Kinder-Prep Brings Children to Canton School District

Kinder prep is an educational option for those children who are kindergarten age, but who are not quite ready for kindergarten. This is an option for parents to decide when going with their child to kindergarten screening in the spring. Canton School District offers Kinder prep, but many surrounding communities do not. There are a few out-of-town teachers who bring their children to school here in Canton. Kinder prep is a big part of this reason. I was able to ask a couple of them about why they think this program is important and why they decided to bring their children to Canton.

Alexis Burwitz teaches high school math in Canton and lives with her family in the country north of town. Even though her

home is closer to the city of Canton than some of the other residents of the Canton school district, it is technically the Harrisburg school district. Burwitz has a five-year-old with a summer birthday, making him on the younger side for kindergarten when screening time comes around. She and her husband decided to bring their son to Lawrence Elementary for Kinder prep, deciding they were in favor of him waiting a year to start Kindergarten. She believes children can gain maturity over the course of a year, which can have a big impact on their social and academic experiences at school.

"It is so awesome that Canton offers a Kinder-prep class, because not only does it give my son and others a chance to grow comfortable with the school setting. Without the

program, parents are forced to make the decision to either send their child to kindergarten or pay thousands of dollars for preschool or daycare to wait one more year. Kinder-Prep provides kids with confidence as they grow comfortable with the school atmosphere. This confidence then provides a nice foundation for kindergarten, where kids are pushed to begin meeting learning standards. I think school districts who offer this program are doing a great service to their community, and the effects of the program continue to resonate through the higher grade levels. I believe in the strength and community of a smaller school district, and truly believe in what we have to offer here in Canton. I plan to continue to bring my kids here after Kinder-prep." -Alexis Burwitz

Matt David is the high school Government and Personal Finance teacher, as well as a 6th - 12th grade

Dean of Students. He also coaches football and track and lives with his family in Harrisburg. He and his wife are both in education and believe strongly in the development opportunities that Kinder prep offers. Harrisburg has a limited number of spots in their Kinder prep program, with younger kids getting the first placements. Because their son Crew did not receive one of those spots, they still wanted him to take advantage of the program, so they enrolled him in the Canton program.

"Our oldest child, who is now a sixth grader, was in Mrs. Weron's Kinder prep class and we feel he benefited greatly from that extra year between pre-school and Kindergarten. Especially in boys, it seems that an extra year of social maturity is equally, if not more important, than the extra year of academic guidance they receive." -Matt David

FFA Fall CDE Season in Full Swing

Did you know that Canton had the first South Dakota FFA Chapter, forming in 1929?

Throughout the years, the FFA events may have changed or look a little different, but the lessons and experience learned along the way are memorable.

"Canton is an affiliate chapter, which means every student in an ag class is a member of FFA, so our roster is technically at 168 members. Of those, there are about forty-five students who are active. The inactive members are still eligible to participate in any activity if they choose. For example, some may only want to participate in the spring contests." -Russ Swanson, Canton FFA Advisor

Career and Leadership Development Events, or "CDEs," are the events FFA members take part in to develop critical thinking skills. These events have members study and practice to gain knowledge, to learn how to succeed



in a related career. The events are designed to help members prepare for future agricultural careers by testing and challenging the members' technical, leadership, interpersonal, teamwork, and knowledge on the subject matter. A handful of the events are individual based, while others are team based. Some CDEs are held in the fall, with a state level competition



in December, while other CDEs take place in the Spring, with state competition at State Convention. The South Dakota State FFA convention takes place in Brookings, SD on the campus of South Dakota State University. The fall events include Ag Broadcasting, Ag Communications, Ag Issues, Ag Sales, Conduct of Chapter Meetings, Creed Speaking, Employment Skills, Extemporaneous Speaking, Marketing Plan, Parliamentary Procedure, and Prepared Public

Speaking. The spring events include Agriculture Business Management, Agricultural Mechanics, Agronomy, Dairy Cattle Judging, Floriculture, Food Science and Technology, Horse Evaluation and Selection, Livestock Evaluation, Meats Evaluation and Technology, Milk Quality and Products, Natural Resources, Nursery Landscape, Poultry Evaluation, Range Plant ID, and Vet Science.

Securing Our Homeland

I love South Dakota. I love our natural beauty – from the rolling plains to the incredible Black Hills, from the Mighty Missouri to the peaceful prairie lakes. I love our people – they're the hardest working around with common sense American values and strong family morals. I love everything about our state (except for maybe the January weather).

Over the last six years, I have had the opportunity to serve as Governor of the greatest state ever. It has been the honor of my lifetime to be our state's top advocate, to serve as Commander in Chief of our National Guard, and to make decisions that honor our state motto, "Under God, the

People Rule."

You may have heard that President Trump has asked me to come serve in his Administration as the Secretary of Homeland Security, and I am honored by the nomination. When President Trump asked me, I said yes because it is an opportunity for me to serve our nation – but also because it is an opportunity to make South Dakota safer.

I respect the Senate's role to engage fully and openly on the upcoming confirmation process. I look forward to discussing our nation's security challenges and my commitment to addressing them head-on.

This position oversees the federal agencies responsible for our immigration system. Over the last four years, every state has become a border state. Think about that – that's at least 3 murderers for every county in America. I don't want any murderers in my county or anywhere near my kids and grandkids.

This border crisis has impacted us here in South Dakota, too. It has driven up crime in communities across the country as drugs and

human trafficking have increased because of the willful inaction by the current administration. In South Dakota, this has hurt us the most on our tribal reservations, and I have extended my hand to help them address the very real public safety crisis that is caused by the cartels and their affiliates.

In this new role, I'll oversee FEMA, just as you've seen me respond to flooding, blizzards, tornados, and wildfires in our state. We've made cybersecurity South Dakota's next big industry, and I'll have the opportunity to do similar work overseeing the Cybersecurity Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA). And South Dakota has become an example of innovative law enforcement training opportunities with our first-ever tribal-focused law enforcement training – I look forward to doing similar work with the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center.

Everything that I do will be focused on making America SAFE again, and that will make South Dakota safer, as well.

This state has been home all my life – and always will be. Thank you all for giving me the opportunity to serve you. I'll be around for a bit yet, and when I take my new role, rest assured that I will continue to serve you in the years to come.

Great American Smoke Out

The Great American Smoke out is coming soon, November 21st is the date this year. It is a day set aside each year to challenge those who smoke or vape to quit using nicotine- tobacco products. It is also a time for everyone to realize the dangers of nicotine to help avoid ever starting any type of tobacco use. Tobacco products are the single largest preventable cause of disease and premature death in the world, which is why the Great American Smoke out is an important event.

Because nicotine is so difficult to quit using, it is imperative we start talking to your kids as early as possible to prevent them from using tobacco products in the future. Making time in our busy schedules to begin the conversation may be difficult but finding time to give our kids the facts can do so much to help teach them about the dangers of smoking-vaping.

Start the Conversation Right Now

It's never too early to start talking about tobacco with your kids. It is recommended to first mention tobacco-nicotine use around kindergarten, age 5-6 and continue the conversation throughout their high school years. The average age of first nicotine use is 11 years old and even worse, many youth become addicted by the age of 14. When you start an open dialogue early and often, you can make a big impact on the decisions they make as they become high school students and young adults.

Many kids start smoking or vaping because it seems like everyone around them is doing it and it looks like a cool thing to do. What many do not know is the harmful effects that come along with tobacco-nicotine use. As a parent, your job is to point out the many negative health effects

to your children, which include bad breath, yellow teeth, smelly clothes, coughing, and decreased athletic performance, along with life-threatening illnesses.

It is no secret that smoking has serious long-term risks like cancer, but it is important to relay this message to your children. CDC reports approximately 32% of all deaths in the United States can be attributed to tobacco use. The trend toward vaping has increased the number of youth smoking as it has falsely been marketed as a safe alternative to cigarette smoking. Inform your kids so they know the truth about the harms of all tobacco-nicotine products. The liquid used in vaping is not mere water. The ingredients in the liquid, which the e-cigarette device turns into vapor, can contain nicotine, heavy metals, and cancer-causing chemicals. Nicotine, a highly addictive substance, is contained in both regular cigarettes and e-cigarettes.

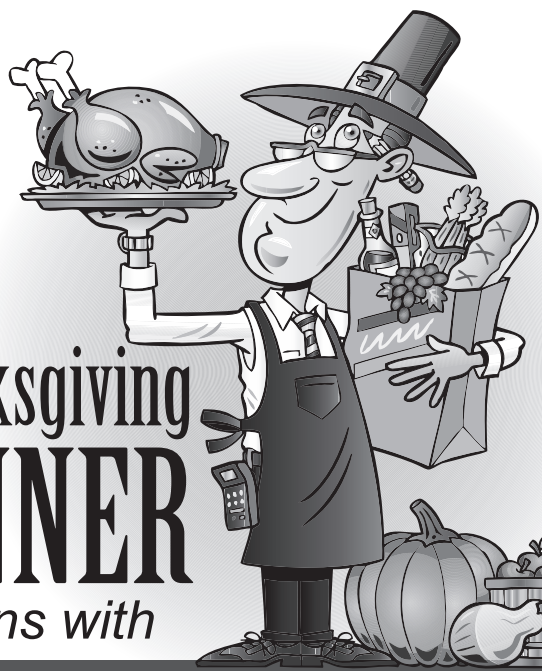
Set Rules About Smoking/Vaping

Be clear with your child that there will be consequences if they are found smoking or vaping. Discussing the consequences ahead of time allows them to understand the seriousness of the issue. Consequences could include loss of privileges for using their electronics or going to friends' houses. It's important to have rules, however the most important thing to keep in mind is to be open and honest about the topic. You are the greatest influence in your child's life, so what your child learns from you can point them in the right direction to permanently avoid smoking. HISTORY REVISITED

This week I will be using a story I wrote back in October but never used. After reading about it in a weekly news magazine it really made me smile because it had to do with music, something that has been a big part of my life going way back to the 1960's.

In case you haven't heard, the lowly cassette tape is making a big comeback and for some of you of a certain age this could be a life changing occurrence or possibly mind-blowing. Yes, this small plastic cartridge that you can carry in your shirt pocket, play in your vehicle, at home, in your Walkman (remember them?) or anywhere you want to listen to music on your 250 watt boombox is selling like hot cakes. Well, maybe not hot cakes but yes, cassettes are back and the world is a much better place because of this.

I remember a trip I made with a musician friend of mine back in the early, 1970's. We were headed to the Black Hills for some reason (probably a music event) and we'd taken my car which was equipped with a under the dash cassette deck. John Entwistle, the bass player for The Who, had just released his first solo album, "Smash Your Head Against the Wall" and we listened to it very loudly most of the way out and most of the way back. I'm quite sure we both did considerable damages to our eardrums on that little excursion.

When I started doing my radio show on KAUR FM, cassettes were still quite common because CD's really hadn't taken off yet. I would lug a box of vinyl records up to Sioux Falls and occasionally play a song or two from cassettes.

George B. German Bio

George B. German learned cowboy songs and cowboy singing while employed at his first job as a ranch hand at the K L Bar Ranch, near Wickenburg, Arizona.

George learned how to sing from his boss, Romaine Loudermilk, the great cowboy singer. George's distinct style and first songs were picked up under Romaine's influence. This style was developed by men who rode in trail drives during the early range days.

Over the years, George held close to this style of performing and composing. As a result he has been instrumental in continuing the cowboy song tradition into the later years of the twentieth century.

He is also known for his personality as a radio performer on WNAX in Yankton, South Dakota. Residents of the upper Midwest could wake up to George's voice every morning from the late 1920's into the 1950's.

During his years at WNAX, he also worked as a farm service reporter with his own show, "RFD with George B." During his program, George conducted interviews which examined rural life as it existed throughout the upper Midwest.

His famous renditions of the song and to "Ridin' Old Paint" and "The Strawberry Roan" became standard cowboy classics. His cowboy songbooks published by M.M. Cole in the 1930's were the largest selling cowboy songbooks ever issued.

His contribution to the preservation of the cowboy song tradition inspired the organizing members of the Music Archives to name their organization in his honor.

I Rode Old Paint Right Into Heaven

I rode old Paint right into heaven,
Right thru the pearly gate.

And I said "St. Peter, where are those cattle?
I hope I'm not too late."

St. Peter said, "George, don't you worry,

Just hold Ol' Paint and we won't hurry,

Through sunshine, clouds and hills.

Well, we topped a rise and down in the valley,
Were cattle everywhere.
I said, "St. Peter, that's sure some tally!
A picture I'll declare!"

So we rode on down toward the wagon,
With the lantern on the tongue.
And I said, "St. Peter, I ain't a-braggin'
This makes a guy feel young!"

Then I looked toward the camp and there with a smile,
My ride was not in vain:
I saw a grin as big as a mile,
On handsome Big John Wayne!

And I said, "John Wayne, it's you by thunder!"
And he answered with a grin!
"It's me O K but now I wonder,
Just how did you get in?"

And I said, "Ol Paint knew the way,
St. Peter did the rest!
He said, George, welcome to Cowboy Heaven!
And I'm sure that he knows best!"

I had to make sure the song was cued exactly where it began on the tape or problems could arise.

Since I bought a lot of vinyl (and CD's once they came out) I would record mix tapes for myself and certain friends. I would even go as far as making artwork to adorn these tapes. If I had all the money I put into cassettes, cassette players for both home or vehicles, I'd probably be a very wealthy man.

I heard a few years ago that cassettes were creeping back into the marketplace. But when I read that more than 430,000 cassettes were sold in the US in 2023 it made me very happy. Even big name artists like Taylor Swift and Ariana Grande are releasing new music on these small plastic contraptions. Once CD's had become the big thing, I thought vinyl would most likely fade away. When that didn't happen and there was a resurgence of vinyl, I never dreamed that cassettes would soon follow.

So, if you have a big box of old cassettes in your attic, basement or garage you may want to dig them out and see if your old cassette player still works if you still have one. You could even plan a 70's Retro-Cassette Party and invite all your old friends over. This might be a good way to spend New Year's Eve.

I still have hundreds of old cassette tapes I either recorded myself or purchased but my cassette deck doesn't work anymore. I guess it's time to either get it fixed or buy a new one. Rock On and Happy Reading as we take a look at George B. German and one of his most popular songs.

Financial Focus Which IRA is right for you?

The individual retirement account (IRA) is celebrating its golden anniversary. Created in 1974, this savings vehicle has helped millions of people build resources for retirement. And in 1997, the Roth IRA was introduced. But which IRA is right for you?

Let's look at the basic differences between the two IRAs. With a traditional IRA, you generally invest pretax dollars, so the more you put in, the lower your taxable income. Your earnings grow tax deferred, meaning you pay no taxes on them until you start taking withdrawals. (If you take withdrawals before you reach 59½, you'll be subject to ordinary income tax and a 10% IRA penalty.)

When you invest in a Roth IRA, your contributions aren't deductible, but they can be withdrawn at any time, tax- and penalty-free. And you can typically withdraw your earnings on these contributions tax free once you're 59½ and you've had your account at least five years. (If you don't meet these conditions, withdrawals of earnings are subject to income taxes and the 10% penalty.)

So, are you better off by taking the immediate tax break offered by a traditional IRA or the long-term

benefits of tax-free withdrawals available with a Roth IRA?

If you think you'll be in a higher tax bracket when you retire, you might want to consider a Roth IRA, especially if you have a long time until retirement. This will give you more opportunities to put away funds that can be withdrawn tax free. Conversely, if you think you might be in a lower tax bracket upon retirement, you might lean toward a traditional IRA, as you'd get the tax benefits now, when you're in a higher bracket, and can eventually make your taxable withdrawals when you're in a lower one.

Here's something else to keep in mind: Once you turn 73 (or 75 if you were born in 1960 or later), you must start taking taxable withdrawals — technically called required minimum distributions, or RMDs — from your traditional IRA. But if you have a Roth IRA, you won't face RMDs and can essentially keep the money in your account indefinitely. If you don't need all the funds in your Roth IRA for your retirement, you can pass them on to your heirs.

Ultimately, though, your income may determine which IRA is right for you. You can earn any amount and contribute to a traditional IRA,

though if you exceed certain income limits, your contributions may no longer be tax deductible. If you and your spouse don't have a 401(k) or other retirement plan through your employers, you can make a full, deductible contribution to a traditional IRA regardless of your income.

But you may not be able to contribute to a Roth IRA, or at least not make the full maximum annual contributions, if your income is above certain levels. Your tax advisor can explain these levels, which often increase from year to year. (In 2024, the most you can contribute to either IRA, depending on your income, is \$7,000 per year, or \$8,000 if you're 50 or older.)

Under some circumstances, you can convert a traditional IRA to a Roth IRA, though you'll need to pay taxes on the conversion. In any case, think carefully about your options and make the choices that are appropriate for your needs.

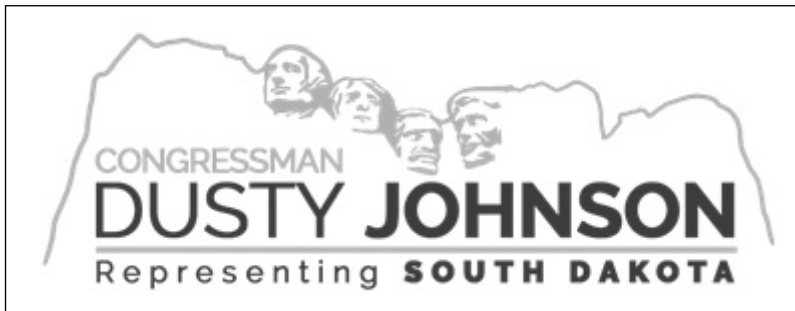

Headrick's 'DAYTRIP' Accepted at Six Film Festivals: DSU senior animator exceeding expectations

Reprinted with permission from: By WREN MURPHY Madison Daily Leader wren@madisondailyleader.com Beau Headrick arrived at Dakota State University with a dream: he wanted to make his drawings move. As a senior, six film festivals are now confirmed to show his animated short, effectively making his dream a reality.

"DAYTRIP," a three-minute animated film, centers on Fuzz, a small creature who wants to climb Mount Magoo. Along the way, he meets new friends and sees the value of working together. Fuzz learns that it's not the journey that matters but the friends he made along the way.

While Headrick was an avid fan of animation in middle school and high school, he didn't know how to animate anything when he came to DSU. Headrick told the Madison Daily Leader. The Canton native's big inspiration, for "DAYTRIP" and his choice of major, is Felix Colgrave, an Australian animated filmmaker who has almost 2 million YouTube subscribers. Colgrave runs a production company with his wife, another animation director.

Headrick said "DAYTRIP" took four months and many, many hours to create, between writing, animating, rendering and every other step of the process.

"Just a lot of nights staying until 4 in the morning, just waiting for stuff to render out or just working on it," he commented.

While the animation style was inspired by Colgrave, the idea for the film came while listening to the song that plays throughout it: "Heart it Races" by Dr. Dog.

"I was just driving home, and I was just trying to come up with ideas to animate, because I needed to come up with something. I just heard a song on the radio, and I pictured this short little animation in my head and I was like, 'I need to show other people what I'm seeing in my brain, so I've got to do it,'" he explained.

Headrick has been in contact with Dr. Dog to use the song, a process which has taken a significant amount of time. Between that, completing the film solo, and submitting it to film festivals, Headrick needed to have patience and resiliency to finish the project.

"It kind of helped me see things through the pipeline and get to see how long things actually can take," he stated. "It kind of taught me that I need to think about things and plan them out before I jump into them right away."

After receiving encouragement from two of his professors, Daniel Welynn and Konrad Lightner, he used a website to enter his film to

almost 30 festivals, according to a press release. The six film festivals that accepted his work include the Boundless Film Festival in London, Portland Film Festival in Oregon, T-Short Animated Film Festival in Germany, First-time Filmmaker Sessions hosted by Lift-off Global Network in the UK and Lift-off Global Network Film Festival, an international film festival.

Headrick will graduate in spring 2025, and he hopes to get a 2D animation job at a studio. To follow industry trends and make himself more versatile, he is focusing on 3D animation during his senior year.

His ultimate goal would be working for Colgrave's studio. "That would, 100%, be my dream goal, to work with that guy," Headrick said.

Other than Colgrave, he named the character designs of Sesame Street as some of his biggest inspirations, citing their fuzzy features' being easy on the eyes.

Before "DAYTRIP," Headrick completed a short film called "TRIP," which he credited with laying the groundwork on completing a project. That experience helped him get through the challenging and joyful parts of "DAYTRIP," whether it was re-animating a deceptively simple shot seven times or laughing at Fuzz's expression in another scene.

His favorite shot is when the friends come together in a crisis while the sun sets behind them.

Headrick thanked his friends for their support and the structure his professors provided him. He explained that without that assistance, he might not have found the motivation to complete the project. Now, he has a professional film and a strong bullet point for his resume, in addition to new experiences and skills.

"I definitely feel like I have something to stand on," he noted.

Once "DAYTRIP" was completed, it was a no-brainer for Welynn to encourage Headrick to submit the film for consideration. By having the film selected, that shows Headrick and potential employers that he is above the student level and has produced professional work, Welynn told the Madison Daily Leader.

"(The film) encompasses everything that was taught to him, and he exceeded my expectations," Welynn wrote. "By sharing their films, the students are opening themselves up to other viewers that

are outside of the normal area for them. It can lead to possible work as well as recognition by peers and those who they are trying to become peers of."

Headrick didn't start with the skills to write, direct and animate a film, though. He learned from his professors and got inspiration from his friends, idols and mentors, slowly and steadily developing the skills he would need to succeed. His professors' accomplishments, such as Lightner working on the Disney film "Zootopia," pushed him to keep going, demonstrating that if people put their mind to it, they can accomplish anything.

"Just go for it," Headrick declared. "I knew nothing when I went into college. I just liked to draw and wanted to see the drawings move."

"DAYTRIP," the 2D film which Headrick wrote, directed and animated, is available to view for free on his YouTube channel at youtu.be/xwymY6Ah9Ns?feature=shared. Headrick graduated from Canton High School in 2021 and is the son of Gary and Ronda Hendrick.

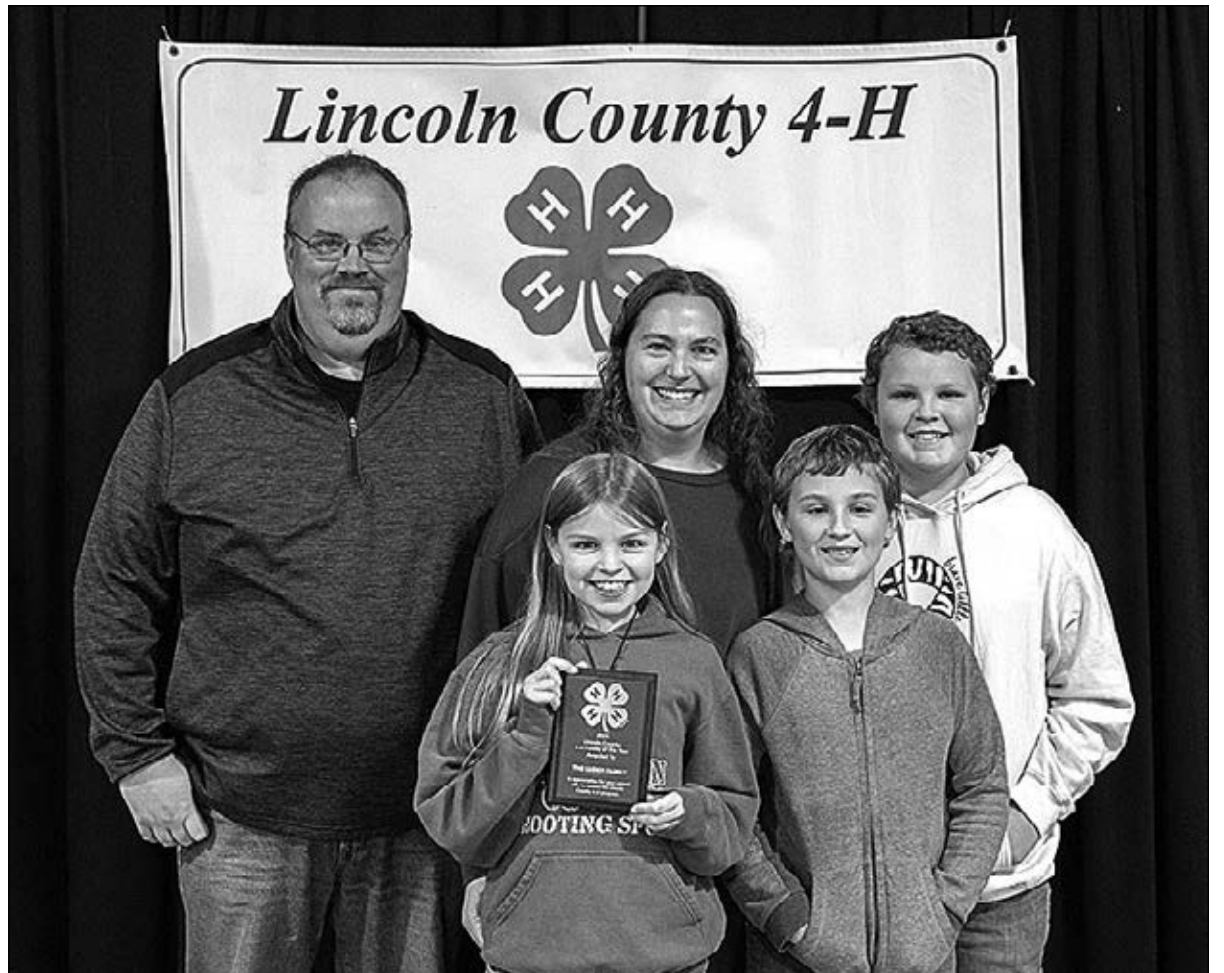

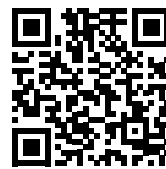
