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Bountiful Baskets Hopefully Coming Soon

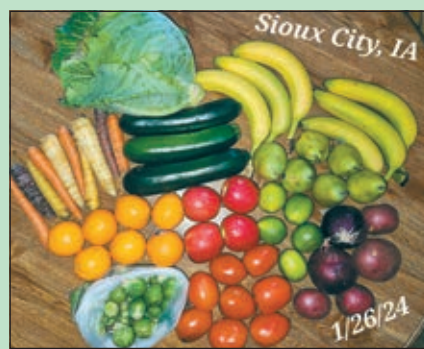
Bountiful Baskets is a group of volunteers that work together to bring customers produce baskets every other week. The produce for local baskets will come from the same company that supplies the Sioux City site out of Omaha. Interested customers receive close to fifty dollars' worth of quality produce. These baskets can help to encourage a healthier lifestyle, at a lower cost than you would be able to get at most grocery stores. The group purchases the items for a discount and then distributes them evenly among customers. A variety of baskets are balanced with seasonal items to get the most appealing and cost-effective baskets. The baskets are usually supplied with half veggies and half fruit. Customers who have previously ordered the baskets have loved the variety they have received.

Canton local, Christina Seal, has been able to expand her family's vegetable and fruit intake by taking part in Bountiful Baskets. They are priced at \$21 for a small laundry basket full of produce every other Thursday. Also available are a selection of bulk items, but the selection changes every week. As of now, the closest current pickup location is in Sioux City, Iowa. Once there is enough local interest on the website, they will be able to open a pickup site at Inspiration Hills.

Produce is shipped by a large truck or semi to the drop-off location. Volunteers unload the truck and separate items into each basket that was ordered. Each a pair of these baskets (one fruit and one vegetables) is one basket that is pre-purchased.

\$30,460,384 for Lincoln County 13 Water project grants from the ARPA fund

In 2022, the SD legislature enacted SD 62, appropriating \$600M of ARPA funds to the Board of Water and Natural Resources to provide grants for eligible infrastructure projects. More than \$591M is currently awarded to 207 projects in communities around South Dakota. Thirteen of those water projects are underway in Lincoln County.

- \$636,622 to Canton for both wastewater and drinking water improvements
- \$7,367,727 to Harrisburg for wastewater improvements
- \$1,689,476 to Hudson for drinking water and wastewater improvements
- \$7,292,901 to Lennox for drinking water and wastewater improvements
- \$1,137,300 to Lincoln County Rural Water Systems for water system improvements to its eastern distribution system
- \$5,677,918 to South Lincoln Rural Water System for drinking water system improvements
- \$4,958,479 to Tea in the form of three separate grants
- \$1,699,961 to Worthing for wastewater treatment facility improvements

The Clock is Ticking!

Getting Federal Money into State Water and Sewer Projects and NOT Back to Washington

SD Senate Bills 53, 66 and 16 meant to access \$94M of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) for water funds

More than \$700M of ARPA funds has been set aside this year for South Dakota cities, including Lincoln County, for one-time, individual water and wastewater system upgrades and expansions.

But deadlines are looming, ARPA rules require that all funds be allocated by the end of this year and be spent by December 31, 2026. The ARPA money doesn't have to be paid back, but if it isn't all spent the remainder goes back to Washington.

And it is not only deadlines. The state is worried that some large-scale water and sewer project may not get completed on time because of shortages in labor and material.

Seen as a federal finance aid windfall that may never happen again, SD lawmakers are leading

an effort to make sure that the 207 projects are on track and all the \$700M is allocated. Currently \$94M of that money is unallocated. If passed, Senate Bills 53, 66 and 16 would allow the state to access those ARPA funds with the purpose of improving the water infrastructure across South Dakota.

Just what is ARPA \$\$\$?

ARPA is a \$1.9 trillion aid package Congress and the Biden Administration passed in 2021 to help states recover from the pandemic. It guarantees direct funding to all cities, towns and villages in the US.

ARPA is not to be confused with the \$2.2 trillion Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act (CARES). This aid package was passed in March of 2020 by the Trump Administration along with the \$2.3 trillion 2021 Coronavirus Response and Consolidated Appropriations Act signed into law Dec. 20, 2020. The two

measures provided direct economic assistance for American families for food and rent assistance and also covered revenue losses; both were a direct response to the Pandemic emergency.

The ARPA fund was quite different from CARES and the Coronavirus Response and Consolidation Appropriations Act. It is more deliberate and a thoughtful type of funding addressing the long-term impacts that cities felt after COVID. Its moneys are meant to be used to mitigate the public health costs and the economic hit of COVID, boost pay for essential workers and replenish revenue lost as a result of COVID. More importantly, the funds were also meant to assist with expensive and often postponed infrastructure projects tied to water, sewer and broadband.

Still, the ARPA money came with some restrictions.

The Hawks used 4 individual champions and 11 place winners to finish with 209.5 team points to easily out distance the entire field. The C-Hawks scored 209.5 team points with Vermillion finishing 2nd with 142 followed by Beresford 125.5. Canton was lead by our 2 Seniors as they both finished first with Alex Davies at 160 and Tanner Broughton 195. Canton used another strong semi final round to grab the lead and they just added to it as they sent 7 to the finals by winning 7 of 9 matches and then 4 of the 7 final matches.

On Friday night, the Canton Boys Basketball team traveled to Wakonda to face the Irene-Wakonda Eagles. Just when it seemed the C-Hawks were going to end the Bulldogs 29 game win-streak, Madison began to pull away making their free-throws down the stretch. Canton lost a close game, 77-70.

Canton City Commissioners voted unanimously to award the pool repair bid to the Heg company of

Cherokee, Iowa, after reviewing all the bids received last week. Their bid was \$21,077 for the painting and sealing of the swimming pool. The work will be done this spring, so the pool can be ready for the season on the scheduled opening date. The repair of the in-ground water storage reservoir is to begin on March 15th. This project will require the reservoir be empty for about 30 to 45 days. During this time, residents are asked not to water. The request for conservation is being made by the city commission so that adequate water supplies are available in case of fire.

A huge backhoe took down the former COOP service station and several side dump trailers carried away the rubble last week leaving the northwest corner of Fifth and Dakota in Canton bare for the first time in decades. Several onlookers recalled shopping for appliances and buying fuel at the COOP over sixty years ago.

The congregation of Our Savior's Lutheran Church, rural Inwood will celebrate their 100th Anniversary this summer. The church building was built in 1889 and is the original building constructed for the congregation.

A certificate of approval was received by the City of Canton for the new municipal airport that had been under construction for the past couple of years. The new airport

will officially open on March 1, 1974.

Mike Block and Steve Helder will attend the South Dakota State "A" wrestling tournament at Watertown on February 23 and 24. Block wrestled in the 98 weight class and Helder in the 105 weight class.

Dr. E. S. O'Neil started Tuesday for Chicago to take a post graduate course in dentistry.

The house formerly occupied by J. R. Pattee as a residence was moved from its old location on Bartlett Street to the vacant lot on Cedar Street, just south of the Congregation Church. Ben Whitmore bossed the job.

The time for our city election is rapidly approaching and if we are to incorporate under the general law, as we believe a majority of our citizens are now in favor of doing, the necessary steps should be taken so that we can determine the question at the coming election.

Messrs Isackson & Ellingson finished moving their Gate City Machine Shop to the new location south of Webb's barber shop yesterday and they are now very conveniently located.

The masquerade ball given by Stetson's Concert Band at the opera house was not so well attended as it would have been held the weather been less inclement but those present report a very enjoyable evening.

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HISTORY REVISITED

As I watched our old jail and sheriff office come down and turned into a pile of rubble, it made me think of two other downtown structures that met the same fate—the Canton Theater and Anderson's Furniture.

I remember quite well standing across the street on the south side of 5th back in the 1970's when our theater came crashing down and feeling very sad. Having grown up here, I was one of countless other Canton kids that went to this theater almost every weekend to watch whatever movie that was currently playing.

Back in the 1950's television was in it's infancy and compared to the big screen, we probably figured "the tube" was just a passing fad. Watching a movie in a packed theater surrounded by your friends with a box of popcorn and your favorite candy was as good as it gets. We could be transported back to the wild and woolly west, a steamy jungle in Africa, the front lines of a WWII battlefield or ride a rocket into outer space all for a quarter or whatever admission was back then. We'd laugh at the crazy antics of the best comic actors of that era, be frightened by very scary monsters or villains we'd only seen on the pages of comic books and ride along with our favorite cowboys as they chased the bad guys through the canyon. Watching a movie in this old theater was usually the high point of the week for us kids and all those old memories came rushing back as that building came crashing down. I'm sure tears were shed by some but I just remember feeling very nostalgic about the loss of a place that had made my imagination grow by leaps and bounds.

Watching the old Anderson Furniture building come down also brought back many old memories. Growing up next door to John and Gary, I remember going downtown with them and spending time in their father's store. It seemed very immense to me back then almost

as large as Penny's or Shriver's in downtown Sioux Falls where my mother use to take me to buy school clothes. Knowing this old furniture building and some structural issues that made it unsafe to occupy lessened the impact that our old theater had on me. It had served it's purpose very well for many decades and it's time had come to an end.

Luckily, I never had any real attachment to the sheriff's office/jail. Having never been arrested, I don't have a witty, interesting story to relate about spending time in one of it's cells under the watchful eye of Kenny Albers. I do remember being in this building for something work related when I was doing some cartography for the county back in the 1980's. It now joins the Canton Theater, Anderson's Furniture and a host of other downtown Canton buildings that have gone by the wayside. I assume this leveled site will become a parking lot. I just hope the county erects a nice sign or plaque that states this was once the site of the Lincoln County Sheriff's office. According to the 1985 History of Lincoln County South Dakota, the jail was originally located in the basement of the courthouse. The building that was just demolished was a WPA project and built in 1940.

For this week's column I've chosen a few more stories from the July 28, 1966 Centennial Edition of the Sioux Valley News. Happy reading and make plans to attend a free concert by Minnesota musician, Bob Bovee, at the Old Courthouse Museum in Sioux Falls this Friday at noon. Along with Pop Wagner, Bob performed at the first Sioux River Folk Festival held in Canton back in 1980.

Also check out Russ Swanson's program Three Days in Dakota, the James Brothers Escape from Northfield at the Old Courthouse Museum on Sunday, February 25. It all starts at 2 p.m. and admission is also free. Can it get any better than this?

"CANTON CALLING"*

For nearly seventy years, telephone service has been a partner in Canton's progress. From a novel means of communication over a few city blocks, it has grown to the kind of magic by which people can "talk" together whenever they wish, wherever they may be.

Canton has always been in the forefront of telephone progress. In 1897, twenty-one years after the telephone exchange was installed in Canton by a stock company. Fifty shares of stock were sold at \$25 per share. Charles E. Judd was President; T.P. Thompson, Secretary; and F.H. Bacon, Treasurer. The Company was sold in 1902, again in 1918. It was purchased by Northwestern Bell Telephone Exchange Company on October 1, 1919. Long Distance service was established to Sioux City on January 28, 1898. Service was free on the opening day.

In 1924, the crank type telephones were replaced with common battery telephones; dial telephones came in 1960 and nationwide customer dialing of long distance calls in 1962.

The first switchboard was installed in the rear of the Milliman Millinery Store at 110 South Main Street to serve 21 customers. In 1899, the switchboard was moved to the second floor at 101 East Fifth Street, several years later to 106 West Fifth Street, at which time a new switchboard was placed in service; to 121 East Fifth Street, and finally, to the present location 204 East Fourth Street.

From the 21 telephones that were connected to the first switchboard located at 110 South Main Street, Canton has grown to have over 1,900 telephones and to make hundreds of telephone calls every day.

The Centennial year Canton's telephone men and women are happy to join in celebrating our city's big birthday. With telephone service, as with Canton, the achievements of the past are only a prelude and a promise for the future.

Centennial Issue is Biggest Ever

This special Centennial Issue of the Sioux Valley News has a total of seven sections and 42 pages. It is the largest newspaper ever printed in Canton.

Extra copies have been printed to meet the demands for this issue, and the regular News price of 10 cents per copy will remain in effect throughout Centennial Week.

Following the Centennial, copies will be sold at 25 cents each. The News will not be able to honor requests from local persons to mail copies elsewhere, but proper-size mailing envelopes will be on sale at the News office.

Ford is Big Seller in 1929

651 cars were sold in Lincoln County during 1929. It was 193 more than were sold in 1928. Fords were the hottest seller in the county with 239 followed by Chevrolet with 163 and Whippet with seven. Other makes sold were Oldsmobile, 33; Durant, 28; Plymouth, 23; Dodge, 22; Pontiac, 16; Essex, 15; Chrysler, 13; and Nash, 12.

Canton Bombed 63-0 in 1930 Grid Battle

Canton invaded the Sioux Falls gridiron in September 1930 and returned with a 63-0 defeat under their belts. It was the first time in 12 games Canton failed to get a touchdown.

City Receives Charter in 1881

The City of Canton, then in Dakota Territory, was organized as an official city under a special charter in 1881 by the act of the legislative assembly of the Territory of Dakota at Yankton, the territorial capital.

The first city election was held in April, 1881. Elected first mayor was O.S. Gifford. The first aldermen were A.R. Brown, William M. Cuppett, Joe Horn, J.W. Hewitt and S.C. Madole. John Faide, Jr. was the first clerk.

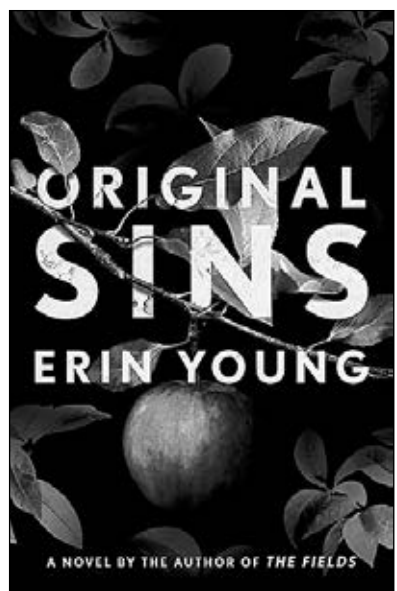

Besides facing the standard rigors testing a new agent, Riley finds herself immersed in an intrigue ranging from small-time misogynists to state government as she tries to unearth the identity of a man known only as the Sin Eater, who has been stalking and assaulting women, whom he leaves behind dead or physically and psychologically maimed.

Riley has demons of her own to fight, though, such as a sexual assault in her youth by her brother's best friend Hunter that leaves her dazed and fleeing to California to a lifestyle she would prefer to forget. Her grandfather, a legendary lawman, rescues her and returns her home to rebuild her life, even after her parents are killed in a car accident.

New on the job, Riley also must work through her relationship with her brother Ethan and niece Maddie, who has come to regard her as a substitute mother.

As she works with her uncooperative fellow agent Peter Altman, Riley begins to suspect something amiss. While her superior wants them to work together, the more experienced agent makes it clear he would prefer working alone.

Riley finds better cooperation with an understanding state DCI agent nicknamed Fogg, who stands by her



as they navigate twists and turns in their pursuit of the Sin Eater.

Young also blends in the story of Kody, an impressionable young man who finds himself an unwilling accomplice to Harlan, his mother's boyfriend and a participant in a plot to kidnap the female governor, Jess Cook, who has tackled the issue of disparity in women's wages.

Young's description and accuracy in describing Des Moines and law enforcement is spot on, quite remarkable for someone writing from England. She writes of Iowa as though she has lived there all her life. Her depiction of Riley as heroic but with real human flaws is equally impressive.

This is a great book and a great contribution to the crime genre.

How will higher rates affect you?

As you know, interest rates have risen considerably over the past couple of years. But what does this mean to you, as a consumer and as an investor?

From a consumer's standpoint, it's not hard to see the effects of higher interest rates. If you want to take out a mortgage or refinance an existing one, you'll find that it's considerably more costly, in terms of the interest you'll pay, than it was a few years ago. And the same is true of car loans and credit cards. Paying these debts at higher rates can affect your cash flow, so while rates are high, you may need to make some important decisions about your overall budget and spending plans.

As an investor, though, you may find the effects of higher interest rates to be somewhat more complex. That's because higher rates can have a different impact on different types of investments, such as stocks and bonds.

When considering stocks, be aware that not all market sectors will respond the same way to higher interest rates. For example, the financial sector, which includes banks, insurance companies and brokerage firms, may benefit from higher rates. On the other hand,

smaller technology companies, which still must invest heavily in their businesses, may not do as well due to rising interest rates making it more expensive for them to borrow. And other sectors will respond differently to higher rates. Keep in mind, though, that there's great variance within sectors and among companies, so when you consider purchasing stocks, evaluate each choice on its merits and make sure it fits within your risk tolerance, time horizon and need for portfolio diversification. When you diversify your investment dollars, you can reduce the risk of market volatility affecting just one type of asset, although diversification by itself can't protect against all losses.

With fixed-income investments, such as bonds, interest rate movements can have significant and direct impacts. When interest rates rise, the value of your current bonds will likely fall because new bonds can pay higher rates. However, you can also buy bonds at the new, higher rates and benefit from bigger interest payments.

Still, there's no guarantee that interest rates will stay elevated – in fact, the Federal Reserve has indicated that it might actually start

cutting rates in 2024 – which is why it may be a good idea to build what's known as a "ladder" consisting of short-, intermediate- and long-term bonds. Once you have your ladder in place, you'll have some protection from interest-rate movements. So, if rates were to keep rising, you could reinvest the proceeds of your short-term bonds in the new, higher-paying ones. But if rates level off, or even fall, you'll still benefit from your longer-term bonds, which typically (but not always) pay higher rates than short-term ones.

Of course, if you hold your bonds until maturity, you will continue to get the same interest payments, regardless of where market rates go.

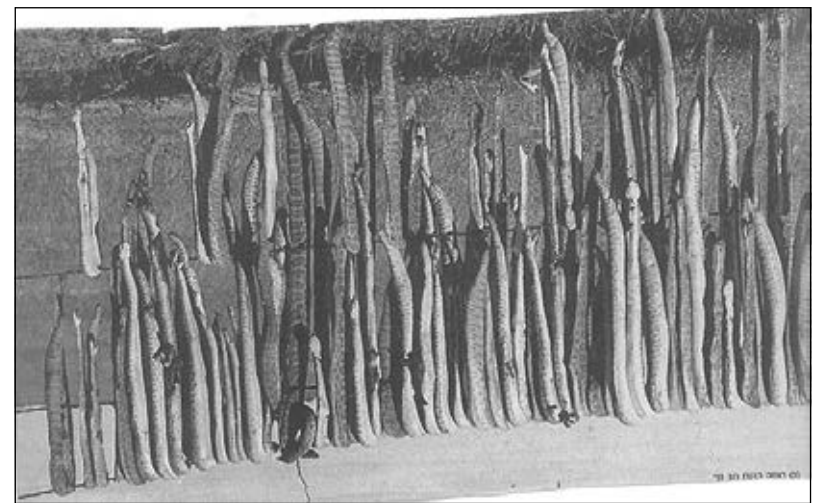
In any case, it's useful to be aware of what's happening with interest rates – the more you know about the factors affecting your investments, the better off you'll be.

Healthy Communication: I can't read your mind!

We're all doing it – all day, every day, whether we want to or not, everyone is constantly communicating with each other. It helps each of us meet our needs as individuals. Although communication is a common yet important skill, healthy communication requires additional effort, time, and motivation. Here are tips to polish your communication skills for your daily and more challenging conversations.

Pay attention to your current emotions and mood. Are you happy, sad, angry, confused? Identifying your own emotions will assist your explanation of your feelings. If this similar feeling returns in the future, there is an increased chance you will know how to respond and approach the challenge.

Be aware of both your verbal and nonverbal communication. Your facial expressions and body language are as important as the words coming out of your mouth.

Hold a confident posture whether you are standing or sitting. Poor posture shows what you are trying to say does not mean much to you.

Keep a calm tone of voice. No one wants to be yelled at. Your calm tone will encourage the person you are talking with to remain calm.

Think before you speak. Once you say something, it has been said. There is no going back to remove what was said.

Using "I feel" statements will communicate your needs. Simple statements such as "I feel upset" will tell the person you're talking to how you currently feel. If this person is supportive in your life, they will take your information and start problem-solving with you. Supportive people in your life care about you and do not want to see you suffer emotionally or mentally.

Actively listen to the person you are communicating with. This includes making appropriate eye contact (research cultural practices on the importance of eye contact/no eye contact), not interrupting the person speaking, and allowing them to clearly state their point before asking questions.

Stay away from blaming others. "You always do this. You make me so angry." These statements are usually taken as an emotional attack and will make the person you are talking to become defensive and shut down in the conversation. Once someone has shut down and refuses to communicate, a solution is less likely to be found.

Clearly express your need to move forward from the conversation. For example, "I need help with chores to keep the house clean" clearly states what this person wants out of the conversation. Unfortunately, people cannot read other's minds. If the need is not clearly stated, the other person may not know how to respond.

Be open to compromise. If you are trying to work through challenges with others, there will be times when you need to compromise to settle disagreements. Stay open-

mindful about what needs you are working to fulfill. Identifying how you may benefit healthily will strengthen your compromise.

It is important to note that verbal and electronic communication have similarities and differences. When communicating via text or email, there is a risk of misunderstanding the information and the individual receiving the message may interpret the tone differently than what was intended. If there are concerns that the information may be misunderstood or miscommunicated, or if communicating about a sensitive topic, it may be best to relay the information verbally or to follow up with the individual you are communicating with verbally to ensure they understand your message. This will also provide an opportunity for the receiving person to ask any clarifying questions.

Learn to accept the things you cannot change. Change is hard, but it will continue to happen. There are simply parts of life no one can change as much as they would like to. Good changes will come.

Although we as humans are in constant communication with one another, let us be mindful that there is always room to improve how we communicate with one another. It is important to note that practice makes perfect. Some of the hardest discussions people have are deeply connected to their emotions making it difficult to communicate. Find supportive people in your life that you can trust. Turn to a mental health professional if you need assistance because life presents tough challenges. Practice these healthy communication skills to feel heard and solve challenges.

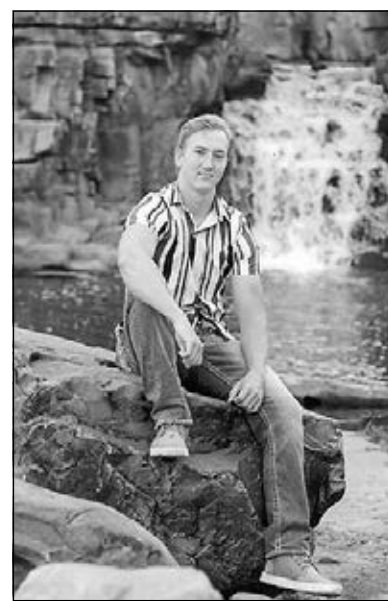

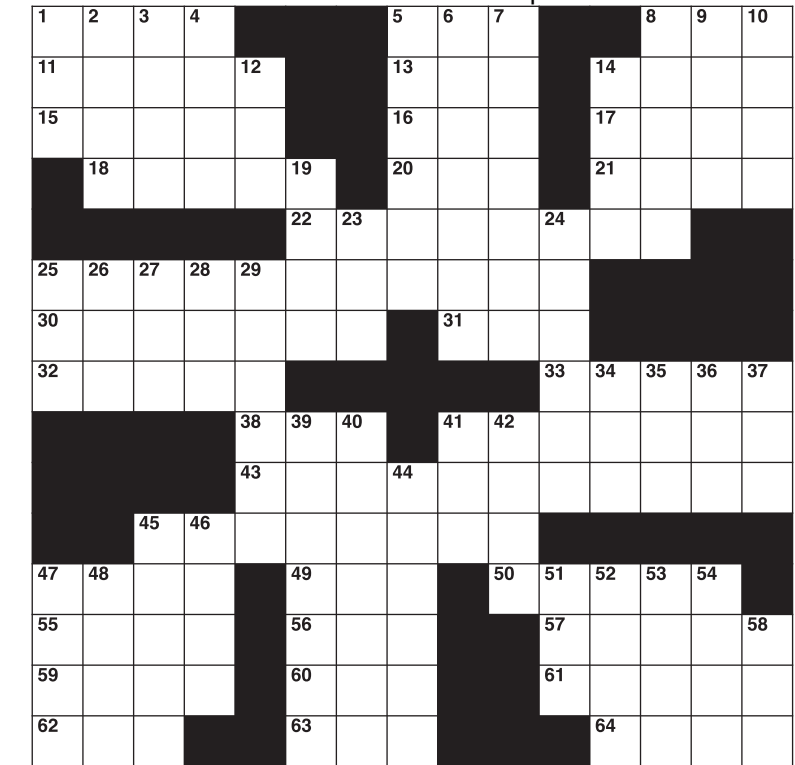

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Legislative Report

In week six the CO2 seemed to displace the oxygen in the room. SB201 passed out of Senate Commerce and Energy with a 7-2 vote and a room packed full of farmers and others testifying against the bill SB201. This bill removes any local control over CO2 pipelines. As I reported before “A county, municipality, township, or other governmental unit, including governmental units chartered under S.D. Const., Art. IX, § 2, may not pass or enforce an ordinance that regulates, restricts, or prohibits a gas or liquid transmission line or an electric transmission line which requires or holds a permit under chapter 49-41B, including without limitation any requirement or restrictions as to routing, setback, construction, operation, maintenance, and zoning permits.” The second part of that section states “This Act preempts any local law, ordinance, or regulation that conflicts with any provision of this chapter or any policy of the state implemented in accordance with this chapter and, notwithstanding any other provision of law, a governmental unit of this state may not enact or enforce an ordinance, local law, or regulation conflicting with or preempted by this chapter.”

In my testimony against the bill I stated that I was not going to refer to corn, ethanol or pipelines. While I am concerned about the problems this caused for counties and townships regarding the pipeline, I have just as much concern for the precedent this bill sets in the future. If this language

becomes law, it opens the door for wind and solar farms to come here, and using this precedent, override the county and township control over any aspects of those projects. The greater problem is, with all the efforts we make to maintain local control, this potentially eliminates local control for any pipeline or electric project the state wants to push. This bill now moves to the Senate floor.

Here are possible tactics that could be used to pass this bill. SB201 has an emergency clause, which means it must have a 2/3 majority vote; in the Senate that equates to 24 of the 35 members. An emergency clause means the law takes effect as soon as the governor signs it. If the Senate believes they have the 2/3 majority on the floor they will pass it to the House. In a house committee it takes a simple majority of the committee to move it to the floor. If the bill passes to the floor of the House it would take 47 votes to pass it with the emergency clause. If they canvass the vote and do not believe they have the 47 votes, it will be amended to remove the emergency clause which then it will only take a simple majority of 36 votes. If it is amended it would then likely get to a conference committee which is comprised of members appointed by the leadership. It should be noted, current leadership are sponsors of the bill. The committee would most likely ask both bodies to concur, which simply means to agree, and the simple majority of both houses can pass the bill. Tactics like this

are used every year on tough bills. You may recall my update about HB1198, Tyler Tordsen’s bill to move all state level office elections to a primary rather than the current system of selecting them at the Republican Convention. We defeated that bill, along with 5 amendments, with a 31-36 vote. If you consider this a republican issue as I do, removing the democrat votes means the republican vote was 24- yes and 36 no votes with one more ‘no’ vote absent. It was soundly defeated. However, the Senate hog housed SB13 and amended it read exactly the same as HB1198. The only reason to do this is if they believe they have flipped enough votes in the house to pass it, otherwise it is a waste of everyone’s time.

I am continuing to work on the prison issue. Out of respect to the newspapers that allow us allotted space for our updates, I have more information about the prison funding on my website and FB pages. The information you likely have been seeing is misleading at best. If you believe “the prison” in Lincoln County will cost 700 million dollars or more, you have not seen the actual proposed budget. The Lincoln County prison itself is less than 350 million, the rest of the money is in 17 other related projects across the state. If you believe they are shutting down the old prison site, you would be wrong there too. Please go to my website for current information on the prison. I will have more detail in my next legislative update. I will have more information here next week.

SENATOR JIM BOLIN

The sixth week of the legislative session saw continued budget hearings on Social Services, Health, and Education. Each of these sections of state government had presentations before the Appropriations committee that required extra time. One of the key areas discussed by the Department of Social Services was the Medicaid expansion approved by a vote of the people in 2022. The program is currently being subsidized by the federal government, but this is the last year that subsidy will be available. A shortfall in excess of \$30 million will be needed this next year to make up for this expansion first authorized in Obamacare back in 2010 and eventually approved by a public vote. The legislature that meets in 2025 will have a major task to meet that need as we can see that the revenue from the sales tax is not growing as fast as in the recent past. This change will put more pressure on the South Dakota budget in years to come.

Another big event for the Appropriations Committee was the adoption of revenue estimates for the budget that will begin on July 1, 2024. Both the Bureau of Finance and Management and the fiscal staff of the Legislative Research Council present estimates for the different sources of revenue for the state. The committee then decides which number to adopt or if they will adopt a compromise figure. Both groups forecast a slowing economy with sales taxes and video lottery showing small increases but with the contractors’ excise tax showing a robust gain. Those are the three biggest sources of state revenue. Other taxes such as those on tobacco and insurance policies will likely decline. Predicting the proper financial standing of the state is a major undertaking but we have often been very close to what the revenue turns out to be. I am hopeful that we will be accurate again for the next budget year.

Two contentious bills that were debated on the floor were HB 1092 and HB 1008. The first dealt with a possible increase in the 911 charge that is added to the telephone bill we all pay. The fee has not been raised for a number of years and a bill was introduced to add seventy-five cents a month to each phone bill. It required a two thirds majority to pass as all spending bills require

such a margin other than the general bill for the regular expenses of the state. Also, the 911 board was not consulted and did not weigh in on this proposal in advance. In the end a number of senators voted to stop the increase and currently negotiations are taking place to perhaps reach a compromise figure. I favored it with some reservations, as increased costs, not covered by this proposed increase, will be financed by local property taxes that are already too high. This bill will likely be voted on again next week, but its prospects are not promising.

HB 1008 would change the residency requirement for admission to the state veterans’ home in Hot Springs. Currently, it is open only to veterans who are residents of our state. It is a very excellent facility in a physically beautiful location but very remote from the rest of the state. The state wants to open it up to out of state veterans in an effort to boost the numbers of people who reside there. I was opposed to this change and argued against it but in the end, it was passed. Numbers are down in this facility, but I am not sure this change is the right adjustment.

The legislature also took time to recognize two law enforcement officials who recently passed away. HC8016 honored the life of deputy sheriff Kenneth Prorok who was killed in the line of duty in Moody County. SC 809 honored Sheriff Dan Limoges, the longtime sheriff of Union County, who died very suddenly of natural causes this last week. The families of each of these men need our prayers and support at this time.

The week of Presidents Day will see many bills evaluated in the Appropriations Committee. Up until now, the policy committees hear the bills and decide them. This next week each spending bill will be decided by the committee. We do this after all the budget hearings are concluded. Some will survive and others will not make it through the gauntlet.

Thanks again to the papers who published this report along with those of my colleagues. The regular run of the legislature will conclude on March 7th, so we are nearing the end. My best to all who read this column.

BIG Update

Recently, the Biden Administration proposed a ban on new permits for new domestic liquified natural gas (LNG) exports. This is another decision the President made in an effort to advance his climate agenda, but the decision fails to

recognize American-made energy is actually cleaner than energy from countries like Russia and Iran. Prohibiting new exports will force our allies to rely on dirtier energy from these adversarial countries, bolstering the economies of enemies instead of ours. Increasing exports could add as much as \$73 billion to the U.S. economy and support 453,000 jobs by 2040, but with Biden’s ban, we lose all of that growth opportunity.

This week, I supported the Unlocking Our Domestic LNG Potential Act when it passed the House so we can continue to grow our LNG exports, ensuring America and our allies can remain energy secure.

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The Supreme Court at the Beginning: What to Wear? Water Projects

The photos and images of U.S. Supreme Court Justices portraying earnest men and women wrestling with momentous legal issues and controversies, the resolution of which will shape American society, politics and the constitutional landscape, fairly capture the serious side of those seated on the nation's High Tribunal. But that's not the Justices' only side. There is another.

In the beginning, indeed, on the first day that the Supreme Court of the United States convened—February 2, 1790—the most important issue confronting the Justices was what to wear to work. Seriously.

As such, the Justices faced the same question that many of us contemplate as we approach our first day on the job—appropriate workplace attire. The issue was a controversial one that went beyond members of the Court. Alexander Hamilton, whose daily dress promoted sartorial splendor, suggested the English wig and gown. Thomas Jefferson, who differed with Hamilton on so many issues, was at odds with him on the question of judicial attire. Jefferson, given to dressing as though every day were Saturday, opposed both. He said, however, that if the gown was to be worn, "For Heaven's sake, discard the monstrous wig which makes the English judges look like rats peeping through benches of oakum!"

As if to test the thesis, Justice William Cushing arrived in New York wearing an outdated judicial wig. Observers noted that the wig created excitement. A group of boys followed the Justice down the street. Cushing was oblivious to the commotion until a sailor confronted him and exclaimed, "My eye! What a wig!" At that point, an embarrassed Justice retreated to his lodgings and discarded the wig. Cushing never wore a wig again, and neither did any of the other Justices.

The Supreme Court first convened in the Royal Exchange, on Broad Street in New York City. Although the Justices did not wear wigs, they were nattily dressed in black and red robes, attire that impressed spectators and suggested gravity, elegance and neatness. The public approved.

The Court's beginnings were hardly auspicious, despite its distinguished membership. The occasion was formal, and



newspapers followed it closely, reporting all the details of the first meeting of the third branch of government. The Court lacked the stature and prestige that it would accrue through the years. Hamilton's description of the judiciary as "the least dangerous branch," was reflected in the disinterest of some offered an appointment to the Court, in the lack of organization and adequate staffing.

Only four of the six men that had been appointed by President George Washington, and quickly confirmed by the U.S. Senate, showed up for the first meeting. Robert H. Harrison declined appointment, likely because he considered his position as Chancellor of Maryland to be more important than a seat on the U.S. Supreme Court. John Rutledge, although a member of the Supreme Court for its first three terms, attended only one session and soon resigned to accept the position of Chief Justice of South Carolina.

Little attention was paid to the organizational and administrative details and needs of the Court, at its first meeting and throughout its first Term in 1790. The Court had nothing to do except admit attorneys to its bar, and it shortly adjourned. It began as a court without an official reporter, litigants, a docket, appeals or decisions to make. For its first two years, it heard no cases and made no substantive decisions until 1793.

John Jay, the first Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, shed light on the beleaguered state of the Court in its early years. At the request of President Washington, Jay took leave from the Court and spent considerable time in England, negotiating what became

known as the Jay Treaty (1794). After resigning from the Court in 1795, he was invited by President John Adams in 1800 to return to the Court, once again as Chief Justice, as successor to Oliver Ellsworth. When Jay was offered the position, he declined it because of the arduous responsibilities of riding circuit, but he also cited the Court's lack of "energy, weight and dignity," which he said were necessary to support the national government. And, he added, the Court lacked "public confidence and respect." He returned to New York to become Governor.

Jay's decision to pass on President Adams's offer was the Supreme Court's gain. Adams proceeded to nominate John Marshall, who became, and remains, the nation's greatest Chief Justice. Marshall converted the Court into a truly co-equal branch of government and laid the foundation for it to become the authoritative interpreter of the Constitution.

It is difficult for us today to realize that, at the beginning, a seat on the Court was little more than an opportunity to complete a distinguished legal career. Even that, however, was not enough to secure the service of some strong and experienced attorneys. But the humble beginnings of the Court are a thing of the past. "Since Marshall's time," Justice Felix Frankfurter once wrote, "only a madman would resign the chief justiceship to become governor," or for that matter, a state judge.

Today, the Supreme Court Justices flex their considerable judicial muscles to resolve the weightiest, and most contentious, legal issues of our time.

The funds could not be used to replenish reserve funds, pay down debt, create a rainy-day fund, bolster pensions or pay for court judgments or settlements. The funds also set a timeline with a short shelf life; all funds had to be allocated by Dec. 31 of 2024 and spent by Dec. 31 of 2026.

Keep the water running

For South Dakota towns, the ARPA money an opportunity to address costly infrastructure issues. The ARPA funds were created to replace lost revenue of up to \$10M. The available money could be spent on public services like road projects, water, sewer, health services, administration, police and fire and environmental remediation.

Many South Dakota cities and counties took the practical approach using the federally-backed local spending to upgrade and repair their water distribution systems and wastewater and storm water infrastructure. They moved on projects they might not have been able to afford if they had not received the funding. By filling the gaps, cities also wouldn't have to bound for future improvements.

Viewed as an historic investment across the state, it's not surprising \$600M has already been allocated toward 207 one-time, individual water and wastewater system upgrades and expansion projects. According to the Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources (DANR), once completed, the projects will affect an estimated 85% of the state's population. Still, less than one third of the money has been spent.

Three Senate Bills meant to access unspent ARPA money

Currently, there are three water-related funding measures that would tap into ARPA money. Senate Bill 66 would allocate \$13M in ARPA funds to improve or upgrade water and sewer systems at state-owned facilities. Senate Bill 16 asks for \$20M for 12 specific water, irrigation and flood control projects. Senate Bill 53 specifically asks for \$94.3M in grant money from the ARPA fund to support the eligible water and wastewater projects that have already been awarded.

Just like the ARPA money, the clocking is ticking for the three Senate bills.

The three bills need to move out of the Senate by February 21 – also known as crossover day – to have any success of passing.

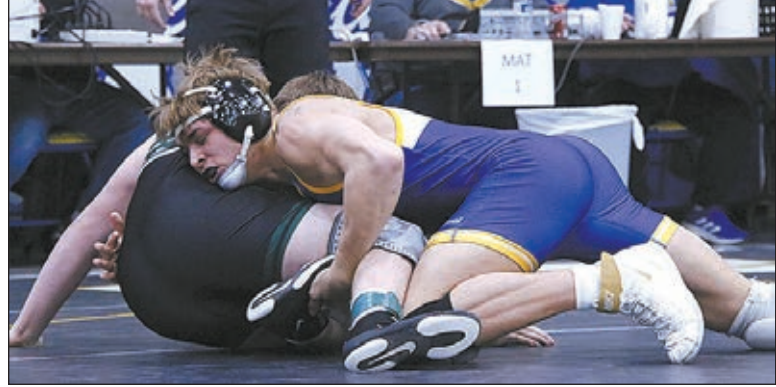
