
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There's No Place Like Home





The newest addition to the Canton Volunteer Fire Department was put into service Sept. 22; an addition that combines the equipment and capabilities of two units into one fire rescue pumper. Canton's former rescue rig was aging and the 1986 Luverne pumper rig was also getting to the age where it would need to be replaced for the fire department.

Instead of buying two rigs, with changes in equipment and layout, the fire department was able to combine the old pumper and rescue trucks into one new rescue/pumper, saving the city approximately \$100,000 because the rescue truck will not have to be replaced. When the final build was done, the truck came in under budget by \$40,000, saving the city even more. The 2014 Smeal pumper/rescue rig, officially Pumper 3, is outfitted with a 1,500 gallon per minute pump, carries 1,000 gallons of water, 20 gallons of foam and is an automatic diesel rig.

HISTORY REVISITED

For this weeks column I will be using information taken from another pamphlet I picked up at the Canton City-Wide Rummage Sale. I assume it was published by the Homestake Mine with help from the Lead Civic Association. It doesn't say when it was actually printed but since the last year mentioned is 1961, I believe it came out then or the following year. For fifteen page pamphlet it contains a lot of information on this mine that was once ranked forth or fifth of the great gold producers in the world.

We can thank two miners attached to Custer's Military Expedition in the Black Hills who first discovered gold on French Creek near the present site of Custer in 1874. Two years later in the northern Black Hills two brothers, Moses and Fred

•Homestake• A South Dakota Gold Mining Enterprise

For fourteen consecutive years preceding World War II, South Dakota was the second largest gold producing state in the Union. California was generally first. In 1949 South Dakota replaced California as the leader and Homestake is now South Dakota's only remaining gold producer.

In 1874 gold was discovered near the present city of Custer. The gold rush of 1875 and 1876 became a stampede after the government's efforts to keep the pioneers from encroaching on the property of the Sioux Indians failed.

In 1880 the first railroad was built in the Black Hills to bring cordwood and timber to the mills in Lead. It was called the Black Hills and Ft. Pierre R.R. Electrification of mining operations began in 1906 with the construction of the first of three hydroelectric plants.

In 1942 the War Production Board Order L-208 suspended all gold mining in the United States. This was rescinded in 1945 and mining and milling operations resumed.

From 1950-1960 a gigantic modernization program was undertaken and new mining techniques, tools and equipment were introduced. There are three active operating shafts. The Ross and the Yates both have a depth of 5,000 feet. The underground shaft, Winze No. 4, reaches from the 4,850-ft level to the 6,200-ft level.

There are approximately 200 miles of tunnels in the mine. Over 100 miles of a narrow gauge railroad system operates underground. There are 31 compressed air locomotives, 24 electric storage battery locomotives, three electric trolley locomotives, 250 one-ton ore cars, 500 automatic side-dump three-ton ore cars and 511 rocker-dump 1 1/2-ton cars in use.

Homestake Annually:

- Mines 1,900,000 tons of ore
- Handles several hundred thousand tons of waste rock
- Sets off over 1,000,000 blasts which explode 4,450,000 sticks of 45% dynamite. End to end they would reach from Lead to Minneapolis. This dynamite requires the consumption of more than 950,000 blasting caps annually. The cost-over \$1,500 per day.

It isn't all work for those employed at Homestake. There is a large brick building built by the mine that is used for a recreation center. It is free to use not only for the employees and their families but also for anyone living in the Lead area. It includes a lounge, game room with billiard and pool tables and a bowling alley with six lanes. On the top floor is a free library with 26,000 books. There is also a swimming pool and a movie theater. In the basement of Christ Church there is a free kindergarten established by Phoebe Hearst, mother of Randolph Hearst. There is also plenty of outdoor recreation that includes softball, baseball, golf, skiing and ice skating.

Over 13,000 people are owners of Homestake. In South Dakota alone over 2,300 people in 60 counties are shareholders in the mine. Homestake is not one man's dream but the dream of thousands, owners and employees together, who have combined their brains, brawn and resources to a common advantage. Approximately 1900 workers supply the technical knowledge and manpower, skills and abilities, so vitally necessary to the success of this operation. Truly Homestake is a fine example of the American Free Enterprise System.

Watch out for investment scams

When you invest, you'll find that knowledge is power. The more you know about your investment choices, and who is offering them, the better prepared you'll be to make good decisions. And this diligence can also help protect you against investment scams.

How widespread is this activity? Consider this: Investment fraud losses totaled more than \$4.5 billion in 2023, according to the FBI's Internet Crime Report.

Here are some common types of scams:

Cryptocurrency – Not all cryptocurrency offers are scams, but many are. The scammers will contact you via social media, claiming they've made a lot of money in crypto and are willing to help you do the same. They may direct you to a website or app to invest, but the "company" taking your money may not even exist, and, after taking your money, may disappear.

Investment programs – These programs claim to have "proven" strategies that can enable you to get rich by investing in financial products. But these strategies are dubious at best and can cost you thousands of dollars that could otherwise go into an investment plan based on your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon.

Real estate – Typically, a real estate scam tries to get you to invest in a

"world-class" or "luxury" property development, but these properties may take years to build, if they're built at all. Also, various real estate "seminars" claim they can teach you how to get wealthy by buying and selling real estate, but these programs are expensive and usually worthless.

Gold and other precious metals – Scammers who call themselves "rare coins" merchants may try to sell you gold coins, bullion or other types of precious metals, claiming that these assets will always go up in value (which isn't true) and that "now is the best time to act." You can find legitimate ways to invest in precious metals, possibly through mutual funds, but you'll need to determine whether these assets can be an appropriate part of your investment portfolio.

So, how can you avoid these scams? Here are some suggestions from the Federal Trade Commission:

- Don't be pushed into snap decisions. Scammers will pressure you to act quickly because "space is limited" in an investment offering or a "special deal" won't last long. If someone won't give you time to consider an offer, it's not worth considering.

- Be suspicious of "risk-free" claims. All investments carry risk, and no variable investments can claim to provide "guaranteed returns." If an

"Incidents Around the House" By: Josh Malerman

Coming in hot with another horror novel to talk about during this spooky fall season. "Incidents Around the House" is a mind-bending supernatural thriller by the same author as the 2018 Netflix hit "Bird Box."

This story is told from the perspective of an 8-year-old girl, Bela. Her family is being targeted by an entity known as her "other mommy" who happens to live in Bela's closet. She comes out to talk to her at night and asks Bela every night if she can "come into her heart." They started off as being friends, but when the incidents that are happening around their house intensify, Bela realizes something is going to have to change. Other Mommy is getting tired of asking Bela the same question and is getting restless and bolder in the way she interacts with the whole family. Her family thinks it is an imaginary friend, albeit creepy one, until Other Mommy reveals herself to her parents and grandmother.

I loved this one because it was fast-paced, I couldn't put it down, and it was genuinely terrifying. Being told from the perspective of a child made it extra creepy. 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

Lincoln County Commissioners Tuesday, September 24

The Lincoln County Commissioners met Tuesday, September 24 in the Lincoln County Boardroom. Commissioners heard agenda items including strategic planning talks, insurance discussions and road improvements.

Assistant Commission Administrative Assistant, Paul Anderson introduced John Beranek from Intersections Consulting to give a presentation on strategic planning. "Strategic planning, to me, is one of those things that can be misunderstood about what it is people want to do. To me, the end result is what is the implementation, not just what's the plan that you put together," he said. Beranek is hoping to bring the community together for more engagement and listening sessions to allow the public to make their concerns before moving into a smaller, strategic planning team. "We researched the iceberg theory, we talk about what are some of those things happening in the community, what's the pattern and trends around them, can we get underneath those underlying structures around it and then what is the mental shift mindset that needs to occur in order to go back up that other side to transform our thinking, design differently, begin to anticipate the problems or issues, and find a wise solution rather than just reacting quickly over and over

and over," he said. Commissioner Schmidt asked Beranek how he plans to incorporate the other towns in Lincoln County into the plan when they each have plans for their own futures. "In the early part of this process we're collecting data, what is the plan that Hudson has, what are other communities doing for baseline data, for some information, and awareness. The other thing is those listening sessions and the third thing is the design team and what do we think we need to do to get to those people who are our champions," Beranek responded. With no board action needed, the Commissioners thanked Beranek for his time. Although no motion was made, Chairman Jibben opened the floor to public comment on the matter. Mark Nordsy (Spelling??) took to the podium. "I live in Northern Lincoln County, Southern Sioux Falls, so I'm part of that constituency. I want to first thank you and applaud you for going ahead with strategic planning, it's a passion of mine as well and I think it's very important for Lincoln County to do that. I was heartened to hear today that the heart of this thing is an implementation plan. That's always the hardest part, it rarely gets done, so it's important that the effort is put into the implementation and I was also excited to hear about metrics, that drives accountability and without that, you just have a pretty binder

on the shelf. The other thing, when they talked about public input, when John talked about how he was going to get public input, I thought it was very important however you chose to do it. Mr. Schmidt's ideas about towns and townships, that's incredible thinking. But some rhetorical questions, is this in the budget? Have you established guidelines as you seek to engage John, how much are you going to allow to be spent? As you go through some of these initiatives, they're going to cost money, they're not going to be free, or free in employee time," he said.

Auditor, Sheri Lund joined the meeting for board action to approve the South Dakota Public Assurance Alliance as the County's property and liability coverage carrier and to authorize the chair to execute an agreement with the Alliance. "We discussed the property and liability coverage so today we're here to decide which way we're going to go," Lund said. Zach Jensen from South Dakota Public Assurance Alliance (SDPAA) was present to answer any questions from the commission. "As I mentioned last time, EMC has had some struggles in the industry and over the last few months putting a proposal together and where things are at now, they've provided everything except an auto proposal and an umbrella proposal. We've had a few auto losses so that portion has been struggling, property as well,

but they did provide a property renewal," he said. The first choice the commission needed to make was to decide if they wanted to join the insurance pool and if they wanted to stay with the \$6 million liability limits. Commissioner Schmidt requested to delay a week so all commission members would be present for the vote, motion failed to get a second and died. Commissioner Arends made a motion to enter into agreement with the SDPAA but with no second, the motion also failed. With no action being taken, the item will be moved to the next meeting.

Auditor Lund gave a presentation regarding the 2025 Lincoln County Budget and budget process. "On September 10 we passed the 2025 budget, so today I just wanted to look at preparation for 2026. Realizing that we do have six months prior to the 2026 budget discussions, but since we have it fresh in our minds, I would like to do a little review of the budget session. My questions would be what worked during that 2025 budget and what did not," she asked. With no feedback, Lund requested committees be set up for future budget items. The two committees would be made up of two commissioners, a representative from the State's Attorney's Office, a representative from the auditor's office, human resources, and the judiciary. "The committee would collect information and present options

to Lincoln County to decide the future of Lincoln County's Public Defenders office," she said. The board agreed that it was something that needed to be looked into and put it as an agenda item for the next meeting.

Chief Civil Deputy State's Attorney, Drew DeGroot joined the meeting for board action to co-sponsor the City of Canton's application to be placed on the State Water Plan and authorize the chair to execute the application. "Previously the board action has been that the board has committed \$725,000 to the improvements of Northwest Avenue in partnership with the City of Canton. We're looking to maximize our dollars, to put it bluntly. We want to try and do whatever we can, we've already committed to improving that road, but what can we do to maximize our dollars and make that road and entrance into the county Justice Center even better. This will start the process of allowing us to seek additional funds with the City of Canton to possibly beef up that road," he said. Motion approved.

DeGroot also asked for board action to approve the bid package from American Engineering Testing, Inc. for the acceptance testing services at the Mary Skie/Lincoln County Airport. "This is a budgeted item of \$5,000, this is also reimbursable through the IP grant," he said. Motion approved.

Lincoln County Commission Tuesday, October 1

The Lincoln County Commission met Tuesday, October 1 in the Lincoln County Boardroom. Commissioners heard agenda items including on-sale liquor license agreement, a new loader, and insurance services.

Commission Recorder, Alicia Cafaro read to the Commission a public hearing to consider an application for a temporary on-sale liquor license to operate outside the municipality for David Derschan, 57015 Bar LLC (Chancellor Bar) for an event to occur on October 5, 2024, located at Prosper Country Warehouse & Event Hall, 46620 278th St., Lennox, SD 57039. Cafaro told the commission that this is the fourth of the six total allotted licenses per year. Motion approved.

Highway Superintendent, Terry Fluit, held a public meeting to discuss the five-year plan for the highway department. "For 2025, the first thing we have is three preservation projects, and all of

said. All projects were awarded preservation grants and Fluit will go to bid shortly on those. The remaining projects for the year are budgeted items and Fluit and his crew are preparing to start those in the spring. The Commission approved the five-year plan for the next year.

Fluit next asked for board action to approve a change order for structure #42-007-040 PCN08XA in the amount of \$29,545. "This is a structure on 272nd, County Road 106, West of Tea, hopefully this one will be open soon. Once the structure was built and they had it in place, we went out there and we didn't feel that the rip wrap went around the bank enough to protect that bank from being washed out and cutting on high water flow. The state agreed and has already approved this as a change order so it will be a full cost to us, but it'll fall within my budget to do this for a project," he said. Motion approved.

Highway Assistant Superintendent, Jared Narum joined the meeting for board action to approve the Highway Department purchase of a replacement wheel loader from Butler Cat in the amount of \$350,021.73 from the Sourcewell contract. "Back in June

in the flood, our Fairview pick got flooded out, and we lost our 2006 950 loader. They ended up pulling 10 gallons of water out of the crank case and a couple gallons out of the transmission. We had Butler Cat do an extensive evaluation of the machine and they came back with a cost on what it would take to fix it and it was around \$147,000. After dealing with EMC insurance, they gave us an estimate of what they're going to pay for what the machine was worth and that was \$87,900. During that time I reached out to Butler Cat to see what it would have been worth if it hadn't been flooded and they got back to me and it was around \$90,000. So I believe what we're getting through insurance on that machine and what it was worth to the dealership is pretty close," he said. The Highway Department is currently renting

a loader at the cost of \$10,000 a month. The insurance company paid a \$5,000 payment towards the rental of equipment, but that was the maximum amount they paid. The item is not a budgeted item, but Narum believes the rental cost is too high to continue renting. Motion approved.

Auditor, Sheri Lund, joined the meeting for board action to approve the South Dakota Assurance Alliance as the County's property and liability coverage carrier and to authorize the chair to execute an agreement with the Alliance. In a three-step process, Lund received full support in authorizing the agreement. The second step involved retroactive coverage. "This action would be for extended reported coverage for property and liability coverage and the cost for the two different

options in front of you. You need to decide first if you want coverage, second which type of coverage do you want and then the term," she said. Commissioner Arends asked what the reasoning for purchasing this insurance was. "This is for the unknown, for the prior to us ending EMC and going to SDPA," she said. Commissioner Landeen made a motion to purchase the three-year retro coverage through EMC. Motion carried 3-1 with Arends being the nay vote. The third item Lund needed action for was board action to retain Jensen Insurance as property and liability agent at a three per cent of the premium from the South Dakota Public Assurance Alliance. A motion to retain Jensen Insurance was made by Commissioner Landeen, motion failed.

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

Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, as well as inside and outside every sleeping area.

Test smoke alarms monthly, and replace the batteries if needed.

Purchase and learn how to safely use a fire extinguisher.

Create a fire escape plan with your family, reviewing and practicing it twice a year.

Your fire escape plan should include two exit points from every room, as well as a designated outdoor meeting spot.

Make sure everyone in your family knows when and how to call 911 or the fire department.

PREVENT

Turn off portable heaters whenever you leave a room or go to sleep.

Never leave a candle burning unattended, and consider replacing traditional candles with battery-operated flameless versions.

Keep matches and lighters out of reach from children, and make sure they know never to play with these items.

Replace or repair loose plugs, exposed wiring or frayed extension cords, and avoid overloading outlets and extension cords.

Keep any items that can catch fire at least three feet away from cooking and heating devices.

Remain in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food. Always turn off the stove if you leave the kitchen even for a brief period of time.

Constitutional Amendment E

Title: An Amendment to the South Dakota Constitution Updating Gender References for Certain Officeholders and Persons.

Attorney General Explanation: The South Dakota Constitution became effective upon the State joining the United States in 1889. The generic male pronouns he, his, and him are used in the text of the State Constitution to reference certain officeholders or individuals.

This amendment changes the text of the State Constitution to remove the use of generic male pronouns when referencing certain officeholders or individuals. For example, when referencing the Governor, instead of saying "he shall be commander-in-chief of the armed forces of the state," the text will be changed to read "the Governor shall be commander-in-chief of the armed forces of the state." The amendment makes similar changes to other references to the Governor, as well as to references to other officeholders including Lieutenant Governor, Supreme Court Justices, and Circuit Court Judges. The amendment also makes similar changes to references in the Constitution to general classes of people such as persons, electors, and public officers.

Vote "Yes" to adopt the amendment.

Vote "No" to leave the Constitution as it is.

Full Text of Constitutional Amendment E:

A JOINT RESOLUTION, Proposing and submitting to the electors at the next general election an amendment to the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, updating references to certain officeholders and persons.

Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of South Dakota, the House of Representatives concurring therein:

Section 1. That at the next general election held in the state, the following amendments to the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, as set forth in sections 2 through 25 of this Joint Resolution, which is hereby agreed to, shall be submitted to the electors of the state for approval.

Section 2. That Article IV, § 3 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 3. The Governor shall be responsible for the faithful execution of the law. He The Governor may, by appropriate action or proceeding brought in the name of the state, enforce compliance with any constitutional or legislative mandate, or restrain violation of any constitutional or legislative power, duty or right by any officer, department or agency of the state or any of its civil divisions. This authority shall not authorize any action or proceedings against the Legislature.

He The Governor shall be commander-in-chief of the armed forces of the state, except when they shall be called into the service of the United States, and may call them out to execute the laws, to preserve order, to suppress insurrection or to repel invasion.

The Governor shall commission all officers of the state. He The Governor may at any time require information, in writing or otherwise, from the officers of any administrative department, office or agency upon any subject relating to the respective offices.

The Governor may convene the Legislature or either house thereof alone in special session by a proclamation stating the purposes of the session, and only business encompassed by such purposes shall be transacted.

Whenever a vacancy occurs in any office and no provision is made by the Constitution or laws for filling such vacancy, the Governor shall have the power to fill such vacancy by appointment.

The Governor may, except as to convictions on impeachment, grant pardons, commutations, and reprieves, and may suspend and remit fines and forfeitures.

Section 3. That Article IV, § 5 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 5. The lieutenant governor shall be president of the senate but shall have no vote unless the senators be equally divided. The lieutenant governor shall perform the duties and exercise the powers that may be delegated to him by the lieutenant governor by the Governor.

Section 4. That Article IV, § 8 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 8. All executive and administrative offices, boards, agencies, commissions and instrumentalities of the state government and their respective functions, powers and duties, except for the office of Governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, and commissioner of school and public lands, shall be allocated by law among and within not more than twenty-five principal departments, organized as far as practicable according to major purposes, by no later than July 1, 1974. Subsequently, all new powers or functions shall be assigned to administrative offices, agencies and instrumentalities in such manner as will tend to provide an orderly arrangement in the administrative organization of state government. Temporary commissions may be established by law and need not be allocated within a principal department.

Except as to elected constitutional officers, the Governor may make such changes in the organization of offices, boards, commissions, agencies and instrumentalities, and in allocation of their functions, powers and duties, as he The Governor considers necessary for efficient administration. If such changes affect existing law, they shall be set forth in executive orders, which shall be submitted to the Legislature within five legislative days after it convenes, and shall become effective, and shall have the force of law, within

ninety days after submission, unless disapproved by a resolution concurred in by a majority of all the members of either house.

Section 5. That Article V, § 5 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 5. The Supreme Court shall have such appellate jurisdiction as may be provided by the Legislature, and the Supreme Court or any justice thereof may issue any original or remedial writ which shall then be heard and determined by that court. The Governor has authority to require opinions of the Supreme Court upon important questions of law involved in the exercise of his The Governor's executive power and upon solemn occasions.

The circuit courts have original jurisdiction in all cases except as to any limited original jurisdiction granted to other courts by the Legislature. The circuit courts and judges thereof have the power to issue, hear and determine all original and remedial writs. The circuit courts have such appellate jurisdiction as may be provided by law.

Imposition or execution of a sentence may be suspended by the court empowered to impose the sentence unless otherwise provided by law.

Section 6. That Article V, § 6 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 6. Justices of the Supreme Court, judges of the circuit courts and persons presiding over courts of limited jurisdiction must be citizens of the United States, residents of the state of South Dakota and voting residents within the district, circuit or jurisdiction from which they are elected or appointed. No Supreme Court justice shall be deemed to have lost his or her voting residence in a district by reason of his removal because the justice moved to the seat of government in the discharge of his justice's official duties.

Section 7. That Article V, § 7 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 7. Circuit court judges shall be elected in a nonpolitical election by the electorate of the circuit each represents for an eight-year term.

A vacancy, as defined by law, in the office of a Supreme Court justice or circuit court judge, shall be filled by appointment of the Governor from one of two or more persons nominated by the judicial qualifications commission. The appointment to fill a vacancy of a circuit court judge shall be for the balance of the unexpired term; and the appointment to fill a vacancy of a Supreme Court justice shall be subject to approval or rejection as hereinafter set forth.

Retention of each Supreme Court justice shall, in the manner provided by law, be subject to approval or rejection on a nonpolitical ballot at the first general election following the expiration of three years from the date of his appointment. Thereafter, each Supreme Court justice shall be subject to approval or rejection in like manner every eighth year. All incumbent Supreme Court justices at the time of the effective date of this amendment shall be subject to a retention election in the general election in the year in which their respective existing terms expire.

Section 8. That Article V, § 8 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 8. The chief justice shall be selected from among the justices of the Supreme Court for a term and in a manner to be provided by law. The chief justice may resign his office of chief justice without resigning from the Supreme Court.

Section 9. That Article V, § 9 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 9. The Legislature shall provide by law for the establishment of a judicial qualifications commission which have such powers as the Legislature may provide, including the power to investigate complaints against any justice or judge and to conduct confidential hearings concerning the removal or involuntary retirement of a justice or judge. The Supreme Court shall prescribe by rule the means to implement and enforce the powers of the commission. On recommendation of the judicial qualifications commission the Supreme Court, after hearing, may censure, remove or retire a justice or judge for action which constitutes willful misconduct in office, willful and persistent failure to perform his official duties, habitual intemperance, disability that seriously interferes with the performance of the duties or conduct prejudicial to the administration of justice which brings a judicial office into disrepute. No justice or judge shall sit in judgment in any hearing involving his justice's or judge's own removal or retirement.

Section 10. That Article V, § 10 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 10. During his term of office while in office, no Supreme Court justice or circuit court judge shall engage in the practice of law. Any Supreme Court justice or circuit court judge who becomes a candidate for an elective nonjudicial office shall thereby forfeit his justice's or judge's judicial office.

Section 11. That Article V, § 11 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 11. The chief justice is the administrative head of the unified judicial system. The chief justice shall submit an annual consolidated budget for the entire unified judicial system, and the total cost of the system shall be paid by the state. The Legislature may provide by law for the reimbursement to the state of appropriate portions of such cost by governmental subdivisions. The Supreme Court shall appoint such court personnel as it deems necessary to serve at its pleasure.

The chief justice shall appoint presiding circuit judge for each judicial circuit to serve at the pleasure of the chief justice. Each presiding circuit judge shall have such administrative power as the Supreme Court designates by rule and may, unless it be otherwise provided by law, appoint judicial personnel to courts of limited jurisdiction to serve

at his pleasure of the presiding circuit judge. Each presiding circuit judge shall appoint clerks and other court personnel for the counties in his presiding judge's circuit who shall serve at his pleasure of the presiding judge at a compensation fixed by law. Duties of clerks shall be defined by Supreme Court rule.

The chief justice shall have power to assign any circuit judge to sit on another circuit court, or on the Supreme Court in case of a vacancy or in place of a justice who is disqualified or unable to act. The chief justice may authorize a justice to sit as a judge in any circuit court.

The chief justice may authorize retired justices and judges to perform any judicial duties to the extent provided by law and as directed by the Supreme Court.

Section 12. That Article VI, § 3 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 3. The right to worship God according to the dictates of conscience shall never be infringed. No person shall be denied any civil or political right, privilege or position on account of his person's religious opinions; but the liberty of conscience hereby secured shall not be so construed as to excuse licentiousness, the invasion of the rights of others, or justify practices inconsistent with the peace or safety of the state.

No person shall be compelled to attend or support any ministry or place of worship against his person's consent nor shall any preference be given by law to any religious establishment or mode of worship. No money or property of the state shall be given or appropriated for the benefit of any sectarian or religious society or institution.

Section 13. That Article VI, § 7 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 7. In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall have the right to defend in person and by counsel; to demand the nature and cause of the accusation against him the accused; to have a copy thereof; to meet the witnesses against him the accused face to face; to have compulsory process served for obtaining witnesses in his on the accused's behalf, and to a speedy public trial by an impartial jury of the county or district in which the offense is alleged to have been committed.

Section 14. That Article VI, § 9 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 9. No person shall be compelled in any criminal case to give evidence against himself the person or be twice put in jeopardy for the same offense.

Section 15. That Article VI, § 20 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 20. All courts shall be open, and every man person for an injury done him in his to the person's property, person or reputation, shall have remedy by due course of law, and right and justice, administered without denial or delay.

Section 16. That Article VII, § 2 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 2. Every United States citizen eighteen years of age or older who has met all residency and registration requirements shall be entitled to vote in all elections and upon all questions submitted to the voters of the state unless disqualified by law for mental incompetence or the conviction of a felony. The Legislature may by law establish reasonable requirements to insure ensure the integrity of the vote.

Each elector who qualified to vote within a precinct shall be entitled to vote in that precinct until he the elector establishes another voting residence. An elector shall never lose his residency for voting solely by reason of his the elector's absence from the state.

Section 17. That Article VIII, § 9 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 9. The lands mentioned in this article shall be leased for pasture, meadow, farming, the growing of crops of grain and general agricultural purposes, and at public auction after notice as hereinbefore provided in case of sale and shall be offered in tracts not greater than one section. All rents shall be payable annually in advance, and no term of lease shall exceed five years, nor shall any lease be valid until it receives the approval of the Governor.

Provided, that any lessee of school and public lands shall, at the expiration of a five-year lease, be entitled, at his the lessee's option, to a new lease for the land included in his the lessee's original lease, for a period of time not exceeding five years, without public advertising, at the current rental prevailing in the county in which such land is situated, at the time of the issuance of the new lease.

The commissioner of school and public lands shall notify by registered mail each lessee or assignee on or before the first day of November first preceding the expiration of his the lessee's lease that such lease will expire.

Such option shall be exercised by the lessee by notifying the commissioner of school and public lands by registered mail, on or before the first day of December first preceding the expiration of his the lessee's lease describing the lands for which he the lessee desires a new lease, in the same manner as the same is described in his the lessee's original lease.

The Legislature may provide by appropriate legislation for the payment of local property taxes by the lessees of school and public lands.

Section 18. That Article XII, § 3 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 3. The Legislature shall never grant any extra compensation to any public officer, employee, agent or contractor after the services shall have been rendered or the contract entered into, nor authorize the payment of any claims or part thereof created against the state, under any agreement or contract made without express authority of law, and all such unauthorized agreements or contracts shall be null and void; nor shall the compensation of any public officer be increased or diminished during his the officer's term of office: provided, however, that the Legislature may make appropriations for expenditures incurred in suppressing insurrection or repelling invasion.

Section 19. That Article XII, § 4 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 4. An itemized statement of all receipts and expenditures of the public moneys shall be published annually in such manner as the Legislature shall provide, and such statement shall be submitted to the Legislature at the beginning of each regular session by the Governor with his the Governor's message.

Section 20. That Article XVI, § 5 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 5. No officer shall exercise the duties of his the office after he shall have been the officer is impeached and before his the officer's acquittal.

Section 21. That Article XVI, § 7 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 7. No person shall be tried on impeachment before he shall have been being served with a copy thereof at least twenty days previous to the day set for trial.

Section 22. That Article XVII, § 5 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 5. In all elections for directors or managers of a corporation, each member or shareholder may cast the whole number of his the member's or shareholder's votes for one candidate, or distribute them upon two or more candidates, as he may prefer.

Section 23. That Article XX, § 3 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 3. Should no place voted for at said election have a majority of all votes cast upon this question, the Governor shall issue his proclamation for an election to be held in the same manner at the next general election to choose between the two places having received the highest number of votes cast at the first election on this question. This election shall be conducted in the same manner as the first election for the permanent seat of government, and the place receiving the majority of all votes cast upon this question shall be the permanent seat of government.

Section 24. That Article XXI, § 2 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 2. The Legislature by two-thirds vote of each branch thereof at any regular session may fix the salary of any or all constitutional officers including members of the Legislature. In fixing any such salary the Legislature shall determine the effective date thereof and may in its discretion decrease or increase the salary of any officer during his the officer's term.

Section 25. That Article XXI, § 3 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 3. Every person elected or appointed to any office in this state, except such inferior offices as may be by law exempted, shall, before entering upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States and of this state, and faithfully to discharge the duties of his the office.

Constitutional Amendment F

Title: An Amendment to the South Dakota Constitution Authorizing the State to Impose a Work Requirement on Individuals Eligible for Expanded Medicaid Benefits.

Attorney General Explanation: The Medicaid program is funded by the State and the federal government to provide medical coverage for certain low-income people who qualify for the program. In 2022, the voters approved a Constitutional provision that expanded Medicaid eligibility for any person over age 18 and under 65 whose income is at or below 133% of the federal poverty level, plus 5% of the federal poverty level for the applicable family size.

This constitutional amendment authorizes the State to impose work requirements on any person eligible to receive benefits under the expanded Medicaid program, except for those persons who are physically or mentally disabled.

The amendment does not identify any specific work requirement that may be imposed on those receiving expanded Medicaid benefits.

Any work requirement proposed by the State must be approved by the federal government prior to implementation.

Vote "Yes" to adopt the amendment.

Vote "No" to leave the Constitution as it is.

Full Text of Constitutional Amendment F:

A JOINT RESOLUTION, Proposing and submitting to the voters at the next general election, an amendment to the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, as set forth in section 2 of this Joint Resolution, which is hereby agreed to, shall be submitted to the electors of the state for approval.

Section 2. That Article XXI, § 10 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

Beginning July 1, 2023, the State of South Dakota shall provide Medicaid benefits to any

In a primary election covered by this section, each candidate must be listed on a single primary ballot regardless of the candidate's political party. A voter may vote for any primary candidate regardless of the voter's party affiliation or lack thereof. The two candidates receiving the highest number of votes cast in a primary election advance to the general election. If more than one candidate is to be elected to an office at the general election, the number of candidates advancing from the primary election is twice the number to be elected in the general election.

The general election ballot may only include those candidates advancing from the primary election. The legislature may, by law, establish procedures for replacing a candidate who advanced from the primary election but will not participate in the general election due to death, withdrawal from the race, or disqualification.

A candidate may select the name of a political party to be listed next to the candidate's name on the primary ballot. The same political party designation shall appear next to the candidate's name on the general election ballot if the candidate advances to the general election. Both the primary and general election ballots must state that a candidate's indicated political party designation does not constitute or imply an endorsement of the candidate by the political party designated.

The legislature may establish any necessary procedures to implement this section.

If any provision of this section or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity will not affect any other provision or application of the section that can be given effect without the invalid provisions or applications, and to this end the provisions of this section are severable.

Initiative Measure 28

Title: An Initiated Measure Prohibiting Taxes on Anything Sold for Human Consumption.

Attorney General Explanation: Currently, the State collects tax on the sale or use of certain goods, including foods and drinks. Many municipalities also collect these taxes.

This initiated measure prohibits the State from collecting sales or use tax on anything sold for human consumption. The measure eliminates these sources of revenue for the State.

Human consumption is not defined by state law. However, its common definition includes more than foods and drinks.

The measure does not prohibit the collection of sales or use tax on alcoholic beverages or prepared food. Prepared food is defined by law to include food that is sold heated or with utensils.

The measure may affect the State's obligations under the tobacco master settlement agreement and the streamlined sales tax agreement. The master settlement agreement resulted from multi-state lawsuits against cigarette manufacturers for the public health effects of smoking. South Dakota's annual share of the master settlement agreement is approximately \$20 million. The streamlined sales tax agreement is a multistate program designed to simplify the collection of sales and use tax for companies selling in multiple jurisdictions.

Judicial or legislative clarification of the measure will be necessary.

Vote "Yes" to adopt the initiated measure.

Vote "No" to leave South Dakota law as it is.

Fiscal Note: Beginning July 1, 2025, the State could see a reduction in sales tax revenues of \$123.9 million annually from no longer taxing the sale of anything sold for human consumption, except alcoholic beverages and prepared food. Municipalities could continue to tax anything sold for human consumption.

Full Text of Initiated Measure 28:

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF SOUTH DAKOTA: That Title 10 be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the state may not tax the sale of anything sold for human consumption, except alcoholic beverages and prepared food. Municipalities may continue to impose such taxes.

Initiative Measure 29

Title: An Initiated Measure Legalizing the Recreational Use, Possession, and Distribution of Marijuana.

Attorney General Explanation: This initiated measure allows individuals 21 years of age or older to possess, grow, ingest, and distribute marijuana or marijuana paraphernalia.

Individuals may possess up to two ounces of marijuana in a form other than marijuana concentrate or other marijuana products. Individuals may possess up to six marijuana plants with no more than twelve plants per household. The measure also places limits on the possession of other forms of marijuana and marijuana products.

Under the measure, the possession, ingestion, and distribution of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia remains illegal for individuals under the age of 21. Driving under the influence of marijuana remains illegal.

The measure restricts where individuals may possess or consume marijuana, such as schools or where tobacco is prohibited.

The measure allows employers to restrict an employee's use of marijuana. Property owners may also regulate the use of marijuana on their property.

The measure does not affect State laws dealing with hemp. It also does not change laws concerning the State's medical marijuana program.

The measure legalizes marijuana-derived substances considered felony-controlled substances under State law. Marijuana remains illegal under federal law.

Judicial or legislative clarification of this measure may be necessary.

Vote "Yes" to adopt the initiated measure.

Fiscal Note: The state and municipalities would collect minimal additional sales tax revenue, as the measure would not decriminalize the sale of cannabis but would decriminalize the sale of cannabis accessories. Counties could see incarceration expenses reduced by \$581,556 every year.

Full Text of Initiated Measure 29: Be it enacted by the people of South Dakota.

Section 1. That title 34 be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Terms used in this chapter mean:

(1) "Local government," a county, municipality, town, or township;

(2) "Cannabis," the plant of the genus Cannabis, and any part of that plant, including the resin extracted from any part of the plant, and every compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the plant, or the plant's resin, including hash and marijuana concentrate. The term includes an altered state of marijuana absorbed into the human body. The term does not include hemp, as defined in § 38-35-1 or fiber produced from the stalks, oil or cake made from the seeds of the plant, sterilized seed of the plant which is incapable of germination, or the weight of any other ingredient combined with marijuana to prepare topical or oral administration, food, drink, or any other product;

(3) "Cannabis accessory," any equipment, product, or material that is specifically designed for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing cannabis into the human body; and

(4) "Possession limit," the following amounts of cannabis:

(a) Two ounces of cannabis in a form other than concentrated cannabis or cannabis products;

(b) Sixteen grams of concentrated cannabis, which includes hashish and cannabis extracts; and

(c) Cannabis products, other than concentrated cannabis, containing one thousand six hundred milligrams of tetrahydrocannabinol.

Section 2. That title 34 be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Subject to the limitations in this chapter, and notwithstanding any other law, the following acts, if done by a person at least twenty-one years of age, may not be an offense under state or local law, regulation, or ordinance; be subject to a civil fine, penalty, or sanction; be a basis for detention, search, or arrest; be a basis for the denial of any right or privilege; or be a basis for asset seizure or forfeiture:

(1) Possessing, using, ingesting, inhaling, processing, or transporting not more than the possession limit of cannabis; or transferring without consideration not more than the possession limit of cannabis to a person who is twenty-one years of age or older;

(2) Possessing, planting, cultivating, harvesting, drying, processing, or manufacturing not more than six cannabis plants and possessing and processing the cannabis produced by the plants, provided that the plants and any cannabis produced by the plants in excess of the possession limit are kept at one private residence only, are in a locked space at the private residence, are not visible by normal, unaided vision from a public place; and that the total number of plants at the private residence may not exceed twelve, even if more than two people who are twenty-one years of age or older live in the residence;

(3) Possessing, using, or manufacturing any cannabis accessory;

(4) Delivering, distributing, transferring, or selling a cannabis accessory to a person twenty-one years of age or older;

(5) Allowing the person's property to be used for any of the acts permitted by this chapter; and

(6) Any combination of the acts allowed by this section.

Section 3. That title 34 be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Nothing in this chapter affects a law prohibiting:

(1) The delivery or distribution of cannabis or a cannabis accessory, with or without consideration, to a person younger than twenty-one years of age;

(2) The purchase, possession, use, or transport of cannabis or cannabis accessories by a person younger than twenty-one years of age;

(3) The consumption of cannabis by a person younger than twenty-one years of age;

(4) The operation of or being in physical control of any motor vehicle, train, aircraft, motorboat, or other motorized form of transport while under the influence of cannabis;

(5) The consumption of cannabis while operating or being in physical control of a motor vehicle, train, aircraft, motorboat, or other motorized form of transport, while it is being operated;

(6) The possession or consumption of cannabis or possession of cannabis accessories on the grounds of a public or private preschool, elementary school, or high school, in a school bus, or on the grounds of any correctional or juvenile detention facility;

(8) The smoking of cannabis in a location where smoking tobacco is prohibited;

(9) The smoking of cannabis in a public place;

(10) The undertaking of any task under the influence of cannabis, if doing so would constitute negligence or professional malpractice; or

(11) Performing solvent-based extractions on cannabis using solvents other than water, glycerin, propylene

glycol, vegetable oil, or food grade ethanol.

Section 4. That title 34 be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

This chapter does not:

(1) Require an employer to permit or accommodate an employee to engage in conduct allowed by this chapter;

(2) Affect an employer's ability to restrict the use of cannabis by an employee;

(3) Limit the right of a person who occupies, owns, or controls private property from prohibiting or otherwise regulating conduct permitted by this chapter on or in that property; or

(4) Limit the ability of the state or a local government to prohibit or restrict any conduct otherwise permitted under this chapter within a building owned, leased, or occupied by the state or the local government.

Referred Law 21

Title: A Referred Act to Provide New Statutory Requirements for Regulating Linear Transmission Facilities, to Allow Counties to Impose a Surcharge on Certain Pipeline Companies, and to Establish a Landowner Bill of Rights.

Attorney General Explanation: The Act authorizes counties to impose, for any tax year in which the pipeline operator receives a tax credit, a \$1.00 per foot surcharge on carbon dioxide pipelines. Revenue from the surcharge must be distributed as tax relief to each property owner in the county where the pipeline is installed. Any remaining revenue can be allocated at each county's discretion. No other fee may be imposed except property taxes, or fees associated with road agreements.

The Act also imposes certain requirements on carbon dioxide pipelines: pipelines must be installed to a minimum depth; each pipeline operator is responsible for damages to drain tile, and to the surface owner, caused by the pipeline; each operator is also responsible for leaks or failures of the pipeline; and any land agent acting on behalf of the pipeline must be a pipeline employee, State resident, or State licensed real estate agent. The Act also includes requirements that carbon pipeline easements be in writing, and only enforceable for a specified period of time; pipeline operators must initiate business operations within five years of the easement; and each easement is void after five years of nonuse.

Vote "Yes" to allow the Act of the Legislature to become law.

Vote "No" to reject the Act of the Legislature.

Full Text of Referred Law 21:

An Act to provide new statutory requirements for regulating linear transmission facilities, to allow counties to impose a surcharge on certain pipeline companies, and to establish a landowner bill of rights:

Section 1. That a NEW SECTION be added to chapter 10-4:

Pipelines for the transmission of carbon dioxide are not subject to any discretionary formulas authorized by this title.

Section 2. That a NEW SECTION be added to chapter 10-12:

A county may impose a pipeline surcharge up to one dollar per linear foot of carbon dioxide pipeline installed in the county, during any tax year that the carbon dioxide pipeline company claims a tax credit pursuant to 26 U.S.C. § 45Q (January 1, 2024).

For each county where a carbon dioxide pipeline company has installed a pipeline, the company shall report to the county the linear footage of carbon dioxide pipeline installed in the county.

A carbon dioxide pipeline company shall remit the pipeline surcharge to each applicable county in the same manner as provided for the payment of property taxes in chapter 10-21. The revenue derived from the pipeline surcharge must be distributed as follows:

(1) At least fifty percent as tax relief for property in the county where the carbon dioxide pipeline is located pro rata on a per foot basis to each property in the county upon which the pipeline is installed; and

(2) The remaining revenue to be allocated as determined by the county.

Section 3. That § 10-37-3 be AMENDED:

10-37-3. Any pipeline company having lines in this state shall annually, on or before April fifteenth of each year, make out and deliver to the Department of Revenue a statement, verified by the oath of an officer or agent of such pipeline company making such statement, showing in detail for the year ended December thirty-first next preceding:

(1) The name of the company;

(2) The nature of the company, whether a person or persons, an association, copartnership, corporation or syndicate, and under the laws of what state organized;

(3) The location of its principal office or place of business;

(4) The name and post office address of the president, secretary, auditor, treasurer, and superintendent or general manager;

(5) The name and post office address of the chief officer or managing agent in this state;

(6) The whole number of miles of pipeline owned, operated, or leased within the state, including a classification of the size, kind, and weight thereof, separated, so as to show the mileage in each county, and each lesser taxing district;

(7) A full and complete statement of the cost and actual present value of all buildings of every description owned by said pipeline company within the state and each lesser taxing district, not otherwise assessed;

(8) The number, location, size, and cost of each pressure pump or station;

(9) Any and all other property owned by said pipeline company within the state which property shall be classified and scheduled in such a manner as the secretary of revenue may by rule promulgated pursuant to chapter 1-26 require;

(10) The gross earnings of the entire

company, and the gross earnings on business done within this state;

(11) The operating expenses of the entire company and the operating expenses within this state; and

(12) The net earnings of the entire company and the net earnings within this state; and

(13) Whether or not the pipeline company that installs a pipeline for carbon sequestration claims a tax credit under 26 U.S.C. § 45Q (January 1, 2024) in that year.

Section 4. That § 49-41B-1 be AMENDED:

49-41B-1. The Legislature finds that energy development in South Dakota and the Northern Great Plains significantly surrounding states affects the welfare of the population, the environment, and natural resources of the state. The Legislature also finds that by assuming permit authority, that the state must also ensure that these facilities are permitted and constructed in an orderly and timely manner so that the energy, commerce, and transmission requirements of the people of the state are fulfilled. Therefore, it is necessary to ensure that the location, construction, and operation of facilities will produce minimal adverse effects on the environment and upon the citizens of this state by providing that the permitting or siting of a facility is determined by the commission and a facility may not be constructed or operated in this state without first obtaining a permit from the commission.

Section 5. That § 49-41B-19 be AMENDED:

49-41B-19. The Public Utilities Commission shall also hear and receive evidence presented by any state department, agency, or units of local government relative to the environmental, social, and economic conditions and projected changes therein U

Section 6. That § 49-41B-28 be AMENDED:

49-41B-28. A permit for the construction of a transmission facility within a designated area may supersede or preempt supersedes and preempts any county, township, or municipal, or any other governmental unit land use, zoning, or building rules, regulations rule, regulation, or ordinance. Any local land use, zoning, or building rule, regulation, or ordinance preempted or superseded under this section is not an applicable rule or law under subdivision 49-41B-22(1). A route or transmission facility permitted by the commission under this chapter is not subject to any local land use, zoning, or building rule, regulation, or ordinance, unless the commission requires compliance with any generally applicable rule, regulation, or ordinance as a condition of the permit issued. The enforcement of any county, municipal, township, or other governmental unit rule, regulation, or ordinance for a transmission facility permitted under this chapter must be done pursuant to the order of the commission granting the permit.

Section 7. That a NEW SECTION be added to chapter 49-41B:

A county, municipality, township, or other governmental unit, including governmental units chartered under S.D. Const., Art. IX, § 2, may not enact or increase, in any form, a tax, fee, or charge that is related to a gas or liquid transmission line or an electric transmission line which requires or holds a permit under chapter 49-41B. The provisions of this section do not prohibit:

(1) Real property taxes pursuant to title 10;

(2) Road use, construction, maintenance, and improvement agreements pursuant to titles 7, 8, 9, or 31; and

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


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

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C-Hawks Drop Homecoming

Game to Lennox Orioles

The Canton C-Hawk football team hosted the Lennox Orioles on Friday night for the Hawks Homecoming game and were defeated 44-16 putting their season record at 3-3 while Lennox moves to 5-1. Canton will next travel to Dell Rapids on Friday with a 7:00 pm kickoff. The Quarriers have a 5-1 record with their lone loss to Dakota Valley and wins over Madison, Rapid City Christian, Milbank, Tri Valley and a 26-0 win over West Central last game.

Canton started the game with the ball at the 19 then a long pass from Alex Rhead to Cain Wallner of 36 yards put the ball in Lennox territory at the 41. Wallner had a 11 yard run then a penalty and no gain on a couple plays brought in Salvador Lopez and he kicked a 32 yard field goal to take a 3-0 lead at 7:12. Canton kicked an onside kick and recovered the ball at the Orioles 49 yard line and after a 22 yard pass from Rhead to Teague Granum moved the ball down to the 32. Rhead hit Wallner for a 20 yard pass but the Hawks couldn't capitalize and were intercepted in the giving the ball back to Lennox but the Orioles turned the ball back to the Hawks at the 45 after a 4th down interception as the 1st quarter ended with the Hawks leading 3-0.


Canton moved the ball into Lennox territory as Wallner ran for 17 yards and put the ball on their 33 then on a 4th and 9 Rhead dropped back and found Wallner getting behind the defense and hit him as he crossed the goal line for the 33 yard touchdown pass and with Lopez kicking the extra point the Hawks had a 10-0 lead at 9:14. The Hawks defense forced a punt after Rylan Larson got a tackle for a one yard loss giving Canton the ball at the 15. Rhead to Wallner for 30 yard pass moved the ball to the 45 and after a holding penalty on the Hawks the Rhead to Wallner connection came again for 18 moving the ball to the Lennox 47. Mason Bentz had a run of 11 up the gut but after a Rhead to Tyler Rozeboom 5 yard pass play a fumble turned the ball back over to Lennox and they took less than a minute to move down field setting up a 16 yard touchdown as Canton led 10-6 with 2 minutes till halftime.

Wallner had a 60 yard return on the kickoff and the Hawks couldn't take advantage and were intercepted 3 plays later giving the Orioles the ball on their 48 but a pass down to the Hawks 30 followed by a pass down to the 3 yard line then 2 plays later they scored and with the extra point run the Orioles took a 14-10 lead at halftime.

Lennox got the ball to start the 3rd quarter and took to the air and with a long pass moved into Hawks territory at the 35 then a couple plays later they hit the receiver with a short pass but he got around the defense and ran it in for a touchdown for the 29 yard touchdown pass. The extra point pass was no good making the score 20-10. The Orioles ran an onside kick and recovered the ball at the 29 yard

line and on their first play they ran outside and was to fast for the Hawks defense and scored :08 after their last TD and after the extra point pass they increased their lead to 28-10. Canton was forced to punt the ball back after Rhead was sacked for a 5 yard loss and Lennox got the ball at the 36 then they ran around the Hawks left end and after some missed tackles the Orioles had the ball down to the Canton 32. Lennox passed the ball down to the 5 but a holding penalty moved the Orioles back to the 17

Orioles 38. Canton took to the ground and Strand carried the load with 5 runs with a 15 yard run along with a pass interference penalty putting the ball at the 5 with a 4th and goal. Lennox was called for a defensive holding penalty then on another 4th and goal and this time Strand powered his way into the end zone for the touchdown. The extra point pass was incomplete making the score 44-16 and Lennox ran out the clock giving the Hawks their 3rd defeat in a row moving their season record to 3-3.
