measure clarifies that the South Dakota Public Utilities Commission (PUC) has siting authority over linear projects like electrical lines, pipelines, and other transmission projects that cross the state.

Don't buy the notion that the Landowner Bill of Rights guarantee that carbon pipelines will be built. There is no guarantee. The only guarantee is that if they are built,

landowners, farmers and local units of government will benefit the most. The PUC will still make that decision just like they do for other linear projects in South Dakota.

South Dakota's number one industry is still agriculture. Regardless of your opinion on carbon sequestration, if the market demands lower carbon and South Dakota farmers and ethanol plants can provide it - that's a win for the entire state. New revenue flows through all of our communities - big and small. Conversely, if South Dakota doesn't participate in these lower carbon opportunities, our commodities will be less valuable than those states that are competing. And, that revenue loss would also be shared by our communities - big and small.

Repealing SB 201, the Landowner Bill of Rights, won't stop the carbon pipeline from being built and it has nothing to do with revamping eminent domain laws. Don't believe the rhetoric - all a repeal would do is strip the protections and benefits for South Dakotans. And, that's a fact

Stand up for landowners and hold carbon pipelines accountable. Refuse to sign this ill-advised petition to defeat SB201. We cannot continue to delay this important project!

Now, if you'll excuse me, I need to go pull some more weeds.


Letter to the Editor OFF The Road With Jerry



BIG Update

It's Police Week and the House passed several bills this week to show our support for law enforcement officers. Our men and women in blue sacrifice greatly to protect our communities, whether that is by the border, in Washington, D.C., or on reservations. Here's a few bills I voted on to support those in blue:

Detain and Deport Illegal Aliens Who Assault Cops Act to amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to include the assault of a law enforcement officer as grounds for detention and deportation.

Improving Law Enforcement Officer Safety and Wellness Through Data Act to ensure we have the most accurate information on the impact attacks on our officers have on their mental health.

Financial Focus

Should estate plans be equal ... or fair?

When you're creating your estate plan, your biggest priority may be taking care of your family — your spouse, grown children, grandchildren, and other loved ones. Abilities — You may well have some assets that you believe are more suitable for one child over another. This can be especially true if you are planning on passing on a

If you know that one child is the most capable of running the business or has been primarily involved in the business, then you may want to give that child control as a next-generation owner. Yet, this may not seem fair to another child, who might also express interest in the business, so you may want to look for ways to provide this child with enough assets to help make the overall inheritance more equal.

Practicality — In some instances, you might think you can meet both the "fair" and "equal" criteria. Suppose, for instance, that you have a cabin or other vacation home that you think two of your children could share. In theory, this joint ownership might sound good, but in practical terms, it could cause problems. Are both children equally willing and capable of paying taxes and upkeep on the cabin or vacation home? What if one child wants to sell their share? And then, there's the question of who gets to use the property at various times of the year. All these issues should be resolvable, but they can also cause great stress within the family.

There's no simple formula for solving the fair-versus-equal dilemma. But keep this in mind: Communicating your wishes to your loved ones while you are drawing up your estate plan can help reduce

confusion — and hopefully lead to fewer hard feelings — when you are no longer around. By their nature, fairness and equality issues related to estate plans can trigger a range of emotions, and addressing these feelings beforehand can help provide a great service for your loved ones.

You might also find that some objectivity can be valuable. That's why, when creating your estate plan, you may benefit by working with a team of professionals, including your legal, financial and tax advisors.

When developing your estate plan, you might well strive for equality and fairness but above all, you want to get things right. And careful planning, open communication and appropriate guidance can help go a long way toward this goal.



Two years ago, spectators and reenactors alike thought it was a good event teaching and learning about the war, the soldiers and the issues behind the conflict. Last time, 89 reenactors arrived from 7 states camped on the grounds of Lori and John Lems off of Bridge Street. This year I have had inquiries from reenactors from ND, SD, MN, WI, IA, NB, MO, KS, IL, CO, TX and AK.

This year in addition to the events on the ground, reenactors will be shuttled to Forest Hill Cemetery on Sunday morning to pay honor to the dozens of Civil War Veterans buried there. Both the Boys in Grey and the Boys in Blue as friends will listen to the roll call. Fire a salute in honor and listen to Abraham Lincoln recite the Gettysburg Address.

The Chamber of Commerce and the Canton Civil War Committee will be donating one dollar of every admission to the reenactment to the Cemetery Board to help with maintenance at the facility.

Canton Historian Bill Peterson has written short article about each of these soldiers which are on the Canton Civil War Facebook page. Please visit the facebook page and the event webpage for all the information you can imagine about



this August's event. Over the next few months, I hope to write a few articles about the reenactors who plan on being at Canton and the reenactments they attend.

Interesting facts related to Memorial Day

Memorial Day is celebrated annually on the last Monday of May across the United States. The proximity of Memorial Day to the summer solstice has led many to view the weekend preceding the holiday as the unofficial kickoff to summer. However, Memorial Day is about more than backyard barbecues and weekend getaways.

Memorial Day honors service members who died while serving in the United States military. Though Memorial Day traces its origins to the years following the American Civil War in the mid-nineteenth century, it did not become an official federal holiday until 1971. That's one of just many interesting facts about Memorial Day that are worth noting as the United States prepares to commemorate the sacrifices of military personnel who died in service of the country.

- Memorial Day began as something of a grass roots movement. According to History.com, by the late 1860s individuals in towns across the war-ravaged United States began holding springtime tributes to soldiers who lost their lives during the American Civil War.

- Among the more notable postwar commemorations was one organized by former slaves in Charleston, South Carolina. That commemoration occurred less than a month after the Confederate forces surrendered in 1865. Despite that, History.com notes that in 1966 the federal government declared Waterloo, New York, the birthplace of Memorial Day.

- Postwar commemorations also were organized by northern veterans of the Civil War. General John A. Logan, who led an organization of Union veterans, called for a



nationwide day of remembrance in May 1868. General Logan referred to the holiday as Declaration Day and chose May 30 because it was not the anniversary of any specific battle and therefore unlikely to be viewed by some as controversial.

- Early commemorations of Decoration Day, which gradually came to be known as Memorial Day, initially honored only those soldiers who died during the American Civil War. However, that changed over time as American servicemen fought in various wars, including both World Wars, the Vietnam War, the Korean War, and other conflicts.

- The red poppy has become a symbol of Memorial Day. That red poppy can be traced to a poem

by Canadian John McCrae, who served as a Lieutenant Colonel in World War I. "In Flanders Field" notes the red poppies that grew in fields where countless soldiers had been buried in modern-day Belgium. The poem was published in 1915, three years before the war ended. Sadly, McCrae himself was a casualty of the war, succumbing to pneumonia in France in 1918 while still in the service.

Memorial Day honors service personnel who lost their lives while serving in the U.S. military. The holiday's inspiration and lengthy history merits consideration as the nation prepares to commemorate countless soldiers' sacrifices once more.

Safety Tips Ahead of your Memorial Day Barbecue

Memorial Day weekend marks the unofficial start of summer for millions of people across the country. Backyard barbecues are a staple of Memorial Day weekend, and such informal gatherings contribute much to the laid back vibe of this beloved three-day weekend.

Backyard barbecues may be all about food and fun, but it's important that hosts take measures to ensure such soirees are safe as well. By employing the following measures, hosts can ensure their Memorial Day barbecues are safe for all in attendance.



- Place the grill in a safe location. The National Fire Protection Association urges hosts to place their grills a safe distance away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves or overhanging branches. The NFPA also notes no grill should be placed within 10 feet of any structure, including a home.

- Check propane tanks for leaks prior to using the grill. Memorial Day may be the first time many people use their grill since the previous summer or fall. The NFPA recommends propane grill users check their tanks for leaks prior to using the grill for the first time. This inspection is simple. Apply a light solution of soap and water to the hose. The NFPA notes a propane leak will release bubbles. The smell test also can reveal a leak, as a strong odor of gas can indicate a leak. In such instances, close the tank valve and turn off the grill. If the leak stops, have the grill serviced by a professional. If the leak persists,

call the fire department. The NFPA urges hosts who detect an odor of gas while cooking to get away from the grill immediately and call the fire department. Do not move the grill in such instances.

- Man the grill at all times. An unattended grill poses a significant safety hazard. Whether you're using a propane grill, a charcoal grill, a smoker, or a hybrid, make sure an adult is keeping an eye on the grill at all times.

- Purchase long-handled cooking tools. The American Red Cross notes that long-handled cooking tools are designed to keep chefs

safe. Such tools ensure cooks' hands and arms do not have to be directly over flames, which can periodically flare up and pose a safety hazard.

- Ensure children are supervised when swimming. The grill is not the only safety threat that may be present at Memorial Day barbecues. Hosts who will open their pools or provide inflatable pools for children should make sure kids are supervised when in or around the water at all times. Before allowing kids in a pool, hosts should confirm their swimming abilities and insist kids who cannot swim or only recently learned to swim wear inflatables or life jackets to reduce drowning risk.

Memorial Day weekend is a festive time at many households. By emphasizing backyard barbecue safety strategies, hosts can ensure everyone has a great time and gets home safe this Memorial Day weekend.

COMMISSIONER BRIEFING: Sheri Lund, Auditor, Currently, items that are not under the road and bridge projects are loosely based on previous year's numbers with the exception of repair budgets. For road projects, it took last year's price and 4 or 5% increase. The timing issue for the highway budget is a little off. Budget decisions are made by October 1st for projects that will not go to bid until February. Proposed: Change to the process would be that we do a 4-year average on all the expenditures in the highway department. Unless there is a project that has been bid and the prices are set prior to the budget deadline. Then, by the first Tuesday in April of the current budget year, there would be an in-depth review of the projects that are bid for the current construction year and the proposed budget. At that point we would do a supplemental hearing (if need be) for the difference between the estimates and the bid projects. This would give more accurate numbers to the budget, due to the projects that would be completed would all be bid out, as well as revenue sources would be recognized ie. grants and cost sharing. The cash applied number will be more accurate. We currently have over 3,056,435.00 assigned to highway road and bridge purposes in the general fund. No public input was heard.
RESOLUTION: BE IT RESOLVED to approve a change in the budget process for the Highway Department based on a 4-year average for all expenditures starting in FY2025, and have a budget review and supplement hearing May 1st of the budget year. AA Bill Means Safer and Stronger Skies

By Sen. John Thune

Millions of Americans will board airplanes this year to travel throughout the United States and the world. They depend on a robust and efficient national aviation system to keep the skies safe and traffic running smoothly. Congress recently passed a bill to reauthorize the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) that includes some significant provisions to create a better experience for the traveling public. I'm proud to have secured several provisions that will strengthen aviation safety, improve airport infrastructure, and streamline the use of next generation technologies.

The United States is currently facing a pilot shortage, which has resulted in reduced air service at airports across the country, especially smaller airports like those in rural states like South Dakota. My proposal to improve pilot training will help address this shortage by making pilot training more accessible and improving training quality.

My proposal, which is based on a recommendation from an independent board, would provide prospective pilots with a new pathway to meet their certification requirements that includes training in advanced simulators. For obvious reasons, standard flight training hours in a cockpit don't involve deliberately flying into a storm or dealing with fires or engine failure. But simulator training offers prospective airline pilots the chance to experience those situations, and deal with them again and again until their response is finetuned. I'm glad this proposal was included in the final bill because it's a win-win for addressing the pilot shortage and improving the quality of training airline pilots receive.

I was also able to secure provisions in this bill to support

small airports as they expand flight service and upgrade their facilities. One such provision allows communities to receive multiple grants from a program designed for small community air services, which will make it easier to expand sorely needed air service in rural communities. Another gives small airports more flexibility to use certain federal funding for terminal improvements, which will enable rural airports to expand access even as construction costs rise. These elements of the bill will help ensure many of the airports that South Dakotans use can make upgrades in facilities and flight offerings that will benefit South Dakotans.

The FAA bill goes beyond just commercial flights and airplanes. This year's bill also includes my bipartisan legislation related to drone flights. The Increasing Competitiveness for American Drones Act will streamline the approval process for beyond-visual-line-of-sight drone flights, which would clear the way for drones to be used for commercial transport of goods across the country. The wider deployment of drones have transformative potential for our economy, including innovative opportunities in transportation and agriculture that would benefit places like South Dakota. And it will ensure the United States remains competitive in a growing industry that is increasingly dominated by competitors like China.

This year's FAA reauthorization bill takes important steps to keep America at the forefront of aviation. It keeps America's skies safe, increases flight access, and ensures American innovation will continue soaring to new heights. I'm proud of the work that my colleagues and I put into this bill, and I look forward to continued American leadership in the skies.

MOWING AND DISCHARGE OF MOWING WASTE

91.55 MOWING REQUIRED.
All weeds and plants declared to be primary or secondary noxious weeds by the State Weed and Pest Control Commission, all weeds declared to be locally noxious and all other weeds or grasses existing upon any lot or land in the city shall be mowed on or before attaining a height greater than eight inches.

91.56 DISCHARGE OF MOWING WASTE REGULATED.
It is unlawful to discharge any mowing waste on to the pavement or gutter portion of any public street.

91.57 NOTICE TO STOP DISCHARGE.
(A) Whenever the city is informed of or observes a prohibited discharge into the street or gutter, an employee of the city may issue a notice of violation or a warning ticket of the violation of this section.
(B) Such notice or warning ticket may be served personally, sent by prepaid first class mail, or by posting a copy of such notice upon the premises where the violation occurred and such notice is deemed given at the time it is personally served, mailed or posted.
(C) Any notice of violation or warning ticket issued by an agent/employee of the city may be appealed to the City Commission in writing within ten days after the notice of violation was served personally, sent by prepaid first class mail, or by posting a copy of the notice upon the premises.

91.99 PENALTY.
(A) Any person violating any provision of this chapter, for which no other penalty is provided, shall be subject to the penalty provisions of 10.99.
(B) Any person, or persons, violating the provisions of 91.35 through 91.44, will be guilty of a Class II misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be subject to a fine of the maximum amount permitted by law, or imprisonment in the county jail not longer than 30 days, or shall receive both such fine and imprisonment.
