Canton High School Students Get A Reality Check

Canton High School students were able to participate in the third annual “Reality Check” sponsored by “Love In The Name Of Christ” (Love INC) on February 6. This year there were sixty-eight students who went through the experience. The event took place in the Canton High School Auxiliary Gym students over the first three class periods. The first week of January, students in the Personal Finance and History classes were asked to provide their teacher, Mr. David, with the career they would like to pursue following college or trade school. Then, Love Inc staff took these careers and calculated for each student what their average entry level salary would be, based on South Dakota incomes, for these

the experience. A law enforcement officer is part of the experience, and some students may receive tickets. The “Chance” table simulates other emergency expenses that pop up which could be medical or personal. The program can be eye-



opening for some and could help many students understand how to be fiscally responsible by showing them real-life situations in which they need to make wise financial decisions.

Pastor Clay Lundberg remarked, “The SOS table, where you go when you are in debt, was surprisingly quiet this year. Pastor Sheldon only had to talk to a handful of people and only two kids ended up having to get a second job to make it through a month’s worth of expenses. Some students had to adjust their vehicles and housing in order to make it. One student did so well with their expenses, that she was able to upgrade her vehicle.”

Based on interviews throughout “Reality Check” most students found that their income was lower than expected based on what jobs they had chosen. The biggest shock



individual careers. Payroll taxes were then deducted, and the students were left with their take home pay. Students first stop during the event is with the bank, where they are given a checkbook register with their starting salary written inside. They then proceed to visit a total of twenty different tables, staffed by over thirty community volunteers, where they take care of typical monthly bills. Some examples of the tables are transportation, vehicle tag agency, insurance, doctor, housing, groceries, utilities, entertainment, haircare, furniture, phone, and childcare.

Students make other decisions on life events that come up throughout

God's Just Judgment

Our little girl loves puppies. She is not alone. Puppies are cute and when they grow up, they often become a man's best friend. Sadly, some puppies grow up to be something different. A few weeks before Christmas last year, a man in California was killed at a park by 3 dogs. Another man who tried to help him was injured. As much as we like dogs, I understood why those dogs had to be euthanized.

Some would argue that those dogs should have been spared and rehabilitated. Most people understand that such an approach would have come with enormous risk. If there were a way we could know for certain that rehabilitation would not work and that those dogs would kill again and would even kill innocent puppies, then it would be much easier for the most dedicated dog lover to understand why they were put down.

None of us can see into the future concerning those dogs, but we can look at the patterns of what was likely to happen. God however can see into the future.

What if instead of 3 dogs, it were 3 people? What if it were a whole world full of people? At the time of Noah, God sent a worldwide flood that destroyed every person other than Noah, his three sons, and their wives. Genesis 6:5 tells us, "Then the LORD saw that the wickedness of man was great on the earth, and that every intent of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually." Verse 11 tells us that the earth was filled with violence. God saw what was going on and knew what would happen if he did not intervene.

When God sent the flood, he was able to stop the spread of violence and to let Noah and his family start over in peace. God was able to see what would have happened if he had not stepped in with the flood. Of course our world has not been perfect

since then, but it has not yet gotten that evil again either.

Before the flood, God knew that things were so bad and that he needed to step in and intervene in order to protect humanity. In a similar way, he stepped in years later when he saw the violence of the Amalekites. God ordered the Israelites to destroy all the Amalekites. We may ask why God would give such a brutal order. We must not forget that God knows the future and he knows hearts. He understood what would happen if they were not stopped. He also knew if they would repent or not. It was merciful for him to restrain the evil of the Amalekites just as he restrained evil with Noah's flood. God was protecting the world, just like animal control was protecting the community from the killer dogs.

Another example is the people of Nineveh. They too were exceedingly evil, but God sent Jonah to them to tell them they needed to repent. They did repent and God spared them. God also knew their hearts and knew they would repent. Thus he sent Jonah and showed them mercy.

Often the same people who are critical of God for destroying the Amalekites are also critical of God for allowing evil. The reality is that God is gracious and he does restrain evil while still allowing man a certain amount of freedom. God is good and he is concerned about what happens to people here on earth, so we should take him seriously and follow him. In the past those who ignored him drowned in a worldwide flood or died as Amalekites. Others like those of Nineveh who listened to Jonah repented and were spared. Trust Jesus and come to God so you do not face his judgment. Instead receive his love and mercy. In Revelation 3:19, Jesus said, "Those whom I love, I reprove and discipline; be zealous therefore, and repent." www.southtownchurch.com

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HISTORY REVISITED

I wrote most of this piece back in December after "A Complete Unknown," a movie about Bob Dylan's rise to fame back in the early 1960's, first came out. I then thought I should wait until I had actually seen the film before mentioning it in this column.

As a birthday gift Bill Peterson said he would take me up to Sioux Falls to see "A Complete Unknown." Exactly a month after my birthday we finally made it up to watch the film and it was definitely worth the wait. I wholeheartedly give it a 5-star rating and if it doesn't win a bunch of awards, I will be very surprised. If you grew up in the 1960's like I did, this movie will transport you right back to those turbulent times. Even if you are much younger and weren't around when Dylan first came on the scene, I think you'll enjoy this film that has a ton of great music in it. Whether he wanted it or not, Dylan became "the voice" of the 1960's and his songs spoke to what was going on in America and the world.

One of the first records I bought back in the mid 1960's was a Bob Dylan LP which I still have. Over the years I bought many more as his music changed from folk songs to country, rock, his born-again Christian phase, back to folk and even a Christmas album. Some were great and some were not but Bob always had something very unique and interesting to say.

One of the reasons that I got into Dylan's music was the fact that he came from our part of the country. I had relatives that lived in Duluth where Bob was born and my parents and I would travel up there when I was just a kid back in the 1950's. Of course this was long before the world knew who Dylan was but once his songs started to be heard on the radio and we learned he was from our neighboring state of Minnesota, we had to find out more about him and his powerful songs that spoke to the times we were living in.

Along with the Beatles and the Rolling Stones the music of Bob Dylan helped define the 1960's. Considered by many to be the most important songwriter our country has ever produced, Dylan has given the world an incredible wealth of songs that continue to influence popular music to this day.

The following are excerpts from the Rolling Stone Encyclopedia of Rock and Roll that was published in 1983. It will tell of Dylan's early years and end in 1979 when he won his first Grammy Award. Happy reading as Valentines Day and Presidents Day arrive.

Bob Dylan

The Early Years

Born Robert Allen Zimmerman on May 24, 1941 in Duluth, Minnesota, he moved with his family to Hibbing when he was six. After taking up guitar and harmonica, he formed the Golden Chords while a freshman in high school. He enrolled at the arts college of the University of Minnesota in 1959 and during his three semesters there he began to perform solo at coffeehouses as Bob Dylan (after Dylan Thomas- he legally changed his name in 1962).

Dylan moved to New York City in January of 1961 wanting to meet his idol Woody Guthrie. He went on to visit him frequently at a hospital in East Orange, New Jersey. In April he played at New York's Gerdes' Folk City as the opener for John Lee Hooker. His set included Guthrie-like ballads and his own lyrics added to traditional tunes. A New York Times review by Robert Shelton alerted A&R man, John Hammond, who signed Dylan to Columbia Records and produced his first album, "Bob Dylan". It contained only two originals, "Talking New York" and "Song to Woody". It came out in 1962.

Dylan's second album, "The Freewheelin' Bob Dylan", came out in 1963. It included "Blowin' in the Wind" (a hit for Peter, Paul and Mary), "A Hard Rain's A-Gonna Fall" and "Masters of War", protest songs on par with Guthrie's and Pete Seeger's.

By 1964, Dylan was playing 200 concerts a year and he met the Beatles. He also met Roger McGuinn of the Byrds and gave him "Mr. Tambourine Man" which became the bands first hit in 1965. That same year, Dylan married ex-model Sara Lowndes.

"Bringing It All Back Home" was released in 1965. On half of it Dylan was joined by a Rock and Roll band. When he played the Newport Folk Festival on July 25 the Paul Butterfield Blues Band backed him and he was booed. "Like a Rolling Stone" became Dylan's first major hit reaching #2 on the charts.

As "Rainy Day Women #12 and 35" went to #2 in April, 1966 Dylan's worldwide record sales topped ten million and more than 150 other groups or artists had recorded at least one of his songs.

On July 29, 1966 Dylan smashed his Triumph 55 motorcycle while riding near his Woodstock, New York home. With several broken neck vertebrae, a concussion and lacerations of the face and scalp, he was in critical condition for a week and bedridden for a month. He then spent nine months in seclusion.

On January 20, 1968 Dylan returned to the stage at a Woody Guthrie memorial concert. In May, 1969 he released the overtly countryish "Nashville Skyline" featuring "Lay Lady Lay" and "Girl from the North Country" with a guest vocal by Johnny Cash and a new, more mellow voice.

In 1970 Dylan released "Self Portrait" which included songs by other writers and live takes from a 1969 concert with the Band. He scrapped an early version of "Blood on the Tracks" and recut the songs with studio players in Minneapolis.

In 1976 Dylan appeared in the Band's "The Last Waltz". In 1979 he announced he was a born-again Christian and released "Slow Train Coming". It went to #3 on the charts and netted him his first Grammy for "You Gotta Serve Somebody".

Constantly changing, deliberately elusive and often prophetic, Bob Dylan was the most influential American pop musician of the 1960's and 70's in both his stance and his music. Dylan was defined and denounced for every shift of interest, while whole schools of musicians took up his ideas. His lyrics became so well known that the late Jimmy Carter quoted them in his presidential inaugural speech. By personalizing folk songs, Dylan invented the singer-songwriter genre by performing his allusive, spontaneous vocal style with an electric band creating a widely imitated sound.

Is South Dakota required to provide ambulances to 911 callers?

No.

South Dakota hasn't declared emergency medical services, or EMS, to be an "essential service," meaning the state and county governments aren't required to provide them.

For example, residents in rural areas may call 911 for an ambulance, but it may not arrive due to distance, high demand or other reasons.

South Dakota is among the majority of states that don't require emergency medical services, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures, a bipartisan organization that serves legislators and staff.

In January 2025, South Dakota state Rep. Eric Emery (D-Rosebud) introduced a bill co-sponsored by Republican legislators that would have required cities and counties to provide EMS, but it failed to make

it out of committee.

In 2020, Nebraska declared emergency medical services to be an essential service and is one of at least 15 states to do so.

This fact brief responds to conversations such as this one.

Put your tax refund to work

Most of us probably don't enjoy preparing our taxes, but there's often a reward at the end — a tax refund. If you get a refund this year, how can you make the best use of it?

Of course, the answer depends somewhat on the size of your refund. Last year, the average tax refund was \$3,050, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

Whatever the size of your refund, though, you'll want to maximize its benefit. Here are a few suggestions:

- Contribute to your IRA. If you were to receive about \$3,000, it would go a long way toward funding your IRA for the year — but any amount would help. You still have until April 15, 2025, to contribute to your IRA for the 2024 tax year, but if you've already "maxed out" on it, you could use your refund for

2025. The annual contribution limit for a traditional and Roth IRA remains \$7,000, or \$8,000 if you're age 50 or older. And by getting an early start toward fully funding your IRA, you can reduce the pressure of having to come up with large amounts later in the year.

- Build an emergency fund. Your tax refund could help you start or expand an emergency fund. It's a good idea to keep up to six months' worth of living expenses in such a fund, with the money kept in a liquid, low-risk account, separate from the funds you use for your daily expenses. You might need to draw on this fund for unexpected expenses, such as a major home or car repair or a medical bill that's not fully covered by your health insurance. Without such an emergency fund in place, you might be forced to dip into your IRA or other retirement accounts to pay for these types of costs, and such a move could be expensive, resulting in taxes, penalties and lost opportunities for growth.

- Contribute to a 529 plan. If you have children or grandchildren and you'd like to help them further their education someday, you might consider investing in a 529 education savings plan.

With a 529 plan, earnings and withdrawals are federally tax free, provided the money is used

for qualified education expenses.

Based on where you live, your 529 plan may provide state tax benefits, too. (It is possible, though, that 529 withdrawals could affect financial aid packages, depending on who owns the account.) A 529 plan can be used to help pay for college, accredited trade school programs, some K-12 expenses and even to help repay some student loans.

- Pay down debts. Your tax refund may give you a chance to reduce your debt load. But which debts should you tackle first? You could follow the "snowball" method by paying off the smallest of your loans or debts as quickly as possible. Or you could choose the "avalanche" route by making minimum payments on all debts and using extra funds — such as your tax refund — to pay off the debts that carry the highest interest rates. Either method could help you save money in the long term.

It's not often that you receive a financial windfall such as a tax refund — so think carefully about how you can maximize its benefits.

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

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City Canton Passes Shouses Ordinance

The Canton City Commission met in regular session on Monday, February 3 at 7 p.m. All Commissioners were present at the time of roll call.

With no Visitors to be Heard, the first item under Old Business was the Second Reading to Repeal the Celebrate Canton Board. In response to the Chamber's request to take over Celebrate Canton, a repeal for the Celebrate Canton Board has been drafted. The First Reading was done at the January 21, 2025 meeting. If approved, the Ordinance will be published on February 13 and effective on March 5. Motion to approve by Commissioner Paul Garbers. Seconded by Commissioner Tyler Larson. Unanimous approval.

The final item under Old Business was the Second Reading of Planning & Zoning Ordinance for Amendments Relating to Shouses. Planning & Zoning has conducted their hearing on December 30, 2024 and recommends approval of passage for an Ordinance relating to Shouses. The First Reading was conducted at the January 21 City Commission Meeting. If approved, it will be published on February 13 and effective March 5. Motion to approve by Larson. Seconded by Commissioner Jackie Pigors. Unanimous approval.

The first item under New Business was a Petition to Vacate Alley. A petition to vacate the alley running East and West between Bartlett Street & Cedar Street and Fourth Street & Fifth Street has been submitted. Mayor Sandra Lundstrom noted that she is property owner along this alley. She said she will conduct the Hearing but will be abstaining from voting. Mayor Lundstrom opened the Hearing. Pigors asked why the alley is being vacated and it was mentioned that the alley cannot be used due to safety issues caused by the new car wash. A New Hire - Police Sergeant was next under New Business. It is being recommended to hire Neilson Conley as Police Sergeant at \$35.40/hr (Grade 14, Step 2) effective February 9, 2025. This is a budgeted position for 2025. Motion to approve by Pigors. Seconded by Larson. Unanimous approval.

Advertise for the Open Police Officer Position was next on the agenda. Motion to approve by Pigors. Seconded by Garbers. Unanimous approval.

The final item under New Business was the Beaver Creek Pay Application #11. JSA Engineering has submitted a pay application for the Beaver Creek Trunk Sewer Pay Application. This Pay Application is for \$10,941.51. Motion to approve by Garbers. Seconded by Larson. Unanimous approval.

During Commissioner Dialogue, City Administrator Andrew Pietrus said they will be conducting City Engineer Interviews on February 13 during the day and this will be an open meeting as it does not meet the requirements for executive session.

Administrative Coordinator Alicia Riniker mentioned that Monday, February 17 is President's Day and City Offices will be closed. The City Commission meeting will be held on Tuesday, February 18 at 7 p.m.

With no further discussion, motion to adjourn at 7:17 p.m. by Garbers. Seconded by Larson. Unanimous approval.

Alzheimer's Association Advocates Travel to Pierre in Support of Respite Bill



Volunteer advocates with the Alzheimer's Association met with lawmakers at the Capitol in Pierre for State Advocacy Day on Monday, February 3.

More than 40 South Dakotans from across the state, including those living with Alzheimer's, family members, and others impacted by the disease met with legislators over lunch to share how the disease has impacted their families and communities.

Advocates urged legislators to support H.B. 1098, which would provide \$500,000 in state funding to help family caregivers access

respite care – providing caregivers a break while knowing their loved one is in good hands.

"Caring for a loved one with dementia can be physically and emotionally exhausting, often leaving family caregivers with little time to attend to their own needs," said Leslie Morrow, Executive Director of the South Dakota Chapter. "Right now, we have a critical opportunity to support South Dakota families facing the challenges of dementia care."

The bill passed unanimously in the House Health and Human Services

Committee and is scheduled to be heard by the Joint Appropriations Committee on Friday, February 7.

Lincoln County Commission Discuss Budget Timelines

With all members present, the Lincoln County Commissioners met Tuesday, February 4 in the Lincoln County Boardroom. Commissioners heard agenda items including rezone updates, Behavioral Health agreements, and budget timelines.

The first item brought before the commission was deferred from the January 28 meeting pursuant to SDCL 7-8-18. Board action for an Ordinance of Lincoln County, SD, changing the zone of the property described as Iken's Tract 2, SW1/4 SW1/4, Section 21-T99N-R51W Perry Township from the A-1 Agricultural District to the C Commercial District and amending the Official Zoning Map of Lincoln County. The applicant is requesting a change of zone from the A-1 Agricultural District to the C Commercial District on approximately 4.85 acres. Chairwoman Landeen stated that the public hearing was held at the last meeting, and she would not be taking public comment on the agenda item. Motion to approve by Arends for a change in the rezone, seconded by Putnam. With no discussion, the motion failed 3-2.

Civil Deputy State's Attorney, Joe Meader was present to request board action to execute the 2025 agreement with Southeastern Behavioral Healthcare to allow for Mobile Crisis Team services for Lincoln County agencies. Meader, along with Kim Hansen and Tiffany Wolfgang, who are the directors of support services, were present to

answer any question the commission may have on their program. "For those that don't know, Lincoln County, a service we perform for the county is to pay for involuntary commitments, which occur if Lincoln County is the referring County for individuals who are brought to Avera Behavioral, who are on an active mental health crisis. In 2010 our legislature took a step back and said okay, we've learned a lot in the past 30 years on how mental health crisis work and how those individuals are to be treated. The previous language of the statue said that law enforcement agents shall deliver an individual who is having a mental health crisis to Avera Behavioral, they had no other options," he said. Motion by Schmidt, seconded by Arends, motion carried.

Assistant Highway Superintendent, Jared Narum stood in for Terry Fluit to request board action to authorize the highway superintendent to advertise for bids for the 2025 striping project. With no question from the public or the commission, the motion was approved unanimously.

Auditor Sheri Lund was present for discussion regarding the 2026 budget process and timelines. "We set up a budget committee, and the purpose of the committee was to create a solid process for the budget to include timelines, job separation, and workflow. The committee members included myself, Jim Schmidt, Jake Oakland, Toby Brown, and Paul Anderson and

we reviewed the budget calendar and planning cycle which was part of the agenda and set out the timeline for when everything was going to be done," Lund said. Lund requested the Commission set an amount for the budget increase for the upcoming year. The commission thanked Lund for the report.

Human Resources Director, Traci Humphrey requested board action to approve employee handbook updates. "We have four points to go over, first is to amend the extended sick leave assistance program, currently the language for that is too vague, we want to amend that to require that you must have 24 hours of contribution before the use of the program," she said. Humphrey also made changes to amending payments of benefits when an employee is on FMLA. Short-term disability is now being offered as part of the benefit program, and language needed to be updated, and weather emergency policies for employees who must report to work for public safety. Commissioner Otten asked a question on the weather emergency updates asking if there is an emergency, where will staff be housed? "The goal is to have cots available for them to stay in the building that they are already reporting to for work. We've talked with buildings and grounds, and we already have some cots available," Humphrey responded. Motion by Otten, seconded by Arends to approve updates, motion carried.

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Dates Vehicle Owners May Be Impacted By System Updates

PIERRE, S.D.—The Department of Revenue's Motor Vehicle Division will launch a new title and registration system, 605Drive, on February 17, 2025.

Training for the new system began on December 9, 2024, with basic trainings for county and internal users. Since then, 18,060 computer-based training modules have been assigned to county users. Fifty-one counties have completed 80% of those training courses.

The transition to the new system will occur in three phases. Starting on February 7, registration renewals will not be available on mySDCars.gov or at the DMVNow Kiosks. Registration renewals will continue to be available at county offices through 7 PM Central Time on February 13th although we recommend checking with your treasurer's office to see if they have an earlier stop time to

work through their end-of-day processes.

Between February 14 – 16, 2025, motor vehicle transactions, including title transfers and registration renewals, will not be available. During that same time, the system transition will also delay a dealership's ability to transfer a title and a financial institution's ability to release liens.

The new system will launch on February 17, 2025. Access to registrations will be available at county treasurer offices, DMVNow Kiosks, and through the new online platform, whose link can be found on the Department's website at dor.sd.gov by clicking "Vehicle Registration and Plates" under Online Services.

The Department recommends vehicle owners who renew in February renew their registration early to avoid any delays.



Where's the Beef From?

Grazing cattle are not an uncommon sight in South Dakota. Ranching has long been a part of our way of life, and we take our beef seriously. But when you go to the grocery store, you can't determine if the beef you're buying is from the ranch down the road or from another country. You can look at the label on your shirt to find out where it's from, but why don't we label the beef we eat?

I'm a longtime supporter of mandatory country of origin labeling (MCOOL) for beef. American beef producers – in South Dakota and across the country – work hard to produce high-quality beef. Many consumers would prefer to know whether the package of ground beef or steak that they're buying is an American product. Requiring a country of origin label would provide transparency that benefits both consumers and producers.

I supported provisions in both the 2002 and 2008 farm bills that required MCOOL for beef. Unfortunately, in 2015, the World Trade Organization (WTO) struck down America's labeling requirements. Since then, I've worked with many of my colleagues in Congress and successive administrations to restore country of origin labeling for beef. While I appreciate recent U.S. Department of Agriculture changes limiting the voluntary "Product of the

USA" label to beef born, raised, slaughtered, and processed in the United States, there is still more work to be done.

I recently reintroduced the American Beef Labeling Act, which would require the U.S. trade representative (USTR) and the secretary of agriculture to develop a WTO-compliant means of reinstating mandatory country of origin labeling for beef. My bipartisan bill would require the USTR to have a reinstatement plan in place within six months and implement it within the following six months. If a year passes without MCOOL being reinstated, it would be automatically restored.

South Dakota beef producers will have a friend at the U.S. Department of Agriculture in the Trump administration. President Trump's choice for secretary of agriculture, Brooke Rollins, grew up on a family-run farm. She understands the needs of farmers and ranchers, and I was pleased that she expressed a willingness in her confirmation hearing to work with me to reinstate MCOOL for beef.

South Dakota agriculture producers work hard every day to produce high-quality food and fuel for America and the world. They deserve fair and transparent markets to sell the fruits of their labor. I will continue to work to keep America's farms and ranches strong.

City of Canton Ordinance 1130

ORDINANCE NO. 1130

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CANTON, SD, AMENDING THE ZONING REGULATIONS OF THE CITY OF CANTON BY AMENDING CHAPTER 3 URBAN RESERVE DISTRICT SECTION 3.02 CONDITIONAL USES, CHAPTER 4 RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT SECTION 4.02 CONDITIONAL USES, AND CHAPTER 11.11 SITE-BUILT SINGLE-FAMILY AND MULTI-FAMILY DWELLING STANDARDS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF CANTON, SD:

Section 1. That Section 3.02 Urban Reserve District Conditional Uses of the Zoning Regulations of Canton, SD be amended to include the following:

Conditional Use: Applicable Standards

Shouse: 11.02, 11.04, 11.11, 11.12, 11.16, 18.01

Section 2. That Section 4.02 Residential District Conditional Uses of the Zoning Regulations of Canton, SD be amended to include the following:

Conditional Use: Applicable Standards

Shouse: 11.02, 11.04, 11.11, 11.12, 11.16, 18.01

Section 3. That Chapter 11.11 Site-Built Single-Family and Multi-Family Dwelling Standards of the Zoning Regulations of Canton, SD be amended to include the following:

I. SHOUSE.A shouse, also commonly referred to as a barndominium or shop-style dwelling, is allowed if approved as a conditional use.

1. The gross floor area of a shouse may not have less than fifty (50) percent of the gross floor area dedicated to dwelling purposes. Gross floor area is the sum of the gross horizontal area of all floors of a building measured from the exterior walls but does not include an unfinished basement or attic area not intended for living space. Finished attic areas are allowed as a living space as long as they meet the requirements outlined below.

2. The owner of the building may not lease any portion of the building to any person who is not residing on the premises as a tenant.

3. The garage area must be completely within the enclosed building.

4. There must be a separate exterior walk-through door for outside entrance for the living area and a separate exterior walk-through door for outside entrance for the garage of the structure. These doors shall be side-hinged and shall provide a clear

width of not less than 32 inches and a minimum height of 78 inches. For upper-level living space, a sufficient stairway following the fireblocking standards of the most recently adopted International Residential Code is required.

5. The separation wall between the garage area and living area shall be constructed in compliance with the fireblocking standards in the most recently adopted International Residential Code.

6. The living area must include a full kitchen, living area, full bathroom, laundry facilities, and at least one bedroom. The structure must be constructed in accordance with State and local residential building code.

7. The maximum sidewall height of the shouse shall not exceed eighteen (18) feet above concrete slab and the maximum overall height of the shouse shall not exceed thirty-five (35) feet above concrete slab.

8. The structure shall be constructed on a permanent foundation. The primary exterior finish shall be sided with hardboard siding, aluminum siding, steel lap siding, vinyl siding, stucco, brick, rock, wood or similar approved material. The use of corrugated sheet metal, ribbed or rolled steel for exterior walls is prohibited.

9. No commercial activity is permitted on the premises unless a conditional use is permitted by the Planning and Zoning Commission.

10. Building floor plan, building elevation plan, and lot site plan must be submitted with the building permit application.

11. Minimum lot requirements and minimum yard requirements shall comply with the standards of the zoning district.

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Gov. Rhoden's Inaugural Address

Mr. Chief Justice, honorable members of the Supreme Court, Lt. Governor Venhuizen, senators, legislators, constitutional officers, family, friends, and my fellow South Dakotans:

Good afternoon! Before I begin, I want to thank our people for this honor. Our state is great because "Under God, the People Rule." It is truly an honor to serve our people as Governor. And as a former Guardsman who served for six years, it is a great honor to serve as Commander-in-Chief of the South Dakota National Guard.

South Dakota has given so much to me and my family. I'm a fifth-generation South Dakotan on my mom's side and a fourth-generation South Dakotan on my dad's. My roots are in South Dakota – and I'm never leaving.

About a week ago, I was at Longhorn Steakhouse out in Rapid City. An older rancher walked up to my table and asked, "you Larry Rhoden?" I said, "Yes I am." He said, "Well, it's good to meet you. You built me a couple sets of branding irons a few years back, and they work great!" I can think of very few things that he could have said that would have made me feel better.

The truth is, we are all called to serve one another. Everything that we do for each other should be done to the best of our ability. If we work hard and put others first, things tend to work out. If we do a great job, it will stick with people. But we don't do these jobs to be remembered. We do them because it's right. Public service requires someone to step up and do the right thing on behalf of the people.

100 years ago, another governor gave his inaugural address to the South Dakota Legislature. Carl Gunderson had grown up a farmer. Before he became Governor, he served five terms in the South Dakota Senate, then as Lieutenant Governor for four years. Does that sound familiar to any of you? When he delivered his inaugural address, he spoke of many things that might be familiar to us. He talked about the ups and downs of agriculture; how property taxes are too high; how we need to find ways to make government more efficient. Some of the specifics are different today, but the basic needs facing our state are very much the same. I want to

read you one paragraph from the end of his speech:

"The solution of South Dakota's problems will not come through legislation. The tendency toward state and federal supervision, inspection, and regulation has resulted in a lessening of the spirit of self-reliance. We look to government for too much aid. We need a revival of the spirit of the 'covered wagon.' The spirit that traveled by covered wagon in the early sixties across the prairies of Iowa to the Dakotas; the spirit that made its home temporarily in the 'dugout,' the 'sod shanty,' and the log cabin along the streams. It was the spirit that came more to give, than to receive; the spirit that served humanity and the future of a great state."

My focus will always be to keep South Dakota strong, safe, and free. I want to keep South Dakota strong – strong families, strong businesses, and strong institutions. I want to keep South Dakota safe – with low crime and respect for law enforcement. And I want to keep South Dakota free – freedom will continue to be our calling card as long as I am governor.

I will extend a renewed hand to everyone in our state: East River and West River; small towns and big cities; and yes, our tribal communities. I will be available to discuss the challenges that you face and how we can turn them into opportunities.

I believe that the distinction between challenges and opportunities is largely one of perspective. A challenge is many times an opportunity not yet recognized or realized. Whenever I have a task in front of me, I try not to look at it as an obstacle to be overcome. Rather, if I look at it as an opportunity to achieve something, the task at hand becomes a lot easier.

I want that same mindset to be the foundation of everything that we do during my administration. Five

years ago, Governor Kristi Noem declared South Dakota "Open for Business."

That bold stand was put to the ultimate test during COVID. We overcame that challenge and turned it into South Dakota's greatest opportunity. Now, I want to apply that same approach to all of our work.

I want to keep South Dakota "Open for Business." But more than that, I want our state to be "Open for Opportunity." That means opportunity for families to do what is best for their kids; opportunity for our communities to respond to whatever unique situations they're facing; opportunity for kids



back to farming.

Many of you probably didn't know who Carl Gunderson was. And 100 years from now, folks might not remember who Larry Rhoden is. If we remember that, making the best decisions for our people suddenly becomes a lot easier.

I promise to be a Governor who remembers that the solution to our problems will not come through legislation.

Rather, it will come from providing our people the opportunity to do right for their families. I promise to set a tone of civility and respect, and the example will start from the top. I pledge to govern with openness and responsiveness.

My focus will always be to keep South Dakota strong, safe, and free. I want to keep South Dakota strong – strong families, strong businesses, and strong institutions. I want to keep South Dakota safe – with low crime and respect for law enforcement. And I want to keep South Dakota free – freedom will continue to be our calling card as long as I am governor.

I will extend a renewed hand to everyone in our state: East River and West River; small towns and big cities; and yes, our tribal communities. I will be available to discuss the challenges that you face and how we can turn them into opportunities.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF CANTON, SD THAT CELEBRATE CANTON BOARD § 32.201 MEMBERSHIP, § 32.202 OFFICERS, § 32.203 AUTHORITY, § 32.204 MEETINGS; QUORUM; RECORDS AND REPORTS, § 32.205 REPORTING REQUIREMENTS, AND § 32.206 FUNDS FOR OPERATION, OF CHAPTER 32: CITY ORGANIZATIONS, BE REPEALED

CELEBRATE CANTON BOARD

§ 32.201 MEMBERSHIP—The Celebrate Canton Board shall consist of a total of 5 board members and shall include at least one City Commissioner. All members shall be appointed by the affirmative vote of a majority of the City Commission. Each board member shall serve a three-year term, which shall be staggered. A board member may be terminated at any time by the majority vote of the City Commission.

§ 32.202 OFFICERS—The Celebrate Canton Board shall annually elect from its number a President, a Vice-President, and a Secretary, each of whom shall serve for a one-year term or until his or her successor is elected. Each officer of the board shall be qualified and shall not be a City Commissioner. The Vice-President shall act in the absence or disability of the President. In case of death or resignation of an officer, a successor shall be elected by a majority vote of the remaining board members at the next regular board meeting.

§ 32.203 AUTHORITY—All contracts must be approved by the City Attorney and signed by the Mayor with the permission of the City Commission.

§ 32.204 MEETINGS; QUORUM; RECORDS AND REPORTS—The Celebrate Canton Board shall have regular meetings to be held at least quarterly. Special meetings may be called by the City Commissioner serving on the Board or by the President of the board. The President shall have the authority to cancel a regular meeting if there is no business

to transact at the meeting. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum to transact business, and a majority of the quorum present at a meeting shall be necessary to approve any board action. The Secretary shall keep a record of its proceedings and prepare reports as requested by the Board. If the Secretary is not present the Board may appoint a Secretary Pro Tempore to perform the duties of the Secretary at the meeting.

§ 32.205 REPORTING REQUIREMENTS—Any recommendation by the Board to the City Commission shall be by resolution of the Board. The Board shall make an annual report to the City Commission of its acts and expenditures. Such annual report shall show the condition of all affairs under the control of the Board. The City Commission may request a report from the Board at any time. The records, books, papers, and accounts of the Board shall at all times be available and subject to inspection by a City Commissioner, the Finance Officer, a committee appointed by the City Commission for that purpose, or by a citizen.



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
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C-Hawk Boys Basketball Fall to #1 SFC
