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Canton Car Show Returns

The time is finally here after all the planning the Canton Area Car Show is returning. The first car show was held in 1980 in the city parking lot on 6th and Lincoln with just 70 cars. Randy and Deanna Ludwig grew the Canton Car Show to over 700 cars that filled over 18 city blocks of downtown Canton.

The car show ran each year until 2007 when Deanna became ill and construction began on the Lincoln County Courthouse expansion. A small show and shine was held in 2008 in the Canton High School parking lot. A large summer storm moved through the area causing the show to end early. Deanna passed away in early 2008 and this last show and shine was held in her memory. The Ludwig's were involved in 27 successful years of the Canton Car Show. They always had a passion for cars and wanted to share that with others.

Planning for this big event started more than a year ago with a group of volunteers coming together with big ideas. This new group came

up with the name of Canton Area Car Show for Generations. Bernie Tyrrell name came up because of his love for cars and years of building them with his son Mick, grandson Josh and his three great-grandkids. Terrell has a 1946 Ford and his son Mick owns a 1965 Chevy Malibu but over the last twenty years he has been building a rat rod out of car parts left over from other vehicles.




This custom made fire pit is the prize for the Best of Show this year at the Canton Area Car Show for Generations.

Celtic Music Coming to Open Air Market



The sounds and stories of old and new Ireland will be heard at the Canton Open Air Market as the Celtic group Maggie in the Meantime. The will play Thursday, July 18 starting at 6 p.m.

Maggie in the Meantime is made up of four musicians who have been playing since they were children: Magdalena Modzelewska, Darrel Fickbohm, Blaine Fickbohm, and Jeff Paul.

Magdalena Modzelewska (Maggie) is one of the four principal violins in the South Dakota Symphony and has performed in Europe and America as a soloist. Her own musical project, Flower and Flame, has performed in Europe and the state of South Dakota.

Blaine Fickbohm, has mastered the wooden drum (cajon), and joins the group from his hometown of Moville, Iowa.

Jeff Paul, from Los Angeles, is the jack-of-all-trades in the group with stage credits in every genre. He is principle oboist in the South Dakota Symphony, but for this show he plays pennywhistle, oboe, keyboards, guitar, and English horn.

Darrel Fickbohm, brother to Blaine, is a guitar player, a singer/songwriter and professional actor with performance credits in both Europe and America. He describes the group as a distilled blend of storytelling, Celtic, folk, and ballad. In the course of the evening one hears some familiar tunes and some new.

"Many countries, like Scotland and Ireland, still listen to the same music from generation to generation—it unites them. We, in America, have gotten away from that kind of popular appeal, but recent trends in folk revival have been reclaiming lost ground. We've found that nearly everyone has a good time at our shows," says Darrel.

Veterans Burial Benefits

In June, the United States Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) announced that they will provide a commemorative urn or plaque for a deceased veteran. Families should note that if they select the new urn or plaque option, they cannot inter their loved one at a VA National Cemetery and cannot receive a government-furnished headstone, marker, niche cover, or medallion for placement in any cemetery.

The South Dakota Veterans Cemetery follows the eligibility requirements for burial in a National Cemetery, so it is important to know if the VA provides a commemorative urn or plaque for a veteran, they will not be eligible for burial at the South Dakota Veterans Cemetery.

The South Dakota Department of Veterans Affairs wants to emphasize again that if the family chooses to receive a plaque or an urn to commemorate their veteran, the decision cannot be undone. There is no path to restore eligibility. Receipt of a commemorative urn or plaque nullifies eligibility for burial in a National Cemetery, the State Veterans Cemetery, or receipt of a government furnished headstone if the veteran is to be buried in a private cemetery.

As always, we urge all veterans to visit their county or tribal veterans service officers (CTVSO's) to learn more about this program and its implications, as well as all burial benefits.

Economic Development Boards Approve Financing

PIERRE, S.D. — The Governor's Office of Economic Development Board of Economic Development approved six loans and two grants while the Economic Development Finance Authority authorized two bond resolutions. These projects reflect a capital investment of over \$121 million and the creation of 148 full-time jobs.

The City of Canton was approved for a Local Infrastructure Improvement Program grant of \$423,000. The grant will be used to extend a street and related infrastructure within the Canton Industrial Park.

HISTORY REVISITED

The day I receive the posters for the Sioux River Folk Festival is always a special one. Sure, it means I have to get busy and start putting them up but it also means that this event I've been a part of since the summer of 1980 is getting closer by the minute.

Last year I made a goofy 30 day festival countdown calendar and sent it to some friends who live up by Larchwood. They have been associated with the folk festival for a very long time and this year I decided they needed a longer countdown calendar. For 2024 they received a 92 day calendar that began on May 1 and ends on August 2, the first day of the festival. This means they have 22 days to check off as I write this column.

I'm quite sure most of you have a summer event that really stands out and makes you very happy to still be alive and taking in air. If cars are your thing you're probably getting excited about the return of the car show to Canton later this month. Maybe a trip to the Black Hills or a few days at Lake Okaboji are in your plans. I know family reunions take place in the summer and maybe you are counting down the days until you get to see all those aunts, uncles and cousins you haven't seen in a while. Motorcycle enthusiasts have Sturgis to prepare for and then there's all those music lovers who eagerly await the Sioux River Folk Festival. Hopefully the rain and foul weather we had last summer

won't visit us again. But we will take whatever we get and make the best of it. And I hope whatever event you are eagerly waiting for arrives and is even better than you dreamed it would be.

Happy reading and don't forget to check out Maggie in the Meantime at the Open Air Market on Thursday at 6 p.m. We are getting financial help from the SD Arts Council and FOTM for this free event. If you've seen this Sioux Falls band you know they are very good. If you haven't caught them yet, you are in for a real treat. For this Open Air Market we will be going back to the regular 6-8 p.m. If we have to double up more acts because of canceled shows, we will start at 5:30 and end at 8:30.

Concerning Giants in the Earth by Ole Rölvaaag: If you are interested in the history of southeastern South Dakota and you've never read Giants in the Earth, you should. This novel, written in 1927, was the first book I can remember reading when I was young that depicted the life of early homesteaders in this area. In the November/December 2020 issue of the South Dakota Magazine, John Andrews wrote an article called Books to Read again. And Again- Ten books to pass the time and grow your appreciation of South Dakota. Giants in the Earth was one of these books. The following is what John had to say about this book and why it is so important to him.

Giants in the Earth by Ole Rölvaaag, story by John Andrews

A friend told me that several years ago she convinced her brother to read *Giants in the Earth*. "He was so mad," she said of his reaction upon finishing. I completely understood.

I still get little angry when I think of the conclusion to Ole Rölvaaag's saga of the prairie." I won't spoil it, but it is heartbreaking.

Giants (1927) tells the story of four Norwegian families who established a small community along Spring Creek in Southeastern Dakota Territory in 1873. They confront hardships that threaten to destroy their livelihoods: blizzards, locusts and the loneliness that comes with leaving your homeland - knowing you'll never return - and entering a place completely deserted, where, "there isn't even a thing that one can hide behind," in the words of Beret, one of the main characters.

I was drawn to *Giants* because I've always been curious to know more about my great-grandparents' homesteading experience. They arrived in Dakota Territory in 1882 and were among the 800,000 Norwegians who emigrated to North America between 1825 and 1925. Reading the scenes in Rölvaaag's novel conjured countless questions I wish I could ask: Did you only eat porridge? Did anyone try to jump your claim? How close were your nearest neighbors? What did it feel like to hold your first church service?

Their real-life experiences may not have strayed far from the novel. Many of the stories are based on conversations Rölvaaag had with his father-in-law, Andrew Berdahl, who settled in northeastern Minnehaha County in 1873. His was one of eight families that made the journey in 11 covered wagons from Filmore County in Minnesota to the spot along Slipup Creek about eight miles west of Garretson.

The opening page of *Giants* depict the scene as Per Hansa, Beret and their three children cross into Dakota Territory, traversing chest-high prairie grass that has never seen a plow. Rölvaaag describes the sound of the wind rustling through the tall and spindly stems: "Tish-ah, tish-ah." During summer, I open the window of my home office. Across the road is a field of corn, nearly 7 feet tall. "Tish-ah" it says, as the breeze trickles through the leaves, and I think of *Giants* and the shared experiences of thousands of our ancestors.

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Fish Stories

I love fishing. There's almost no better way to relax, get away from the hubbub of daily life, and connect with the natural beauty all around us. And they taste pretty good, too! South Dakota is home to some of the best fishing in the country. We have many unique experiences, from river fishing on the Mighty Missouri to the Prairie Lakes in the northeast part of the state – and many more opportunities besides.

Our Department of Game, Fish and Parks (GFP) manages many of these opportunities across the state, especially at our state parks and recreation areas. In fact, their theme for our state parks this year is "Reel in Memories in South Dakota State Parks." I want to share a few "fish stories" from the work that GFP does. But unlike some "fish stories" that are full of exaggeration and extra twists, these ones are all true!

GFP's Outdoor Campus in Sioux Falls teaches fishing classes for groups and the community. One intern at the Outdoor Campus was teaching a special needs class when one of the kids informed her that "he had experience fishing and baiting the hook, but he really wanted to learn how to take a fish OFF the hook." He wanted to catch a fish! With 30 seconds left in the class, he hooked a small bluegill and was able to reel it in, take a picture, unhook it (exactly what he was hoping for!), toss it back in, and leave with the biggest smile on his face.

GFP hosts the "Ladies, Let's

Fish" series, which takes place one Thursday a month at the Pelican Lake Recreation Area. The class is led by women from GFP, which provides a safe and supportive environment for women to learn and gain confidence fishing. Fifteen women signed up. They learned how to purchase a fishing license on GoOutdoorsSouthDakota.com – then they learned practical skills like tying knots, fish identification, using different types of tackle, setting up fishing poles, and casting. One lady found tying knots easier than she thought. It rained at the first class, but the women were determined to continue fishing. One of them caught a nice white bass, and the ladies were so excited! They all made plans to continue fishing in the future.

We host all kinds of kids' fishing competitions and other kid-focused fishing events across the state. 35 youth and 35 adults participated at this year's 17th Annual Kids Fishing Derby at Oahe Downstream. Lake Herman hosted the annual Casting for Kids tournament – kids of all ages came out to enjoy fishing. The Lake Vermillion Recreation Area hosted Take a Kid Fishing – 17 kids were provided a free tackle box, a fishing poll, a fishing handbook, and a meal of hot dogs and chips, too!

There are all kinds of similar events for our kids at state parks and recreation areas across the state – just check gfp.sd.gov to

find out when and where!

One final story shows us how fishing can bring peace and hope, even in very difficult circumstances. LeeAnn Currey is fighting breast cancer, and she participated in the "Casting for Recovery Retreat" last year. This event is open for women with all stages of breast cancer treatment and recovery at no cost.

LeeAnn said that the retreat "was a fun-filled weekend and another way of celebrating life." She had never fly fished before, but she learned something new and bonded with the other women who were going through their cancer journeys. They all shared a lot of laughs – like when LeeAnn hooked her guide Royce's cap during one of her casts. But she still caught two fish – and has the pictures to prove it! LeeAnn expressed how humbling the experience was, saying, "I came away with a lighter heart and a smile on my face. It was a weekend I will cherish forever."

This year's "Casting for Recovery Retreat" will take place from October 4-6 at NeSoDak in Waubay. Individuals should apply online by July 25, and they will be randomly selected to participate.

I hope that each of you find a chance to get out on the water and "Reel in Memories" this summer. You'll find peace, some hope, and maybe even a delicious dinner! As the saying goes, "You can't buy happiness, but you can go fishing – and that's pretty much the same thing."

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Decisions with BIG Impacts

BIG Update

President Biden's performance during the debate a couple weeks ago was very concerning. Americans deserve a Commander in Chief who is up to the task, and it's clear that Biden is not capable to fulfill the responsibilities of the office. It is not safe for the American people or the future of our country if Biden continues to run the administration.

Strong cognitive health is necessary to carry out everyday activities and make decisions, especially those that impact an entire country and significant world affairs. We should have a leader who we can trust to make those decisions.

BIG Idea

California recently requested authorization for a regulation that would require much of their railway system to become zero-emissions. This decision

is not based on evidence and would have drastic effects on rail transportation outside of California. Their request is not feasible and could cripple the supply chain across the United States.

The EPA must reject this unsound policy that will affect the entire nation's freight rail network. California's extreme climate agenda cannot be forced on the rest of America.

I questioned Ms. Arias, the chief of the transportation division at California Air Resources Board during a Transportation and Infrastructure Committee hearing about this detrimental policy.

BIG News

Noncitizens should not be allowed to vote in federal elections, yet dozens of states don't require proof of citizenship to register to vote. With nearly

25 million noncitizen residents in the U.S. and nearly ten million undocumented immigrants that have crossed our border illegally during Biden's presidency, we should ensure those who determine the outcome of federal elections are actually U.S. citizens.

I voted to pass the Safeguard American Voter Eligibility (SAVE) Act to require proof of citizenship when registering to vote in federal elections. Proof of citizenship could be shown through identifications like a REAL ID, U.S. passport, military ID, a government-issued photo ID with a birth certificate, or other official documents.

Free, fair, and accountable elections are vital to the survival of our democracy. Only Americans should vote in American elections.

How strong is your emergency fund?

You can't predict financial emergencies—but you can prepare for them.

To do that, you can build an emergency fund to pay for unexpected expenses, some of which may be sizable. Without one, you might be forced to dip into your investments, possibly including your retirement accounts, such as your IRA or 401(k). If this happens, you might have to pay taxes and penalties, and you'd be withdrawing dollars that could otherwise be growing over time to help pay for your retirement.

In thinking about such a fund, consider these questions:

How much should I save? The size of your emergency fund should be based on several factors, including your income, your spouse's income and your cost of living. However, for most people in their working years, three to six months of total expenses is adequate. Once you're retired, though, you may want to keep up to a year's worth of expenses in your emergency fund — because you don't want to be forced to cash out investments when their price may be down, and you may not be replenishing these accounts any longer.

What types of emergencies should I prepare for? Your emergency fund could be needed for any number of events: a job loss or early retirement, housing or auto repairs, unreimbursed medical bills, unexpected travel, and so on. But this fund may also be needed to help you cope with other threats.

expenses — mortgage, utilities, food, transportation and others — you might find it challenging to set aside some extra money in an emergency fund. But you do have opportunities. If you're working, you could set up a direct deposit so that part of your paycheck goes directly into your emergency fund. You could also save a portion of any extra income you receive, such as bonuses and tax refunds.

Where should I keep the money? An emergency fund has two key requirements: You need to be able to access the money immediately and you need to count on a certain amount being available. So, it's a good idea to keep your emergency fund in a liquid, low-risk account that offers protection of principal. For this fund, you're less interested in growth than you are in stability. But because interest rates have recently changed, you may be able to get a reasonable return without sacrificing liquidity or safety.

How can I build an emergency fund? Given all your normal

One final word about an emergency fund: It takes discipline to maintain it and to avoid tapping into it for everyday expenses or impulse purchases. The name says it all — this is a fund that should only be used for emergencies. By keeping it intact until it's truly needed, you can help yourself weather many of the storms that may come your way.

For fans of cool vehicles and classic cars, Canton is the place to be July 27 and 28. The 2024 Canton Area Car Show for Generations will be family-friendly fun for all ages.

The show's name is a tribute to one of its organizers, Bernie Tyrrell, and the love of cars he shares with his son Mick, his grandson Josh, and his three great-grandkids. Bernie has a 1946 Ford, while Mick owns a 1965 Chevy Malibu. Together with son Mick, and grandson Josh, Bernie and family over 20 years ago built a rat rod out of car parts from 17 other vehicles.

Car show weekend begins with Chase the Ace from 5 to 7 p.m. July 26 at The Wheel in downtown Canton. Proceeds benefit the car show. Harley Davidson of Sioux Falls will be at the show with a full display including a trailer and tent with demo rides and The Wheel will host food trucks and a show and shine from 5 to 8 p.m. for anyone who wants to display their vehicle.

(6) The maximum number of licenses that may be issued pursuant to this Resolution to any person, organization, or entity within any calendar year is six (6). (7) If an event is cancelled, rendering

the issued license unnecessary, the licensee shall provide written verification of cancellation to the County Auditor's Office in order to ensure the cancelled event does not count against the licensee's maximum number of licenses that may be issued within that calendar year. (8) Any license issued pursuant to this Resolution shall be issued only to the specific person, organization, or entity and for the specific location specified on the application pursuant to SDCL § 35-4-125. (9) The fees for licenses issued pursuant to this Resolution shall be as follows: A temporary special malt beverage retailer's license \$25.00 per day. A temporary special on-sale wine retailer's license \$25.00 per day. A temporary special off-sale liquor license may be issued \$50.00 per day. A temporary special on-sale package dealers license \$50.00 per day. (10) A \$50.00 publishing fee for each application shall be required unless a public hearing is not required pursuant to SDCL § 35-4-124(7) (11) Any application brought pursuant to this Resolution shall be accompanied by the license fee and publishing fee, if applicable, at the time of submission to the County Auditor's Office. The fees for licenses issued pursuant to this Resolution shall be placed in the County's general fund. (12) Any license issued pursuant to this Resolution may be rescinded by official Commission action should the licensee, or any employees or agents acting on behalf of the licensee, violate any County resolution, ordinance, or State law related to the sale or furnishing of alcoholic beverages. Resolution**RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE CREATION OF TAX INCREMENTAL DISTRICT NUMBER 10, LINCOLN COUNTY #2407-22**

WHEREAS, on May 20, 2024, the Planning Commission recommended the creation of a tax increment district in accordance with SDCL § 11-9-4; and

WHEREAS, the County Commission has the power, pursuant to SDCL § 11-9-2, to create the Tax Incremental District Number 10, Lincoln County and define its boundaries; and

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED:

1. Authority and Declaration of Necessity. The County declares the necessity for the creation of the Tax Incremental District Number 10, Lincoln County pursuant to SDCL Chapter 11-9. Further, the County finds that the improvement of the area is likely to enhance significantly the value of substantially all of the other real property in the District and is necessary for economic development within the County. Further, the County finds that the District will be created for economic development.

2. Findings. The County Commission makes the following findings:

a. Not less than fifty percent, by area, of the real property within the district will stimulate and develop the general economic welfare and prosperity of the state through the promotion and advancement of industrial, commercial, and manufacturing development; and

b. The improvement of the area is likely to significantly enhance the value of substantially all other real property in the district.

c. The plan is feasible and development within the District is in conformity with the County's comprehensive plan.

3. Findings of Maximum Percentage of Tax Incremental Districts. The aggregate assessed value of the taxable property in the District, plus all other tax incremental districts, does not exceed ten percent of the total assessed valuation of the County.

4. Creation of District. There is hereby created, pursuant to SDCL 11-9, the Tax Incremental District Number 10, Lincoln County (the "District"). The District is hereby created on the day this resolution becomes effective, which shall be twenty days after publication.

5. Designation of District Boundaries. The District shall have boundaries which shall include the following described real property:


