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Innovation Storage Condos Holds Ribbon Cutting

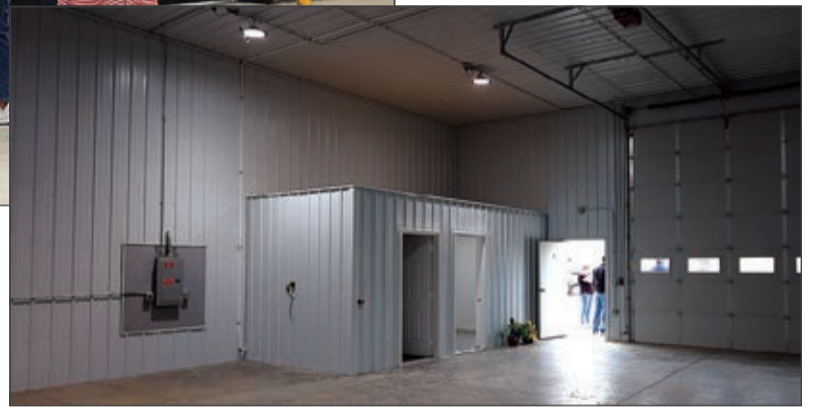


Pictured at right is the inside of each unit. There is a small room to use as an office along with a bathroom. Every unit has a large garage door, electricity, heat, water and sewer.

Canton's very own Tyler Halverson is making his name down his own path in the country music world. On April 16th, 2024, Halverson had his Grand Ole Opry debut. For country music stars, this is known as a milestone moment in their careers. Halverson was joined by his family, including his seven younger siblings, parents, grandparents, and other excited and proud family members.

"It's definitely been a long road for him, but it's been fun to watch him chase his dreams and support him through all of it!! His crazy life has some perks to it! Like being backstage at big concerts and meeting cool people along the way!!" -Mackenzie Halverson

After attending Belmont College in Nashville and graduating, Halverson took to the road with his songwriting and playing. After several independent releases, he was signed with Atlantic Records in 2023. As of June 10th, 2023, Halverson signed with Concord for his first publishing deal.

His latest single "New Loop" was recently released on the "Twisters" soundtrack. Halverson's name joins the soundtrack along with country music powerhouses such as Miranda Lambert, Jelly Roll, Tyler Childs, Thomas Rhett, Kane Brown, Lainey Wilson, and Luke Combs to name a few. He will have more singles releasing throughout the rest of the year, with the next song "Closer" coming out August 2nd.

Q&A

-How did you feel when you had your Grand Ole Opry debut?

It was humbling and surreal all at the same time. When you think about who has stepped foot in that circle before you, you can't help but feel how heavy and exciting



that is. The Opry was a place my parents and I had been to when visiting Nashville and the dream was always to wind up there. It was a full circle moment to say the least.

-What was it like having all your family there to celebrate your debut with you?

Having my family there was everything! I've missed enough holidays, birthdays, weddings, funerals and what else have you to chase this dream down. And that night was just as much theirs as it was mine. I'd be nowhere without the support of my family. It never gets easier being away from the

people you love, so when they're there to share it with me, it just makes it all that much better. I just hope it shows my brothers and sisters to find the gift God gave you and to use it.

-Any upcoming tours with other artists?

We have shows coming up with artists like Turnpike Troubadours, Muscadine Bloodline, and Midland. But truthfully, we try and stay on the road headlining our own clubs. I'll always take a couple hundred of my own fans than a couple thousand of somebody else's. The fire grows quicker that way.

-What is your favorite part of touring?

Seeing all the beautiful country God made and meeting all the wonderful people still out there.

-How does it feel to have your name and song on a movie soundtrack?

I think it's a tip of the hat saying things are headed in the right direction. Things are looking up, but there's still plenty of work to be done.

A Dangerous World Calls for a Strong America

I often say, "If we don't get national security right, the rest is just conversation." In just the last year, we've seen our ally Israel come under attack from terrorists, and our own military has been attacked by Iran-backed militias 170 times, all while Russia and China continue their campaigns of aggression and strengthen their alliance with one another. Times like these underscore the need for American strength.

The reality is that we are not as prepared as we should be to address these threats. The weakness that the Biden-Harris administration has shown on the world stage has emboldened our adversaries. At the same time, our military readiness is not where it needs to be to deter aggression. We have service branches that are below their recruitment targets. We have planes that can't fly and ships that can't sail because of deferred maintenance. And we have shortages of munitions

and weapons.

Last month, my colleagues on the Senate Armed Services Committee put forward a National Defense Authorization Act for next year that takes steps to address the challenges we're facing. It fully funds deterrence initiatives and strengthens partnerships to counter Russia and China. It makes critical efforts to modernize military technologies and strategies that will define tomorrow's conflicts. And it authorizes the purchase of new combat vessels, vehicles, and aircraft to upgrade our aging fleets.

I'm particularly proud to report that this bill includes full funding for the next steps of the B-21 mission, including necessary support facilities. The Air Force calls this new plane the future backbone of its bomber force, and I am incredibly proud that its first mission will be hosted at South Dakota's own Ellsworth Air Force Base. One of my top priorities is making sure that Ellsworth has

everything it needs for this critical advancement in our nation's defense.

The annual defense bill is one of the most important pieces of legislation we consider each year. I believe there should be a sense of urgency about getting it to the floor. My colleague Sen. Roger Wicker (R-Miss.) recently released a blueprint for making a generational investment in our military. He noted that our defense budget as a share of our economy has fallen to near record lows, and he proposes a defense buildup similar to President Reagan's initiative in the 1980s.

We have no time to waste to build up our military, and the first step is getting this year's defense bill passed in a timely manner. History has shown that weakness invites aggression. The strength of our military is the surest way we have of securing peace, and it must be a priority.

The annual one-day car show featured hundreds of cars, trucks, motorcycles and even a few vehicles that may not be classified in those categories. History often leaves behind tales captured in photographs and those of the memories of the people that lived through times, offering unique perspectives of points in time that otherwise would be forgotten. Corky Minor and Joyce Miles have been working diligently for years to preserve the history of the Beloit Children's Home, commonly known as the Beloit Orphanage. In just two weeks, the duo will host the 150th Anniversary of the Iowa Orphanage's reunion right here in Canton.

1999

E. O. Lawrence Elementary school gets three false fire alarms from the high humidity levels inside the school. All three times the fire department came to the school to figure out what was wrong, but all three times it was just the high humidity that set the alarms off.

The Canton airport gave free rides to those people who attended the "fly in breakfast" that they hosted. Anyone who purchased breakfast there could have a chance to take a ride in the skies with their family. Mostly everyone who bought breakfast took this opportunity.

1974

A bridge one mile south and 1/2 mile west of Canton's west city limits was the scene of an accident as a gravel truck driven by Herman Westphal, Balaton, Minnesota, fell through the bridge. Extensive damage was incurred upon the truck which was loaded with gravel. The bridge collapsed and at the present time is closed. No injury was reported by Westphal.

The first school lunch will be Monday, August 26, in all schools. Cost: K-6 grades - 3¢ and 7-12 grades 40¢. Students may pay on almost any basis. 10 meal tickets; 20 meal ticket; single meal ticket; or semester.

A liberalization of rules that will bring mail delivery service for the first time to more than 100,000 rural families has been approved by Postmaster General E. T. Klassen, Postmaster Dick Irons said today. The new rules will benefit an estimated five families served by the rural routes out of the Canton Post Office, Postmaster Irons said.

Last week another isolated case of anthrax was reported in the same area as the last case. This case involved a different farm place where one head of cattle had to be destroyed. The disease was detected and controlled

before it had a chance to spread.

Neighbors and friends arrived at Joe Welter farm after dinner on Monday, July 29 to finish combining about 30 acres of oats. Six combines moved through the field and finished by 3:30. Nearby farmers also furnished two balers, eight tractors, several trailers, three elevators and three trucks. After completing the job, Taylor Oil Company, Sioux Falls, filled the farmers equipment with fuel.

1899

Dr. A. G. Noid is putting in a cement walk in front of his drug store. This is the beginning, and the end, which is not far away. We'll see a cement walk all along the block between Fifth and Sixth Streets.

Judges Cuthbert and Knudson were at Fairview and argued before the town board as to whether or not a saloon was to be put in. Although the sentiment in the town is against it, the law allows it and it was decided to issue a license at \$800.

A special train will leave Canton next Sunday for Spirit Lake and Okoboji at 8:05 a.m. arriving at Arnold's Park at 11:30 a.m. A fine entertainment is promised. Park 1st will consist of a concert by Edison's concert phonograph, the most wonderful of its kind yet produced. Part 2nd consists of Edison's latest moving picture machine and the celebrated passion play of Oberammergau, illustrated. Several fine bands will present to add to the pleasure of the excursion. Returning train will leave Arnold's park at 6:20 p.m. Tickets for the round trip are only \$1.50

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HISTORY REVISITED FOLK FESTIVAL EDITION

It's always been a tough sell getting folks to attend the Sioux River Folk Festival that have never gone to it before. Apparently some people still think that all they're going to hear is a solo act or maybe a trio with a guitar or two and maybe a banjo singing old Peter, Paul and Mary songs. Well, there is nothing wrong with that but our folk festival is much, much more than it's title proclaims. Just reading through our brochure, that has bios on all of the thirteen main acts, the following descriptions of their music gives one a pretty good idea what this festival is all about.

- “progressive- acoustic boy band”
- “a mix of Celtic and classical”
- “alternative rock played on acoustic instruments”
- “experimental jam- grass act”
- “Shake your hips instrumental flair”
- “fast picking bluegrass runs
- “classic Americana”
- “outlaw country”
- “traditional folk”
- “a warm and wondrous acoustic sound”
- “soulful lyrics with tight three part harmonies”
- “hillbilly hollers, borderland ballads and sassy country blues”
- “high and lonesome”
- “music from America's Big Band era”
- “jazz rifts and lyrics that express optimism”
- “artists covered include James Taylor, Gordon Lightfoot, Tom Petty, Richard Thompson, Don McLean and Bob Dylan”

So, if something you just read sounds like something you'd be interested in hearing live in the beautiful outdoor setting of

Newton Hills State Park you may want to purchase a ticket and attend. Tickets are available at Canton Home and Farm, Calico Skies Winery, Newton Hills State Park office and at the gate.

Children 14 and younger are admitted free and leashed dogs are welcomed. This event is handicap accessible with parking near the concert site.

Before I sign off, I'd just like to thank the Sioux Valley News for helping advertise this event, the SD Arts Council for funding, all our local sponsors and most of all the great staff at Newton Hills State Park. These folks go way above and beyond their job descriptions before, during and after the festival.

This and their Festifall in early October are their biggest and busiest weekends of the year and they always seem to make it look like its no big deal. If you attend the festival, please let them know you appreciate all the extra work they put into making our three day event run so smoothly.

I will leave you with a short bio of John Hartford taken from a CD. He was the most well-known act the Sioux River Folk Festival has ever booked. It was 1993 when John performed. The Rocky Mountain Oysters, a Sioux Falls based bluegrass band, ended up being his backing band for his evening show. Their banjo player switched over to saxophone and turned this show into something so incredible that words simply can't describe it. If we are lucky maybe something similar will happen this weekend. Happy reading.

John Hartford

John Hartford (1937-2001) had a long and varied musical career. He was born in New York City, but grew up near the Mississippi River, which would have a profound influence on him. He was signed to RCA Records in Nashville in 1966 as a country singer and songwriter in the mold of his fellow-travelers on the scene, like Kris Kristofferson and Mickey Newbury. One of his compositions from that period, "Gentle on My Mind," although first recorded by Hartford, became a huge national hit for Glen Campbell. Hartford moved to Los Angeles and appeared as a musician on "The Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour" and "The Glen Campbell Goodtime Hour." Eventually, the yearly royalties from "Gentle on My Mind" allowed him to pursue his own music.

Back in Nashville, Hartford began to play bluegrass and traditional country music with Norman Blake, Tut Taylor, Jimmy Martin, Lester Flatt, and other Nashville musicians. Most of the material he recorded in the 1970s and 80s was released on the Flying Fish label. He also began to establish a unique style, frequently performing solo with fiddle (while clogging) or banjo, wearing a black vest and bowler hat. All these playing styles were incorporated into his subsequent recordings. In his final years, he recorded albums for Rounder Records with Bob Carlin, and compiled recordings of traditional material by some of his musical heroes.

Many of Hartford's own songs deal with the Mississippi River and steamboats. He obtained a steamboat license and helped operate a steamboat ride in Nashville.

The Ringing Bell of Liberty

When anti-American criminals tear down our statues, deface our monuments, or burn our flag, we must hold them to account for their vile actions. This past week, anti-American criminals defaced the Washington D.C. replica of the Liberty Bell in the name of violence and hatred, writing "Hamas is coming" and other far more vulgar statements.

In 1776, when our Founding Fathers first declared independence from Great Britain, a bell in the tower of what would later be called Independence Hall rang out to summon the citizens of Philadelphia to gather. They would hear for the very first time the Declaration of Independence read aloud in public.

Colonel John Nixon, who was in command of the Philadelphia city guard, read aloud those immortal words, "that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

Inspired by those words, Americans fought and died to defend them and to make them true here at home. In the decades and centuries since, many nations around the world have been similarly inspired, taking to heart that simple yet revolutionary claim "that all men are created equal."

The bell that rung that day became a symbol of the liberty that the Declaration of Independence proclaimed: the Liberty Bell. Inscribed on the bell is the beautiful phrase, "Proclaim Liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof."

In Washington D.C., the center of the federal government that the Declaration proclaims was instituted

"to secure these rights," a replica of the Liberty Bell was installed so that the leaders of our nation would never forget the purpose for which they hold elected office.

11 years after the Liberty Bell rang out to herald the reading of the Declaration of Independence, it rang again for another solemn occasion: the signing of the United States Constitution. Although it wasn't in the original text, that Constitution established the First Amendment, which provided for "the right of the people peaceably to assemble." It created no right to violently protest, deface public property, or espouse violence and genocide against an entire people.

Symbols have meaning, not merely because they exist, but because of what they symbolize. Statues honoring our leaders matter, not because they were better than anyone else, but because of the importance of their actions and what they symbolize.

The Liberty Bell symbolizes perhaps the two most important

Helder, who was raised in Canton, earned degrees in animal science ('79) and electrical engineering ('80) followed by a master's in electrical engineering ('85).

The distinguished professor emeritus became an expert in the field of radiometric calibration of satellite imagery working extensively with the Earth Resources Observation and Science

Center near Sioux Falls and NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center.

Helder spent 34 years on the SDSU faculty, serving as head of the Department of Electrical Engineering and Computer Science from 2001 to 2010, associate dean for research in the Jerome J. Lohr College of Engineering from 2010 to 2019 and director of the SDSU Image Processing Lab from 1990 to 2019.

In 2003, he was named researcher of the year for the college. In 2004, he received group achievement awards from NASA and EROS Data Center as well as the U.S. Geological Survey's John Wesley Powell Award, which is the highest civilian award given by the USGS. In 2023, Lohr College of Engineering named him its Distinguished Engineer.

During his career, he received grants totaling more than \$27 million.

Financial Focus

Look for different ways to borrow and use credit

Like most Americans, you will probably take on debt at some point in your life. And by managing debt wisely, you can potentially improve your saving and spending habits – and even your ability to invest for the future.

Let's look at some of the common options available for borrowing and using credit:

- **Credit card** – When used carefully – and not over-used – a credit card can be a valuable tool, especially if you travel frequently. Many people tend to stick with the same credit card without exploring what else is out there. Try to find a card that rewards you in as many ways as possible – and then keep your eyes open occasionally for even better rewards as they can change from time to time. Obviously, you want a card with a low interest rate, although ideally, you'd like to pay the card off each month without incurring any interest. You also should take a close look at a card's other features. Are you getting a competitive amount of mileage points? How much is your annual fee? Do you have a generous "cash back" program? Do you have access to "extras," such as airport lounges?
- **Home equity loans and home**

equity lines of credit – As the names suggest, a home equity loan or line of credit lets you tap into the equity you've built up in your home, which can be considerable, especially if you've owned your home for a long time. A home equity loan provides you with a lump sum, which you will repay over a set term with a fixed interest rate. A home equity line of credit usually carries a variable rate, although you might find a lender offering a fixed-rate option. You can generally draw on your loan or line of credit for any purpose, but keep in mind that unless you're using the funds for home improvements or additions, your interest payments are generally not tax deductible.

• **Securities-based lending** – Just as a home equity line of credit lets you borrow against the equity in your home, a securities-based loan, such as a margin loan, lets you borrow against the value of your investments, including stocks, exchange traded funds and mutual funds. Some people take out margin loans to purchase more investments, but you can use the money for any purpose. The margin loan process is usually not complex and when you make repayments,

you're paying yourself back. However, you should approach a margin loan with caution because if you borrow too much, the value of your margin account may fall below the maintenance requirement – the minimum dollar amount you must keep in your margin account after you've started taking money out. When this happens, your brokerage institution may issue a maintenance call that requires you to either deposit more money or marginable securities or sell some of the investments in your account.

Ultimately, when weighing your borrowing and credit options, you'll want to evaluate several factors: the interest rate you'll be paying, the purpose for taking on the debt, your ability to repay it without impinging on your cash flow, and so on. With careful thought and planning, and, if needed, help from a financial professional, you can make your debt work for you – and not the other way around.

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Delivering Wins for Indian Country

BIG Update

The assassination attempt on President Trump is a very serious act that should not be overlooked. Congress is working to get to the bottom of this. The House held committee hearings this week to get answers about what happened at the rally in Pennsylvania. The hearings resulted in Kimberly Cheatle stepping down from her position as Director of the Secret Service, after members on both sides of the aisle called for her resignation.

I voted to establish a special task force to investigate and identify ways to strengthen security measures. The bipartisan task force passed the House unanimously – all members agree that we can't let this major security failure ever happen again.

BIG Idea

In South Dakota, the average life expectancy is 78 years old. But, for Native American enrolled members on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, it's 58 years. That's a remarkable 20-year gap. One of the reasons for that is the poor quality of health care in Indian country. The federal government has trust and treaty obligations to address this, but the quality of care is second class. The Indian Health Service (IHS) faces a lack of oversight, questionable financial integrity, staffing needs, and employee shortcomings.

I introduced the Restoring Accountability in the IHS Act to improve the delivery of care for Native Americans relying on IHS by promoting the recruitment and retention of staff, best practices on information-sharing, cultural awareness, and accountability.

This week, I testified in the House Natural Resources Committee on my bill to improve service for Indian country.

BIG News

The public safety crisis on Indian reservations is serious. Tribal law enforcement agencies are faced with a lack of resources and officers, contributing to long response times and insufficient safety. I've requested additional funding for tribal law enforcement, field hearings in Indian country, and introduced legislation to ease the burden on tribal law enforcement.

This week, the House passed the appropriations bill for the Department of Interior which oversees tribal safety programs within the Bureau of Indian Affairs. I fought hard to get an increase in funding, and this package included the following:

- \$2.81 billion for the Bureau of Indian Affairs – a 14.5% increase from the FY24 enacted level – which includes:

- \$746 million for Public Safety and Justice programs – a 34% increase from the FY24 enacted level.

- \$414 million for Criminal Investigations and Police Service – a 51% increase from the FY24 enacted level.

- \$55 million for Tribal Courts – an 18% increase from the FY24 enacted level.

Fiscal responsibility is important, so I'm glad these funding increases are done without raising the cost of the bill. We made significant cuts elsewhere to provide resources for essential safety programs. This is a huge win for Indian country.

South Dakota Submits Official Request for Presidential Disaster Declaration

PIERRE, S.D. – Today, Governor Kristi Noem formally requested a major disaster declaration from the President for 25 counties due to the severe flooding that occurred in South Dakota between June 16 and July 8, 2024. Governor Noem signed Executive Order 2024-06 declaring the disaster. According to the National Weather Service, the rain event that created this flooding was a 1,000-year event (see Image 1 below).

Today, we are submitting our request for a presidential disaster declaration to address the damage from a historic 1,000-year flood that impacted South Dakota," said Governor Kristi Noem. "We have been working with families, local governments and officials, and FEMA for weeks to assess the damage. I am so proud of what South Dakotans have been able to do to start piecing our communities back

together."

In the aftermath of the flooding, teams from the Office of Emergency Management (OEM) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) have been on the ground conducting thorough damage assessments across the impacted areas, working closely to assess the extent of the damage and coordinate the necessary response efforts.

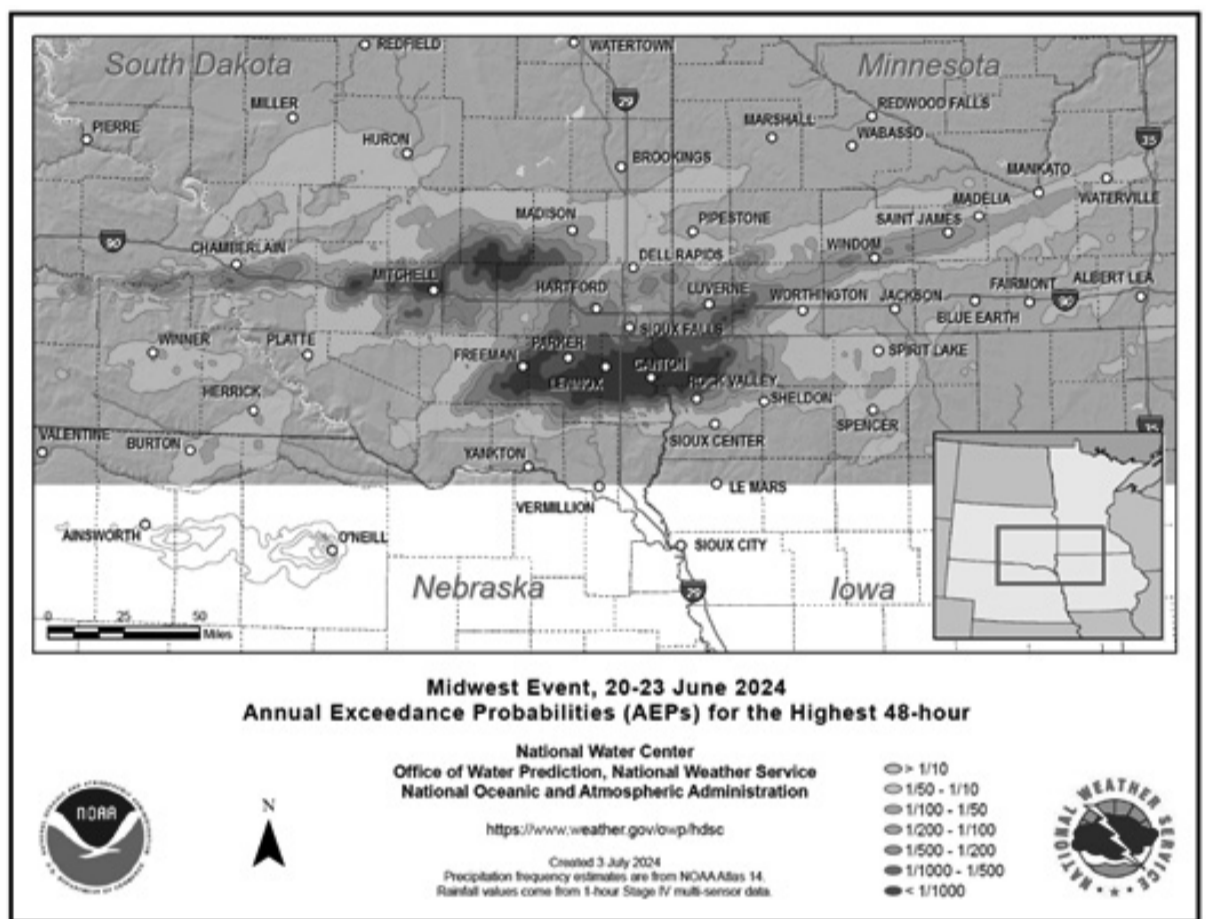
"This thorough damage assessment was normal protocol for a presidential disaster declaration, and it's an important part of the process to make sure all eligible counties and citizens are included," said Kristi Turman, Director of the Division of Emergency Services at the South Dakota Department of Public Safety.

During the flood, at least 11 river gauges hit new preliminary record-high levels. The Big Sioux

River at Sioux City crested nearly eight feet higher than previous records. New record crests were set at the following locations:

- Big Sioux River at Canton, Hawarden, Akron, Richland, Jefferson, and Sioux City;
- Vermillion River at Davis, Wakonda, and Vermillion;
- West Fork Vermillion River at Parker; and
- Turkey Ridge Creek at Centerville.

The request for a presidential disaster declaration highlights a critical need in the following South Dakota counties: Aurora, Bennett, Bon Homme, Brule, Buffalo, Charles Mix, Clay, Davison, Douglas, Gregory, Hand, Hanson, Hutchinson, Jackson, Lake, Lincoln, McCook, Miner, Minnehaha, Moody, Sanborn, Tripp, Turner, Union, and Yankton.



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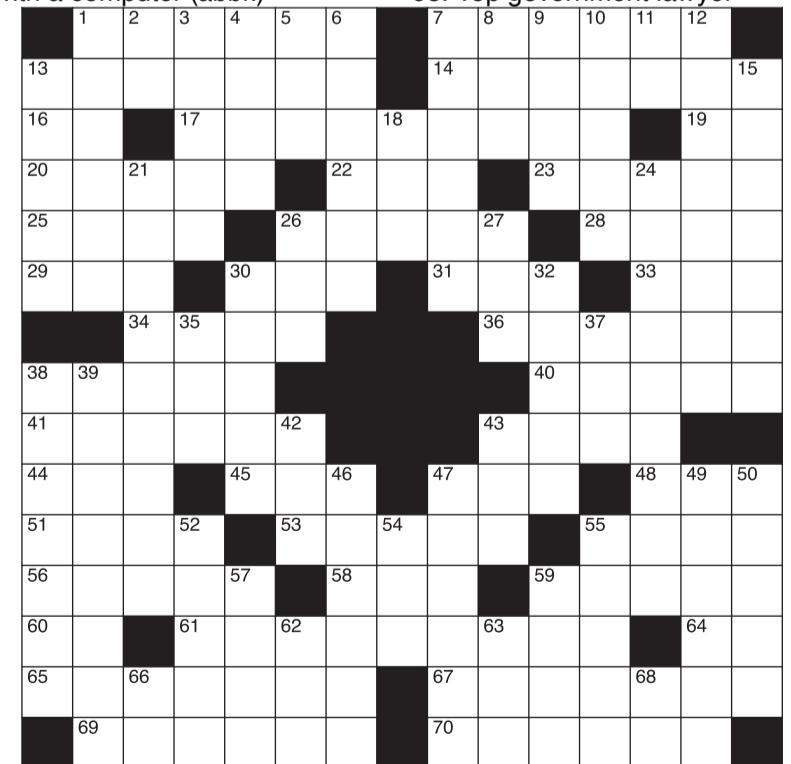

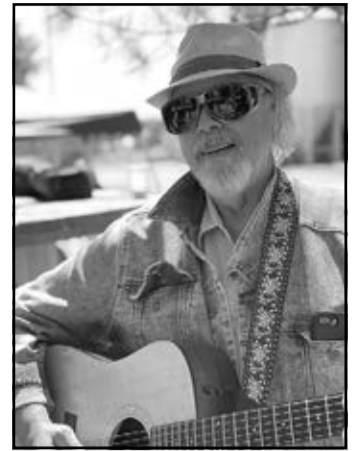


The Brass Holes

State Issued Public Release FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE FREE AND REDUCED PRICE MEALS FOR CHILDREN

PIERRE -- Child and Adult Nutrition Services in the South Dakota Department of Education has announced the free and reduced-price policy for free milk or free and reduced-price meals. The policy applies to children unable to pay the full price of meals or milk served under the National School Lunch Program, School Breakfast Program, Special Milk Program, and/or the Child and Adult Care Food Program. The administrative office of each school or agency that participates in any of these federal programs have a copy of the policy available for review.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals or milk at participating schools and agencies. Families may apply for free or reduced-price meals or free milk for their children for school/program year 2024-2025 according to guidelines effective July 1, 2024. Applications will be provided to households by their local school or agency. Families that are directly certified as eligible for free meals will receive a notice of eligibility from their school.

Schools will use the prior year's eligibility status (free, reduced price, or paid) for up to the first 30 days of school or until a new application is approved or direct certification is obtained, whichever comes first. When the carry-over period ends, unless the household is notified that their children are directly certified, or the household submits an application that is approved, the children must pay full

price for meals and the school or agency will not send a reminder or a notice of expired eligibility.

Applications submitted to a facility that operates that Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) are valid for a full year. Applications expire on the last day of the month one year after the application was submitted or approved.

Households that are currently on Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) will receive letters from the school indicating that their children are eligible for FREE school meals. Families receiving a notice should not complete an application for free meals. All children in a household where any household member receives benefits under TANF or SNAP are eligible for free meals. If any children were not listed on the notice of eligibility, the household should contact the school to have free meal benefits extended to them. This does not apply to CACFP.

Families receiving commodities through the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) can request an Interagency Action Notice that can be brought to the school in place of an application to document free meal eligibility, or they can complete an application and list the FDPIR case number. All children in a household with any household member receiving benefits under FDPIR are eligible for free meals.

If the school or agency knows of children who are homeless, runaway, foster, from a migrant household, or who are enrolled in Head Start, they will send a letter to the household telling them the children are eligible for free meals. Contact the school or agency if the household does not get a letter because these children may be eligible for free meal benefits.

Foster children that are under the legal custody of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals. Any foster child in the household is eligible for free meals regardless of income. Households may include foster children on the application but are not required to include payments received for care of the foster child as income.

Any household may choose to decline benefits, please notify your child's school or agency of that choice.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to your child's school or agency. An application must include the names of children for whom benefits are requested, all household members and their monthly income or designation that they do not have any income, and be signed by an adult household member with

the last four digits of that person's social security number. Incomplete applications cannot be approved for free and reduced-price meals or milk. Additional copies are available in the agency office. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility status for meals. The school or agency will provide additional information if the eligibility status is used for other purposes.

An eligibility determination is good for the school year; however, applications may be submitted at any time during the year. Contact your child's school or agency if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size changes. The children from that household may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals or free milk during the period of unemployment if the household's income falls within the income eligibility guidelines. Information on any application may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling on the application for eligibility, they may contact the determining official on an informal basis. If the parent or guardian wishes to make a formal appeal, an oral or written request may be made to the school or agencies hearing official to request an appeal.

Some schools or agencies may choose to send a special notice about the Children's Health Insurance Program

to households with the application. It provides a way for school or agency personnel to know if families will allow them to use the child's eligibility status for other program benefits. The decision whether or not a household is eligible for meal benefits or not is not affected by this form.
