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

Gateway Apartments Construction Underway

Construction has started for the new 4-Plex at the previous Gateway Motel location. There will be four apartments, two on the bottom and two on the top. The top level will be zero entrance with access from the alley. Completion is set for October of 2024, with the move-in date projected to be November 1st, 2024. As of right now, the apartments are not rented yet.

The abandoned motel had certainly become the local hangout for most of the stray cats in town. The construction workers and neighbor, June Fossum, said tons of cats left the building when demolition began! Craig and Kari Winquist decided to build a 4-plex for two reasons after the roof was

torn off the building from the "derecho" storm. They believed there was a greater need in Canton for housing than for motel rooms. Also, with building costs the way they are right now, there was no way the insurance proceeds would have built a new motel. There were certainly some obstacles they had to overcome, but they received great support from members of the Planning and Zoning Committee, as well as the City Commission.

Rick Granum with Granum Construction is the General Contractor for the project. Rick's son attends CHS and Rick is a strong C-Hawk supporter. Each apartment is over 1000 square feet with 2 bedrooms and 1 bath. The



kitchen/living area is an open floor plan and includes all appliances. There is a spacious laundry room equipped with a washer and dryer. Garages are still being considered and, if constructed, will be located on the south side of the building on the main level. The upper-level units will be zero-step entries which will be accessible from the ally. Work Begins on Lincoln County Justice Center

Dirt work has started for the future home of the Lincoln County Justice Center. Commission Jibben said, "He is excited to get the project started. Lincoln County is growing fast and needs to keep up with the population."

The Justice Center was on the agenda at the April 30 meeting. Commissioner Jim Schmidt stated the board needed to appoint a Justice Center Building Committee, made up of at least two commissioners, which shall have the authority to make timely decisions and sign documents, up to \$100,000, for the construction of the Lincoln County Justice Center project. Chief Civil Deputy State's Attorney, Drew DeGroot, was present if any commissioner had any questions.

"Back in 2023 there was an original motion for the chair at the time to sign an agreement to hasten or speed up the process. This is a clarifying motion to have two members of the board. These members will have the responsibility to review your standard agreements and also have the ability to sign change orders up to \$100,000. It would also be their responsibility to make sure that the rest of the commission is informed of any changes," he said.

Commissioner Mike Poppens nominated Commissioner Tiffani Landeen and Commissioner Jim Jibben for that role. Motion approved.

Rasmussen joined the meeting

for board action to approve JLG Architects' proposal to redesign access to the Lincoln County Justice Center along N. West Street for \$80,400.

"This is a proposal for a redesign for a sewer utility along North West. I have Lynn Remmers from JLG architects available if you have any questions about the proposal," he said.

Schmidt asked Remmers to explain to the board what the redesign covers and what it will mean for moving the project forward.

"This proposal is for redesign services, architectural, civil, and mechanical services. It will be taking the utilities which is the sewer to the building and moving it from our proposed location which is currently designed in the easement and going over to West Street. Civil plans and documentations all need to be revised to accommodate that work," Remmers said.

The time frame to have new designs made would be 12 weeks but there are not concerns at this time that it will impact start time on the building.

Motion approved with Commissioner Poppens voting no.

The three-story building to be located on Highway 18 and 480th Ave will be a ground-up development. The new justice center could include up to eight courtrooms, including room for two expansion courtrooms on the

third-floor, space for 15 offices for lawyers with the Lincoln County State's Attorney's Offices and several multi-purpose meeting rooms for case negotiations, meetings with clients or other uses. There will also be space for the clerk of courts, public defender's offices, other county offices, a sheriff's office and space for a jail. The plans are designed to be flexible.

With Lincoln County now growing to be the 3rd largest

**God Gets The Vengeance**

Not all road rage incidents make the news, but occasionally someone's behavior is so egregious that it actually becomes criminal. Regardless, such incidents go against God's command to love your neighbor as yourself even if they have not broken any other law.

I have heard reports of- and even watched videos of- people who were involved of car accidents and they exited their vehicles screaming and shouting and ready to start a fight.

Recently a friend was involved in a 3 car accident. She was in the vehicle that was damaged the worst. The man in the vehicle ahead of her immediately got out of his car and came to her car. He saw the damage to her car and told her not to move until the ambulance arrived. Instead of yelling at her, he was showing concern for her safety. Then the driver of the third vehicle came and prayed with her as they waited for the ambulance.

Hearing what happened after her accident was so very refreshing after the worst examples of humanity often make the headlines. The first and greatest command is to love God with all your heart, soul, and strength. The second greatest command is to love your neighbor as yourself.

The people involved in the accident with my friend were strangers before the accident, but they treated each other the way Christ would want them to.

Too often people feel wronged and want to take vengeance. There is a reason why accidents are called "accidents." That does not change the fact that cars are damaged, people are hurt, and schedules are disrupted. Such events can cause frustration.

We already have laws that require drivers to have insurance. Thus our laws already provide a way for a level of compensation. That means that any anger and lashing out at the accident scene is not a call for justice but rather a call for vengeance.

In the scriptures, God gives us clear instruction about avoiding

vengeance. Romans 12:19 tells us, "Never take your own revenge, beloved, but leave room for the wrath of God, for it is written, "VENGEANCE IS MINE, I WILL REPAY," says the Lord." This does not negate the need for criminal prosecution and Romans 13 shows us that human governments should hold people accountable for criminal behavior.

If we try to bring vengeance ourselves, we might make a mistake. Of course someone who intentionally causes a car collision with the intent of hurting others should be brought to justice. On the other hand, we have all accidentally caused hurt and damage to others. If our courts do not find the person guilty, God knows what true justice would be, therefore it is up to him to bring vengeance, not us. Deuteronomy 32:4 says, "The Rock! His work is perfect, For all His ways are just; A God of faithfulness and without injustice, Righteous and upright is He."

Knowing God is faithful and without injustice helps us to understand the reality of sending people to hell. He will not send anyone there who does not deserve it. Jonah was sent to Nineveh and they repented and God did not destroy them even though they were evil. God does however bring vengeance upon evil when there is no repentance.

All have sinned and come short of the glory of God. Therefore, we all deserve his vengeance. But God is a merciful judge and he sent his son, Jesus Christ, to pay for our sins so that we do not have to face the punishment. Therefore, to escape God's vengeance, we must place our faith in Jesus as we believe in him. John 3:16 tells us, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life."

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HISTORY REVISITED

Summertime is when towns and cities like to put out their welcome mat and hope to attract as many visitors as they possibly can. During my lifetime it was the Canton Car Show that stands out as the biggest draw to our county seat. I don't have any exact numbers but I know our towns population doubled or tripled in size (maybe more) over the weekend it was held.

Canton drew a big crowd in 1900 when Theodore Roosevelt spoke at the Canton Depot. In 1932 the National Ski Jumping Tournament brought between 15 and 20 thousand folks into the Canton area and, of course, this was held during the coldest time of the year.

Back in 1901, at the foot of Broadway, the Epworth League gave their first Chautauqua program in their newly built auditorium. The following year their total attendance for events was 5,000.

Two years ago the first Canton Civil War Days brought a large

number of folks into Canton and with good weather this year's event may bring even more. And with the car show coming back in late July be prepared for a large influx of folks who have been waiting a long time for this event to return to Canton. Of course, all these people have to eat, sleep, buy gas, check out our local merchants, etc. which means it has the potential of bringing in a lot of extra money not only to Canton but the surrounding area.

With the second Open Air Market this Thursday, featuring The Fossils, and Hotel California doing their Eagle's tribute at the PAC on Friday, this summer is off to a good start. Let's all hope that when the dust finally settles and we can look back at the summer of 2024 we can all agree it was one of the best Canton has seen in a long, long time.

Happy reading as I leave you with a piece from the 1959 Ninety Years of Canton Methodism booklet.

The Epworth League

The first mention of the Epworth League in the records occurred in 1891 when they had 35 members, all of whom should be named, for they were such ardent supporters of the church. Their president for 1895 was Miss Annis Cosper. By 1902 the group had grown to 60. It met each Sunday evening, much as our MYF does today.

The Epworth Leagues of this district, backed by the ministerial association, formed the Epworth League Assembly which gave a Chautauqua-like program in the big auditorium while they built at the foot of Broadway in 1901. A bit undertaking, it was organized for religious, literary, scientific, and cultural benefits for this entire area, and for several years it was well patronized. Sunday School institutes and the Epworth League Parliament met during the morning hours, whereas the afternoon and evening hours were given over to lectures on all subjects or to musical programs. It was as a part of these programs that the Wendt orchestra was first mentioned.

When the auditorium was first opened on June 28, 1901, the mayor of Canton urged all public-spirited citizens to meet in the Courthouse square at 7:30 p.m. to hear the band concert and form a procession to march to the Assembly grounds. All fire companies and fraternal organizations took part.

In 1902 there was a total attendance of 5,000. This was a big affair; the railroad ran special trains to bring the folks to Canton; many stayed a week or the full ten days. Every available room in that part of town was rented. Many camped out in the park and cottages began to appear. On July 6, 1905, William Jennings Bryan spoke to a full house. By 1908 the interest died down, however, and the organization began to lose money. After 1911, the meeting was backed by the business men of Canton on a regular Chautauqua circuit.

No other mention of the Epworth League occurs in the records after 1914, but it was still an active organization when the MYF took its place.

The MYF

The Methodist Youth Fellowship came into being following the union of three different branches of the church and the dissolving of the Epworth League. It was organized here in 1946 under the leadership of Rev. James Bell, with Mr. and Mrs. Robert Tupper as counsellors. Some of its activities this past year aside from their regular weekly spiritual meetings are:

1. Collecting clothes for the S.D. Indian Missions.
 2. Conducting drive for UNICEF (\$100).
 3. Sending 28 pounds of old Christmas Cards to the Methodist Hospital at La Paz Bolivia.
 4. Giving a fund to Rust College.
 5. Earning money to help 25 young people attend Camp at Lake Poinsett.
 6. Serving an Easter Sunrise Breakfast.
- Miss Edna Hoffman now leads an MYF for Intermediates.

HOMETOWN girl

This article titled "Killed on the Track" was published in the paper 115 years ago on June 11, 1909.

"Dominico Montnegre, an Italian and a member of a Milwaukee Surfacing crew of work west of Canton, fell from a hand car last Friday evening while returning to camp, and died at 3 o'clock Saturday morning. He was riding on the car with two brothers and in some manner lost his footing and fell in front of the hand car, one of the wheels striking him on the back of the head. He was immediately taken to Dr. Wendt's office where everything was done for the injured man, but human aid was of no avail."

Coroner Ryrnes took charge of the body and after hearing all evidence possible through interpreter Tossini, Mr. Byrnes decided no inquest was necessary.

The body was prepared for burial and kind friends furnished flowers in abundance from which his heart-broken brothers prepared a beautiful cross and an anchor.

The dead man came from Italy last March where he left a wife and two children who will never meet their loved one in this life again. The brothers sat by the dead body for several hours and in their native tongue called him brother, brother, and their grief was intense.

He has struggles with depression, does not have many friends, is bullied at school, and feels alone in his world. Darius does not feel like he fits into his Persian side of the family, or his father's American side either. The one thing he does look forward to every night is re-watching episodes of "Star Trek" with his father.

He has only ever skyped with his Persian side of the family and has never met them in person. When Darius' grandfather gets a poor health diagnosis, his parents decide to take the family to Iran to visit. There he meets Sohrab, a boy his age, who somehow seems to know how to calm Darius' soul and make him feel like he is good enough. After being around his extended family for the first time in his life, he discovers himself, and starts to understand his parents a little bit more.

I loved this one and I hope you will too. There is also a sequel to this book that I will be checking out soon. It was interesting to learn about the Persian heritage, foods, and traditions as well. Though it was a young adult novel, I felt myself connecting to it in ways that I have not connected to other books before. There is a little Darius about me in certain ways, a little nerdy, a little depressed, and a little awkward. He is like a twin brother that I never had. Khorram has a beautiful way of describing situations throughout the story. I also found it unexpectedly funny in certain scenes, which was refreshing compared to some of the other "heavy" portions of the story. This is a perfect read for Pride month.





Canton Asylum for Insane Indians (1903-1933) AKA Hiawatha Asylum for Insane Indians

Asylum Cemetery Fencing Project: Hiawatha Golf Club to install a new oval split rail fence. The fence was designed by Kelly Eilers, former grounds superintendent. The fence will replace the over 30 year old semi-rectangle fence.

The "Keepers..." is a group of Native and non-native individuals who strive to fulfill its mission statement, and carrying Harold Iron Shield's tradition of hosting an Honoring and Remembrance ceremony that started in 1988. One hundred twenty-one ancestors of fifty-three tribal nations are buried in the asylum cemetery. The cemetery is a part of Canton and United States of history, and in 1998 it was listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Since officially forming in 1013, the "Keepers..." have been recognized by a City of Canton Resolution in February of 2014, given approximately fifty presentations, (recent November 2023 at Good Earth State Park), been interviewed for television and print media stories, and completed the "Gate Project" at the entrance to the former asylum grounds.



The Canton City Commission met in regular session on Monday, June 3 at 7 p.m. at the Depot. All Commissioners were present at the time of roll call.

Under Visitors to be Heard, Commissioner Paul Garbers commented about the warning that Citizen Todd Esche received for the grass behind his house. Garbers noted that the grass will be used for hay.

With no other Visitors to be Heard, the only item under Old Business was the Second Reading of Planning & Zoning Membership Ordinance. The First Reading was done at the May 20 City Commission meeting to update an ordinance to amend Chapter 32: City Organizations for Planning & Zoning membership, compensation, and expenses. This ordinance will update the Planning & Zoning Commission from five members to seven members. If approved, it will be published on June 13 and effective July 3. As a note, per City

Next on the agenda was to advertise for a Full-Time Police

Officer. It is being recommended to advertise externally for the Full-Time Police Officer Position vacated by Michelle Smith. Motion to advertise by Larson. Seconded by Pigors. Unanimous approval.

Next under New Business was a Position Description Change. It is being recommended to update the Utilities Foreman position to change the word "manages" to "assists". Motion to approve the change by York. Seconded by Garbers. Unanimous approval.

A New Hire - Utilities Foreman was next under New Business. It is being recommended to hire Bill Winter for the Utility Foreman position at \$28.96/hr (Grade 12, Step 3). He will have a 90-day probationary period after which he may be eligible for a step increase. Motion to approve by York. Seconded by Larson. Unanimous approval.

The Beaver Creek Pay Application #3 was next on the agenda. JSA Project Engineer Devin Clay has submitted a pay application for the Beaver Creek Trunk Sewer project in the amount of \$184,965.60. Motion to approve by York. Seconded by Pigors. Unanimous approval.

The Airport Board Appointments was next under New Business. It is being recommended to re-

appoint Dave Amundson and appoint Robert Moulton-Ely to the Canton Municipal Airport Board for 3 year terms. Motion to approve by Larson. Seconded by Pigors. Unanimous approval.

The next item under New Business was the Canton Municipal Airport - Notice to Proceed, Black-Top Paving - Taxilane Extension. KLJ Engineering has submitted the Notification to Proceed for Journey Group Companies dba Black-Top Paving for the Canton Municipal Airport Taxilane Extension. Motion to approve by Pigors. Seconded by Larson. Unanimous approval.

The final item under New Business was the Schwartzle Change Order #3 - Canton Pool Project. Burbach Aquatics Inc. has submitted a change order for the Canton Community Swimming Pool FEMA Bathhouse. The change order is for the cost to install the underground gas line from the gas meter to the mechanical building and the bathhouse and to compensate Spielman Excavating for the work completed in the excavation of the mechanical building. This cost was not in the original proposal. The contract time has increased by 0

days and the contract amount has increased by \$42,531.73. The total new contract price is \$2,041,000.51. Garbers noted that he did not want to delay the Pool Project by waiting for an explanation from Burbach Aquatics on why this expense was missed in the original proposal. However, he wanted to know if the City has any recourse and would like an explanation from Burbach Aquatics. Motion to approve the change order with the expectation that the Commission gets an explanation from Burbach Aquatics by Garbers. Seconded by Larson. Unanimous approval.

During Commissioner Dialogue mentioned that volunteers will be helping to clean up the Ash Trees on June 8 and the City will not be sweeping up branches. He also noted that the private tree declaration that was supposed to be on the June 17 City Commission agenda will be moved to the July 1 City Commission meeting so the full Commission can be present.

With no further discussion, motion to adjourn at 7:30 p.m. by Larson. Seconded by Pigors. Unanimous approval.

The Planning and Zoning Commission shall consist of seven members. The members of the Planning and Zoning Commission shall be resident electors of the city and shall include the Mayor or a City Commissioner as a member. The City Commission may appoint administrative officials of the city as ex officio members of the Planning and Zoning Commission. The City Commission shall oversee the management of the City Planning and Zoning Commission.

The Planning and Zoning Commission shall consist of seven members. The City Commission may appoint administrative officials of the city as ex officio members of the Planning and Zoning Commission. The City Commission shall oversee the management of the City Planning and Zoning Commission.

§ 32.053 COMPENSATION AND EXPENSES.

All members of the City Planning and Zoning Commission shall serve as such without compensation. The city agrees to pay for expenses for travel and training such as registration fees and mileage if approved by the City Commission.


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Sportstalk
