Since Scott's passing, Rachel and the children continue to live in Canton.

Gackle's family started the golf tournament in 2021 in his memory, so all his friends and family could gather for a fun day outdoors. All funds from the tournament go directly back to the Canton community. Previously they have donated the proceeds to Canton wrestling, Canton trap team, swimming pool, and have given out three scholarships to graduating

seniors in high school.

This year the 18-hole tournament is scheduled for August 17th. Registration from 9-9:30 with golfing beginning at 10am. There will be prizes for 1st place along with pin prizes that will be awarded.

If you are interested in signing up for the tournament you may do so at the Canton golf course. The entrance fee is \$200 for a four-person team. For those who do not wish to participate in golfing but wish to contribute to his memorial, his family would love support in the form of pin prizes and monetary donations towards scholarships and other Canton programs. The memorial fund is set up at Farmer's State Bank where it can be directly deposited. The goal for next year is to be able to award scholarships to three of the upcoming 2025 graduating seniors.

Natalie Mae Elaine Amen Stroschein, born January 2, 1929, in Canton, to Ludwig and Palma (Narum) Fladmark, passed away on July 29, 2024.

She was 2½ years old when her father died, leading her mother, sister, and her to live with their maternal grandparents. They eventually moved into their own home during her high school years. Natalie was a vibrant and dedicated student. Confirmed in the 8th grade, she taught Sunday school to kindergarteners throughout high school while being heavily involved in music. Working six nights a week at a movie theater, she graduated in 1947 and went on to work for the telephone company and a finance firm in Sioux Falls.

On July 31, 1950, Natalie married Howard Amen. They welcomed a daughter, Debra, in 1951 and another daughter, Barbara, in 1957, but they also endured the heartbreak of losing an infant son, David, in 1955. They moved to Brookings for Howard's final year of college, where Natalie worked as a secretary for the physics and mechanical engineering departments at SDSU. Later, they lived in Lennox and Brookings again where Howard taught and coached at SDSU. In 1965 the family moved to Belle Fourche, where Natalie was active in church and began working in abstracting.

In 1976, they moved to Fargo after Howard and his partner acquired several businesses, including Hebron Brickyard. Natalie managed the brickyard office and also was bookkeeper. She became a cherished member of Bible Study Fellowship (BSF), eventually serving as a discussion leader.

Following Howard's death in 1985, Natalie relocated to Sioux Falls in 1989, continuing her participation in BSF and Women's Circle groups. In 1990, she married Milo Stroschein, and they enjoyed many happy years together until his passing in 2017. Natalie moved to Fargo in 2021 to be closer to her daughter. Despite health challenges, including a stroke that led to her passing, she remained positive and grateful to her caregivers.

**2014**

He has also performed in Canton and at the Folk Festival in Newton Hills. Since I used his name in this poem, I wanted to make sure he was ok with that and not sue me. I haven't heard back from him yet and that could mean that he's talking to his lawyers but I'm not going to lose any sleep over it. (Maybe I should be more concerned about using our governor's name.)

When you read this we will be into the first full week of August. The 44th Folk Festival will be history and there will only be one open air market concert left that will take place this Thursday, August 8 featuring Landon Weis, a young musician from Sioux Falls. We had to cancel two of the events this summer because of rain but luckily only one of the acts- Rick Stoops and Keven Vermillion- didn't get to perform. We will make sure they are the first to be contacted for summer 2025.

Canton Civil War Days will be here before we know it and with school starting on August 19, the summer of 2024 will be winding down but not soon forgotten. The first day of autumn doesn't arrive until the 22nd of September so enjoy the remaining warm weather, sunny days and hopefully no bad storms or floods. Happy reading.

## Enjoy God's Gifts

It can be hard to accept a gift. Years ago, a friend wanted to give me a gift of money. Since I didn't feel like I "needed" it I refused it.

Another friend witnessed what happened and told me that by accepting the gift, I would have made the giver happy, but by refusing the gift I was making them sad. He explained that if I really did not need the money, I could have graciously accepted the gift and then quietly given it to someone else. He helped me to understand the importance of both giving and accepting gifts. It is a lesson I still struggle to remember. Eventually, I began to understand how both giving and receiving can be a way to show love toward others.

Years later, I better understand the concept he was trying to teach me as I realize that the best gift giver of all is Jesus Christ. Not only did he give his life, as the creator, he also gives us all that we need to live. God cares about us and has given so many wonderful gifts. Ecclesiastes 2:25 asks, "For who can eat and who can have enjoyment without Him?"

The book of Ecclesiastes makes it clear that God wants us to have enjoyment in life- that he wants to give us good things. Of course he wants us to avoid sin as well. He wants what is best for us. He also wants us to accept the gifts he has given and to enjoy them. "And also that every man should eat and drink, and enjoy the good of all his labor, it is the gift of God." (Ecclesiastes 3:13)

A quick reading of the Old Testament might convince us that God was more concerned with getting sacrifices from man than he was in giving gifts to man. A more in depth study, however, shows that God wanted people to enjoy the gifts he had given them, even when he was expecting sacrifices. For

example in Deuteronomy 14:22-23, the Hebrew people were expected to bring a yearly tithe to give to the Lord, but then God wanted them to use that tithe to have a feast so they could enjoy what he had given them. In fact in vs 24-26 he makes it clear that if the place where they go to worship is too far, then they should sell their tithe and bring money. Look what God wants them to do with the money: "And you may spend the money for whatever your heart desires, for oxen, or sheep, or wine, or strong drink, or whatever your heart desires; and there you shall eat in the presence of the LORD your God and rejoice, you and your household. (Deuteronomy 14:26).

The people were being taught that they needed to come to God and then to accept his gift. He was training people to be ready to come to him and to accept the greatest gift he would ever give them. "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life." (John 3:16)

Trusting Jesus for salvation is about being willing to accept a gift from God. "For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God; not as a result of works, that no one should boast."

God loves you and wants you to enjoy life. Sin may seem enjoyable for a time, but it leads to misery and death. If we follow God's plan for our lives, we will find much more enjoyment as we find fulfillment in his best gifts. ## Financial Focus

### How should you respond to market cycles?

The movement of the financial markets can seem mysterious — and yet, if we look back over long periods, we can see definite patterns that consistently repeat themselves. As an investor, how should you respond to these market cycles?

To begin with, it's useful to know something about the nature of a market cycle and its connection to the business or economic cycle, which describes the fluctuations of the economy between periods of growth and contraction. Issues such as employment, consumer spending, interest rates and inflation can determine the stage of the business cycle. On the other hand, the market cycle refers to what's happening in the financial markets — that is, the performance of all the different types of investments.

The market cycle often anticipates the business cycle. In other words, the stock market may peak, or hit bottom, before the business cycle does the same. That's partially because the financial markets are always looking ahead. If they foresee an event that could boost the business cycle and help the economy, such as the Federal Reserve lowering interest rates, they may become more "bullish" on stocks, thus driving the market up. Conversely, if

the markets think the business cycle will slow down and the economy will contract, they may project a decline in corporate earnings and become more "bearish" on stocks, leading to a market drop.

Once you're familiar with the nature of market cycles, you won't be surprised when they occur. But does that mean you should base your investment strategy on these cycles?

Some people do. If they believe the market cycle is moving through a downward phase, they may try to cut their perceived losses by selling stocks — even those with strong fundamentals and good prospects — and buying lower-risk investments. While these "safer" investments may offer more price stability and a greater degree of preservation of principal, they also won't provide much in the way of growth potential. And you'll need this growth capacity to help reach your long-term goals, including a comfortable retirement.

On the other hand, when investors think the market cycle is moving upward, they may keep investing in stocks that have become overpriced. In extreme cases, unwarranted investor enthusiasm can lead to events such as the dotcom bubble, which led to a sharp market decline

from 2000 through 2002.

Rather than trying to "time" the market, you may well be better off by looking past its cycles and following a long-term, "all-weather" strategy that's appropriate for your goals, risk tolerance, time horizon and need for liquidity. And it's also a good idea to build a diversified portfolio containing U.S. and foreign stocks, U.S. Treasury securities and other investments. While diversification can't protect against all losses, it can help protect you from market volatility that might primarily affect just one asset class.

Market cycles often draw a lot of attention, and they are relevant to investors in the sense that they can explain what's happening in the markets. Yet, when it comes to investing, it's best not to think of cycles but rather of a long journey — one that, when traveled carefully, can lead to the destinations you seek.

## A Laundry List of Bad Ideas

Two years ago, Democrats in Congress passed the so-called Inflation Reduction Act. At that time, they claimed that the bill would bring down inflation and reduce the budget deficit. Two years later, it's clear that those promises haven't come to pass.

To begin with, the bill's title is outright deceptive. Even before it became law, it wasn't expected to do much to combat inflation – inflation that Democrats created in the first place. Economists later agreed it did little, if anything, to combat the inflation crisis. And even President Biden acknowledged that the Inflation Reduction Act had "nothing to do with inflation."

Democrats' claim that it would reduce the deficit also proved to be untrue. The cost of the bill's provisions has grown to such an extent that it's not only not going to reduce the deficit, it's likely to add to it.

The bill did, however, spend more than a trillion dollars on Green New Deal policies and hit conventional energy producers with burdensome

tax hikes. It reads like a laundry list of wasteful spending, doling out taxpayer dollars for planting trees, purchasing zero-emission garbage trucks and postal delivery vehicles, and even grants for climate-related political activity.

Then there are the tax credits for well-off Americans to buy an electric vehicle. Perhaps the Biden administration's signature environmental policy is effectively forcing the widespread adoption of electric vehicles (EVs), and the Inflation Reduction Act was a big part of that push. The other part – new regulations from the administration forcing automakers to electrify a huge portion of their fleets in the next few years – is driving up the cost of the law.

Besides the fact that many Americans have legitimate concerns about electric vehicles, or just don't want one, the Biden administration's push for EVs comes at a time when our electric grid is barely keeping up with existing demand. Plugging in millions of cars is sure to further strain our electrical grid and lead

to higher prices, and possibly blackouts.

Of course, this was also the bill that funneled \$80 billion in new funding to the Internal Revenue Service, most of which was earmarked for increased audits and enforcement to fund Democrats' Green New Deal vision. And it also included price controls on prescription drugs, which one analysis projects will result in 135 fewer new drugs available to patients. We are already seeing that projection come true as multiple drug companies have halted new research as a result of the new law.

The Inflation Reduction Act not only did not address inflation, it's contributing to a host of bad outcomes for the American people. It's a laundry list of bad ideas, from unrealistic Green New Deal policies to costly taxes and irresponsible spending. And this bill represents only a portion of the reckless taxing and spending Democrats would like to do if they again have the power to do it.



## Communities Affected by Floods and Fentanyl

### BIG Update

This week, I held another telephone town hall to hear from South Dakotans. I hop on the phone and thousands of people join to ask questions and hear from me. We covered a host of topics like the assassination attempt on President Trump, the Olympics, the border, government spending, and so much more.

### BIG Idea

Fentanyl is destroying lives and families. We know most of this fentanyl is coming from China and we must put policies into place to stop it from flowing across our border. During the Select Committee on China's Fentanyl Policy Working Group meeting this week, I heard from experts on how the United States has used sanctions to address the fentanyl epidemic in the past, and how Congress can strengthen and use sanctions to target the root cause of the epidemic.

The "Achilles Heel" of the fentanyl epidemic is the legitimate commercial interests of many Chinese fentanyl manufacturers. Unlike the cartels that operate in a solely illegal way to bring fentanyl across the border, the Chinese chemical companies that produce and export fentanyl precursors do so as a "side hustle." Many of these companies have real

businesses that sell legal chemicals to customers around the world. These businesses are uniquely vulnerable to sanctions and would suffer from any economic pressure the United States applies. Congress must take action to stop the flow of Chinese fentanyl into our country.

### BIG News

The floods that devastated southeastern South Dakota in June and July were a once-in-a-thousand-year event. Communities experienced catastrophic flooding after heavy rainstorms. This flood destroyed homes, businesses, and public infrastructure in the North Sioux City and Dakota Dunes areas. The damage is expected to cost tens of millions of dollars to repair, and spans 25 counties in South Dakota. The lives of about six thousand residents have been affected. This is an issue that deserves national assistance.

Last week, Governor Noem submitted the official request for a Presidential major disaster declaration. Immediately following Governor Noem's request, I joined U.S. Senators John Thune and Mike Rounds to urge President Biden to issue a major disaster declaration. We must do what we can to remedy the destruction and assist those who are faced with repairs.

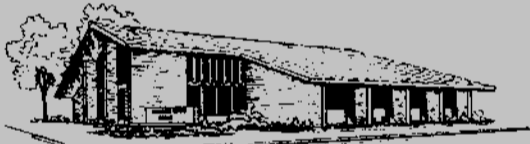
