Hart's Battle with Breast Cancer

October marks Breast Cancer Awareness month. The importance of this is to promote early detection and encourage women to have regular screenings or mammograms done. Breast cancer is the most common cancer in American women, with one in eight women developing it during their lifetime.

Last March 29th, Canton resident Teisha Hart, went in for her yearly mammogram. After many ultrasounds, biopsies, and tests, learned by April 18, 2024, that she had breast cancer. They had taken ten biopsies of her right breast and three additional biopsies of her right lymph nodes. She got the call from the doctor at 8:29 am while at her job at JAM Preschool. She was getting ready to take the kids back to the classroom and with the help and hugs of Mrs. Shelley and Mrs. Jill, she was able to gather herself enough to head home. She could not focus on anything and does not remember much after the phone call. When she got home, her husband Geno greeted her, and they talked and cried together. Geno reached out to their four daughters, Jorrie, Deana, Kierra, and Kiauna to tell them the news. After an MRI and introductions to her medical team, they got a plan together. As breast cancer does run in Hart's family, she decided to have a double mastectomy.

May 20, 2024, Hart arrived at the surgical center for her mastectomy with her support team

including her husband Geno, daughters Jorrie and Kiauna, her parents Monte and Susan, and Mrs. Shelly. "Having so many people in the room before and after my surgery was just what I needed, the saying "No One Fights Alone" stands true. So many of the preschool families brought meals over, provided fuel money for the follow up appointments, and checked in often to see how I was doing, it was all very much appreciated," Hart said.

After waking up from surgery, she was informed that they found cancer, an 8mm size tumor on her left-side, and a 49 mm (7cm) on the right-side. Having the surgery was a great decision, because otherwise in a few years Hart would be fighting this all over again.

Hart is still recovering, as this has not been an easy road. She has expanders in right now, until they can get the chest wall to expand enough to receive implants. She experienced a few setbacks and an infection that placed her in the hospital for a few days over the summer.

"I have questioned myself often about the expanders, wondering if all this misery and being uncomfortable is worth it. I have been told that the implants after this is piece of cake for recovery, so that is what I am holding onto. Praying all will be good before the end of the year for that surgery. 52 days from the beginning of the diagnosis to when she had my double mastectomy, I am still processing I HAD breast



cancer. The grief is real, I have guilt because I didn't need to go through chemo or radiation, like so many who are diagnosed. I am afraid of "what if it comes back, will I be able to fight again? The side effects of the medication I am now on are crazy, will I be able to tolerate it for 5 years like the Doctors want?" – Teisha Hart

Knowing the signs and symptoms of breast cancer can be the determining factor in an early or late diagnosis. Some of these signs and symptoms may include a new lump in a breast or underarm, thickening or swelling in a part of the breast, irritation or dimpling of breast skin, pain in nipple area, change in the size or shape of the breast, or pain in any part of the breast. Adding healthy habits into your daily life can decrease the risk of developing breast and other cancers. Early detection saves lives, is easier to treat, and if caught in the earliest stage before the cancer has a chance to spread, the five-year survival rate jumps to 99%.

Hart never felt a lump, and at her physical at the beginning of April, her Dr. did not feel the tumor on the right side during her breast exam. Without a mammogram, it would have gone undetected, because of how far back they were in the breast tissue, which would have delayed any care for her diagnosis.

"It's so important to get a yearly mammogram and checkup. Self-examination is great also, but mine we only found because of the change from last year's mammogram." -Teisha Hart



Teisha's family and friends have been a huge part of fighting breast cancer. Since breast cancer ran in her family, they decided a double mastectomy was the treatment to do.

Biden-Harris Inflation Crisis Leaves Americans Falling Behind

According to the Congressional Joint Economic Committee, it costs a typical family \$13,327 more per year to maintain the same standard of living it had at the beginning of the Biden-Harris administration. That's a staggering increase for the same goods and services in the span of less than four years, and Americans are the ones bearing the brunt of this sticker shock, as the price of groceries spiked 22 percent, shelter costs went up 23 percent, and energy prices grew by 34 percent, among other necessities. And the reason costs are so much higher today is because of Washington Democrats' addiction to reckless spending.

Eager to begin implementing their big government agenda, Democrats seized on the pandemic as an excuse to spend \$1.9 trillion on their so-called American Rescue Plan in 2021. They ignored warnings that the bill was too big and that it could "set off inflationary pressures of a kind we have not seen in a generation," and they pushed the bill ahead with Vice President Harris casting critical tie-breaking votes. As predicted, inflation began to accelerate almost immediately.

The Biden-Harris inflation crisis is a classic case of too many dollars chasing too few goods. Democrats flooded our economy with their reckless spending, and inflation began to climb as a result. It kept on climbing for years, reaching a 40-year high and causing untold economic pain across the country.

But this inflation crisis did not deter Democrats. In fact, as inflation was soaring, the Biden-Harris

administration was actually trying to force through yet another reckless taxing-and-spending spree, this time with a massive \$3.5 trillion price tag. One can only imagine how much worse inflation would have been had this bill passed.

For the last few years, the American people have been paying more and getting less. They have had to put more on their credit cards and dip into their savings. Others put off necessities and niceties to make ends meet. How many Americans had to lower their standard of living because of higher costs? How many car repairs, family vacations, or braces for the kids had to be put off because of inflation?

Then there's the additional economic pain of rate hikes the Federal Reserve was forced to impose to deal with the Biden-Harris inflation crisis. Those rate hikes meant higher credit card interest rates, higher rates for car loans, and higher mortgage rates. Americans who had to put more on their credit cards to deal with high food or energy prices are now facing increased challenges paying off that debt. Other Americans are finding the American dream of homeownership out of their reach, facing elevated mortgage rates on top of already staggering home prices.

When the history of the Biden-Harris administration is written, I suspect it will be defined by the historic inflation crisis caused by its reckless spending. Years of elevated prices have taken a toll on Americans' budgets, and I fear those effects may linger. Americans simply cannot afford another reckless taxing-and-spending spree.

Worried About Hell?

I enjoy welding. It is amazing how someone can take a cutting torch, a welder, and an old piece of metal and make it into something useful. I have learned however that I need to be careful working with the metal because it gets very hot.

I know all too well, the discomfort and suffering that hot molten metal can produce. I once had a piece fall through a hole in my pant leg. Next it entered my boot and burnt through my sock to cause a painful wound on the top of my foot. As funny as it may have been to watch me quickly kick my boot off, I realize that the pain of extreme heat and fire is no laughing matter.

What happened to me was just a minor inconvenience. My experience is nothing compared to an eternity in the lake of fire. "And if anyone's name was not found written in the book of life, he was thrown into the lake of fire." (Revelation 20:15) As careful as I want to be when using the welder and cutting torch, I want to be even more careful not to end up in the lake of fire because I did not listen to God.

John 3:16 tells us, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." Take advantage of open enrollment

If you work for a midsize or large company, you may soon be able to review your employee benefits package, as we are entering the open enrollment season. So, consider your options carefully, with an eye toward making changes appropriate for your needs.

Here are some of the key areas to look at:

- **Retirement plan** – Depending on your employer, you could change your 401(k) or similar retirement plan at any time of the year, but you might want to use the open enrollment season to review your contribution amounts. You may have heard that you need about seven to 10 times your annual income as a life insurance death benefit, but there's really no one right answer for everyone. Instead, you should evaluate various factors — including your mortgage, your income, your spouse's income (if applicable), your liabilities, the number of years until your retirement, number of children and their future educational needs — to determine how much insurance you need. If your employer's group policy seems insufficient, you may want to consider adding some outside coverage.

• **Disability insurance** – Your

employer may offer no-cost group disability insurance, but as is the case with life insurance, it might not be sufficient to adequately protect your income in case you become temporarily or permanently disabled. In fact, many employer-sponsored disability plans only cover a short period, such as five years, so to gain longer coverage up to age 65, you may want to look for a separate personal policy. Disability policies vary widely in premium costs and benefits, so you'll want to do some comparison shopping with several insurance companies.

- **Flexible spending account** – A flexible spending account (FSA) lets you contribute up to \$3,200 pre-tax dollars to pay for some out-of-pocket medical costs, such as prescriptions and insurance copayments and deductibles. You decide how much you want to put into your FSA, up to the 2025 limit. You generally must use up the funds in your FSA by the end of the calendar year, but your employer may grant you an extension of 2½ months or allow you to carry over up to \$640.

- **Health savings account** – Like an FSA, a health savings account (HSA) lets you use pre-tax dollars to pay out-of-pocket medical costs. Unlike an FSA, though, your unused HSA contributions will carry over to the next year. Also, an HSA allows you to withdrawals, though they may be assessed a 10% penalty. To contribute to an HSA, you need to participate in a high-deductible health insurance plan.





C-Hawks Fall to Dell Rapids Put Record to 3-4

The Canton C-Hawk football team traveled to Dell Rapids on Friday night and were defeated 62-22 to fall to 3-4 and now they host Madison on Friday night with a kickoff at 7:00pm. Madison comes into the game with a 4-3 record with wins over Belle Fourche, Custer, Vermillion and Tri Valley and suffered a loss to SF Christian, Lennox and Dell Rapids.

Canton started the game on defense and they would force a punt after a 3rd down pass was knocked down by Jace Charrlin giving the Hawks the ball at the 34 yard line. Keywin Strand made a 14 yard gain putting the ball in the Quarriers territory and then 2 plays later Cain Wallner took the snap and headed right and got around everyone and out ran everyone for a 45 yard touchdown and with Salvador Lopez extra point kick the Hawks got out to a 7-0 lead at 8:03.



Neither team would score again in the first quarter then in the 2nd Dell started at the Hawks 2 yard line and scored with a run up the gut on the first play and :05 into the 2nd they tied up the score 7-7. Canton punted the ball over to Dells and they would get a touchdown on a 66 yard run over the left side of the Hawks defense and with the extra point kick the Hawks fell behind 14-7 with 9:44 left in the 2nd. Canton threw an interception on their 3rd play and the Quarriers took over on the Canton 39 and DR tried to pass early on the drive but Landon Dominisse knocked the ball away but they ran for a first down at midfield. Rylan Larson made a good tackle to force a 4th and 3 but on the play DR faked a handoff up the gut and the quarterback dropped back and found a wide open receiver downfield and hit him with the pass for a 47 yard touchdown pass. The extra point kick was good and the Quarriers jumped out to a 21-7 lead with 6:26 left till half. Charrlin had a good kickoff return and the Hawks would start at the 39 and they used Teague Granum on the ground for 7 yards with Wallner running for

play they fumbled the ball and DR picked up the loose ball and ran it back into the endzone for the 10 yard touchdown making the score 34-10 at 11:10. Canton would get started on the 37 yard line and runs by Granum and Alex Rhead got the Hawks into DR territory at the 41 and Granum took the handoff and ran for 33 yards on a reverse and then from the 10 Strand took the handoff and followed Rupe, Cam Winter and Hunter Richmond up the gut and powered into the endzone for the 10 yard touchdown making the score 34-16 with 8:39 left in the 3rd. The Quarriers didn't waste anytime as they got around the outside and out ran the entire defense for a 65 yard touchdown run :14 later than the Hawks score and with the extra point they made the score 41-16. Canton moved into DR territory after Rhead hit Wallner for a couple pass plays down to the 43 but incomplete passes and short runs brought up a 4th and 5 from the 33 but an incomplete pass turned the ball over and the Quarriers got close to midfield and from their 45 yard line they went over our right side of the defense and broke 5

tackles and found open field and scored a 55 yard touchdown and the extra point was good making the score 48-16 with 2:27 left in the 3rd. The Hawks got the ball at the 45 yard line after a good return from Charrlin and after a pass from Rhead to Granum gained the Hawks 24 yards as they moved into DR territory at the 33 with the 3rd quarter ending with Canton trailing 48-16.

The Hawks opened up the 4th with a pass play as Rhead found Granum coming across the field and hit him for the 33 yard touchdown pass play and the extra point was no good making the score 48-22 five seconds into the quarter. DR didn't waste time to get into the endzone as they only took :50 as they ran a play out right and cut up field and out ran all the defenders for the 55 yard touchdown run and with the extra point the score went to 55-22. Too many incomplete pass stopped the Hawks next series after a 12 yard pass from Rhead to Granum but they turned the ball over at the 43. The Quarriers moved into the Hawks side of the field after a long run down to the Hawks 35 then down to the 10 yards line with the help of more missed tackles then they ended the game with a 12 yard touchdown run around the end and with the extra point the game ended with DR winning 62-22 for the Hawks 4 straight loss giving up over 40 points a game.



Lincoln County Commission Discuss Rising Costs

The Lincoln County Commission met Tuesday, Oct. 8 in the Lincoln County Boardroom. With all members present, Commissioners heard agenda items including liquor license transfers, raffles, and safety plans.

Commission Recorder, Alicia Cafaro read the commission a public hearing to consider an application for the transfer of a Retail (On sale) Liquor License to operate outside a municipality from Land-Lar, LLC to Raj & Son Fuel, LLC. The applicant was not present at the meeting and there were no proponents or opponents to state their opinion. Commissioner Schmidt asked if anyone had done any checking into the potential sale and asked if background checks had been completed on either party. Auditor Sheri Lund joined the meeting to answer questions. "This is what would be called My Bar down in Beresford. It is going from Land-Lar to Raj & Son. Raj & Son originally owned the liquor license, and they leased it to Land-Lar, so now it's just transferring it back because she's closing the business," Lund said. Motion by Poppens, seconded by Schmidt, motion carried.

Auditor Lund read the next public hearing pursuant to SDCL 7-21-22, for the purpose of adopting the following supplements to the 2024 Budget: A supplement adding to the Information Technology budget \$5,170.00 due to resolution 2312-44 passed on 12.26.2023 change in step increases and change in

insurance coverage; increase in Treasurer budget in the amount of 7,837.00 due to resolution 2312-44 passed on 12.26.2023 change in step increases; increase in the Sheriff budget in the amount of \$1,775.00, due to resolution 2407-45 approved on 07.23.2024 for a vehicle replacement; increase to the Airport budget in the amount of \$576,222.77 to revenue and \$236,374.07 for expenditures for unbudgeted Airport improvements. Motion by Landeen, seconded by Poppens, motion carried.

Assistant Commission Administrative Officer, Paul Anderson informed the Commission of a notice of intent to conduct a raffle by Midwest Dance Booster Club. "They submitted the details of the raffle to the Auditor and the Secretary of State. There is no action required by the board, it is just a notification, unless you object to the raffle," he said. No action was taken.

Anderson informed the Commission of a notice of intent to conduct a raffle by South Dakota Freedom Caucus PAC. "Again, the details of the event are included in the requested action," Anderson said. Commissioner Schmidt asked if the even has a political agenda tied to them and Anderson responded that all the details had been provided and there are purpose benefits to the raffle. No action was taken.

Auditor, Sheri Lund returned to the podium for board discussion with action regarding mileage reimbursement. "The

state changed the mileage rate again; they changed it to 67 cents when a personal vehicle is available, and county vehicles are not available or 30 cents when a personal vehicle is used, and a county vehicle is available. With our grants, if we are in line with the state, it makes it easier, but I was wondering if we should adopt a policy that we go with the state mileage regardless of how many times a year they change it, so I don't have to come up here with their generosity," Lund said. The current rate is 65 cents and 29 cents following the same guidelines. Lund stated this is the first time that she has seen it be changed twice in one year, normally it is only changed in July of each year. Motion by Poppens, seconded by Arends, to come in front of the board for approval each time. Motion approved.

Building Superintendent, John Rombough requested board action to approve County Courthouse recaulk project and accept a quote for services. "One of my last projects for the season is to do caulk repair to the joints around this building. I had in my budget \$12,000 based off of recommendations I got a year and a half ago. As I was getting quotes this summer, I fell way short of that and the cheapest quote is about double," he said. The lowest bidder also did the windows in the courthouse a few years ago. Rombough remembers being hesitant with the window bid because they were so much lower, but feels

they did an excellent job, were good to work with and recommends using their services again. Motion carried.

Highway Superintendent, Terry Fluit joined the meeting for board action to award and select a consultant for the Lincoln County Comprehensive Safety Plan. "Last year we were awarded some federal money through Safe Streets for All grant to do a safety plan for the county. Two consultants responded to the request for proposals and after reading

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CANTON, SD, AMENDING THE ZONING REGULATIONS OF THE CITY OF CANTON BY AMENDING CHAPTER 11.03 ACCESSORY BUILDINGS, RECREATIONAL FACILITY AND MISCELLANEOUS STRUCTURES; CHAPTER 19.02 DEFINITIONS; AND CHAPTER 11.09 FENCES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF CANTON, SD:

Section 1. That Chapter 11.03 Accessory Buildings, Recreational Facility and Miscellaneous Structures of the Zoning Regulations of Canton, SD be amended to include the following:

B. Residential districts.

1. Accessory buildings and detached private garages:

c. Cloth, canvas, plastic sheets and tarps and similar materials, corrugated roofing or siding are not allowed as primary materials, except greenhouses are allowed to have sheeting (glass or plastic) of prescribed building thickness as an outer covering. As an exterior material, steel siding and roofing is allowed provided it is architectural grade. Shipping containers and pod-type storage shall not be allowed as accessory buildings. Temporary use of shipping containers and pod-type storage is allowed for no more than 30 days in a calendar year. A pitched roof shall be required on an accessory building.

In his first State Tournament appearance, Ethan finished in a tie for 83rd place, improving on his first day score by four strokes.


