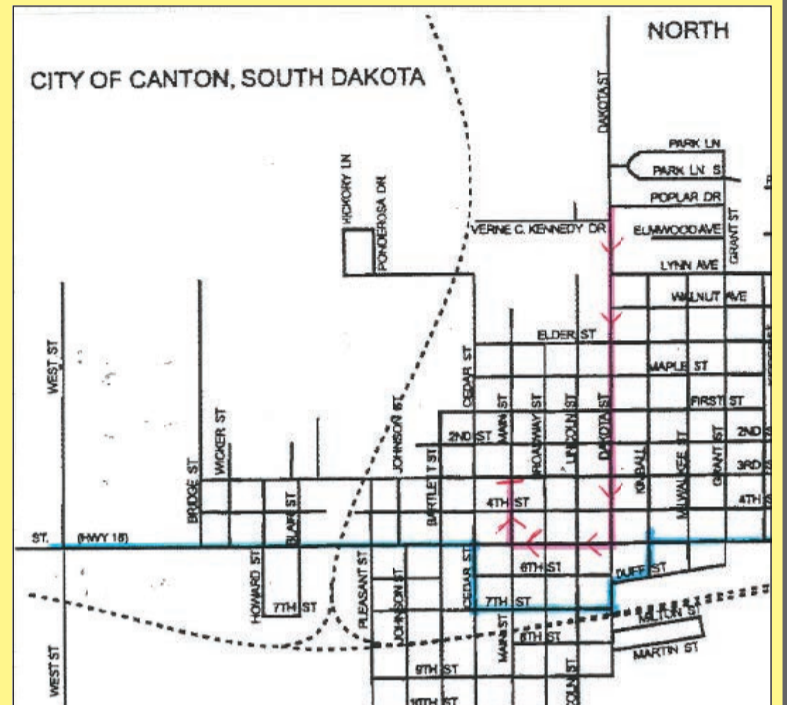

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HISTORY REVISITED

I still remember my first time visiting Mt. Rushmore and being totally amazed by the size and scope of that massive sculpture blasted into solid granite by Gutzon Borglum and a group of ex-miners. Growing up I got to see Mt. Rushmore several more times over the years and it was always a big thrill to visit this place in our state's beautiful Black Hills.

While attending college, I had a summer job working at the State Game Lodge in Custer State Park. On our one day off a week we would head into Custer and sometimes we'd encounter another important sculptor, Korczak Ziolkowski, who was working on the Crazy Horse Memorial. We'd see him in the downtown area and he projected this aura of great vision and energy as he interacted with local townfolk and tourists. To me he seemed bigger than life just like what he was doing with his work on Crazy Horse.

Back in early 1980's Steve Frislie and I set up a 8mm movie camera in the front seat of my Ford Granada and headed due west down I-90. Our destination was Mt. Rushmore. Our trip involved making one of our Haphazard Films and we had set up our camera so it only took a frame every twenty or thirty seconds. (It could have been more or less but I can't remember exactly.) This made it look like we were traveling at a very, very high rate of speed. One second we'd be blasting by Mitchell and a few seconds later we'd flying across the Missouri River at Chamberlain.

We quickly arrived in the parking lot of Mt. Rushmore and set our camera back to

its normal speed. Steve and I had our star dummy, the very bearded and very short, Mr. Z. Boe in tow. The first person we encountered was a young man from California and we quickly talked him into carrying Mr. Z. Boe around and talking to him with Mt. Rushmore looming in the background. I'm quite sure we caused a lot of tourists to scratch their heads and wonder what we were up to. Luckily we weren't approached by security personnel and escorted off the property. It was all in good clean fun and watching these scenes now always brings back a lot of good memories of Steve and those carefree days when I was a much younger man.

At our recent Canton City-Wide Rummage Sale, I picked up a pamphlet published in 1962 by the US Dept. of the Interior and the National Park Service. It tells all about how Mt. Rushmore came to be and that's what I'll be using for my story this week. There's a couple of lines in this pamphlet that really caught my attention. Usually when one is talking about Mt. Rushmore the words "carving" or "carved" are used. Whoever wrote this wanted readers to know that Mt. Rushmore wasn't "carved." It was all measuring, drilling, blasting, drilling, wedging, more drilling and bumping. The word "carving" is only a figure of speech when talking about how the Four Faces came to be.

Happy reading as October and this year's harvest unfolds. And please keep Bill and Vicki Peterson and their extended family in your thoughts and prayers. My condolences and love.

Mount Rushmore National Memorial

On the granite face of 6,000 foot high Mount Rushmore in the Black Hills of South Dakota the likenesses of four great Americans have been sculptured. The four men are George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln, and Theodore Roosevelt. Each likeness is carved out of solid granite and measures about 60 feet from chin to forehead. Gutzon Borglum sculptured the models and directed the work. The Washington figure is finished as far as the shoulders, adding to the overall dimensions of the group. This group of sculptured figures is one of the largest ever undertaken. The heads are in the proportion of men 465 feet high. Each head is twice as high as the head of the great Sphinx of Egypt.

The four great Americans represented here stand as giants among the Presidents of the first century and a quarter of our Nation's history. They built well in the development of our democratic processes of government, and are honored here because of it.

Gutzon Borglum, the noted sculptor selected to execute the carvings, began work on the granite face of Mount Rushmore, August 10, 1927, the same day that President Calvin Coolidge dedicated the memorial. The real, organized work of drilling and blasting stone, however, began on October 4 and continued, with many lapses cause by lack of funds and unfavorable weather, for nearly 14 years until death stayed Borglum's hand in March 1941.

Borglum used at Mount Rushmore the engineering methods he had evolved at Stone Mountain in Georgia. The first step was to blast away the surface rock until a point was reached where a solid granite face, unbroken by the deep fissures lining and crosschecking the face of the mountain was exposed. The work was done by drills, jackhammers, and dynamite. Borglum trained a group of ex-miners to do the work. All the drilling and blasting was done on the basis of measurements obtained from a model.

After about 6 1/2 years of actual work extending over a period of more than 14 years, the work on the sculptures came to an end in October 1941. Borglum himself had died 7 months earlier at the age of 74, leaving the final work to his son, Lincoln Borglum. The latter spent the remaining available money on Roosevelt's face (which was never completed) finishing the lapels and collar of Washington's coat, blocking out Jefferson's collar, and putting some last touches on Lincoln's head.

Carving of the sculptures was authorized by act of Congress in 1925. By another act in 1929, The Mount Rushmore National Memorial Commission was created. In 1938 Congress designated not more than 1,5000 acres of Federal lands in Harney National Forest for the memorial. In 1939, the National Park Service, U.S. Dept. of the Interior, assumed responsibility for the administration of the memorial. This memorial contains an area of about two square miles.

Round 'Em Up

"There's nothing better for the inside of a man than the outside of a horse." That quote hung on a gate on our family farm and ranch growing up. It wasn't until years later that I realized who said those words: the Gipper himself, President Ronald Reagan.

We have two incredible events in late September in South Dakota that showcase just how much men and women can accomplish on "the outside of a horse." On the last Friday in September, we celebrate the Buffalo Roundup at Custer State Park. And that same Thursday through Saturday, cowboys and cowgirls ride horses (and bulls) at the Governor's Cup in Sioux Falls. Our western heritage is celebrated on both sides of the state in just one weekend - I love it!

The Buffalo Roundup might be my very favorite event on the calendar every year. It's quite a spectacle as 1,500 bison thunder through our beautiful Custer State Park. It's also a celebration of America's history.

Less than 150 years ago, there were fewer than 1,000 bison left alive in the United States. That number is over 500,000 today largely thanks to our state bison herd at Custer State Park. The legendary Scotty Philip started our state herd and became known as "the man who saved the Buffalo."

When I was in Congress, I led efforts to name the bison as America's National Mammal, and we got that bill passed in 2016. And I hold the years that I've helped round up the bison at our annual Buffalo Roundup among my most precious memories. About 20,000 visitors join us every year (we actually broke our record in 2023 at more than 22,500). If you haven't seen it for yourself, you should join us next year!

The Governor's Cup is the final event in the CINCH Playoffs - meaning it is the final opportunity to qualify for the National Finals Rodeo. This is the second year running that we've held this fantastic rodeo in Sioux Falls. Dozens of the best rodeo cowboys and cowgirls duke it out for a \$1 million purse, making it "The Richest Rodeo in South Dakota History."

Rodeo is our state sport in South Dakota, and I've prioritized bringing the biggest and best rodeo competitions to our state. 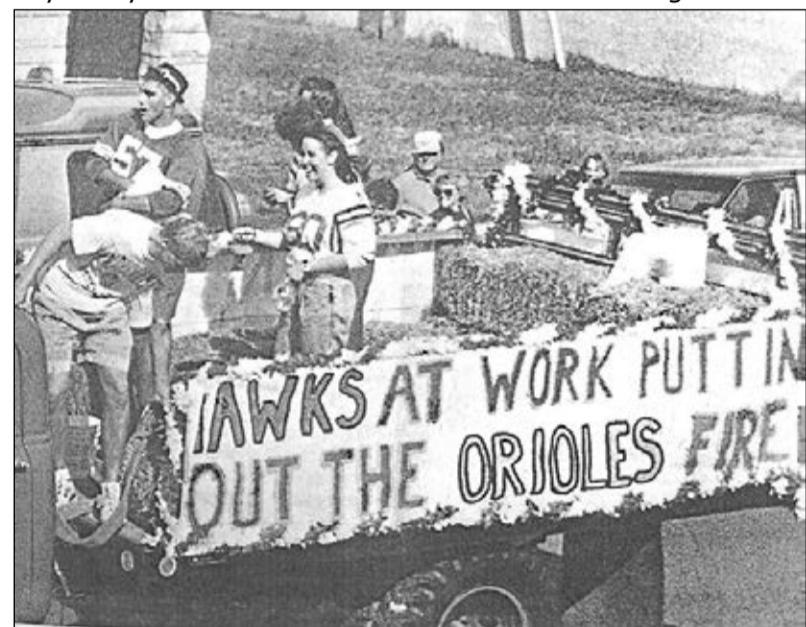

Broadband Blunders Leave Americans Disconnected

President Biden promised that his infrastructure law would make high-speed internet "available everywhere in America," and he put Vice President Harris in charge of broadband initiatives to accomplish that goal. Three years later, this administration's signature broadband program – the \$42 billion Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) program – has not connected a single household to the internet. In fact, not a single BEAD project has started construction and none are expected to begin until sometime next year or later.

So what's taking so long? The BEAD program is a sad story of government inefficiency and progressivism run amok. Rather than focusing on delivering broadband service to unserved areas, the Biden-Harris administration chose to load up the BEAD program with a wish list of requirements that Congress never envisioned. There are climate change mandates, biased technology mandates, it prioritizes government-owned networks, union labor, and DEI hiring practices; and it even attempts to impose price controls

in direct violation of the law. As a result, what should have been a straightforward application and approval process has become a mess.

Then there's the Biden-Harris administration's poor implementation of the program. During debate on the bill that authorized the program, I expressed reservations about the agency tasked with running it. The National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) has previously fumbled administering broadband expansion programs with much smaller budgets than the \$42 billion now under its charge. Not to mention another agency, the Federal Communications Commission, has the expertise and capacity to better administer broadband deployment programs like BEAD.

Unfortunately, my fears have been realized. One state official testifying before Congress said this of the program's implementation: "NTIA's functional requests are akin to building a plane while flying it without having the necessary instructions to be successful. NTIA has provided either no

guidance, guidance given too late, or guidance changing midstream, all with a lack of appreciation for state operations and costs and the needs of our telecommunication providers." Another state official called BEAD "the most burdensome federal program" she has ever managed.

While the president touts his administration's efforts on expanding internet access, the reality is hardly worthy of boasting. And the vice president seems to have been about as effective as the "broadband czar" as she has as the "border czar," which is to say she has failed at both. Three years into a \$42 billion program, not a single dollar has been allocated, not a single project has begun, and not a single household is better off.

Rural and unserved communities were promised an internet connection, but this administration's mandates and poor management have prevented that connection from being delivered. My Republican colleagues and I will continue our oversight efforts into the failure of this program – unfortunately, it's one of many failures we've seen of the Biden-Harris administration.

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Build Dakota Scholarships Fill Jobs With Homegrown Talent

When Alexis Myers tore a knee ligament the second week of practice as a senior high school basketball player in Ethan, South Dakota, it was a low point in her young life.

"There were so many emotions," she said. "Being out for the season was really tough."

That time away from her teammates was spent with medical professionals who prepared her for knee surgery and helped her recover, exposing Myers to a new vision for her future.

One of the physician assistants at Avera Health mentioned the Build Dakota Scholarships, a cooperative effort to fill high-need technical jobs in the state with homegrown vocational talent.

About six months later, after graduating from Ethan High School in 2022, Myers participated in a "signing day" at Southeast Technical College in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, where students sit at a table in front of family and other supporters and sign letters of intent to accept Build Dakota grants.

Myers, 21, who was sponsored by Avera to become a certified surgical technologist, earned her degree in two years and is now a surgical tech at Avera Queen of Peace Hospital in Mitchell, South Dakota, working alongside many of the same people who helped treat her knee injury.

"Coming out of school debt-free and having a degree and a job in two years is amazing," Myers said. "I didn't expect a bad situation to turn into a good outcome, but that's what happened."

Build Dakota fills high-demand jobs from within

This year marks the 10th anniversary of the Build Dakota Scholarships, a partnership among First Premier Bank, the state of South Dakota and industry partners to address workforce development in a state with one of the nation's lowest employment rates.

Nearly 3,400 high school graduates have received the grants, which provide the full cost of tuition in exchange for a pledge to work for a South Dakota company in the student's field of training for at least three years.

It's a different strategy than the \$9 million "Freedom Works Here" ad campaign spearheaded by Gov. Kristi Noem, whose goal was to lure skilled workers from out of state to fill 20,000 open jobs in high-demand occupations such as nursing, plumbing, welding and dentistry.

A survey of South Dakota economic development organizations by News

Watch found that industry leaders heard anecdotal evidence of people moving to town but couldn't tie new workers in high-demand fields to the "Freedom Works Here" campaign with any hard data.

Build Dakota offers a way to keep things in state with tangible connections between employers and the students who are trained for specific jobs, said First Premier CEO Dana Dykhouse, who chairs the scholarship board.

"When you talk about plumbers and electricians, it's hard to get those people to uproot their lives and move to another state," said Dykhouse. "If I'm an electrician in Indiana, my wages are about the same as an electrician in South Dakota. Our focus is on targeting our students at home."

Scholarships help boost tech school enrollment

The grants are given at South Dakota's four technical schools — Lake Area Technical College in Watertown, Mitchell Technical College in Mitchell, Southeast Technical College in Sioux Falls and Western Dakota Technical College in Rapid City.

The program has helped boost tech school enrollment in the state to an overall head count of 7,407 in fall 2024, up 7.1% from the previous year.

Data from the state's Board of Technical Education shows that 87% of students who graduated in 2022 were working in South Dakota or continuing their education six months after graduation.

At South Dakota's four-year public universities, 53% of 2022 graduates were working for in-state employers one year past their graduation, according to Board of Regents data. That percentage increased to 73% when narrowed to just South Dakota residents.

Cory Clasemann, president of Southeast Technical College, said vocational schools typically have a strong in-state retention rate, but the Build Dakota program elevates that trend by giving students a stake in the process.

"They're making a pledge to work with a South Dakota company," said Clasemann. "It becomes a real incentive and commitment to remain in South Dakota and fill those high-need technical jobs, which is the entire purpose behind the program."

'We want the cream of the crop'

The Build Dakota board handed out 298 scholarships the first year, and that number increased to 533

in 2023-24. The amount of grants given is typically about a third of the applications received, according to Dykhouse.

"There are many other scholarships available," he said. "But for Build Dakota, if we're gonna give them a free education, we really want the cream of the crop, and we want the ones that are going to stay here and be valuable employees."

Of the students who received Build Dakota grants since 2014, half are either still attending school or are in the South Dakota workforce, while 22% have completed the program. Nearly a third (30%) didn't fulfill their commitment, of which 20% are in repayment and 8% have repaid in full.

Some of those who didn't honor the three-year work requirement took jobs in other states, where their employer offered to pay off their loan, Dykhouse said.

Ad campaign to highlight tech education

For Myers, now working as a surgical tech in Mitchell and living at home in Ethan, the challenge of rehabbing her knee injury led to rewarding opportunities.

She briefly entered a game and scored a basket at the Corn Palace in Mitchell late in the 2021-22 season, providing a feel-good moment after missing most of her senior year.

Then came the signing day ceremony at Southeast Tech, an annual summer event modeled after the tradition of high school athletes announcing their college choice surrounded by fanfare and family. On this occasion, students were preparing to study vocations as varied as automotive technology, sports turf management, construction management, computer programming and veterinary tech.

"I was hesitant about going (to signing day) because I'm sort of an introvert and didn't want to be the center of attention," said Myers. "But I'm glad I did it. Getting the scholarship is really rewarding, so to be able to celebrate with the people who got you there is great."

Now Myers works at Avera Queen of Peace, preparing operating rooms, arranging equipment, ensuring sterilization and helping doctors and first assistants during surgeries. She's one of 200 students that Avera has sponsored through the Build Dakota program over the past five years.

BIG Update

Port workers at East and Gulf Coast ports are threatening to strike on October 1 if they can't reach an agreement with their employers. A port strike would be devastating to the economy, costing \$5 billion each day. Not only is there a financial impact, but a strike would create a weeks or month-long backlog of shipments. These ports handle nearly half of our agricultural exports to international markets, especially during harvest time. More than half of imported apparel and shoes come through these ports, and a strike could significantly delay gifts for Christmas, which is quickly approaching. I hope both sides can reach an agreement before Tuesday to prevent another supply chain crunch.

I joined Fox Business to talk about the repercussions of a port strike.

BIG Idea

This week, I met with the Associated General Contractors to discuss Biden's harmful Project Labor Agreement rule, which is hamstringing our contractors' ability to bid on projects and could cause delays for the work at Ellsworth Air Force Base. I recently hosted a roundtable in Rapid City to talk to more contractors about the impact this rule will have on their business.

I've been working to stop this burdensome rule to keep our construction projects on time and on budget.

When veterans returned home from the war, many weren't received with gratitude for his or her service. I've partnered with the Vietnam War Commemoration project to give Vietnam-era veterans a long-awaited, proper welcome home. During each ceremony, I hear stories of the veterans' life and service, shake their hand, and give them a pin that says, "A grateful nation thanks and honors you."

I've hosted pinning ceremonies big and small across the state and was recently notified by the Department of Defense that I am a "Top Performer" for being in the top 15% of participating organizations for the number of veterans we have honored.

100 Years Ago This Month: Historical events from October 1924

The month of October has been home to many historical events over the years. Here's a look at some that helped to shape the world in October 1924.

- The Irish Army, the Irish Naval Service, the Irish Air Corps, and the Reserve Defence Forces unify on October 1 to form Ireland's Defence Forces.
- Commissioner of baseball Kenesaw Mountain Landis bans two members of the New York Giants, player Jimmy O'Connell and coach Cozy Dolan, on October 1. O'Connell and Dolan were charged with offering a Philadelphia Phillies player a \$500 bribe to throw a game on September 27.
- Carlos José Solórzano is elected President of Nicaragua on October 5. President Solórzano is overthrown less than two years later.
- Radio Marconi begins broadcasting from Rome on October 6. The station is the first radio station in Italy for the general public.
- The Council of People's Commissars in the Soviet Union declares an amnesty for all participants in the August Uprising on October 7. The uprising was an unsuccessful insurrection against Soviet rule in the Georgian Soviet Socialist Republic.
- Grant Park Stadium in Chicago is dedicated on October 9. The stadium, which is renamed Soldier Field on Veterans Day in 1925, eventually becomes the home of the Chicago Bears.
- American baseball player Jake Daubert dies on October 9 at the age of 40. Daubert died of complications from an appendectomy after avoiding surgery to play in the Cincinnati Reds' final home game.
- The holy city of Mecca is captured by the Wahhabi Muslims on October 13. The capture of

Mecca is part of the conquest of Hejaz by the Saudi kingdom of Nejd.

- Lido Anthony Iacocca is born in Allentown, Pennsylvania, on October 15. Iacocca would become one of the most influential American automotive executives of the twentieth century.
- Inmate Adolf Hitler issues a statement on October 16 admitting he was born in the Austro-Hungarian Empire and not in Germany. Hitler would not become a German citizen until 1932.
- President Calvin Coolidge hosts a breakfast at the White House for various well-known Broadway actors on October 17. The event, staged just weeks before Election Day, is considered a groundbreaking

City Monarchs of the Negro National League 5-0 to win the Colored World Series on October 20.

- British Fascist William Joyce is slashed with a razor while attending a meeting of Conservatives in London on October 22. Joyce later gained notoriety as Nazi propagandist "Lord Haw-Haw" and is ultimately hanged for treason in 1946.
- Voters in Ontario narrowly reject a proposal to end the prohibition of sales of liquor on October 23.
- The British Foreign office releases the Zinoviev letter on October 24. The letter is alleged to be a directive from Moscow addressed to the Communist Party of Great Britain that urges the latter



- event in American political history, marking the first time a campaign utilized a staged event with popular celebrities in an effort to improve a politician's public image.
- Notre Dame defeats Army 13-7 at the Polo Grounds in New York City on October 18. The much-anticipated matchup leads nationally syndicated sportswriter Grantland Rice to write his now famous column in which he dubbed the Notre Dame backfield the "Four Horsemen."
- Ninety people lose their lives in a hurricane that strikes Cuba on October 19. The hurricane is the earliest officially classified Category 5 Atlantic hurricane.
- The Hilldale Club of the Eastern Colored League defeat the Kansas

to increase labor unrest throughout the United Kingdom. Historians now agree the letter was a forgery.

- On October 25, "The Adventure of the Three Garridebs," a short story written by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle and featuring Sherlock Holmes, is published for the first time in Collier's Weekly in the United States.
- Writer Pedro Sainz is among various individuals imprisoned in relation to a meeting of notable Spaniards on October 28. The meeting featured individuals opposed to the dictatorship of Miguel Primo de Rivera. Three days later, Rivera condemns many present at the meeting to solitary confinement for an indefinite period without trial.

DANR Announces Over \$24 Million for Statewide Environmental Projects

The South Dakota Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources (DANR) announced the Board of Water and Natural Resources has approved \$24,416,257 in loans and grants for drinking water, wastewater, and solid waste projects in South Dakota.

The \$24,416,257 total consists of \$24,286,257 in low-interest loans and \$130,000 in grants to be administered by the Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

"I am pleased to announce this financial assistance is available," said DANR Secretary Hunter Roberts. "Safe and reliable water, wastewater, and solid waste infrastructure help protect our environment and strengthen communities for our kids and grandkids."

Funds were awarded from DANR's Drinking Water State Revolving Fund Program, Clean Water State Revolving Fund Program, and Solid Waste Management Program to the following:

Box Elder received a \$2,000,000 Clean Water State Revolving Fund loan to replace sewer mains within the Highway 14/16 corridor and add additional water lines to accommodate recent growth. The project also includes upsizing lines on the west side of town for areas of

new development. The terms of the loan are 3.75 percent for 30 years. Previous funding for this project was awarded in May 2022.

Fort Pierre received a \$2,470,434 Drinking Water State Revolving Fund loan for drinking water system improvements including



construction of a water storage tank, water mains booster station, and other necessary appurtenances. The terms of the loan are 3.75 percent for 30 years. Previous funding for this project was awarded in September 2022.

Lincoln County Rural Water System received a \$1,740,000 Drinking Water State Revolving Fund loan to relocate its existing water main to accommodate a

connection from Highway 11 to Interstate 29. The improvements are necessary due to the growth of Sioux Falls, Harrisburg, and Tea. The terms of the loan are 4.75 percent for 30 years.

Mitchell received a \$13,000,000 Clean Water State Revolving Fund loan for improvements at its wastewater treatment facility. Improvements at the south plant include equalization installation of a new generator and extension of the sewer force main. Improvements at the north plant include the construction of an additional equalization basin. Previous funding was awarded in April 2022. The terms of the loan are 3.75 percent for 30 years.

Pierre received a \$5,075,823 Drinking Water State Revolving Fund loan to replace the existing force main under Euclid Avenue due to the existing infrastructure's age and condition. The terms of the loan are 3.75 percent for 30 years.

South Eastern Council of Governments received a \$100,000 Solid Waste Management Program grant to recapitalize its Economic Revolving Loan Fund to originate loans for eligible purchases. This funding allows the Council to provide low-interest loans for solid waste management and recycling projects in the region.

Walworth County received a \$30,000 Solid Waste Management Program grant to construct a cold storage facility at the landfill to store and perform maintenance on landfill equipment.

The Solid Waste Management Program provides loans and grants for solid waste disposal, recycling, and waste tire projects. The Legislature annually appropriates dedicated funding for the Solid Waste Management Program through the Omnibus Water Funding Bill.

The State of South Dakota and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency fund the Clean Water and Drinking Water State Revolving Fund Programs, which provide low-interest loans for wastewater, stormwater, water conservation, nonpoint source projects, and public drinking water system projects. The programs are funded through a combination of federal appropriations, loan repayments, and bonds.

The board approved the funding at today's meeting in Pierre.

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Q&A: South Dakota's food tax repeal measure

Sophie Stoffers carried groceries to her car in a Sioux Falls Hy-Vee parking lot and pondered a question from a reporter.

Would Initiated Measure 28, an effort on the Nov. 5 ballot to eliminate South Dakota's sales tax on food, make life better for her?

"I'm always a fan of saving money," said Stoffers, 24, who recently moved to Sioux Falls and works as an assistant athletic trainer at Augustana University. "But I don't know much about (the measure). I need to hear the pros and cons before voting."

According to U.S. Department of Agriculture data, an average family of four in South Dakota spends about \$1,200 a month on food purchased at a store and prepared at home. Eliminating the 4.2% tax on food would save that household \$50.40 a month, or about \$600 a year.

Stoffers and her boyfriend have noticed grocery bills ticking upward. She'll glance at the receipt on the way out of the store and try to cut back on nonessential items.

But that's a long way from breaking down the ramifications of a sales tax cut on consumables, especially with differing viewpoints of what IM 28 will do.

Opponents pounced on the wording of the measure as broader than just groceries. They said it could cause a budget crunch by preventing the state from collecting sales tax on "consumable" items such as tobacco, toothpaste and toilet paper.

Estimates for the loss of state revenue range from \$124 million to \$646 million annually.

From a consumer perspective, national data shows that while the rate of inflation on food has softened, the price of grocery staples such as beef and eggs increased by 3.2% over the past year.

"This is the right thing to do," said Rick Weiland, co-founder of Dakotans for Health, the petition-gathering group whose tax repeal effort was certified for the ballot with 22,315 signatures.

Assessing that statement means wading through a litany of factors, from legal language and tax policy to the ongoing conflict between a Republican-led Legislature and progressive groups that pursue policy change through citizen initiatives.

Here are the most pressing questions surrounding IM 28 as the November vote approaches:

What's the argument for grocery tax repeal?

Supporters call the measure a long-overdue effort to take the tax burden off low-income families and individuals. South Dakota and Mississippi are the only states that fully tax food without offering credits or rebates.

The basic premise for eliminating the grocery tax is to make it easier for people to put food on the table within the constraints of their household budget.

"The tax is quite regressive," Anna Phillips, an analyst at the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities in Washington, told News Watch. "If you look at the percentage of household income spent on groceries, low-income earners spend roughly double the percentage of their income that high-income earners do on groceries. So this is going to make more of a meaningful difference to families who are currently struggling to get by."

Feeding South Dakota, the state's largest hunger relief organization, estimates that about 106,000 people in South Dakota, more than 11%, are food insecure, which means they lack reliable access to enough affordable, nutritious food. Of that number, 1 out of 6 are children.

Has this been tried before?

South Dakota's grocery tax has been a target of legislative reform for decades, mostly by Democrats.

In 2004, the South Dakota Democratic Party gathered enough signatures to put a state food tax repeal on the ballot after legislative attempts to eliminate the tax fell short.

Opponents of the effort, including then-Gov. Mike Rounds, warned that passing the repeal would likely reduce the amount of state aid available for schools and health care.

Voters responded to that message and rejected the measure by a margin of 68% to 32%. Later attempts by state legislators to lower the tax on food or exempt groceries from the general sales tax rate also failed.

Weeks before being re-elected in November 2022, Republican Gov. Kristi Noem made a public pledge to preside over "the largest tax cut in state history," a full repeal of the grocery tax. She vouched for its affordability and noted that voters might pass the repeal if lawmakers didn't.

But legislators rejected Noem's proposal during the 2023 session, opting instead to temporarily reduce the overall sales tax rate from 4.5% to 4.2%, with a sunset (or expiration) of 2027.

What's the main argument against it?

There are fiscal consequences to eliminating the tax. Sales taxes are the largest source of state government revenue in South Dakota, one of seven states without a state income tax.

Phillips stressed that, while eliminating the grocery tax is a good

way to advance racial and economic equity, states should pursue full repeals with caution due to budgetary impacts.

It's important to remember that state revenue lost from eliminating the grocery tax would be on top of the \$104 million estimated annual revenue loss from the overall sales tax cut passed by legislators in 2023.

So the question becomes: Can South Dakota afford to do this without having to cut important programs elsewhere or adding another tax?

Opponents of the measure answer that with a resounding no, citing what they said are ambiguous and problematic wording in the ballot measure.

The specific language of IM 28 prohibits the state from collecting sales tax on "anything sold for human consumption, except alcoholic beverages and prepared food."

Nathan Sanderson, executive director of the South Dakota Retailers Association, said that wording is so vague that it could prevent the state from collecting sales tax on "consumable" items such as tobacco, toothpaste and toilet paper.

The Legislative Research Council took that a step further in a report to state legislators in July, extrapolating the "human consumption" definition to include propane and motor fuel and services rendered by a plumber or landscaper.

Weiland countered that it was the LRC and attorney general's office that questioned earlier language in IM 28, which led to the current framework.

He called for common sense, saying interpretations of the measure should be shaped by the stated intent of petitioners to target taxes on food and drink.

"You don't drink gasoline," Weiland said. "You don't eat services."

What kind of budget crunch are we talking about?

Well, it's complicated.

Not even the LRC, which provides statutory and legal guidance for proposed ballot initiatives, has been consistent on what the impact will be.

Reed Hollweger, who resigned as LRC director during a meeting of the Legislature's executive board in October 2023, addressed the potential for differing interpretations of "anything sold for human consumption" in a fiscal note sent to the secretary of state as required by law in January 2023.

"For purposes of this fiscal note," he wrote, "the LRC assumes the phrase only includes food items because of the modifying language 'except alcoholic beverages and prepared food' and does not include personal tangible property and services, both of which can also be sold for human consumption. Other assumptions as to the meaning of this phrase may be just as reasonable, if not more so."

With that qualification, the fiscal note said that the state could see a reduction in sales tax revenue of \$123.9 million annually.

Sanderson estimated to News Watch in June that IM 28 would result in a budget downturn of at least \$176 million annually because it would include tobacco products, defined in state law as "any item made of tobacco intended for human consumption."

Then came the kitchen-sink estimate the LRC presented to legislators as an update in July – a worst-case scenario analysis that said the budget impact could soar as high as \$646 million annually.

So which number is right?

The official fiscal note produced by Hollweger uses the \$123.9 million figure, while Attorney General Marty Jackley's ballot statement noted that human consumption "is not defined by state law, but its common definition includes more than just food and drinks."

Jackley's statement also said that "judicial or legislative clarification of the measure will be necessary." That's the one thing that both sides agree upon.

Any judicial review will likely involve trying to find a "harmonious

reading" of the conflicting statutes or language, according to Neil Fulton, dean of the University of South Dakota School of Law and former chief of staff to Rounds.

"The goal is to identify the intent of the enacting Legislature, or the people in this instance," Fulton told News Watch. "Commonly, that's found from the text alone because it's free of ambiguity. But if the context or other aspects of the enactment lead to a different reading, or when a statute can be read multiple ways, the guiding star is, 'What did the people intend?'"

How much of a problem is IM 28's wording?

Phillips, the policy analyst, said the measure should have stipulated that the tax rate will be changed to 0% rather than saying the state "may not tax" consumables.

Eliminating the tax entirely would likely put South Dakota out of alignment with the Streamlined Sales Tax Project, a cooperative effort of states, local governments and the business community that standardizes collection of sales tax, she said.

"That agreement makes administration easier across states, both for vendors who have to comply with sales and use taxes as well as tax administrators," said Phillips. "So removing the tax entirely on groceries will take South Dakota out of that agreement, which would be unfortunate."

South Dakota could also lose revenue from the Tobacco Master Settlement Agreement, a 1998 pact among 46 states and major cigarette manufacturers as part of litigation for health care costs and deceptive trade practices.

Jackley has said that not taxing tobacco could jeopardize South Dakota's share of that settlement, which amounts to about \$20 million annually.

As for the "anything sold for human consumption" language, Phillips pointed to more specific wording used by Oklahoma legislators in a bipartisan effort to reduce the state's tax on food and food ingredients to 0% earlier this year.

To stay aligned with the streamlined sales tax, the Oklahoma law defines food and food ingredients as "substances, whether in liquid, concentrated, solid, frozen, dried, or dehydrated form, that are sold for ingestion or chewing by humans and are consumed for their taste or nutritional value."

That's essentially the same standardized language found in South Dakota law, which Hollweger said in a letter to Dakotans for Health in 2022 would "likely apply" to the LRC's original suggested language for the measure.

The Oklahoma law also states that the 0% tax rate does not apply to alcoholic beverages, dietary supplements, marijuana products, prepared food or tobacco.

Phillips said the differences between Oklahoma's law and IM 28 underscore the difficulty of articulating complex tax policy through a ballot measure, which needs to be clear to voters and cannot encompass more than one subject under South Dakota law.

Fixing that language "shouldn't be difficult to do," she said. "I would imagine the Legislature would have a bit of an incentive to do it because they don't want to blow that hole in their budget."

What will legislators do if it passes?

Because IM 28 is an initiated measure, not a constitutional amendment, legislators have more power to craft the policy.

For instance, they can adjust the language to align with the definition found in South Dakota law, removing some of the unintended consequences cited by IM 28's opponents.

"The counter to many of these complaints (about wording) is that

the Legislature has eight months to fix it," said Michael Card, an emeritus professor of political science at the University of South Dakota. "Part of this back-and-forth is due to efforts to limit the scope of initiated measures, a fight between the dominant (Republican) party and those who want to change laws through the ballot."

Sanderson responded that even if the language is fixed and IM 28 is sharpened to include only groceries, there are still repercussions on top of the earlier general sales tax cut.

Sales tax receipts declined by 2.6% in fiscal year 2024 after gains of 9%, 12.2% and 12.7% the previous three years, according to the South Dakota Bureau of Finance and Management. That dip reflects the earlier sales tax cut and will require action if the state can't tax groceries or other consumables, he said.

"The problem is that IM 28 doesn't have any mechanism for replacing the lost revenue, so the money's going to have to come from somewhere," said Sanderson, who spearheads a coalition that opposes the measure.

"In order to make that up, they're going to have to raise a tax somewhere. That requires a two-thirds vote of a Legislature in which 94 out of 105 are currently Republicans. Are legislators going to vote for a (sales) tax increase to raise revenue? I don't think so. And that's why we've expressed our concerns that if IM 28 passes, it's going to lead to higher property taxes or an income tax (through ballot measure), because the Legislature is simply not going to vote with a two-thirds majority vote to raise the tax."

Weiland called these claims scare tactics meant to influence voters and take the focus away from the merits of a grocery tax repeal.

He referenced past legislative overrides of resident-led initiatives such as IM 22, a campaign finance and ethics reform package approved by voters in 2016 that was later repealed by lawmakers with an emergency clause that ensured it could not be referred back to the ballot.

"I think every concern that's been raised, if in fact it was a real concern and not a campaign tactic, they could address very simply in the upcoming legislative session," said Weiland, a former Democratic candidate for U.S. House and Senate. "What I think they're more likely to do is talk about this \$646 million hole in their budget so they can declare a state of emergency and repeal it like they did with IM 22."

Does Gov. Noem support a grocery tax repeal?

Noem personally testified in committee for her 2023 bill to repeal the grocery tax, based on her campaign pledge.

She pointed to double-digit increases in sales tax revenue in 2021 and 2022 and a budget surplus in 2022 of \$115 million, an outlook boosted by COVID-related federal stimulus and inflation-impacted tax receipts.

The bill ultimately failed, but the message was duly noted by Dakotans for Health and other groups that have pushed for eliminating the grocery tax.

"The Republicans' big argument has always been, 'Oh, we don't have the money to repeal the food tax. It will come on the backs of firefighters and teachers, or we'll have to do a state income tax,'" Weiland said. "Well, the governor took all those arguments and threw them in the trash."

But Jim Terwilliger, the governor's budget director, noted that Noem's proposal would have reduced the state's food tax to 0% rather than eliminating it, addressing concerns about compliance with the streamlined sales tax agreement.

The bill's language aligned with state definitions for food and food ingredients and it spelled out exceptions such as alcohol, tobacco and cannabis.

She warned lawmakers of potential budget fallout if voters passed a grocery tax initiative on top of the general sales tax cut, pointing to public support for such a measure.

Terwilliger told News Watch earlier this year that Noem doesn't support

IM 28 because of concerns about the wording. He added that the governor "still believes a repeal of the grocery tax is the best tax relief for South Dakota families if it is done in a responsible manner," though she didn't mention the repeal in her 2024 budget message or State of the State address.

Can cities and towns still tax groceries if this passes?

Again, it's complicated. The actual wording of the measure states that "municipalities may continue to impose such taxes."

But opponents, including the South Dakota Municipal League, said eliminating the tax, rather than reducing it to 0%, will render local governments unable to impose the food tax because of South Dakota Codified Law 10-52-2.

That law states that cities and towns can charge a sales tax if the tax "conforms in all respects to the state tax ... with the exception of the rate." Eliminating the tax entirely would create problems with state and local alignment, said Sanderson.

"Cities and towns can only tax the same items as the state," he said. "So despite the language in IM 28, if the state cannot charge a tax on 'anything for human consumption,' neither can a municipality."

Rapid City lawyer Jim Leach, who represents Dakotans for Health, called that a flawed analysis. His contention is that IM 28, if it passes, "becomes the law of

South Dakota" and supersedes the existing provisions, "which would allow municipalities to continue to tax food."

Hollweger, in a written statement to News Watch before he resigned, noted that "only the state was specified" in Dakotans for Health's final submission and that municipalities are not legally defined as agencies of the state. "Therefore, LRC concludes the proposed (ballot measure) would not prevent municipalities from imposing a sales tax on food," he wrote.

Hollweger did not respond to an interview request for this story.

Fulton, the USD law school dean, pointed to a legal principle that says when there is a general statute and a more specific law on the same topic, the more specific statute wins out.

"In this instance, the court would be looking at how IM 28 fits, or doesn't fit, with other taxation statutes and giving the right of way to the more specific statute," he said.

What are the alternatives to grocery tax repeal?

Several states use refunded tax credits for low-income brackets in which consumers pay the full sales tax rate on food but recoup some of those added costs by claiming a credit when they file their taxes.

The benefit of this, Phillips said, is that the relief is targeted toward low-income households, which makes it more efficient. Simply cutting the grocery tax affects these low-income groups as well as higher-earning families that are likely not as reliant on state dollars that could be used for other services.

The downside, she added, is that "people are going to have to know to apply for it, especially if you are dealing with people on very low incomes or fixed incomes who may not even file income taxes."

Even for those who do apply, the relief comes once a year during tax season, Phillips noted.

"If you're a family that's living paycheck to paycheck, you would rather take the benefits (every trip to the store) rather than waiting a year from now and getting it in a lump sum, which is harder to budget for," she said.

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What You Need to Know About Referred Law 21

The South Dakota ballot box will determine the future for South Dakota in many ways. One of them is in the form of Referred Law 21, or RL21.

I wish I could sit down with each of you to explain every step that has led to RL21 being on the ballot. We could visit for hours, but following is a brief overview of a complex subject. It is very important for you to understand. It is very important to South Dakota. It is very important to FREEDOM. So here we go.

The World Economic Forum is pushing agendas in many areas that will bring more control to them, and less to individuals. They propose policies that are then adopted by organizations like the United Nations. One of these policies say we must reduce our carbon score. It's called "Net Zero by 2050." This came to the United States in the form of the Inflation Reduction Act, which has a special tax break called 45Q for companies that reduce CO2 in the atmosphere. This translates into billions of dollars for these projects. Where do those billions of dollars come from? The money for these fake projects comes from taxes that hardworking citizens pay.

The 45Q tax credit spurred two carbon pipeline projects in South Dakota: Navigator and Summit

Carbon Solutions. They claimed the right of eminent domain. Summit sued over 160 landowners and several counties in our state. Each company sought a permit from the SD Public Utilities Commission. BOTH companies were DENIED a permit from the PUC. Why? Because they failed to meet one of the core requirements, which states "the company must abide by all applicable laws and rules." Since they could not meet ordinances and setbacks that certain counties had in place, they failed the test. Local control had a voice that day.

Navigator disbanded, but Summit marched ahead. Fast forward to the 2024 legislative session. Many property rights bills were brought forward, with some bringing needed, reasonable reforms. However, only three made it to the finish line. The majority leaders in both chambers dubbed these the "Landowner Bill of Rights." Let's stop right there. As I stated on the floor, these were not the "Landowner Bill of Rights." These were the "Pipeline Bill of Rights." It was the media spin and money in the room that landed these on the Governor's desk. The most egregious of these bills was Senate Bill 201. This bill essentially strips local control away from certain projects that require permitting from the SD PUC.

In South Dakota, we have something most states do not: a referendum process. That means if the people think the legislature got it wrong, they can refer the decision to the voters. The hurdle is getting 17,000 plus petition signatures in 90 days. South Dakotans across 66 counties went to work, and over 31,000 signatures were collected. Since that time, MANY informational meetings have and continue to be held across the state.

One thing that was argued again and again in the legislature is that these companies did not meet the requirements for eminent domain, which included them being considered a common carrier carrying a commodity. This summer a HUGE ruling came down from the SD Supreme Court. The court ruled that Summit Carbon Solutions had not proved that it met the conditions of common carrier or that it was carrying a commodity. This brought validation to many who had argued this very thing for three years.

All of these things contribute to information you should have before voting on RL21.

I'll tell you my top 3 reasons to vote NO on RL21. I could list MANY, but let's keep it simple:

1) Takes away local control in section 6 of the bill. The denial of a permit based on following



applicable laws and rules is now removed. "A permit for the construction of a transmission facility...supersedes and preempts any county, township, municipal, or any other governmental unit land use, zoning, or building rule, regulation, or ordinance."

2) Many legislators filed a dissent upon passage of this bill, stating reasons that it is Unconstitutional.

3) Sets a precedent for out of state and possibly foreign backed companies to have only one centralized government hoop to

jump through. The government that is closest to the people governs best. Let's make sure that we continue to have checks and balances here in our state. The PUC process we presently have works well in conjunction with our process of ordinances and setbacks instituted by local governments.

South Dakota is NOT for sale. Please VOTE NO ON RL 21.
